New faces will greet athletes on first day of practice

Salado athletes will begin summer practice Aug. 5 for both football and volleyball. Not only will it be a day of new beginnings and new faces for the athletes, but for new coaches

coming into Salado. Brent Graham took over as Athletic Director and Head Football Coach on April 1, but the real work begins in trying to rebuild a 2-8 football team that has missed the playoffs the past three years.

Graham said that he hopes the Eagles are one of the four teams from Div. 1 District 13AA to make the playoffs. District 13AA is the toughest 2A district in the state with defending state champion Cameron Yoe and state regional semi-finalist Lago Vista expected to lead the field of smash mouth teams that include McGregor, Marlin, Academy, Troy and Florence.

Before coming to Salado, Graham was the current assistant head coach/ defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator for Sherman High School. Sherman Bearcats have made four straight playoff appearances since Graham went to work there in 2009. They back-to-back District Champions 2010-11 and three-time bi-district champions 2010-2012.

The Bearcats were state quarter-finalists in 2011 with back-to-back 10 win seasons.

The Bearcats were 37-12 during the four seasons that Graham coached there.

Prior to joining Sherman, Graham was the recruiting coordinator, secondary coach and director of football operations at the University of Tulsa in 2007-09, when the Golden Hurricanes had back to back C-USA West Division championships in 2007-08. The team also posted the most single season wins in Tulsa history with 11 in 2008.

Graham was the Athletic Director and Head Football Coach at Tom Bean High School in 2006-07. Prior to that, he was the Assistant Head Coach/ Defensive Coordinator/ Strength Coordinator at Mesquite Poteet High School (2004-06), a position he also held at Canton High School in 2003-04.

He was the sub-varsity offensive and defensive coordinator, as well as a varsity basketball assistant at Allen High School in 2001-03, coaching under Salado alum Tom Westerberg.

Graham holds a bachelor of science from Tarleton State University and an associate of arts from Collin Community College. He holds a Texas standard teaching certificate in secondary business administration, secondary health education and secondary physical education.

He and his wife Amanda have four children: Maddie, Hudson, Jaxon and Berkley.

Marcos Rene Garcia will teach high school and junior high school math. He will also be a high school assistant football coach and a high school assistant softball coach.

Garcia is a 2010 graduate of University of Mary Hardin-Baylor, earning a bachelor of science degree. He completed the UMHB Teacher Certification Program and is certified to teach 8-12 grade mathematics. He has a Masters of Science in Education

from UMHB as well.

He was a graduate assistant coach at UMHB in 2010-2012 and a student assistant coach in 2009. He completed his student teaching in Belton and Temple school districts in 2009 and 2010.

Forrest Mazey will teach high school health and physical education. He will be the Defensive Coordinator for the varsity Salado Eagles football team.

He comes to Salado from Pratt High School in Kansas, where he has been the head football coach and track coach and an assistant athletic director.

Mazey worked for Salado Athletic Director Brent Graham when Graham was head football coach at Tom Beam High School.

"Coach Mazey is a young, high energy coach that has a passion for leading young people," Graham said. "His back-

Mazey was head football coach and assistant athletic director at Atoka High School, a 3A school in Oklahoma in 2007-2011.

He was assistant football coach for quarterbacks and wide receivers for Northwestern Oklahoma State University.

He has a B.S. in Kinesiology from Northeastern State University and M.Ed. in athletic administration from East Central University.

Tara Hatfield will be a special education teacher at Salado Junior High. She will also be the Salado

High School head volleyball coach and a junior school basketball coach.

Hatfield is certified to teach by the Texas Teachers program. She has a B.A. from Southern Methodist University and a M.A. from the University of Texas at Dallas.

Sportswriters name Eagles to All State

The Texas Sports Writers Association (TSWA) named three Salado Eagles to its All State Team last week and gave two others Honorable Mention. But no players from Salado's 34-7-1 state semifinalist team made the First Team.

Junior ace Casey Frazier (11-1) was named to the Second Team. Meanwhile Hughes Springs, which lost to Halletsville in the state final, had two pitchers named to the First Team, Dylan Moore and Zach Bassham. Hallettsville was named the Player of the Year and first team pitcher.

This is Frazier' second All State honor. He was named a third team pitcher by the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association in June.

Frazier was also named the 22AA All District Most Valuable Player this summer. Frazier pitched 88-2/3 innings, facing 331 batters. He struck out 88 batters, allowing only 15 runs to be scored on him and giving up 57 hits during the extended season.

Jon Franz added the TSWA All State Honor to three earlier state honors he has received. Franz was named to the TSWA Third Team at his shortstop position. Franz was earlier named to the THSBCA All State First Team as a utility player. He was also named to the UIL 2A Baseball State All-Tournament Team as a utility player. He had two hits and two runs batted in during the Eagles' 16-3 semi-final loss to Halletsville. Franz was also picked to play on the All-Star South Team, selected as one of the very best at shortstop among Texas 1A-3A players.

Franz was also named the 22AA All-District Offensive Player of the Year.

At the plate he did good things as well, getting on base better than half the time. He batted .446 with a slugging rating of .640. He knocked in 36 runners on 41 hits. He stole base eight times. On the mound, he pitched 30-1/3 innings, striking out 24 batters with a 2-1 record.

Marshall Mann joins Franz on the TWSA All State Third Team at his position at third base.

Giniewicz batted .354 and had a slugging percentage of .430. He had 28 hits in 79 at-bats, knocking in 22 runs.

Third baseman Marshall Mann was also named first team All District team. Mann had a batting average of .369 and an on-base average of .488. His slugging percentage was .515 as he hit 11 doubles. four triples and a homer.

Coby Giniewicz and Cole Haag received Honorable Mention for their play at second base and catcher, respectively.


The National Conversation

Let's take the advice of the attorney general of the United States. Let's have a national conversation about race in the wake of the verdict in the Zimmerman trial. Let's make it a painfully honest conversation -- except about all the things that are painful for us to admit.

Let's take a tragedy and make it a racial crime. Let's not acknowledge the evidence suggesting that Trayvon Martin was beating Zimmerman. George Let's never, ever admit that if Martin hadn't hit Zimmerman, he would almost certainly be alive today.

Let's act as if the main threat to young black men in America is overzealous neighborhood-watch volunteers who erroneously consider them suspicious, call the police and follow them, then shoot them in self-defense after a violent altercation in confusing circumstances that will never be entirely disentangled. Let's pretend that this happens all the time.

Let's send down the memory hole reports of burglaries and attempted break-ins in Zimmerman's community that, according to a Reuters report, "had created an atmosphere of growing fear in the neighborhood."



Let's ignore Zimmerman is from a mixed-race household. Let's forget that he initially didn't mention Martin's race on his 911 call and said he "looks black" only when prompted by the operator. Let's disregard testimony about his good character, lest it get in the way of the national dialogue about how he's a racist murderer who got away with it.

Let's say the trial was about race in America or about whether black men can walk home from the store or any other insipid, racially charged nonsense to fill the air or the column inches. The national conversation cannot afford to get mired down in legal niceties like what constitutes lawful self-defense, let alone reasonable doubt.

Let's call people we disagree with racists. Dissenting voices must be swiftly condemned and, ideally, silenced.

Let's not talk about the 90 percent of black murder victims killed by other blacks. For national conversation purposes, not all killings are equal.

Let's blast New York stop-and-frisk City's policy as the worst kind of racial inequity. Let's not bother to note that New York City once had 2,200 murders a year and now has 400, nor that many of the thousands of lives saved are those of black men. Let's focus on the important thing -- condemning the policy that contributes to saving those lives as heinously racist.

Let's listen to the attorney general inveigh against "stand your ground" laws and make believe that he knows what the hell he's talking about. Let's ignore that the "stand your ground" law wasn't the reason the Sanford, Fla., police initially didn't arrest Zimmerman, and that it really had nothing to do with the trial.

In short, let's take a terrible event and make it a festival for all our ideological and racial ax-grinding and a showcase for our inability or unwillingness to reason clearly. Let's do it in perpetually high dudgeon while simultaneously patting ourselves on the back about our fearlessness and honesty.

Yes, Mr. Attorney General, you are right. This is exactly the conversation that the country needs.


At last, a fast food giant that gives a damn about the economic hardships low-wage workers face.

Not only does McDonald's care, but, by golly, the good executives who sit atop the Golden Arches are goosing-up the meager \$8.25 an hour that their workers have been getting paid. As you can imagine, hair-netted hamburgerflippers everywhere would be very grateful to see their hourly wage boosted

Well, yes, but McDonald's didn't become a giant by paying fair wages, so actually raising the \$8.25 wage isn't the goose the executives are giving to their workers' paychecks.

Instead, the burger chain has launched a website that instructs employees on how to stretch that eight-and-a-quarter better budgeting.

"Plan ahead and save," exclaims this McCredibly helpful website, adding that if each hourly Mc-



Donald's worker would just organize personal financial records properly, he or she would "become a better decision-maker."

Wow - low pay and a moral lecture. How great is that?

Unfortunately, the website's suggested budget seems to have been written by Scrooge. Initially, the bean-counters forgot to include a few essentials in the "Practical Money Skills" budget they drew up for low-wage folks. Like clothes. Or child care. Or food.

Yes, McDonald's budget-planning tool allotted a fat zero for eating.

Embarrassed, the clueless budgeteers threw in a

but wait — their suggested monthly expenses total nearly \$1,000 more than McDonald's pays its typical workers.

Not to worry, though, for this McBudget helpfully assumes that each employee will have a second job to cover that shortfall in pay.

Meanwhile, McDonald's CEO Donald Thompson takes home \$13.8 million in yearly compensation, a haul that renders budgeting for the bare necessities unnecessary. His hourly employees could make that much too if they worked only 760 years under the Golden Arches.

Texas, Where the Jobs Are Recent report highlights success of Texas model

By Savannah Collins

The Bureau of Labor Statistics recently released its June jobs report — and the new data held plenty of good news for Texans.

For June 2013, Texas employers added 5,800 net new jobs, bringing the state's year-over-year job creation total to over 300,000 — the most of any state. What's more, Texas' job gains aren't limited to any one particular industry. The entire economy is growing.

Of the 11 major sectors of the Texas economy, each one has added to its workforce over last twelve months. From Manufacturing to Construction to Professional and Business Services, businesses of every stripe are hungry for workers.

As for Texas' unemployment rate, it held steady at 6.5 percent, more than a full percentage point below the current national average, 7.6 percent, and two full percentage points below that of its chief economic rival, California. Texas' relatively low unemployment rate for June makes this the 78th consecutive month that it's been at or below the national average.

All things considered, this latest jobs report gives a good illustration of why Texas is known as America's jobs juggernaut. But it also raises an important question — how is it that the Lone Star State is succeeding where so many others have failed?

The answer is rooted in public policy.

For over a decade, state lawmakers have (to varying degrees) applied conservative thought and action to Texas' public policy prescriptions, making a conscious effort to keep taxes low and government restrained wherever possible. This governing approach — dubbed the Texas Model — has had a profound impact on the direction of the state, some of which can be seen in things like jobs, people, and investing.

Consider that over the last ten years, the Lone Star State has been responsible for 30 percent of all net new jobs created nationally. That means that Texas, by itself, has single-handedly created almost one out of every three jobs in America.

In terms of population growth, people are flocking to Texas. From 2011 to 2012, eight of the top fifteen fastest growing cities were in Texas, while no other state boasted more than one city on the U.S. Census Bureau's 2013 list.

Capital investments also seem to be flooding the state unlike elsewhere in the nation. According to Site Selection Magazine, in 2012 Texas completed 761 projects, Ohio completed 491 projects, Pennsylvania completed 430 projects, Michigan completed 337 projects, and Illinois completed 332 projects.

Businesses aren't just investing their capital here they're also investing their future. A whole slew of companies have either already relocated here or stated their intentions to bring their headquarters or major regional offices



here to Texas, including such big names as Apple, Facebook, Google, and Software Advice.

When it comes to jobs, people, and business, Texas has proven to be a winner. And that's because it has the right public policy

The Texas Model is successful because it brings together a climate of economic freedom and competitiveness, recog-


nizes the value of keeping taxes low and government spending lower, and understands the value of a predictable regulatory environment. These are the mix of policies that inspire the entrepreneurial attitude, invite innovation, and serve as the proving ground for prosperity.

As states around the nation continue to struggle with the right approach to creating jobs and wealth,

Partscore deals lack the dramatic interest of game and slam hands, but there is often more room for good play on each side than there is in the higher-level contracts. Considering that about half the deals in bridge contain no game for either side, lackadaisical play in such deals can prove very costly over the long haul.

Take this case where South, playing rubber bridge, is in three spades. If he makes the contract, he scores 90 below the line, which puts him in position to win the rubber on the next or a subsequent deal. This advantage is estimated to be worth about 200 points with both sides vulner-

But if he goes down one, South not only loses 100 points, but also loses the 90 as well as the hidden value of the partscore. So about 400 points are at stake, and such a substantial amount should not be taken lightly.

Good defense can defeat three spades. West leads the K-A of clubs, then shifts to the six of diamonds. Declarer plays the ten from dummy, and East must rise to the occasion by playing the queen on the ten!

Observe what happens if East plays the ace instead. He then cannot afford a diamond continuation because of dummy's jack. Whatever else he returns, declarer draws trumps as soon as he gains the lead, concedes a heart to the ace and later discards his third diamond on dummy's fourth heart to make the con-

But if East plays the diamond queen on dummy's ten, the contract cannot be made. South wins with the king, but when West later takes the lead with the ace of hearts he returns a second diamond. This allows East to score two diamond tricks, and South goes down one. It might not look important, but East is actually about 400 points better off because of his careful defensive play.



CHOCOLATE SWIRL MERINGUE COOKIES

These heavenly cookies will have everyone applauding. Their light, barely-there texture, deep chocolate flavor and orange fragrance make for a show-stopper.


7 ounces bittersweet chocolate, melted 8 egg whites

2 cups brown sugar

1/8 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon orange zest

Preheat oven to 275°F. Line two large baking sheets with parchment paper; set aside.

Pour enough water into a medium pot to reach a depth of about 2 inches; bring to a simmer. Whisk egg whites, sugar, salt and orange zest together in a heatproof bowl that easily sits on top of the pot. Arrange bowl over simmering water and cook, whisking constantly, until mixture is hot through-



move the bowl from the pot to let the contents cool slightly before continuing, if needed.) Transfer hot egg mix-

ture to a large bowl and beat with an electric mixer (fit with a whisk attachment) on mediumhigh speed until stiff peaks form, 8 to 10 minutes. Gradually add melted chocolate, folding the mixture together just until the chocolate is swirled in.

Using a large spoon, drop about 1/3 cup of the batter onto the prepared baking sheets to form each cookie, making sure to space them about 2 inches apart. Set aside to let cool, then serve.



GINGER SPICE SUGAR COOKIES

These cookies feature the addition of ginger and warm spices for a delicious variation on classic sugar cookies.

1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted

1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 1/4 cup molasses

1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 egg 2 cups flour, plus more for

rolling out cookies 1 teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon ground cin-

namon 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon ground

nutmeg

In a large bowl with an electric mixer at medium speed, beat butter, sugar, molasses and vanil-



la together until light and fluffy. Beat in egg until well blended. In a separate bowl combine flour, ginger, baking powder, cinnamon, salt and nutmeg. With mixer at low speed, beat flour mixture into butter mixture to blend well. Divide dough in half and shape into two discs. Wrap in waxed paper and chill until firm, at least 1 hour or overnight.

Preheat oven to 350°F. Dust work surface and rolling pin lightly with flour. Working with one disc of dough at a time, roll out dough to 1/4-inch thick

and cut out cookies with floured cookie cutters. Transfer cookies to parchment paper-lined baking sheets, spacing them 1 inch apart, and bake until lightly browned, 10 to 12 minutes. Transfer cookies to a wire rack to cool. Decorate as desired and store in an airtight container.

1 1/2 cup sliced almonds 4 ounces semisweet chocolate, broken into pieces 4 large egg whites 1/2 cup unbleached evaporated cane sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/2 teaspoon almond extract

Preheat the oven to 300°F. Spread the sliced almonds evenly on a sheet pan and toast for 10 minutes, checking often to make sure

the nuts aren't burning. Remove from oven. When nuts are cool, grind them finely in a food processor and set aside.

Gently melt the semisweet chocolate pieces in the top bowl of a double boiler. Whisk thoroughly when melted, and set aside.

In a mixing bowl, whip the egg whites until soft peaks form when the beater is lifted. Slowly pour in the sugar and the vanilla and almond extracts. Continue beating until stiff peaks form, and the egg whites are thick and sticky.

Use a spatula to gently fold one-half of the egg whites into the chocolate mixture. When just combined, carefully fold in onehalf of the ground almonds. Repeat the process ending with the ground almonds.

Gently scoop rounded tablespoons of batter into mounds about 2 inches across, evenly spaced, onto 2 parchment paper-lined baking sheets.

Bake on racks in the middle of the oven for 30 minutes. After 15 minutes, switch the baking sheets in the oven for even baking. Immediately transfer cookies to a wire rack to cool.






