Graduation June 2 for Salado High School

High Salado School Class of 2012 commencement ceremony will be 11 a.m. June 2 at the Mayborn Campus Center at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor in Belton. Salado has 95 candidates for graduation, including Valedictorian Morgan Daniels and Salutatorian Haylee Young.

Morgan Daniels is the Valedictorian for the 2012 Graduating Class with an overall GPA of 105.9.

She is the daughter of Rick Daniels of Payton, UT and Elena Daniels of St. Alban's, ME. Her grandparents are Hesse Merrill, of Prentiss, ME and Cindy Merrill, of Snowflake, AZ Richard Daniels of Michigan and Diane Daniels of Utah.

She will be attending Brigham Young University on a Heritage Scholarship, where she will be studying biochemistry or chemical engineering. "I hope to attend medical school and become a pathologist," she says.

Primaries head to run-offs

Rolly Correa unseated incumbent Roger Laird in the Republican Primary for Constable, Precinct Two on May 29. Meanwhile, the Bell County Sheriff's race is headed to a July 31 runoff between Eddy Lange and Jim Patterson in the Republican Primary. The winner will face Democrat nominee Frank J. Hernandez, Jr.

With a voter turnout of 11 percent at the Republican Primary, several races will be decided by a special run-off on July 31. David Dewhurst and Ted Cruz will face each other in the Republican Primary run-off for U.S. Senator. Meanwhile on the Democrat side, Paul Sadler and Grady Yarbrough are headed to a run-off for

their party's choice in November. The winner of the Republican and the Democrat primaries will face each other in November.

Correa will be elected as Constable for Precinct Two as there were no Democrat nominees for the position.

A tally of local precinct 203, County and State voting in both the Democrat

and Republican Primaries can be found inside this edition of the newspaper. Names listed in bold won their respective races. Runoff competitors are listed below the results for each race.

Work crews may actually begin work on June 1 for the project.

The work will include reconstruction of exit and entrance ramps for the three exits of Salado (283, 284, 285), as well as a realignment of West Village Rd. connecting beneath an overpass to align with Salado Plaza Dr.

Throughout the construction process, Salado Village Voice will post lane and road closings on its Facebook page and website, as well as in the print edition (when announcements are made in time).

The time-wasting network

"If time be of all things the most precious," Benjamin Franklin said, "wasting time must be the greatest prodigality." But he had never heard of a status update. Facebook is the world's foremost purveyor of information you shouldn't care about. Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg is to uselessness what Henry Ford was to the automobile. He has mastered it on an industrial scale and is riding it to a vast fortune. At more than \$100 billion, the valuation of Facebook equals the annual GDP of Morocco or Vietnam, countries that don't top anyone's list of economic powerhouses, but do actually produce some things of value.

Can 900 million people, the roughly one-eighth of the planet that uses Facebook, be wrong? If they are passing around photos of pets in party costumes, telling us whether they are having a good or bad hair day and playing the farming simulation game "FarmVille," the answer is, "Why, yes they can!"

Facebook has transformed oversharing from an annoying habit of the poorly socialized into the very stuff of daily interactions. No thought is too banal, no event too minor, no mood too passing, no photo too embarrassing to be posted on Facebook.

Facebook has been a boon to employers vetting prospective employees and to divorce lawyers looking for incriminating evidence. Once, taking vodka shots out of the bellybutton of your friend at the bar at 2 a.m. might have been an ill-considered caper to laugh about the next day. Now the photo may well end up on your "timeline."

It's not that Facebook has no redeeming value. It brings together people with similar interests who wouldn't meet otherwise, and is a powerful organizing tool, in causes ranging from high-school re-unions to Middle Eastern revolutions. And, oh yeah, it reminds you of friends'

birthdays. This is all to the good.

Yet Facebook is overwhelmingly the ephemeral chasing the trivial. The "like" and "poke" functions have an appropriately grade-school feel. (It's hard to believe that Facebook once grew its business on the basis of its supposed cool.) The designation "friend" is often a poor simulacrum of the real thing. In a notable Atlantic magazine cover story, Nicholas Carr asked, "Is Google making us stupid?" Compared with Facebook, Google is the King James Bible. Google is the entry point to a world of news and information beyond what leftovers your old college roommate is eating for dinner tonight before taking her papillon, Princess, for a walk.

The T.S. Eliot line "distracted from distraction by distraction" could have described the temptations of 21st-century social media. Other technologies -- the telephone, television, email -- have had the same double-edged capacity to enable work and bring people together, or fritter away time on nonsense.

Facebook tilts toward pure distraction, which is one reason a pall of doubt hangs over its post-IPO future. About half of people in one poll say Facebook is a fad. Mark Zuckerberg is mentioned in the same breath as Steve Jobs and Bill Gates, but his product is considerably more vaporous. The threat to Facebook will always be the advent of some new and even more alluring way to waste time.



SJH gets new principal; Process was thorough

Harry Miller, our junior high principal, announced in April that he will be retiring this summer. His replacement will have some big shoes to fill both literally and figuratively as Mr. Miller wears size 14 shoes and he has done an outstanding job in Salado these past three years. He has had a great career and some of his previous assignments have included serving as head boy's basketball coach at Temple High School, head men's basketball coach at Baylor University for five years, and high school principal at Belton High School and Cedar Hill High School. Mr. Miller is one of the very best principals I have ever worked with and we wish him a long and enjoyable retirement.

Hiring the best employees is one of my most important responsibilities as superintendent, particularly for a position as influential as the junior high principal. Thus, we needed to make sure the selection process was thorough and would result in the very best candidate being selected. We held meetings with employees and parents to discuss the selection process and solicit their feedback regarding what characteristics we are looking for in our next junior high school principal. These are the top ten characteristics based on their feedback:

Leadership – ability to lead and motivate people to perform at their highest level or to a common goal

Ethical/moral – exhibits deep commitment to, keeps word, open and honest with staff

Teamwork – creates conditions for success, gives credit to others, takes blame

Climate – creating a climate hospitable to education

Effective listener – willing to understand and consider all points of view Student oriented – passionate about educating every child to his/her full potential

Human relations – builds trust, supports, challenges, understanding, capable of conflict resolution

Employees/colleagues – able to hire quality staff, makes hard decisions, holds accountable

Involved/visible – visible in school, student activities, and in community, civic leader/worker, community builder

(tie) Experience – experience in a school with similar demographics

(tie) Curriculum – understands what engages students, conditions for teachers and students to perform

These characteristics created a profile of the type of principal we were looking for. I advertised the position on local, regional, and state-wide websites and we received 69 applications. I reviewed all of the applications and selected ten of the applicants to participate in a first round interview. The first round interview committee was comprised of the follow-

ing individuals: Regina Coleman, parent; Jami Fischer, teacher; Gloria Hodge, parent; Cindy Mewhinney, teacher/coach; Michael Novotny, superintendent; Becky Niebuhr, teacher; and Jennifer Umpleby, parent.

After all of the ten interviews were completed, the committee members ranked the candidates from one to ten. The combined rankings from the three teachers resulted in four candidates that rose to the top. The combined rankings from the three parents resulted in the same top four candidates. I invited those four candidates back for second round interviews with a different committee comprised of the following individuals: Andrea Durbin, intermediate school principal; Janet Jones, curriculum director; Lisa Nix, elementary school principal; Michael Novotny, superintendent and Glenn Talbott, athletic director

After the second round interviews were completed, the committee members ranked the candidates from one to four. The same candidate was ranked number one by all of the committee members. In fact, this same person was the top candidate based on the totals of the three teachers and the totals of three parents during the first round interviews. After checking several references from his current and previous districts, I recommended Chris Diem to the school board and they unanimously approved him as the as the new principal of Salado Junior High School.

Mr. Diem grew up in Killeen and he earned his bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University and his master's degree from Tarleton State University. He taught regular, pre-AP, and AP social studies at Harker Heights High School and A&M Consolidated High School. Mr. Diem was later promoted to assistant principal at A&M Consolidated High School. He then moved back to this area and he is currently serving as an assistant principal at Belton High School.

We are excited to work with Mr. Diem starting in July. Thank you to all of the employees and parents that participated in this selection process.

Thank you to all of the students, employees, parents, and community members for an outstanding 2011-2012 school year. I hope all of you have a great summer and we will welcome the students back for the first day of school Aug. 27.

10-10-10 to help local business

The Village of Salado finances are looking quite good, according to the latest report from Investment Officer and Alderman Stephen Peters.

Thus far this fiscal year, the Village has earned more than \$210,254.44 in sales tax through April. This is approximately \$18,000 more than budgeted and represents taxable sales of \$21,025,444.40. Further, the Village sits on \$735,434.21 in liquid investments developed in just over a decade of incorporation.

Despite these rosy numbers, there is a great deal of evidence that business is down in the Village of Salado. Some of that evidence is merely anecdotal. Some is evidenced by the number of vacancies along Main St. and the number of stores that have closed or are in the process of closing their doors this year.

Especially in the downtown retail areas. Some report flat sales, while other Salado shops have reported remarkable decreases in sales this year compared to last. One shopkeeper who has been in business for well over a decade here said that April was the third worst April ever for the business. Worst was the first year of business followed closely behind by April 2002 (when the country was still reeling from September 11, 2001).

If this continues, it will take a toll on more than just Main Street. It will be felt in Mill Creek and elsewhere throughout the community.

The Board of Aldermen should take the opportunity it has before it now (with \$18,000 more in sales tax revenues than originally budgeted through the eight months of the fiscal year) to support the struggling businesses in the community.

Here is our suggestion: a three-pronged approach to help improve retail business in Salado. The first prong is a short-term answer. The second is a foundational answer. The third prong is a long-term answer.

These proposals should be rallied behind by the business community and the residential community alike.

Here is a 10-10-10 plan (all due respect to Herman

Cain) for improving business in Salado.

Prong One: Take the almost 10 percent that the Village is running ahead in sales tax revenues this year and invest it in marketing and advertising the Village of Salado. Round that off to \$20,000.

Use that money now, this year, in this budget cycle by adopting a budget amendment to the effect. Allocate \$20,000 for advertising within a 50 mile radius of Salado in hopes of attracting day-trippers to the Village.

The Village already has in place a marketing and advertising plan for the overnight tourists, through the hotel motel occupancy tax. However, there is nothing in the Village budget to promote shopping, dining, playing and visiting Salado in the immediate central Texas area.

We don't advocate a blank check, by any means. Instead, we advocate the Village approving the expenditures with final approval of where the money will be spent. A plan for print, electronic and broadcast media should be prepared for the next six months the Salado Chamber of Commerce or by an ad hoc Economic Development committee appointed by aldermen. That plan would be approved by the Board of Aldermen.

The marketing plan could include billboards in Georgetown, Temple and Killeen, as well as other media buys in these market areas. If local businesses could add to that fund, the Village could increase its buying power during the fall.

According to a study by the Maine Center for Economic Policy, every \$100 spent at locally-owned businesses contributes an additional \$58 to the local economy.

These local businesses keep money in the local economy not just through sales tax revenues, but through investments in employees, improvements to structures and investments in homes. Those who own a business as well as live in Salado are taxed twice: at work and at home.

By investing in advertising and marketing within the central Texas area, the Village will realize an increase in "day trippers," whether they come from Ft. Hood for the Christmas Stroll or from Temple for a gourmet dinner or from Sun City for lunch and a round of golf.

Day trippers spend approximately half as much as overnight visitors. However, by proximity alone, day trippers can visit more often. Instead of one or two weekend trips to Salado a year, a nearby resident can visit Salado several times a year.

This is a market that has been untapped by the government of Salado and should be reached now, and in the future.

Prong Two: Take 10 percent of the Village Fund Balance to seed an Economic Development Council (or Committee).

Appoint these members in the way that aldermen appoint Tourism Council members. Oversee closely their work and hold them accountable for expenditures. Final approval for expenditures should come before aldermen in a timely manner.

The EDC could then use that money to recruit and attract quality businesses to fill the landmark buildings that are now sitting vacant. Specifically, the Tyler House, the Halley House and the Fowler House are some of the prime targets for this kind of recruiting. Quality restaurants, galleries or shops should be "wooed" to Salado. A plan of at-

tractive "abatements" and "relief" could be given in return for serious business commitments to Salado.

Prong Three: Budget "10 percent" of sales tax revenues to be invested each year in advertising/marketing and economic development.

In addition to the almost \$20,000 in unexpected funds, the Village of Salado must consider a part of its annual budget for marketing and promotion in the nearby central Texas area of more than a half million people.

The long-term history of sales tax revenues for Salado have remained stagnant since 2002 (see related graphic). This does not bode well for the Village coffers that sales tax revenues have hardly kept pace with inflation in the last decade, much less with much-needed growth in Salado.

In one decade, retail sales revenues increased by LESS than two percent.

Without a prolongued and well-organized investment in attracting buyers and visitors to Salado, this will get worse when work on I-35 through Salado begins next week.

Approve a budget expenditure for 2012-13 (and beyond) of some 10 percent of the sales tax revenues (about \$33,000 based on this year's estimate of \$331,000 in sales tax) for economic development through concentrated marketing efforts in the Central Texas corridor as well as approaches to encouraging and bringing new businesses into Salado.

We can grow local businesses and feel the effects of their success (higher property values, lower property taxes, better services, higher standard of living) or we can do nothing.

Doing nothing will result in more stores closing, more vacancies, a crippled and dying downtown, lower residential property values and higher property taxes.

Our choice.

Aldermen will listen, but residents and businesses must make their voices heard.

They can start at the next meeting of aldermen 6 p.m. June 7 at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd.



Lobby Responsibly

The big beer brewers often admonish us imbibers of their products to "Drink Responsibly." Well, I say back to them: Lobby Responsibly.

In particular, I point to a disgusting binge of besotted lobbying by Anheuser-Busch and other beer barons this year in the Nebraska legislature. At issue was the town of Whiteclay, smack dab on the Nebraska-South Dakota border.

Although only about 10 people live there, it's home to four beer stores. Why? Because right across the state line is the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation of the Oglala Sioux tribe, which has a devastating problem of alcohol addiction, combined with intractable poverty. The sale of alcohol is banned on the reservation.

Whiteclay exists solely so booze peddlers can profit from the Oglala tribe's miseries. They sell 4 million cans of beer a year to Pine Ridge residents, including high-alcohol malt liquor. So much for that "Drink Responsibly" slogan. One in four children on the reservation is born with fetal alcohol birth defects. The life expectancy of tribal members is less than 50 years.

Responding to this grotesque exploitation of an epidemic illness,



Nebraska state senator LeRoy Louden introduced a bill that would designate Whiteclay as an "alcohol impact zone." This legislation would allow authorities to limit store hours and ban high-alcohol beers. Of course, Busch and its responsible beer buddies backed it, right?

Not a chance. Like gators on a poodle, their lobbyists leapt on the legislature, calling in chits from key lawmakers who'd taken thousands of dollars in campaign cash from the industry. The chair of the senate committee considering the bill had pocketed \$4,000 in beer money. He dutifully refused to let the bill even go to a vote during the state's recently concluded 2012 legislative session. "We're not here to protect people from themselves," he declared.

Surely there's an especially hot bar stool in Hell reserved for these greedheads.

Diagnostic analysis Contract **Bridge**

Opening lead — king of hearts.

By Steve Becker

This deal demonstrates how a declarer can take advantage of the knowledge he has acquired during the bidding and play to bring in a seemingly unmakable contract.

West led the king of hearts and shifted to a low diamond at trick two. Declarer won with dummy's king, cashed the ace of spades, catching West's jack, and continued with a low spade to the queen. West took the king and led another diamond.

Declarer put up dummy's ace, East contributing the ten, and was now in excellent position to judge West's distribution. West had started with two spades, at least six hearts, most likely four diamonds to the jack and, therefore, at most one club.

So, after cashing the ten of spades, declarer cashed another spade. This forced East to discard a heart as South discarded a club. Now the ace-ofclubs play from dummy, on which West produced the eight, convinced South that West had started with 2-6-4-1 distribution.

This assumption was confirmed when declarer next led a diamond to his queen, forcing East to discard still another heart. South then ruffed the queen of hearts with dummy's last trump as East followed with his last heart.

Everyone was down to three cards at this point. Dummy had the K-10-7 of clubs, East the Q-J-6 and South the 9-5 of clubs and seven of diamonds. The seven-of-clubs lead from dummy then compelled East to win and yield the last two tricks to dummy's K-10, and the game was home.



Artemesia

Native plant is lace for your garden

Bell Co. Master Gardener

A delightful plant I have discovered from my master gardening friends is artemesia. In one year, my first small plant became the size of the hood of a car!! The lacy-like gray leaves make a delightful mound and have a gentle camphor smell. I liked it so much I planted 7 more and they have all done well. These wonderful plants look best if planted beside or in a dark container, or in the foreground of a small dark stand of trees. Other plants with dark leaves, such as lantana, show a good contrast.

Artemesia Powis Castle is also called wormwood and is a perennial. It grows 24-36 inches tall and should be spaced 4-6 feet across. Many of mine are in partial shade, but they do well in full sun and dry areas also. Dave's Garden.com says that these beautiful plants have inconspicuous flowers that are sterile and do not mature into seeds. They do not like the acidic soils of East Texas, but prefer our alkaline Bell County soil. They will grow well in sandy or clay soils as

to three feet tall.

off the stem except a few tiny ones at the top. Next, take your fingernail and gently scrape the top layer of "skin" away from each node where the leaves were. Put this down in a well-drained pot and keep moist and in the shade for about a month and you will have a new artemesia. Digging and dividing the root ball also can propagate artemesia. This is the most energetic, but quickest method of having more artemesias. A large root ball could be divided into 2, 4, or 6 plants. Plant them in a new location and water for the first season or until they are well established.

If you are not that energetic, you can do what I have done. Gently pull an artemesia stem up until you can see under it, and notice where the curve naturally touches the ground. Leave the stem attached to the main plant. Pull the leaves off that stem and gently scrape the layer of "skin" away from the nodes. Dig a 1" depression in the ground and ease the stem into the small hole. Professionals have large bobby pin like devices to hold down the stem, but I usually just take a rock to maintain soil contact. In a month or two you will have an additional artemesia with roots

that you can clip from the main plant and move to the location you desire.

Try this good little drought tolerant plant and you will have lots of "lace" in your garden.



Rachel Carson's Silent Spring, the 1972 DDT ban and the birds that once again now thrive; Chemicals in umbilical cord blood

EarthTalk: understand there is good news about the recovery of bird species like the Peregrine Falcon, Bald Eagle and others owed to the 1972 ban on DDT. Can you explain?

-- Mildred Eastover, Bath, ME

Rachel Carson's seminal 1962 book, Silent Spring, told the real-life story of how bird populations across the country were suffering as a result of the widespread application of the synthetic pesticide DDT (dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane), which was being used widely to control mosquitoes and others insects. Carson reported that birds ingesting DDT tended to lay thin-shelled eggs which would in turn break prematurely in the nest, resulting in marked population declines. The problem drove bald eagles, our national symbol, not to mention peregrine falcons and other bird populations, to the brink of extinction, with populations plummeting more than 80 percent.

Luckily for the birds, Silent Spring caused a stir,



Environmental Defense Fund (EDF), initially formed in 1967 in reaction to the DDT problem. The group's first order of business included filing lawsuits in New York, Michigan, Wisconsin and Washington DC to force a ban on DDT. EDF enlisted the help of dozens of scientific experts-orni-

ronment in general, no one could be sure whether populations of eagles, falcons and other predatory and fish-eating birds would come back from the brink. While the federal Endangered Species Act went a long way to protect these at-risk species and some of their habitat, non-profits also played a

and many credit it with launching the modern environmental ment. Indeed, one of the world's leading environmental non-profits, the

thologists, ecologists, toxicologists, carcinogenesis experts, and insect specialists—to testify at multi-month hearings to prove its point in regard to the dangers of DDT. In 1972 environmentalists' prayers were answered—and their hard vindicated—with work the federal government finally banning DDT.

But with lots of the pesticide already dispersed through ecosystems far and wide, not to mention myriad other threats to

key role in helping specific species recover. To wit, the Peregrine Fund was founded in 1970 by a leading Cornell ornithologist to help nurse peregrine falcon populations hit hard by DDT back to their once abundant numbers. Researchers with the group pioneered methods of breeding peregrines in captivity and releasing them into the wild; such techniques have since been adopted widely by biologists trying to bring

other wildlife species back from the brink of extinction. Thanks to a combination of factors and the hard work of bird lovers and scientists, peregrine falcons are once again common across the U.S., graduating off the national endangered species list as of 1999.

The bald eagle's recovery is perhaps the best known example of how our environmental laws worked to restore not just a resource but our very national symbol. In the mid-1960s fewer than 500 nesting pairs of bald eagles existed in the continental U.S.; today, thanks to the DDT ban and other conservation efforts, some 10,000 pairs of bald eagles inhabit the Lower 48 that's a 20-fold population increase in just four decades! In 2007 the federal government removed the bald eagle from the Endangered Species List. Without the 1972 ban on DDT and ensuing protections, the bald eagle, let alone dozens of other bird species, would likely be gone now in the continental U.S. And without the song of the birds, the spring would be a very silent time indeed.

The study referenced found traces of some 232 synthetic chemicals in cord blood samples from 10 different babies of African American, Asian and Hispanic descent born in 2009 in different parts of the U.S. Study sponsors Environmental Working Group (EWG) and Rachel's Network were looking to find out if the hormone-disrupting chemical Bisphenol



A 2009 study sponsored by the Environmental Working Group and Rachel's Network found traces of 232 synthetic chemicals in umbilical cord blood samples from 10 different babies of African American, Asian and Hispanic descent born in 2009 in different parts of the U.S.

A (BPA), a plasticizer widely used in food and drink storage containers, is present in the cord blood of minority babies in the U.S. Sadly and not surprisingly, BPA turned up in nine of the 10 cord blood samples tested. But perhaps even worse is the study's detection of whole new raft of chemicals showing up in babies' cord blood for the first time. Some of these newer offenders include tetrabromobisphenol A (TBBPA) from computer circuit boards, synthetic fragrances used in common cosmetics and detergents and Teflon-relative per-

fluorobutanoic acid.

The 2009 study was a follow-up to an earlier analysis of chemicals in cord blood in the mainstream U.S. population during 2004 births. That earlier study found some 287 different industrial chemicals and pollutants in babies' cord blood, although BPA was not yet on EWG's watch list at the time. The more recent study focused on minority babies because minority communities in the U.S. tend to bear a disproportionate pollution burden given their closer proximity to busy roads, industrial sites and older housing. But EWG points out that they tested for chemicals that are likely found in virtually every American household, so none of us are immune to exposure. EWG hopes that

mothers, instead focusing on contaminants from exposures to consumer products and commercial chemicals omnipresent on supermarket shelves. these chemicals in umbilical cord blood represents the part of the Congress and government agencies" charged with protecting human health. 

Getting the Most From advertising Your Air Conditioner

Q: I have a window-mounted air conditioner that I use in the summer months. During the winter, it's stored away. This year, it doesn't seem to be cooling as well as it did in the past. Do I need to charge it with freon or something? -- Bailey T., Wheeling, W.Va.

A: I'm not sure how old your window-unit air conditioner is, but refrigerant (R-22 freon) doesn't typically need to be replaced in the first couple of years of the unit's life. Additionally, purchasing and handling of freon is now regulated, so you would need to contact a refrigeration professional to check and charge the unit.

for that repair, there are other ways to improve your air conditioner's cooling capability:

--Make sure the unit is mounted properly in the window and isn't tilting downward or upward.

--Check to see if siding, bricks, leaves or other debris are blocking the louvers on the outside of the unit.

--Keep curtains and furniture away from the unit while it's operating, to ensure good airflow into the room.

--Make sure the air-conditioning unit is clean, including the coils and the intake filter on the front of the unit.

--Start the air conditioner at a medium or low fan setting and a moderate temperature, even on hot days. After 20 minutes, lower the temperature to the setting you want.

--Note the time of day that the room feels hottest, and note the position of the sun. Closing the curtains on windows that don't have an air-conditioning unit can reduce the amount of sun-generated heat in the room.

--If you have a ceiling fan, even in another room of the house, use it to your advantage. Reverse the direction of the fan blades (the switch is located on the metal housing for the fan blades) so that air is pulled up by the fan rather than pushed down. Cool air normally sinks, so the fan will stir that air and make the whole house more comfortable.

like to see the federal government take a more proactive role in approving new substances for use in consumer products, not to mention residential and workplace environments.

On the legislative front, green groups are pinning their hopes for a reformed Toxic Substances Control Act on New Jersey Democratic Senator Frank Lautenberg's Safe Chemicals

Act (S. 847), introduced last fall. The bill is currently spinning its wheels in committee hearings, but its 17 bi-partisan cosponsors are optimistic that it will come up for a floor vote before the 112th Congress wraps up the end of this year.
