# **Salado Golf Club continues** effort to purchase Mill Creek

Salado Golf Club will continue its efforts to raise additional funds after the resignation of Terry Dill as its head and withdrawal of his \$10,000 commitment check.

The interim board met May 21 following a May 16 meeting with members who have pledged and given checks of \$10,000 or more to raise the capital to purchase the Mill Creek golf course property.

At the May 16 meeting, Professional Golf Association (PGA) member Terry Dill, attorney Michael Cooper and certified public accountant Bruce Bolick informed the standing room only audience at the Salado municipal building that negotiations had reached another impasse on the purchase of the property.

The group thought that they had reached an agreement with Morris Foster on May 13, but those details changed earlier in the day May 16.

The agreement in principle was this: \$1.75 million purchase price with

\$500,000 down payment by Salado Golf Club, financing the remainder over 15 years at five percent. The balance would be interest only for the first three years with prinicipal and interest to be paid over a 12 year period after that.

Dill told the group that Foster came back on May 16 with a change to the agreement. He now insisted on \$600,000 down payment with \$1.15 million to be financed.

This was a deal breaker for Dill, who resigned officially from the board by letter and withdrew a \$10,000 commitment.

Bolick had every check that had been given to the group in his hands on May 16. He told Salado Village *Voice* that since May 16 he has returned four checks, including Dill's. He said that since the May 16 meeting he has been given four additional \$10,000

On May 21, the board met to discuss going on despite the absence of Dill and voted to make two changes in its fund raising efforts.

First, Salado Golf Club will now accept loans in increments of \$2,500 for those who would like to join in the effort but cannot meet the \$10,000 level.

"There seemed to be a large movement toward doing that last Thursday," Bolick said. "We'll see if that pans out."

Also, any person who is a current member of the Mill Creek Creek Golf Club or the Salado Golf Club as a social member will be able to join the Salado Golf Club for initiation fees reduced by half.

Bolick said that the group will continue to raise funds to purchase and rehabilitate the golf course in an effort to turn it into a member-owned 501(c)7 organization.

He added that Foster has said that he will close the golf course on Oct. 1 in order to maximize the tax benefits that will disappear on Jan. 1.

What structure that closing could take is not clear at this time, but Michael Cooper told the group that the property could be fenced off and become "pastureland" until it could be developed at a later date, if action is not taken before Oct. 1.

Salado High is in the hunt for its second UIL Lone Star Cup with its Academic Team doing well this week at state and its baseball team still in the playoffs.

The UIL Lone Star Cup is awarded annually to five high schools, one in each of the five UIL classifications (1A, 2A, 3A, 4A and 5A), based on their team performance in district and state championships. The winning schools in each classification will receive the UIL Lone Star Cup trophy and a \$1,000 scholarship, also presented by the UIL.

Salado is officially in Marching Band, Team

fifth place with 40 points, but the One Act Play added six points for Salado on May 21 when "The Boys of Winter" earned third place in state.

Softball and baseball standings are not yet included in the tally.

After arriving at the prom, Hannah was once again honored by her peers who voted her as Prom Oueen.


She danced the night

## atriot' Games at the IRS

It sounds like the plot from a dystopian libertarian novel. The word "patriot" and the phrase "educating on the Constitution and Bill of Rights" triggered heightened scrutiny from the most intrusive agency in the federal government.

We now know that the Internal Revenue Service did indeed target conservative groups, as had long been rumored and oft-denied. The news is a perverse confirmation of the groups' worldview, and a challenge to President Barack Obama's. He always harangues us about putting more trust in government, and then you find out that the IRS has been singling out his political enemies.

This isn't an unaccustomed role for the IRS. It was notoriously used as a partisan bludgeon by Franklin D. Roosevelt and Richard Nixon, an abuse that was a Watergate impeachment count. In this case, the IRS gave special scrutiny to conservative groups filing for tax-exempt status as so-called 501(c)(4) organizations. Their applications would be flagged if an offending phrase or issue popped up, say, "tea party," or statements criticizing "how the country is being run,"

eral debt. Then, the group might be hit with massive document requests and queries about the activities of family members of board members and key officers.

No one defends the propriety of any of this. President Obama says it is "outrageous," and even the IRS calls it, drawing on that elastic Washington word, "inappropriate." So how did it happen? The IRS explanation is that it was an innocent mistake by the rubes out in the Cincinnati office, who apparently lack an appreciation for objectivity and the rule of law, not to mention common sense.

We will learn soon enough how this holds up. But Ken Vogel, a reporter at Politico who has covered the IRS, says via twitter that the "Cincinnati office has little autonomy" and "mostly just follows DC's instructions." Certainly, if the IRS had a rogue operation on its hands, it didn't act like it. An agency vigilant in defense of the rights of citizens and of its own reputation would have ex-

Reports say that the IRS targeting of conservatives began as early as 2010, and senior IRS officials learned of the practice two years ago. In March 2012 congressional testimony, then-IRS Commissioner Douglas Shulman repeatedly denied any targeting of conservatives. Evidently, no one who knew about it did his or her boss the favor of telling him he had misled Congress.

There are two steps toward making it right. One is a thorough congressional investigation and the firing of anyone involved in the harassment or in looking the other way or covering it up.

The other is, as much as possible, to remove political regulation from agencies like the IRS that can become the tool of one party and its partisan agenda. The Federal Election Commission has its faults, but it is designed to be bipartisan and is bettersuited to making politically sensitive judgments. Needless to say, ours should be a country where you can start a group with the word "patriot" in the title and not incur the hostility of the American gov-

The recent good news about job creation obscures

the bad news facing the nation's middle class. At last, some excellent economic news for folks long-mired in the stagnant labor market.

"Jobs Spring Back," exclaimed a typical headline on recent reports that 165,000 private-sector jobs were added in April. Wow - the thunderous, three-year boom of prosperity that has rained riches on Wall Street is finally beginning to shower on our streets, right?

Well, as dry-land farmers can tell you: Thunder ain't rain. Read beneath the joyful headlines and you'll see the parched truth.

For example, more than a third of working-age Americans are either out of work or have given up on finding a job. Also, last month's hiring increase was almost entirely for receptionists, waiters, temp workers, car-rental agents, and other low-wage positions. Plus, manufactur-

ing, generally the source of good, middle-class jobs, didn't add workers in April, when the unemployment rate inched back to 7.5 percent.

problem-Especially atic was the continued rise in underemployment people wanting full-time work, but having to take part-time and temporary jobs. Underemployment is also pounding college graduates. While they've been more successful than non-grads at landing jobs, they're not getting jobs that fit their career goals or even require the degrees

they spent money and time to obtain.

Indeed, many of those rental agents and restaurant employees you encounter hold four-year degrees, forcing everyone else to scramble for the few, even lower-paid jobs farther down the skill ladder. Meanwhile, the next graduating class is about to flood into the labor market with nowhere to go.

America's middle class is in a crisis, while our pathetic political leaders pretend Wall Street's prosperity covers us all — and the corporate media puts little happy-face stickers over the dark reality faced by the workaday majority.







# **Centerville pushes Salado** to 3 games in quarterfinal



Senior Jacob Cheatham, returns as well. He was an All-State pick at the short stop and pitching positions.



EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

The 2A Region III championship in baseball this week is likely to rekindle a slow-nburning, decades' long rivalry between Salado and its northern neighbor Troy. Salado and Troy played the first round of the best-of-three series at 7 p.m. May 29 at University of Mary Hardin-Baylor. The game was after press time. Game two will be played June 1, beginning at 5 p.m. at either Baylor University or UMHB. A third game, if necessary, will follow 30 minutes after game two.

A lot rides on this bestof-three series this week between the second-ranked Salado Eagles and the seventh-ranked Troy Trojans, chiefly a trip to the Round Rock Dell Diamond with a berth in the UIL 2A State Baseball Tournament June

Usually, the two schools have a friendly rivalry playing in the same football, basketball and baseball districts, but even when they don't see each other in district play, they play in non-district or tournaments against each oth-

The rivalry is not as heated as Salado's rivalries with Jarrell and Rogers but

how Salado dismantled a highly-ranked Troy team in the 2008 Region semi-final 16-2 under head coach Melvin Bates. That Eagle squad went on to win the State Championship, the first in baseball for Salado.

Troy returns 10 starters from last year's Region semi-finalist team. The Trojans were 31-6-1 last year and 31-1 in district, losing to eventual state champion Jarrell in the Region final.

Two of those players were named to the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association All State team. District MVP Jon Malmin was named to the THSBCA team as a first team pitcher in his junior year. Kyle Whitley was named to the THSB-CA All-State first team as a sophomore. He was last year's District Offensive

Other returning starters include senior All District nods Nathan Schleede, Dalton Lewis, Daniel Wurtser and Justin Saxon and junior All District nominees Haden Mattke, Rylan Cox and Payton Standford and junior Matt

The Trojans were 12-0 in district this year as champions of District 21AA ahead of Crawford and Clifton. To get to the jans swept Trinity in two games after a first round bye, beat Teague in three, and Central Heights in three last week.

The two teams met early in the season in the Rockdale baseball tournament in late February. Salado got the better of Troy in that tournament as the Eagles went on to win the tournament crown. Salado beat Troy 4-2 and out hit the Trojans seven to six. Troy had a 2-0 lead until the fourth inning when Cole Haag got a walk and rode home on a home run by Reagan Bazar. The Eagles added two more runs in the fifth for the win. Britton Hawes pitched for the win against Troy, facing 32 batters in the tournament-shortened five inning game. He struck out four batters.

All eight teams left in the playoffs were ranked in the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association Top 25 in the last week of rankings before playoffs began in May.

Hughes Springs is the top-ranked team in state, followed by Salado at number two, Halletsville at number six and Troy at number seven. Hughes Springs remains at the top of the list after getting past Grandview in three games. Grandview gave Hughes

its season record. Hughes Springs plays Palmer, the ninth-ranked team in state in a best-of-three series at University of Texas-Tyler May 30 and June 1 to determine the Region II Champion. Bangs and Wall, ranked 19th and 20th respectively in the THSB-CA poll, face off May 30 in Sweetwater with games two and three (if necessary) at Hardin-Simmons on June 1 for the Region I Championship.

Halletsville and Marion, number 18 in the coaches poll, will play May 30 at Weimar and June 1 at New Braunfels Canyon High Schoo for the Region IV Championship.

The Region champions will face off June 5-6 in Round Rock at the Dell Diamond for the 2A State Tournament. Semi-final games will be played at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. June 5, pitting the Region I and II champions against each other and the Region II and IV champions. The winners of the semi-final games will play each other for the state championship at 12 noon June 6.

Salado Village Voice will post results of the series with Troy on the websitewww.saladovillagevoice.com, as well as updates on the state tournament, if Salado qualifies.



### Tax Break on Energy Efficient Products May 25-27

During Memorial Day weekend, Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales and use taxes on purchases of certain energy efficient products. The 2013 ENERGY STAR sales tax holiday begins at 12:01 a.m. (after midnight) on Saturday, May 25, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Monday, May 27 (Memorial Day).

The products qualifying for the exemption are: Air conditioners priced at \$6,000 or less \$2,000 or less Ceiling fans Incandescent and fluores-

cent light bulbs Clothes washers\* Dishwashers Dehumidifiers Programmable

thermostats\*\*

\* Because most dryers use similar amounts of energy, ENERGY STAR does not label clothes dryers.

mable thermostats was suspended on December 31, 2009; however, any existing stock of ENERGY STAR labeled programmable thermostats offered for sale by retailers is still eligible for the exemption. display the ENERGY STAR logo, which may appear on the appliance, the packaging or the Energy Guide label. ENERGY STAR is a joint program Refrigerators priced at of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy. Earning the ENERGY STAR means a product meets strict energy efficiency guidelines set by these two federal agencies. There is no limit on the number of qualifying items one can purchase during this sales tax holiday, and an exemption certificate is not required.

The tax-free holiday also applies to Internet and catalog sales of eligible products, provided that (1) the item is paid for and delivered to the purchaser during the exemption period; or (2) the purchaser orders and pays for the item and the retailer accepts the order during the exemption period for immediate shipment, even if delivery is made after the exemp-

tion period. The retailer accepts an order when the retailer has taken action to fill the order for immediate shipment. Actions to fill an order include placement of an "in date" stamp on a mail order and issuing a confirmation verifying the date the seller accepted the order. An order is considered "for immediate shipment" even if delivery or shipment may be delayed because of a backlog of orders or because an item is temporarily out of stock or on back order by the seller.

Layaway Plans Layaway plans can be used to take advantage of the sales tax holiday. Layaway sales of eligible products qualify for the exemption when either the final payment on a layaway order is made and the merchandise is given to the customer during the exemption period, or the TACLA29893C ■ tomer and the order is accepted into layaway by the retailer during the exemp-I tion period for immediate delivery upon full pay-

ment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period.

#### **Delivery Charges**

Delivery, shipping, handling or transportation charges connected to the sale of a qualifying item purchased tax free during the sales tax holiday also qualify for the exemption. Such charges are included as part of the sales price of qualifying products sold during the holiday whether separately stated or not. For example, assume a retailer sells an ENERGY STAR-rated dishwasher tax-free during the sales tax holiday and charges the customer an additional fee for delivery. The entire amount billed to the customer for the purchase and delivery of the qualifying appliance is exempt from tax, even if the delivery charge is separately stated or billed after the sale.

Shipping and handling charges must be properly allocated when a package or delivery contains both exempt and taxable items. For example, assume a retailer sells an ENERGY STAR-rated clothes washer tax-free during the sales tax holiday. The same customer also purchases a clothes dryer, which does not qualify for the exemption. The retailer charges the customer an additional fee of \$25 per appliance for delivery. The \$25 delivery fee connected to the delivery of the qualifying exempt clothes washer is exempt from sales tax, but the \$25 delivery fee connected to the delivery of the taxable clothes dryer is

subject to tax. However, if the delivery charge is a flat rate per package or delivery address and the amount charged is the same regardless of how many items are included in the package or delivery, for purposes of the exemption the total charge may be attributed to one of the items in the package rather than proportionately and separately allocated between the items. For example, assume a seller charges a flat fee of \$50 per customer address for delivery regardless of the number of items delivered to that ad-

# **Electrical Outlets Don't Sit Straight**

THIS IS A HAMMER By Samantha Mazzotta

Q: In my mom's home, I noticed that a few of the cover plates on the outlets don't sit flush with the wall. Some are angled out so there is a small gap between the plate and the wall, for example. I tried tightening the center screw on the plates, but this didn't help, and one of them cracked when I overtightened it. How can I fix this? -- Sarah in Syracuse, N.Y.

A: It's likely that the receptacles themselves, or their housing, are misaligned. This can be caused by the screws holding the receptacle in place being loose, or the housing (the junction box) not being properly secured. Because the receptacle or junction box doesn't sit straight, the cover plate doesn't sit straight. Hence, the gap between the cover plates and the wall.

Turn off power to the crooked outlets, at the circuit panel. To make sure power is no longer reaching an outlet, plug a radio or a lamp into each of the two outlets of the receptacle. If they stay off, power is most likely off. However, always treat electrical hardware and wiring as if it is live.

Remove the cover plate and take a look at the small screws on either side of the receptacle. If they're loose, tighten them so that the receptacle sits straight within the metal junction

Straightening the receptacle should fix the coverplate alignment problem. However, if it doesn't, check to see if the junction box itself is straight. It may have been installed at a bad angle.

If this is the case, adjusting the box is more complicated. You'll have to remove the receptacle, disconnecting its wires and labeling them so that you are able to reconnect them correctly. Then you'll have to unscrew the junction box from the stud, use a level to find the correct angle, drill a new hole or holes in the stud, then attach the junction box via the new holes, rewire the receptacle and put it back in place. This can be time consuming and frustrating, because you are working in a tiny space. If you've never wired up a receptacle or light switch before, there are several risks involved, from damaging the receptacle to injuring yourself.

In many cases, the first fix -- tightening the receptacle screws -- generally does the trick. However, if the second issue arises, consider the amount of work involved and whether you're confident in doing it. If you're not sure you can do it, consider having a licensed electrician come in to straighten the junction boxes and give the house's entire electrical system a look over for any other

HOME TIP: Use a small appliance, like a radio, lamp or a fan, to test whether power is reaching an outlet, by plugging the appliance

dress. Assume that during the sales tax holiday a customer purchases a qualifying ENERGY STAR-rated refrigerator tax-free, a taxable stove and a taxable microwave and the seller charges the customer the flat fee of \$50 for delivery of all three items. Under these facts, the seller may attribute the \$50 charge for delivery to the sale of the refrigerator (a qualifying exempt item) and does not have to allocate the delivery charge between the refrigerator, stove and microwave. If the charge is attributed to the refrigerator, then the entire flat fee delivery charge qualifies for the exemption. The sales invoice must clearly identify that the delivery charges were attributed to the exempt item and separately state the tax due on the non-qualifying merchandise.

It is important to note that delivery and/or installation charges billed in connection with the sale of air conditioners and refrigerators may disqualify some of those products from the exemption. During the ENERGY STAR sales tax holiday, only air conditioners with a total price of \$6,000 or less and refrigerators priced at \$2,000 or less qualify for exemption from sales and use tax. The total sales price includes charges by the seller for delivery, and charges for installation performed by the seller if the items will remain tangible personal property (i.e., not built-in or permanently attached to the structure of the building). See Tax Code Section 151.007. The addition of these charges to the retail

price of the appliance will cause the loss of the exemption if the total price exceeds the cap.

For example, the purchase of a refrigerator priced at \$1899 plus a delivery charge of \$100 will have a total sales price of \$1999 and will qualify for the exemption. But, a refrigerator priced at \$1999 with a delivery charge of \$100 would not qualify for the exemption because the total sales price would be \$2099 which exceeds the \$2000 cap.

#### **Installation Charges**

Charges for installation of qualifying items purchased during the sales tax holiday may qualify for exemption depending on whether the items are permanently attached to or installed in real property and whether the realty is residential or nonresiden-

Items that are freestanding or mobile, such as clothes washers, dehu-

midifiers, refrigerators, portable dishwashers and window or room air conditioning units are tangible personal property. If an item retains its identity as tangible personal property after installation, then installation charges billed by the seller of the item also qualify for the sales tax holiday exemption - even if the installation is performed after the holiday period is concluded.

Items such as programmable thermostats, central air conditioning units, ceiling fans and built-in refrigerators and dishwashers that are plumbed, wired or otherwise permanently attached to a building structure are improvements to real property. For

items that are incorporated into realty, the taxability of the installation labor is determined by the type of jobsite.

Labor charges are not taxable on new construction and residential repair and remodeling jobsites. Therefore, no tax is due on charges for installing items such as ceiling fans, programmable thermostats or central air conditioning units in residential property or during a new construction project. See Comptroller Rule 3.291, "Contractors," for more information.

Nonresidential repair remodeling is a taxable service. Therefore, tax is due on charges for installing ceiling fans, built-in appliances, programmable thermostats and central air conditioning units in nonresidential

from page 4D real property, regardless of when the installation is performed. Charges for installation performed on existing nonresidential real property should be separately stated on the invoice from the sales price of the qualifying ENER-GY STAR-rated item. A lump sum charge for the purchase of an ENERGY STAR item and installation is subject to tax as the purchase of nonresidential repair and remodeling.

> Sellers may not advertise or in any way promise to pay or not charge sales tax that is due on the sale of taxable items. See Tax Code Section 151.704. Sellers may, however, advertise that tax is included in the sales price of the taxable items that they sell. 96-1331
