Golf course sold, work begins soon

"We're moving forward" Billy Helm said despite the rain drizzling down the afternoon of July 16.

MCCC, LLC purchased the Mill Creek Golf Course the day before and Helm had hoped to have equipment on the course as early as Tuesday morning to begin cleaning up holes along the creek.

But Mother Nature instead has been showering the area with much-needed rains, not just for the golf course, but for the local aquifers and farmers and ranchers.

Helm is president of the MCCC, LLC which will do business as Mill Creek Country Club and which purchased the golf course real estate and operations on July 15 from Morris Foster for \$1.75 million.

He is joined on the board by Richard Castle as Secretary and Armando Lenis as Vice President. MCCC, LLC has made application to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission for a Mixed Beverage Permit with Food and Beverage for the pro shop at 1610 Club Circle.

Helm told Salado Village Voice that plans were being drawn up for renovations to the Pro Shop and Grill area to make them more family friendly to locals and visiting golfers alike.

Some work will be done at the pool area to screen it off for families and swimmers as well.

Helm said that this year the new group would concentrate on getting a contiguous 18 holes of golf play ready and operable.

At the same time, work will be done to line the pond that provides water for the course so that it will stop leaking.

"We've got a real water problem and it needs to be fixed," he

In 2014, the group will then work on repairing and rebuilding the holes damaged by flooding to bring the Robert Trent Jones II course back to its 27-hole form.

Having a 27 hole course and bringing back some of the signature and memory-making holes along Salado Creek will bring not only local golfers back, but also traveling golfers from around the state and the nation. The late Don Mackie is well-remembered as marketing Mill Creek to groups and tournaments when he owned the course.

Helm said that the new group wants to return to this to increase rounds for the golf course and bring additional money back into the Salado community.

"We all remember what it was like" he said of days when 40,000 rounds were played on the course, adding that the course contributed greatly to tourism in Salado.

Complementing increased local play and traveling players is part of what Helm said he hopes will lead to a reinvigoration of Salado as a destination for travelers of all kinds.

Helm said that the new Mill Creek group will work with local businesses in joint efforts of cross promotion and opportuni-

One of those opportunities is quickly filling up as a majority of the 18 flags have been committed to by local businesses. For \$1,500 per year, a business can have their name and logo placed on the hole flag for the golf course. This income will help with the day-to-day costs of running a golf course and build revenue for reinvestment into the

A monument will be placed at each hole naming contributors of \$10,000 or more. The engraved monuments will be at the hole for four years, at which time businesses and contributors can

Finally, a master plaque will highlight a list of smaller donors to the repair and renovation efforts at Mill Creek to commemorate the community spirit that Helm said he hopes will culminate in the reinstatement of Mill Creek as a one of the premier golf courses in the state.

Aldermen consider city manager (again)

Village Aldermen will review in workshop 4 p.m. July 18 a contract with the Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) to provide city administrator services. The board will then consider Signing of the CTCOG contract for the city administrator during its regular session 6 p.m. July 18.

By the contract, CTCOG will provide a contract city manager to the Village of Salado for eight hours weely in the village office. This would be Jim Reed, who is the executive director of CT-

CTCOG would open a satellite office in the Village of Salado for 40 hours weekly in the village office. An economic development planner who is currently a CTCOG staff member would man the office 40 hours per week.

The Contract City Manager will attend all Board of Aldermen and Planning and Zoning meetings unless prior notification is given the mayor.

Reed would be authroized by adopted resolution to represent the Village of Salado and carry out the duties of a City Manager.

The contract would be for six months and renewable after that. The first six month period would be \$28,800 payable to CTCOG.

Monthly payments of \$4,800 per month would be made for the second six month period.

Aldermen at their July 11 failed to adopt the contract on a motion by Michael McDougal to adopt it pending legal review.


The board voted 3-3 on the motion with McDougal voting for it, joined by Shannon Ashe and Fred Brown. Hans Fields, Bryan Fritch and Mayor Danney McCort voted against.

"You have done everything in your power to make sure this does not happen," Brown said to the Mayor after the vote. "Why don't we just make you king and go on home?"

McCort said that he voted against the motion because he wanted the board to vote "on a good, clean contract" that has been reviewed by the Village attorney Alana Bojorquez.

The board then voted 4-1 on a motion by Fritch to "have the mayor sign the contract by August 1" after it has been reviewed by Bojorquez. Fritch joined Ashe, Brown and McDougal this time for a 4-2 vote.

In other business July 11, the board voted 5-0 to purchase a new maintenance truck and to hire Stephen Peters on a part time based of 16 hours per month to oversee the financials of the Village at an estimated cost of \$560 per month.

Welcome rain

Recent showers lift creek

"We're ecstatic," Dirk Aaron told Salado Village Voice as he drove to a board meeting of the Brazos River Authority (BRA).

Speaking about the four inches of rain that the Salado Creek watershed received in the past few days, Aaron said that he is confident that the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District will be able to move from Stage 2 in its Drought Management Plan to Stage 1, which asks for users to voluntarily reduce their water usage by 10 percent.

That is something Aaron has never seen in the two years he has been Executive Director of the CUWCD. During his time as the head of the District, the District has been continuously in Stage 2, which asks for a voluntary reduction in water use of 20 percent.

Aaron said that the automated gauge below the springs of Salado Creek on the Inn on the Creek property were measuring 12 cubic feet per second, which translates to more than 600 acre feet per month of flow.

However, Aaron cautions that this is not a truly accurate measurement of the spring flows. "We are still having a lot of runoff from the rains," he said.

But when the runoff subsides, the measurement will stabilize and Aaron said that he expects the spring flow to maintain at perhaps as high as 500 acre feet per month.

That is double what the flow measured before the recent rainfall event which began July 21 and is expected to end by the

However, in order to move from one stage of its Drought Management Plan to a lesser stage, the increased flow of the springs must be maintained over

Aaron said he anticipates that the flow will do that and that the CUWCD board will be able to move to Stage 1.

Just last week, however, Aaron issued a dire report on the drought conditions, which must have worked like some sort of rain dance. Or maybe he and the board all washed their cars this weekend.

In that report, he asked well users to reduce their usage by 20 percent. That request will remain in effect until the District considers moving to Stage 1 later this summer.

On June 28, before the recent rains began, CUWCD registered a seven-day average of 6.13 cubic feet per second (365 acre feet per month from the U.S. Geologic Service (USGS) stream flow

As of July 10, that seven-day average dropped to 4.37 cubic feet per second, or 260 acre feet "This is very significant be-

cause we lost 106 acre feet of flow in 10 days," Aaron said. But in a short three days, all those losses were made up and

increases in the flow.

However, for the past year, areas of the Salado Creek watershed have received an average of 24 inches of rain through June 2013.

Last July, the watershed received an average of just over three inches of rain, which has been dwarfed by the more than four inches of rain received in the watershed since July 21.

For the long term, however, the drought is far from over. And this drought is differet from previous ones because of additional challenges. Aaron added that the downtown area of Salado Creek and its spring complex faces an additional challenge not faced during previous droughts: the rapid construction and replacement of access road bridges over

the creek itself. 'Clearwater Staff has been in communication with the TX-DOT Environmental Coordinator, Michael Rhodes," Aaron said adding that Clearwater officials and consulting hydrologist met on site in May to review the contractor's best management practices and protective measure of the aquifer.

"Clearwater was not satisfied with those best management practices described by TXDOT officials and their inspectors," Aaron said, adding that the district requested a more robust effort in protecting the aquifer and springflow.

"Our request was to treat each pier similar to a water well construction seal the surface area for protection from contamination and loss of artesian pressure at elevations below the spring complex," Aaron said of the efforts agreed to by TXDOT. "The agreement protects the integrity of the Edwards (BFZ) Aquifer macro-porosity features. know these features are what make the aquifer vulnerable to cement invasion during construction and also vulnerable to unintended introduction of pollutants. These macro-porosity features can and often do serve as conduits during construction and continue such over the life-

time of a bridge pier." Aaron added that the district continues to make site visits to

the watershed has seen dramatic assure that the springs are not being damaged.

"The BMP approach requires substantial over-site of the pier construction by TXDOT officials and inspectors of their contractors to minimize loss of artesian pressure," Aaron said.

Aaron added that the district 'hope(s) that evidence of springflow reduction in early July is not a result of the construction."

TXDOT has hired an outside geologist to evaluate the historical status of the springs and the current status. Raymond Slade is a retired geoologist from the U.D. Geological Service that will conduct the study of the

"Clearwater UWCD has also been assured that the contractor draws no water for purposes of construction from Salado Creek proper," Aaron said. "They are aware of the environmentally sensitive nature of the Salado springs complex and its importance to the economy of Salado. In fact, the whole reason the community is dealing with the Salado Salamander as a potential endangered species was due to TXDOT's initial environmental assessment in 2007."

Salado Water Supply remains in Stage 1 of its Drought Management Plan, a stage which it entered last summer and in which it has remained for the past 12 months or more.

Stage 1 of the SWSC asks customers to reduce water usage by 20 percent.

Salado WSC have reduced water consumption by 14 percent in January through June 2013. This is a reduction of 106 acre feet in water usage.

'Salado Water Supply Customers and Jarrell Schwertner Water Supply Customers have simply done a tremendous job of conserving," Aaron said, adding that "Unfortunately, the Clearwater Drought Management triggers asking for continued Voluntary Reduction of Edwards BFZ Water is addressed to industry, municipal and private well owners who have wells in and around the Village of Salado."

'We have a job to do," Aaron said, "and that is to protect water quantity for the future."

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
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

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Hopefully the third time will be the charm. Texas Department of Transportation has announced a major lane closing for July 22 for I-35 near FM 2268 in Salado.

This lane closing was originally planned for July 11 and then July 16 but heavy rains thwarted those plans.

On July 22, starting at 7 p.m., the southbound lanes of Interstate 35 near FM 2268 in Salado will be closed to allow the contractor to place the new deck for the new FM 2268

bridge. Approximately two hours later, the southbound lanes will reopen and the northbound lanes of I-35 will be closed at the same location for three to four hours.

Northbound traffic will exit the freeway at Exit #283 (FM 2843) to the frontage road and re-enter the freeway north of FM 2268.


The northbound offramp at Grainger Road (#282) will also be closed.

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

An Obamacare Surrender

Washington is riven by conflict and deepseated division. It is rare indeed when both sides can agree on anything consequential. Therefore it is incredibly heartening that there is now bipartisan agreement that the implementation of Obamacare is a mess.

Republicans have long maintained this, but now the Obama administration has lent its implicit assent with its astonishing decision to delay by a year the law's employer mandate. This is what the administration calls, via a blog post by the Treasury Department's assistant secretary for tax policy announcing the decision, "Continuing to Implement the ACA in a Careful, Thoughtful Manner." It can call it whatever it wants, but there is no hiding the embarrassment of a climb-down on a highprofile feature of President Barack Obama's signature initiative.

The purported reason for the delay is incompetence. The administration's story is that it simply couldn't find a way to implement the insurance reporting requirements on employers in the time frame set out in the law. Merely as a side-effect, it had to put off the mandate and the \$2,000-peremployee fine on employers with more than 50 employees who don't offer health coverage.

This just happens to be

the mandate that is causing howls of pain from businesses and creating perverse incentives for them to limit their hiring or to hire part-time rather than full-time employees. And it just happens that 2015 -- the new target for implementation -- is after a midterm election year rather than during.

Explaining the decision, Obama apparatchik Valerie Jarrett issued a stalwart communique from Central Command that should take an honored place in the annals of blatant, unembarrassed hackery.

Her message was: All is well. Nothing to see here. Yes, maybe we've delayed implementation of the (hilariously euphemistic) "employer responsibility payments," aka fines, but don't worry, it's "full steam ahead" with the health-care exchanges this October.

"As we implement this law," Jarrett explained, "we have and will continue to make changes as needed." But the law is supposed to be the law, not optional suggestions from Congress. In Jarrett's view, Obamacare is little more than a warrant for the Obama administration to decide how it

wants to run the American health-care system, one executive decision at a time.

Obamacare was sold on the twin, flagrantly false promises that you could keep the insurance you have and the prices for insurance would drop. But there will be significant dumping of employees onto the exchanges, and the latest indication of the law's price shock came via The Wall Street Journal, which reported that "healthy consumers could see insurance rates double or even triple when they look for individual coverage."

The delay of the employer mandate may create political pressure to delay the more important individual mandate as well, on grounds that ordinary people shouldn't face the fines for not buying government-mandated coverage that businesses have been spared. Certainly, the maneuver on the employer mandate is a painful concession and a signal of weakness. Now everyone can agree: Implementation of the president's proudest achievement is troubled, at best.

government. Yet, Governor Pat McCrory issued a cockamamie, Kafkaesque claim that the gut job ensures that "our citizens' unemployment safety net is secure," while providing "an economic climate that allows job creators to start hiring again."

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
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Legally Blonde takes stage

Contract **Bridge**

Opening lead — jack of hearts.

This deal occurred in the final of the 2001 Bermuda Bowl. The event, held in Paris, was won by the United States, which made a remarkable comeback in the 128-deal match after trailing Norway by 79 International Match Points at the half. The U.S. victory was particularly notable because it marked the first time a woman -- Rose Meltzer -- had ever won the world open team title.

The bidding shown took place when Lew Stansby and Chip Martel were North-South for the U.S. Martel's five-heart response to four notrump indicated two key cards (two aces, or an ace and the king of trumps). His six-spade bid denied holding either minor-suit king, so Stansby settled for the small slam.

Martel won the opening heart lead with dummy's ace, discarding a diamond, and then misguessed how to start the spades by cashing dummy's ace. This created a trump winner for West, and although it might seem that declarer was in danger of also losing an eventual diamond finesse to West's king, Martel actually had matters well under control.

He next ruffed dummy's remaining heart, cashed the king of spades and then played the Q-K-A of clubs. If West ruffed, he would be forced to return a diamond into South's A-Q or else lead a heart, allowing declarer to discard a diamond from dummy while ruffing in his hand. If West did not ruff, he could later be thrown on lead with the spade queen to produce the same result. Either way, Martel was sure to make the slam.

At the other table, the Norwegian North-South pair reached seven spades and finished down two after declarer also misguessed the spades and subsequently lost a finesse to the diamond king. The 1,630-point swing gave the U.S. a 17-IMP pickup on the deal.





any large bits of fat from ribs. Sprinkle ribs with salt. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add ribs and cook, turning occasionally, until browned on all sides, about 10 minutes. Transfer ribs to a 4- to 5-quart slow cooker. In a small bowl, whisk together soy sauce, fruit spread, tomato paste, vinegar, ginger, garlic, five-spice powder and 2 tablespoons water. Pour mixture over ribs. Cover and cook on low until ribs

with tongs and cover with foil (you can serve them with or without the bones). Pour liquid in bottom of slow cooker into a glass measuring cup and let sit until fat rises to the top, 2 to 3 minutes. 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

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Seven tips for storing your belongings wisely

Better Business Bureau tips for renting a storage

For 35 years, the selfstorage industry has been the fastest growing segment of commercial real estate. That's according to the Self Storage Association, which also stated there are more than 48,500 storage unit facilities in the United States. Nearly 1 in 10 American households, or 8.96 percent, rented a storage unit in 2012. That's about twice the number of people who rented storage units two decades before. As more and more Americans decide to store their

belongings in a storage unit, Better Business Bureau urges consumer to do their research first to prevent problems later down the road.

In 2012 BBB received more than 1,400 complaints nationwide against self-storage companies. Many complaints alleged unexpected rent increases. Other consumers alleged their goods were damaged, and they received no compensation.

Before signing on the dotted line, BBB recommends consumers consider these seven factors when selecting a storage

Cost. Get a written estimate. Costs to consider may include a deposit, monthly rental fee, storage preparation and fees for extra options such as electricity, pest control

and insurance. Ask about the fees, how they are to be paid and by what date.

Size. Ask what storage units and sizes are available based on your needs. Ask if there is a maximum weight limit for unit contents and if you are able to pack your belongings in the entire unit from floor to ceiling.

Climate. Keep in mind the general climate and whether your belongings might be subject to mold and/or water damage. If so, you may want to consider an environmentallycontrolled unit.

Insurance. Make sure your items are insured from theft, fire or other damage. The storage facility may provide basic insurance or you can choose to purchase insurance from an alternate source.

Safety. Ask if the facility has surveillance cameras on the property and if a system is in place to restrict access.

Access. Ask if there are hour restrictions that determine when you can access your unit. If so, make sure it works with your move schedule. Also, get as much contact information as you can to reach someone at the facility in case of an emergency, both during and after business hours.

Contract. Get everything in writing, including the size and location of the unit, whether the unit is climate controlled, term regulations, insurance coverage and the payment schedule. Make sure the facility has provided you with several different ways to get in touch with you, either by home phone or

cell phone in case there is ever a problem with your unit or your payment.



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Avoid These Common Painting Mistakes

THIS IS A HAMMER By Samantha Mazzotta

Q: I just started doing some repainting around the house, and I am finding that my first

efforts don't look great. The paint seems thick in some spots; old paint is still faintly visible in others, and I can see brush marks everywhere. I'm going to need to start over, I guess. Any advice on how to improve my painting skills? -- Susan in Kansas City, Mo.

A: First, I'm glad you stopped with the first room as soon as you saw the problems. That way you can fix the mistakes there and learn enough to not repeat them in other rooms, which saves time and money. Experience will help improve many of these common painting problems. But there are some basic steps to take that will minimize the is-

--Paint showing through the new coat: Put a coat of primer between the old paint and the new when the old paint is a darker color or if it is a different

type of paint (oil-based vs. latex-based, for example).

--"Thick"-looking spots: These can be caused by painting a second coat before the first one is dry, or by painting over fresh spackling that isn't completely dry. Thick spots on the old coat of paint also will show through the new one; try to sand those down beforehand.

--Brush marks: Always stir the paint when you open the can, even if the paint store pre-stirred it for you. Then, make sure not to overload your brush with paint: dip only about one-third of the brush. Finally, make your brush strokes smooth and long, and lift the brush away so the paint feathers out.

-- Uneven roller strokes: Apply paint to the roller evenly by using a paint tray or screen. Dip one side of the roller into the paint reservoir and then roll it back and forth on the tray or screen so it spreads evenly. Also, don't let the roller "slide" across the wall surface; it should roll freely. If it doesn't, disassemble and clean it.

--Paint drips: Again, don't overload your brush or roller. If paint drips down the wall, finish the brush stroke and then brush the drip in the same direction that you're painting the rest of the wall, feathering it out. If paint drips on the floor or baseboards, wipe it up immediately with a damp cloth.

--Paint splatters: This happens often when using rollers, so always start your roll by angling upward, and roll smoothly and evenly. Don't hurry.

HOME TIP: To prevent variation between cans of a custom-mixed color, consolidate or "box" all the custom color into a single large container, mix, and then refill the smaller cans with the mixed paint.

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
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
