Eagles win coveted UIL Lone Star Cup

It's official!

Two weeks after releasing the final standings in the Lone Star Cup, University of Interscholastic League (UIL) made it official July 1 by announcing Salado as the winner in the 2A division.

But for Superintendent Michael Novotny, the wait was quite a bit longer. Dr. Novotny began tallying up the results in mid-May when they were updated on the UIL website. At that time, Salado was in the top 10, but only had 50 points.

However, track and field, golf, softball, base-ball and academics had yet to be counted. Dr. Novotny unofficially announced that Salado was in the forefront to win the Lone Star Cup at Commencement exercises on June 6.

Later in June, the final standings were correct and the Salado Eagles had a 10-point lead over Brock. The Eagles had 82 points at the end of the school

So, after a late season rise in the standings, Salado High School captured its second Conference 2A UIL Lone Star Cup win.

The Eagles excelled in the spring winning state championships in academics and girls golf, finishing third at state in one-act play and boys golf, and advancing to the state semifinals in baseball.

The announcement was made official on July 1 after a two-week waiting period when the final standings were released June 17.

"This is an outstanding accomplishment as it represents the highest overall academic, athletic, and fine arts performances for all 241 high schools at the 2A level in the State of Texas," stated Salado ISD Superintendent Michael

Novotny.

Bolstering Salado's

performance in the race for the Lone Star Cup were fall sports, including Boys Cross Country, which placed second at the State Meet, girls basketball playoff appearance and boys basketball, which was a Regional semi-finalist team

Spring competitors who scored for Salado were the softball team for their playoff appearance, girls golf team State champions, boys golf team third place, UIL Academic State champions, UIL One Act Play third in state and boys baseball team State semi-finalists.

This is the second time that Salado has won the Lone Star Cup, making it one of only three 2A schools to earn the award multiple times since its inception in 1998. Holliday has won the Lone Star Cup four times and Brock has won it twice in the 2A division

The UIL Lone Star Cup is awarded annually to five high schools, one in each of the five UIL classifications (1A, 2A, 3A, 4A and 5A), based on their team performance in district and state championships. The winning schools in each classification will receive the UIL Lone Star Cup trophy and a \$1,000 scholarship, also presented by the UIL.

Other winners of the Lone Star Cup were Southlake Carroll (5A), Cedar Park (4A), Argyle (3A) and Weimar (1A).

Honoring the best overall athletic and academic programs in Texas, the UIL Lone Star Cup is open to all UIL participant high schools.

Trophy presentations will take place in the fall at events chosen by the winning schools.

The UIL Lone Star Cup program began during the 1997-98 season.

Barker leaving Village to be Killeen City Secretary

She was the very first employee of the fledgling Village of Salado. In January 2001, the Salado Chamber of Commerce agreed to allow Dianna Barker to work part-time as the Chamber Secretary and part-time as the Village Secretary.

The Village office was housed then at the Salado Civic Center and Charlotte Douglass was the newly-elected Mayor of the Village of Salado, incorporated in 2000.

On July 12, Barker will log in her last day as City Secretary for the Village of Salado. She will start her new job on July 15 as the City Secretary for the City of Killeen, working under City Attorney Kathy Davis.

"I have mixed emotions," Barker said about leaving the job she has held for more than a decade. She has served under four mayors: Douglass, Rick Ashe, Merle Stalcup and Danney McCort.

During her time in the Village office, she has seen the Village grow from sharing space and amenities with the Chamber of Commerce to having its own Municipal Building.

Barker was the very first hire for the Village of Salado. The Village now has a eight employees, including four police officers.

"I've enjoyed it thoroughly," she said, "being able to do the various things that I do here and learning the different jobs."

"I don't know what we will do without her," said Mayor Danney McCort. "She has always been such a wealth of knowledge and skills for us."

In addition to being the City Secretary, Barker is

also the Municipal Court Clerk. She is certified as a Level II Municipal Court Clerk.

She said that she looks forward to the new challenges and opportunities in Killeen.

A 1982 graduate of Salado High, Barker returned to work in Salado in 1996, when she was hired as the Chamber Secretary.

She raised two children in Salado schools all the while working full time in her hometown.

She said that she plans on commuting to work and has no plans of leaving her hometown.

"I've always loved it here!" she said.

Race preferences rumble on

The entrenched regime of racial preferences in American academia is a fit subject for study by the nation's top psychiatrists.

It's never OK to discriminate on the basis of race in American life, except when it is. Schools lionize the 1964 Civil Rights Act in their classrooms, and then violate it in their admissions offices.

This system is bad for the moral fiber of academic institutions, bad for the ideal of race blindness in America, and bad, the latest research suggests, for the minorities supposedly benefiting. It is good only for salving the guilty, race-obsessed consciences of university administrators and appeasing the PC gods and the usual interest groups.

The Supreme Court decided to let the dinosaur keep roaming the Earth, although it tightened up the standards in its 7-1 ruling. The court said that racial discrimination is permissible in fostering educational diversity, but schools have to prove that such discrimination is narrowly tailored.

In the majority opinion, Justice Anthony Kennedy wrote, "Strict scrutiny does not permit a court to accept a school's assertion that its admissions process uses race in a permissible way without closely examining how the process works in practice." No, it will require "a careful judicial inquiry."

In other words, if you are wondering if a given school meets the Supreme Court-approved standard, there's an easy way to find out -- sue and spend years trying to find out. The answer, by the way, will probably change the next time the Supreme Court deigns to hear the issue.

In the real world, there is little doubt that racial preferences are a failure.

"Large racial preferences backfire against many and, perhaps, most recipients," Richard Sander and Stuart Taylor Jr. write in their book "Mismatch," "to the point that they learn less and are likely to be less self-confident than had they gone to less competitive but still quite good schools." They note that "even though blacks are more likely to enter college than are whites with similar backgrounds, they will usually get much lower grades, rank toward the bottom of the class, and far more often drop out.

When racial preferenc-

es were ended in California by referendum in 1996, disaster was supposed to ensue. The New York Times reports that enrollment of blacks and Hispanics in the University of California system dipped slightly from 4 percent and 15 percent; now the numbers are 4 percent and 25 percent. The state university has begun to reach down into middle schools to find promising students -- minority and nonminority alike -- and work to ensure that they are better prepared. This is affirmative action worthy of the name, based on improving students rather than checking a box.

It has begun to dawn on liberals that preferences are a clumsy and ineffectual social tool. In a New York Times column titled "The Liberals Against Affirmative Action," David Leonhardt notes research showing that preferences don't really help the poor. "In effect," he writes, "poor and middle-income students are rejected, while others with the same scores and grades -- legacies, athletes and minorities, often from privileged backgrounds -- are admitted."

Still, racial preferences rumble on, immune to logic or law.

So, where the heck is Congress?

Why can't that immigration reform effort protect our own by taking aim at this emergency? And doesn't this luxury housing crunch just cry out for a mansion-construction

subsidy? If our national leaders won't help the most privileged among us, who will they help?

The situation is so dire that many of the moneyed elites are scrounging around like commoners to find rental properties. Luckily, there are some swell homes still available out in the Hamptons, renting for about a million dollars. For the summer, that is. Yes, that's almost \$10,000 a day — not counting utilities and the pool boy's salary.

But in tough times, the rich tend to toughen up, reach for their wallets, and do what has to be done.

Contract Bridge

This deal occurred in the semi-final of the 2000 women's world championship in the match between Denmark and the United States. The Americans won the match handily and then lost to the Netherlands in the final by the narrowest margin in world championship history -- half an International Match

The deal illustrates the basic principle that when a partnership has determined during the bidding that it holds the majority of the high cards, and the opponents wind up playing at a highlevel contract, a trump lead is frequently very effective.

The bidding shown took place when the U.S. pair of Jill Meyers and Randi Montin were East-West, respectively. North's four-notrump bid was the "unusual notrump," promising length in the minors. After South stated her preference for clubs, Meyers doubled, ending the auction.

Montin then led a trump, with devastating effect. Trine Bilde, South, won with the ten and led a diamond to the king and East's ace. East returned a trump, taken in dummy, and Bilde tried to cash the diamond queen, ruffed by East. Regardless of how declarer proceeded, she could score only six trump tricks and the ace of spades -- down four for a loss of 800 points.

At the other table, the bidding was exactly the same, except that East conservatively declined not to double five clubs. West then led the king of spades rather than a trump.

Renee Mancuso, South, took the spade ace and led a diamond to the king and ace. East cashed a heart and returned a spade, ruffed in dummy. Declarer then embarked on a complete crossruff, scoring eight trumps, the spade ace and the diamond queen (which East unaccountably failed to ruff) to finish down one, -50. The net gain of 750 points gave the U.S. a 13-IMP pickup on the







Salad days of summer

GRILLED TOMATO AND ROMAINE SALAD

Make this beautiful salad when summer tomatoes are at their peak of flavor.

- 4 long, thick slices crusty country bread
- 3 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil 1 large clove garlic, split
- 3 hearts of romaine, halved lengthwise
- 4 large red tomatoes 4 medium vellow tomatoes
- 2 small red onions, halved
- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 3/4 teaspoon fine sea salt 3/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

Chopped fresh oregano

Prepare a grill for medium-high heat cooking. Brush bread with 1 teaspoon of the oil and grill until nicely marked, about 1 minute per side. Rub bread slices on both sides with garlic; discard clove. Set



bread aside.

Place romaine, tomatoes and onions on a baking sheet. Drizzle with 1 table-spoon of the oil and rub until vegetables are coated all over. Grill, turning vegetables frequently with tongs; cook lettuce until outer leaves are just browned and softened, 4 to 5 minutes, and tomatoes and onions until softened and slightly charred, 7 to 8 minutes. Transfer vegetables back to the baking sheet as they are done.

In a small bowl, combine vinegar, salt, pepper and remaining 2 tablespoons

oil. Thinly slice romaine, place on a large platter and drizzle with half the vinaigrette. Very coarsely chop tomatoes and onions, place in a large bowl and toss with remaining vinaigrette. Pile tomato mixture over lettuce and sprinkle with oregano. Cut bread into large chunks and arrange around edges of platter.

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons apple juice
- 1 clove garlic, minced 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/3 cup chopped fresh dill, divided
- 3/4 cup fresh corn (from 1 ear corn)

1 large tomato, diced

Bring a large pot of water



to a boil. Add green beans and cook just until they turn bright green and are barely tender, about 2 minutes. Drain and cool in a bowl of ice cold water. Drain and pat dry.

To make the dressing, whisk together goat cheese, lemon zest and juice, apple juice, garlic and pepper in a small bowl. Toss green beans with half the dressing

and half the dill and spread on a platter. Top with corn and tomato, drizzle with remaining dressing and sprinkle with remaining dill.

 Salt and pepper, to taste
 1 medium jicama (about 1 pound), peeled and cut into chunks
- 1 head romaine lettuce, trimmed and chopped

Put beets into a medium pot, cover with salted water and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium



low, cover and simmer until tender, about 30 minutes; drain well. When cool enough to handle, cut into chunks.

Zest oranges then transfer zest to a large bowl; reserve oranges. Add lime juice, orange juice, oil, salt and pepper and whisk together. Add beets, toss well, cover and set aside at room temperature for 1 hour.

Cut stem and blossom ends off of oranges. Working close to the flesh, use a paring knife to carefully cut away the entire rind and white pith of each orange then cut between the white membranes to remove segments, discarding any seeds as you go; transfer to a bowl.

To serve, add jicama to bowl with beets, toss to coat and season with salt and pepper. Arrange lettuce on plates then spoon beet mixture over lettuce, top with oranges and serve.







Container gardens have long been used to add a spot of color by a front entrance or expand planting space in city lots, balconi es and decks. Don't let

self-watering patio planter, windowbox, or rail planter reduces maintenance and makes harvesting herbs as easy as reaching out the window or backdoor. Plus, guests will have fun harvesting their own fresh mint for mojitos or greens for their salads.

Define outdoor living spaces within your landscape. Use containers as walls and dividers to separate entertaining and play areas from quiet reflective spaces. And consider using pots with built in casters or set them on moveable saucers to make moving these pots easier. This way you can expand and shrink individual spaces as needed simply by moving the pots.

Create your own vacation paradise. Use planters filled with canNew Zealand flax for a more tropical flare. Add some wicker furniture to complete the scene. Or fill vertical gardens, an old child's wagon, metal colander or wooden and concrete planters with cacti and succulents. Add some old branches and large stones. You'll feel as though you've hiked into the desert.





Texas A&M Forest Service urges caution over the July 4th holiday

More wildfires are reported on July 4th than on any other day of the year, a statistic that stresses the need for folks to be extra careful during Independence Day celebrations.

Whether you're shooting off fireworks, grilling hotdogs and hamburgers or just hanging out around the campfire, residents should remember to use caution when doing any-

thing outdoors that could potentially cause a spark.

"Keeping your home safe from wildfire is always important whether you've had rain or not," Texas A&M Forest Service Fire Prevention Specialist Jan Amen said. "If you plan to cook outdoors, do so away from any sort of vegetation and do not leave your grill unattended."

Texas A&M Forest Service Predictive Services Department Head Tom Spencer said the wildfire risk over the Independence Day holiday is elevated in West Texas where the vegetation is dry and gusty winds are commonplace perfect conditions for a potentially devastating wildfire.

Though parts of Texas



have seen recent rains, more than half of the state remains mired in drought. Specific areas of concern include the Panhandle down through Midland and the Trans-Pecos Re-

"Safety should always be your No. 1 concern," Spencer said. "The safest wildfire is always the one that never ignites."

Fireworks safety tips:

Before you celebrate, always check with local government officials to ensure fireworks and outdoor burning are allowed in your county. Be sure to comply with all restric-

Read and follow all warnings and instructions labels on fireworks.

Keep fireworks away homes and structures, which can accidentally ignite.

Use fireworks only under close adult supervision and in safe areas away from dry grass and brush.

Keep a hose, bucket of water and wet towels nearby in case of a malfunction or fire.

Dispose of used fireworks in a bucket of water. Never ignite fireworks in a container, especially a glass or metal container.

Note: Burn bans and fireworks restrictions are determined by county government. Texas A&M Forest Service does not take a position on the use of fireworks, nor does the agency determine, set or lift restrictions.
