Petition circulates for off-premise alcohol sales

A soldier passing through in July 1869 described "as being the first tee-total, 'sure enough,' 'total abstinence' village that I ever visited."

That impression has changed quite a bit as the Village of Salado now has three wineries, a grocery store that sells beer and wine and restaurants that offer a full selection of mixed drinks.

And after Nov. 11, that impression may change even more if a local man has his way.

Robert Dudezcka has collected well over 280 signatures himself in less than seven days since the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen approved his initial petition for a local option election for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption.

Dudeczka says that he plans on turning in to Village Secretary Margret Murray a completed petition of the signatures of registered voters living within the municipal limits of the Village of Salado in order to call for the local option election to be part of the Nov. 11 ballot.

The signatures will have to be verified by the Village of Salado before the election can be called for November.

When the board of aldermen approved the initial petition of 10 signatures that allow for the circulation of a petition that will require a number of signatures of registered voters living within the Village of Salado boundaries totaling 35 percent of the total ballots cast in the Village of Salado in the last gubernatorial election. Dudeczka said he needs 354 signatures, according to the Bell County Voter Registrar's office. State law allows the local option petition to circulate for 60 days before it must be turned in to local authorities for verification. However, it is unclear to Dudeczka whether that 60 day window would allow him to collect signatures toward a May 2014 election or not. He is shooting for the November 2013 election, though, and thinks he will have enough signatures by the end of business Aug. 8 to turn in to the Village of Salado.



• "The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only." Beer, malt liquor and wine in a grocery or convenience store AND beer, malt liquor, wine and distilled spirits in a liquor store.

•"The legal sale of all alcoholic beverage except mixed beverages." Beer, malt liquor and wine in a grocery or convenience store AND beer, malt liquor, wine and distilled spirits in a liquor store AND beer, malt liquor and wine in a bar or restaurant.

• "The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." Beer, malt liquor and wine in a grocery or convenience store AND beer, malt liquor, wine and distilled spirits in a liquor store AND beer, malt liquor, wine and distilled spirits in a bar or restaurant.

Mural finds new home Artwork by local artists on display, for sale on Aug. 17 to benefit museum

Local citizens carried a large mural by Salado artist Lonnie Edwards from the old Tyler house on Main Street to its new home at the Central Texas Area Museum on south Main St.

Traffic stopped as volunteers carried the mural across the Main Street bridge to hang it on the wall of the Museum.

The Central Texas Area Museum is housed in the Grange store just north of the Salado College ruins. The old Grange store, a walking bridge over Salado Creek, the Tyler house and the two-story limestone Salado College building are key points of interest to the mural painted by Edwards in 1994 when La Mansion de Salado (later anglicanized as The Salado Mansion) opened in the old Tyler house, built in the late 1850s. Central Texas Area Museum has its displays in the older part of the Grange building, but the Hall of the Clans and the nearby Wee Scots Shop are in newer additions to the building.

If the requisite number of signatures are verified

The mural now graces the south wall of the Hall of the Clans.

A bronze sculpture by Ronnie Wells, who has housed his art gallery on south Main Street for about a quarter of a century, will be on display and auctioned off to the highest bidder. Wells is a monument sculptor of national renown. One of his monument pieces can be seen at the Ducks Unlimited headquarters in Tennessee.

Other items to be auctioned include these: an original landscape painting by Salado artist B. The live auction will benefit repairs and upgrades (electrical wiring, air conditioners, etc.) for the century-old building now housing the Central Texas Area Museum artifacts as well as the now new home for the Salado Historical Society artifacts.

Eagles take field

All in.

That's how Head Coach Brent Graham describes the efforts of the 85 players and the coaching staff, which started two-a-day practices on Aug. 5.

Practices have been upbeat, Graham said, and at a fast tempo. "There is a contagious spirit out there."

Graham takes the reins of a football program that has won eight games in the past three seasons.

While some statewide pundits debate whether the Eagles will make the playoffs in the toughest district in the state, Graham and his staff say there is a new spirit in Salado.

From last year's squad, 14 lettermen return for varsity play this year.

The Eagles return four offensive and four defensive starters from last year's 2-8 squad. Additiionally, 16 seniors have turned out for practice, some of whom skipped last year. The two-a-days have also seen an influx of 35 freshmen, giving the young head coach a young team to build upon.

Players will don the pads for the first time Aug. 9 in preparation for an early morning scrimmage at 8 a.m. Aug. 10 at Eagle Field. Returning starters include two-way starters Ryan Simmons, who played quarterback and outside linebacker and Clayton Cole, who started at linebacker and running back.

Other offensive starters include Chase Crenwelge, running back, and offensive lineman James Collins.

Returning to the defense are Peyton Womack, defensive line and Davis Little, defensive back who also saw a lot of time as a receiver last year.

Texas Sales Tax Holiday This Weekend — Aug. 9 - 11

The annual sales tax holiday weekend is scheduled for Aug. 9-11.

Families can save money by not paying sales tax on most clothing, footwear and school supplies priced under \$100. Lists of tax-free items can be found at www.TexasTaxHoliday. org.

The sales tax holiday weekend in Texas has been an annual event since 1999.

Shoppers are expected to save an estimated \$78.9 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

The following school supplies will be tax-free during the holiday as long as the item is under \$100: Binders, Book bags, Calculators, Cellophane tape, Blackboard chalk, Compasses, Composition books, Crayons, Erasers, Folders; expandable, pocket, plastic, and manila; Glue, paste and paste sticks, Highlighters, Index cards, Index card boxes, Legal pads, Lunch boxes, Markers (including dry erase markers); Notebooks, Paper; loose leaf ruled notebook paper, copy paper, graph paper, tracing paper, manila paper, colored paper, poster board, and construction paper; Pencil boxes and other school supply boxes, Pencil sharpeners, Pencils, Pens, Protractors, Rulers, Scissors, Writing tablets.

In addition, the following clothing and accessories will be tax-free, with some limitations:

Adult diapers, Aprons (household), Athletic socks, Baby bibs, Baby clothes, Baby diapers (cloth or disposable), Backpacks (for use by elementary/secondary students); Belts with attached buckles, Blouses, Boots (general purpose), Bow ties, Bowling shirts, Bras.


Camp clothes, Caps (baseball, fishing, golf), Chef uniforms, Children's novelty costumes, Clerical vestments, Coats and wraps, Coveralls, Diapers (cloth and disposable), Dresses, Employee uniforms (unless rented), Fishing caps, Fishing vests (non-flotation), Football accessories.

The case of the city of Detroit isn't much of a murder mystery. Various suspects have been fingered in its demise: The global economy. The fall of the auto industry. The decline of manufacturing generally. But it's simpler than that. Detroit died of its own hand.

The city undertook a controlled experiment in what happens if you are governed by a toxic combination of Great Society big spenders, race hustlers, crooks, public-sector unions and ineffectual reformers. It spent and misgoverned itself into the ground. Detroit discovered that all the social spending in the world doesn't deliver order, family stability, education, economic dynamism or effective governance.

The city's downfall started long before anyone imagined that the Big Three would ever be anything but overwhelmingly dominant. Hardly anyone had heard of Toyota in 1967 when riots ripped the city and a long crime wave began that made it unlivable. According to Henry Payne of The Detroit News, the murder rate climbed from 13 per 100,000 residents in 1966 to 51 per 100,000 by 1976. It was the city's dysfunction that made it unappeal-



ing to the auto companies rather than the diminished state of the auto companies that made the city dysfunctional. The city's mayor for 20 years, Coleman Young, was an ethically challenged black nationalist who hated the suburbs. Under Young, journalist Zev Chafets writes, Detroit had "all the trappings of a third world city -- the showcase projects, an external enemy and the cult of personality." And this was in the good old days of the 1970s and 1980s.

By this point, Detroit already reached had terminal velocity on its own. GM had nothing to do with the City Council promising benefits to retirees that it couldn't possibly pay. Chrysler didn't disgracefully mismanage city agencies. Ford didn't disastrously degrade the city's human capital.

Detroit is a city that has celebrated and feasted on government for decades and yet is incapable of the most basic function of government. Crimes basically aren't solved. The clearance rate is 8.7 percent. This in a city that needs a first-rate police

force. Its crime rate is five times the national average. Henry Payne notes that 80 percent of the city's children grow up fatherless, and that of the 50 percent of black men who are high-school dropouts, more than 70 percent don't have a job, and 60 percent have done time.

The city rewards anyone who can't escape its boundaries -- more than a million people have since 1950, when it had 1.8 million residents -- with stifling taxes in a futile attempt to keep up with spending. It has the highest per capita tax burden in Michigan, despite the low per capita income of its residents.

None of this is the product of the "creative destruction" of capitalism. Despite globalization, urban America is alive and well outside of Detroit. Pittsburgh experienced similar economic dislocation when the steel industry collapsed, but hasn't descended into an urban dystopia. Cities in the South like Houston and Raleigh, N.C., are economically vibrant and attractive to new residents. The way Detroit was once, a very long time ago.

about a billion dollars a year just in "management" fees, not counting profits on investments. So Steve skated. Or so he thought. Now, his firm is fighting another criminal case. And it turns out that Mary Jo White, the new chief of the Securities and Exchange Commission, is no pushover for hotshot finaglers. Suddenly, Cohen finds himself facing a civil charge: "failure to supervise" his hedge-fund traders. That might seem minor, but like Capone's tax evasion, it could be very major, for the SEC's punishment can include being barred from conducting Wall Street business.

Al Capone was a bad How bad? He boy. cheated on his income taxes.

He went to prison in 1931 for that. Not for the people he gunned down, nor for any of the other gross illegalities the guy committed as a notorious Chicago mobster. Tax evasion landed Capone in the slammer.

Now comes Steven Cohen. He's not known to have killed anyone and is not a mobster. (Capone didn't think he was one either — he called himself a "businessman.")

Yet Cohen, a multibillionaire Wall Street hedgefund huckster, shares with Capone the unpleasant experience of being pursued by the authorities - and possibly getting nailed on

the Wall Street equivalent of tax evasion.

Cohen's hedge fund, SAC Capital, was caught pocketing a gazillion or so in profits through the criminal enterprise of insider trading. But Steve was able to dodge those criminal charges in the usual Wall Street way: by buying off the government. SAC paid the Securities and Exchange Commission about \$600 million to make the problem go away, without having to admit guilt or be bothered by a trial. Neat.

Yeah, a \$600 million fine would be a death sentence for you and me, but it's barely a hiccup for Cohen & Company – his outfit typically pulls in

Keep your eye on the ball Contract Bridge

The great majority of mistakes made in bridge are of the common garden variety. A player who errs usually knows better than to commit the particular error he makes, but, for some inexplicable reason, he takes his eye off the ball at the critical moment.

Consider this deal where South failed to make three notrump in a fairly routine hand. West led the jack of hearts. Declarer won East's king with the ace and returned the club queen. West went up with the king and led the ten of hearts, forcing out the queen.

South now had to go down one, whatever he did next. In practice, he tried the jack of clubs, but West rose with the ace and cashed three heart tricks to put a quick end to the proceedings.

Declarer would have made the contract had he taken the simple precaution of ducking East's king of hearts at trick one. He should have realized that if East had another heart to lead, the defense could score at most two hearts and two clubs to hold him to nine tricks, while if East did not have another heart to lead, the contract could not be stopped regardless of what other suit East returned. The only combination of cards that could prevent South from getting home safely was for West to have five hearts and the A-K of clubs. South should therefore have ducked the king of hearts at trick one to protect against this possibility. There was no good reason to take the king, and a very good reason not to take it.




