

Parties at impasse on golf course

Both parties walked away from negotiations of the sale of Mill Creek Golf Club to the Salado Golf Club after they could not reach an agreement on April 23.

Morris Foster, owner of Mill Creek, met with Michael Cooper, Terry Dill and Bruce Bolick at Foster's office in Salado.

The Salado Golf Club at Mill Creek offered \$1 million in cash, with a \$25,000 escrow check. This was not acceptable to Foster. He countered with an offer of \$1.5 million. Of that, \$1 million would be paid in cash at the time of the

sale and \$500,000 would be financed by Foster with terms and interest rates to be determined. Foster told the representatives that he would require first lien on the property.

"This was unacceptable," Bolick said, "because it violates the Prospectus that was filed with the State of Texas."

Following the meeting with Foster, the interim board met and discussed other concerns. Golfing memberships in the Salado Golf Club total less than 40 firmly committed members, according to Bolick, a certified public accountant

working with the group. "Since the golfing membership initiation fees are to be used for the working capital of the new club," Bolick stated, "this level of commitment from the golfers does not give the Salado Golf Club sufficient working capital to begin and continue operations.

Unless an agreement between the parties can be reached by May 3, the Salado Golf Club will return the checks to those who have deposited them. Checks will remain in a safe deposit box at First State Bank and will not be cashed until purchase terms are finalized.

Heart Assoc. Paints Ranch Red

Annual event raises funds, to fight America's #1 killer

About 300 locals enjoyed a night under the Texas stars during the Bell County Division of the American Heart Association's annual Paint the Ranch Red at Tenroc Ranch on April 20.

Attendees were served a meal of citrus herb crusted salmon and ancho-espesso smoked beef entrees prepared by The Range Restaurant. After dinner, Bell County Sheriff Eddy Lange auctioned off a handful of items for the live auction. The silent auction took up a tent under the oak trees outside the Blue Heron room of Tenroc Ranch.

Among the live auction items was a one-day guided hunt for Asian Blackjack on Tenroc Ranch, a weeklong stay at a Quebec country home, a handmade custom knife by Bill Smith, and a private dinner for eight by The Range. A weanling and a yearling Appaloosa donated by the Johnson Roofing family was also auctioned.

Cheryl Hunka shared her story of heart disease, healing and health with the audience. She is a 43-year-old executive director of a non-profit trade association. Shortly after a ski trip to Angel Fire, she began to experience chest pains. At first, Cheryl said, "I thought it might be a panic attack, although I had never had a panic attack before."

Then, after preparing her first turkey dinner for family for the holidays, she thought her symptoms, which included nausea and vomiting, might be food poisoning. "Oh no! I thought I might have posioned the family," she said, but a phone call to her parents proved that not to be the case.

Her husband saw that she was sweating profusely and was very weak and he took her to the hospital. None too soon as she was suffering from an acute heart attack. She was taken in immediately for an emergency triple bypass at that time in late December. She shared her story of healing, education and advocacy for heart health with the audience.

An Open Exchange of Ideas



Jackie Robinson's achievement

Before he triumphed over prejudice, Jackie Robinson triumphed over himself.

The signal achievements of the pioneering baseball star, whose story is recounted in the topgrossing biopic "42," were perseverance and self-control. In the face of hatred from fans and opposing players, he showed no anger. In response to isolation from his teammates, he betrayed no self-pity. He went out every day and swung the bat and ran the bases and fielded his position, and displayed the character that his detractors lacked.

"42" is a paean to discipline and to an ethic that has eroded badly in American sporting life, and in our national life in general: "Please, don't express yourself or feel sorry for yourself, don't make excuses, don't worry about what someone else is doing or saying, just go out and do your job."

The first meeting between Robinson and Branch Rickey, when the team honcho broached making him a Brooklyn Dodger, with all the pressure and abuse that would entail, is one of the most mythogenic episodes in baseball history. Rickey

shouted insults at Robinson and demanded to know how he would respond to such provocation. Robinson asked if Rickey wanted a player who lacked the guts to fight back. Rickey responded, "I want a ballplayer with guts enough not to fight back."

As a young man stationed at Camp Hood in Texas during World War II, he got court-martialed. One day, Lt. Robinson refused to move to the back of the bus when the driver told him to, and exploded in rage when the driver called him "n----." He was arrested, but eventually cleared of all charges. Rickey hadn't sought out a shrinking violet. "He wanted someone big enough and strong enough to intimidate, and someone intelligent enough to understand the historic nature of his role," Jonathan Eig writes in his book "Opening Day: The Story of Jackie Robinson's First Season." We never would have heard of Robinson, of course, if he hadn't been a supremely gifted athlete (Rickey wanted to

win the pennant, as well as do right). But baseball history is full of those; it is Robinson's dignity when confronted with so many indignities that sets him apart.

Baseball then had a distinctively Southern flavor that could make even players who were white ethnics feel uncomfortable. A contingent of Robinson's own teammates wanted to boycott him, and so did rival players. He couldn't stay in some of the team's hotels. He got death threats. During all of this, he slumped and thought about quitting, but kept on going, and eventually his talent spoke louder than words.

A legendary image -memorialized in a bronze statue outside the ballpark of the minor-league Brooklyn Cyclones -- is of Kentucky-born Dodgers shortstop Pee Wee Reese draping his arm around Robinson on the field, in a gesture of support and in a rebuke to hostile fans. It may or may not have happened that way. But it's hard to make a statue to the essence of Robinson's accomplishment, to the lonely resolve one at-bat and one inning at a time.

I spent a number of years selling equipment to first responders and these are the guys and gals who arrive at the accident. crash or explosion before anybody else. I have demonstrated equipment to the students at the Fireman Training School at Texas A & M in College Station. And, that is an excellent, very well equipped facility with a well trained and professional staff, training firemen from throughout Texas and beyond. I've been down there several times and always marvel at the extensive complex. One night while making my presentation there were likely several thousand fire fighters concurrently participating in multiple emergency situations including everything from simple brush fires to gas explosions and chemical fires. A fireman who goes through this training is equipped to effectively deal with just about any emergency.

A couple years ago my wife fell in the bathroom, striking her head on the marble floor. I called Salado VFD and Chief Young was here in no more than three minutes. Without pausing, he quickly and efficiently put a neck brace on my wife even before he allowed her to be moved. In the hospital we soon learned that her fall had cracked the number 2 vertebrae. Had Chief Young not been trained to recognize the seriousness of the situation, my wife could have been paralyzed for the rest of her life.....or

And now there are fireman fighting chemical fires with water. First, for their sake and the public at large, let's insist on getting our first responders fully trained before placing them in harm's way and College Station is a great place to start.

The Army Goes Off the Grid Fort Bliss, a base near El Paso, is a hotbed of solar power and other green energy initiatives.

Do you know about "net zero"? That's the wonky phrase attached to an elegant idea: converting communities to total renewable energy, complete recycling, and a culture of conservation to bring humankind's carbon footprint into a sustainable balance with a healthy

Now, imagine the last place you'd expect this ideal to take root... and even flourish. How about an Army base? In Texas? Well, astonishingly enough, the Army is pioneering America's net-zero future. Fort Bliss, a sprawling military base accommodating 35,000 soldiers in El Paso, is one of our armed forces' leading hotbeds of energy conservation and creativity.

The post already has a 1.4-megawatt solar array and has placed rooftop solar panels on enough base housing to generate 13.4-megawatts of energy. It's partnering with El

Paso Electric to add a 200acre, 20-megawatt solar farm by 2015. The base's managers plan to convert its own waste into energy. Oh, and it's engaged in wind power, geothermal, and conservation projects while promoting energyefficient vehicles and building bicycle lanes.

The Army! Who knew

they cared? At Fort Bliss, the rank and file, as well as the brass, are committed to achieving the goal of net zero by 2018. By that date, the base is supposed to generate all of the energy it uses - solely relying Fort Hood, in Killeen, Texas, aims to get there by

The troops have earned their green stripes by planting nearly 15,000 trees and embracing recycling. To encourage the latter, base commander Gen. Dana Pittard has invested the revenue from recycling into skate parks, gyms, and other morale-boosting recreation projects.

"Everybody is getting involved," he says, noting that the effort is changing behavior and fostering a conservation culture, which he hopes "our soldiers will then take with them when they go on."

There's hope for the Earth when even the Army begins to care, take action,



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

Paul Coates

Paul Coates, 86, of La Mesa, California and formerly of Salado, passed away on April 21, 2013.

In Paul's memory, donations may be sent to the foundation which supports the Dalai Lama's efforts to spread peace and protect the culture of Tibet. The Dalai Lama Trust, 241 East 32nd Street, New York, NY, 10016.

Paul Coates was born June 27, 1926 in Jersey City, New Jersey.

He lived with his paternal grandparents and attended St. Aloysius High School. Paul loved to go to the museums near Central Park, NYC.

After graduating from high school, Paul enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He served for two years, as a Quartermaster, on the U.S.S. New Hanover (AKA-73). The U.S.S. New Hanover saw action in the South Pacific during WWII. It sailed to San Francisco for repairs and it was there that Coates celebrated VJ Day.

After repairs, the U.S.S. New Hanover returned to Japan during the occupation period. He would later return to Japan in 1973.

After the war, Paul pursued a dance career in New York City. He made his debut with American Ballet Theatre, appearing with that company both in New York and on tour. He appeared in works such as "Giselle" and Lake."

Taking a leave of absence from ABT in 1952, he worked with the State Fair Musicals in Dallas, where he danced featured

roles and was assistant choreographer. On Broadway and on tour, Paul danced in "Paint Your Wagon" and appeared with Burl Ives, Shirley Booth, Joan Blondell and Maria Tallchief. Among his many television appearances have been the "Jackie Gleason Show" and the "Milton Berle Show."

Coates moved Shreveport, LA in 1954 and started a ballet academy from which he taught countless students for over 30 years. Eventually, he founded Shreveport Ballet Theatre. He choreographed and staged ballets and musicals, including his own version of Balanchine's, "Serenade."

He also introduced Shreveport to the practice of yoga in the early 1970's. He would go each year to San Francisco to further his study and taught many students. As a devoted Buddhist, a highlight of Paul's life was the privilege of having a private audience with His Holiness the Dalai Lama while traveling in Nepal and India in 1973.

When Paul retired from teaching ballet, he lived in San Diego for a year before finding a home in Salado. He started teaching yoga in Salado and Temple in 1994. His last yoga class in Salado was held at The Stagecoach Inn and his last class in Temple was held in June 2011 at the CAC. He made a special effort to bring yoga to elders and enjoyed seeing how it helped them stay active.

He moved back to the San Diego area (La Mesa) to be near his niece and nephew.

Coates is survived by his niece Peggy Graham of La Mesa, Calif., his nephew Steven Graham of Vista, Calif.





For lack of resume, Village aldermen table P&Zappointment

Salado aldermen at their April 18 meeting tabled the appointment of Josh Bratton to the Planning and Zoning Commission because he had not filed a resume or cover letter with his application.

Alderman Hans Fields pointed out that there was no resume or cover letter with the application. "I know he's a pretty good barbecue chef," Fields said, but added that he didn't know about his experience or background for serving on the P&Z board.

Alderman Shannon Ashe said that she felt this was no more than a technicality. She offered that the aldermen should vote on his nomination with the stipulation that a resume would be filled later before he is put into office.

Ashe ended being alone in that sentiment as the board voted 4-1 to table the appointment.

However, the same board voted unanimously earlier this year to appoint Will Lowery to the P&Z. Lowery told *Salado Village Voice* that he had not filled out a resume for the position. He had filled out the three-page application.

On the application are instructions to fill out a resume or cover letter to attach to the application before sending it to the Village.

Lowery is not the only nominee appointed to the P&Z Commission without filing a resume along with the application. Mayor

Danney McCort told Salado Village Voice after the meeting that when he was appointed to the P&Z (before being elected aldermen), that he did not fill out a resume.

The Zoning Ordinance does not specify that a resume is required to be filed with the application. It states on page 7 that, "Any vacancy(s) on the Commission shall be filled via appointment by a simple majority vote of the Board of Aldermen."

In other business, aldermen conducted a public hearing on the annexation of I-35 property to the northern municipal limits and to the southern extra territorial jurisdiction. The board will vote at a later meeting on the annexation. Aldermen also reviewed annexes to the emergency operations plan document.

Aldermen meet again 6 p.m. May 2 at the Municipal Building.

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



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
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Eagles take breather after winning District

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





Contract **Bridge**

By Steve Becker

The opening lead has a decisive effect on the outcome of many hands. Sometimes it defeats a contract, and sometimes it hands declarer the contract on a silver platter. Quite often it radically changes the course of play, since it might compel declarer to adopt an approach he would not normally have considered.

Take this deal where West has no clear-cut lead and decides to start with a trump. This turns out to be his best shot, because without the trump lead, South would eventually be able to ruff a heart in dummy and so acquire his 10th trick.

But the trump lead poses a direct threat to that plan and forces South to reconsider whether to try for a heart ruff in dummy. In the actual deal, if he tries for the heart ruff, he goes down against best de-

Thus, let's say he wins the spade in dummy and leads a heart at trick two. East wins and returns a trump. When declarer then leads another heart. West wins and returns his last trump, and South eventually loses three hearts and a diamond.

However, the opening trump lead should persuade South that trying for a heart ruff is no longer a viable proposition, so he should seek another line of play. As it happens, there is one, and South should not dawdle in adopting it as his only realistic possi-

Accordingly, after winning the first trick in dummy, he plays the A-J of diamonds, hoping to find the suit divided 3-3, in which case dummy's diamonds can be established. This counterstroke proves successful, and, in fact, if the defenders do not promptly cash two hearts, South fin-

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


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
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Drippings Grill's Stain Patio Bricks

Q: The patio bricks underneath my grill tend to catch a lot of grease and oil drippings. I clean up after every barbecue, but there are still stains on the brick from the grease. How can I get these up without bleaching out the spots? -- Rick in Savannah,

A: With porous surfaces like brick and concrete, oil stains can set in and he tough to get out. Your instinct to avoid using bleach or another type of acid to clean up the stains (like lemon juice) is right on. These can just make things worse and can discolor some types

Clearing the grease stain may take a few attempts with a number of cleaning agents. Start with the least harmful materials. most of which can be found in your kitchen or garage.

First, fill an old coffee mug with warm water, a couple of tablespoons of dish soap and a teaspoon of salt. Grab a clean synthetic scrubber brush (like a dishwashing brush). Scrub the stain with the soapy water and rinse with warm water, repeating a few times and letting the bricks dry out to see the results in between each try.

If that doesn't clear the stain, you can try an oilstain cleaner purchased at your local home-improvement store. Some DIYers recommend applying an engine degreaser and letting it sit for about an hour, but test any cleaning agent or degreaser on an inconspicuous spot first.

The sad truth is that it's unlikely any cleaner, commercial or homemade, will completely clear away the grease stain. More powerful or acidic cleaning agents could damage the brick, so they should be avoided. If the stain is really bad, consider replacing the brick. If it's not too bad, clean the area as best you can and cover it with a grill mat to prevent further staining.

HOME TIP: To prevent your grill's grease and oil drips from staining your patio or deck surface, place a grill mat underneath, and clean up spills promptly.



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


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
