Foundation raising \$25,000 for sign

They didn't get much notice, but the Salado Community Foundation is in the process of raising \$25,000 for the construction of artistic gateway sign for the southern entrance to Salado.

Tourism Department chairman Debbie Charbonneau learned that TX-DOT will begin work on the gateway signs in either October or November.

In that time, she is spearheading the effort by the Salado Community Foundation to raise the additional \$25,000 needed for the artistic work on the sign.


The basic sign, which will be 30 feet long and six feet high and have the engraved words "Welcome to Salado," has been funded by the Village of Salado for \$10,000. The Village also agreed to fund the northern sign for \$10,000 as well.

The sign will be embellished with light features and a 12-foot tall Century Plant sculpture created by local artists from Coyoe Glass and Salado Glassworks.

The base of the Century Plant will be sculpted metal measuring six feet in diameter. The stalk will reach 12 feet in height with branches that feature lighted glass globes as the floral buds of the century

Charbonneau showed a mock up of the proposed sign to Salado Rotary, which committed \$500 to each sign over two years.

With this donation, the Salado Community Foundation has raised almost half of the funds necessary to pay for the southern sign. To date, the Foundation has secured more than \$11,000 in donations from organizations, individuals and businesses, including these: Ladies Auxiliary, Tourism Council, Salado Rotary Club, Lauren and Debbie Charbonneau. They answer the call, now it is our turn

When the call comes, they answer it.

Doesn't matter if it is during Sunday school, dinner time with the family, the middle of a Little League baseball game or the middle of the night.

When the emergency comes, they answer it.

And now the two dozen members of the Salado

Volunteer Fire Department are asking us to help them to answer those calls. The SVFD will hold its annual Fish Fry at Salado Intermediate School 5-8 p.m. Sept. 14 with Chief Shane Berrier and other firefighters cooking and serving the fish to raise funds to help purchase equipment and pay for the training of the local first responders.

In addition to fires, the firefighters are very often the first on the scene of highway accidents and emergency 911 calls.

The firefighters have been able to maintain one of the best fleets for small-town volunteer department through donations mailed in each year, fundraisers like the fish fry, an annual contract with the Village of Salado and the annual Smokin' Spokes. This year, the firefighters are adding a Smokin'

Sneakers half-marathon on Oct. 12.

Because of support from locals and grants from the state Forestry service, the SVFD maintains the following fleet of ve-

Four booster trucks with 300-500 gallon tanks for brush and grass fires; a 5 ton brush truck with 1,200 gallon capacity; two engine trucks, one with 750 gallon capacity, the other

with 1,000 gallon capacity; two tankers, one with 2,300 gallon capacity and the other with 4,000 gallon capacity; three rescue trucks and two command

The vehicles are housed at two stations: Station #1 is on Stagecoach Rd., which was recently made one-way for the expansion/construction of I-35 through Salado.

On a pay-as-you-go ba-

sis, local firefighters built the second station over a two year period.

The fire department funds its \$100,000 per year budget in several ways: \$30,000 from a contract with the Village of Salado for emergency services, \$30,000 from county runs, \$8,000 from county EMS pay, reimbursements from private insurance for EMS and fire calls and donations and grants.

Salamander is one in long series of fights, Carter says

Some considered the six month extension by the US Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS) in listing the Salado salamander and Georgetown salamander as endangered as a victory of sorts.

But Rep. John Carter (R-31) sees it differently. Not as a victory but as an opportunity. And the battle, Rep. Carter said Sept. 5 at a gathering of stakeholders affected the Salado salamander proposed listing, is not just about the salamander but about litigation and science.

"This won't end with salamander," Rep. Carter said, adding that when "they finish with the salamander, there are another 251 species that have

been published in the Federal Register to go on the endangered species list. The next one in this area is a freshwater mussel.

Rep. Carter said that fringe environmentalists have taken a litigious approach to forcing the overwhelmed FWS to add more species to the Endangered Species list. "They're not done yet," he said, adding that the environmental group Center for Biodiversity in a settlement with the FWS has pushed the FWS to consider listing hundreds of species as endangered.

"Fish and Wildlife is not making these decisions based on the science they are doing themselves," Rep. Carter said. Instead, the service is relying on the science that is presented to them. In

many cases, that science is one-sided and, according

The local stakeholder group began an effort last year to gather data about the Edwards aquifer, the Salado creek watershed, the effects of the prolonged drought and the Salado salamander itself.

to Rep. Carter, flawed.

County Commissioner Tim Brown said that the group, funded by Bell County, Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD), the Village of Salado, Salado Water Supply Corporation, Jarrell-Schertner Water Supply Corporation and private property owners, entered into a contract with the top experts to study these aspects and help propose a common sense approach to prote-

ecting the habitat of the

"It's not just about the salamander," Brown said. "It's about protecting an important asset," adding that Saladoans get their water from the aquifer.

"If we take care of the aquifer, we take care of the salamander," he said.

"We need the aquifer to be be full, we need it to be clean," said Mike Brashawn, a water rights attorney from Austin who has worked for CUWCD.

The CUWCD was tasked by the state to determine what are the desired future conditions for the Edwards (northern segment) and Trinity Aquifer. For the Edwards, the minimal flow acceptable is 1.6 cubic feet per second.

Even during this extreme, historic drought,

that flow has remained above 2.2 cubic feet per second, according to Dirk Aaron, executive director of the CUWCD.

"We are doing our part to protect both the water quantity and the water quality of the Edwards Aquifer," Aaron said.

However, the drought has caused the salamanders to all but disappear. To some scientists, driven by what Rep. Carter said was a motivation to shut down everything, the proposed salamanders "have to be under more stress because they are no longer

But for other scientists, there is another "common sense answer" to the fact that no one has seen a Salado salamander in several

"They've gone down

into the aquifer itself," he said.

Aaron and Brown agree. They have said that during the historic droughts, the salamander has "disappeared" only to reappear in springs when water conditions improve.

Aaron said that the CUWCD will again make public comment, using the scinetific data gather todate, in refuting many of the claims in the proposed listing of the Salado salamander. Specifically, CU-WCD will refute the claim in the listing proposal that there are no regulatory measures in place to protect the critical habitat of the Salado salamander.

"We have been protecting that habitat," he said, "because it is important to all of us to have enough good, quality water."



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
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

An Open Exchange of Ideas

President Barack Obama's most telling act on the international stage may have come in a meeting in early 2012 in Seoul, South Korea, with Russia's seat-warming president, Dmitry Medvedev.

Before the two got up to leave, President Obama asked -- in an exchange caught on an open mic -- that Moscow cut him some slack. "This is my last election," Obama explained. "After my election I have more flexibility." Medvedev promised to "transmit this information to Vladimir," referring, of course, to the power behind the throne, Vladimir Putin.

When he received the message, Putin must have chortled at the heartbreaking naivete of it. Here was the leader of the free world pleading for more time to get along with his Russian friends on the basis of an utterly risible assumption of good will. Here was a believer in the policy of "reset" who still didn't get that the reset was going nowhere. Here was weakness compounded by delu-

Putin didn't care about Obama's flexibility so much as any opportunity to thwart the United States. Obama said that Syria President Bashar al-Assad had to go; Putin worked to make sure he stayed. Obama said that National





Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden had to return to the United States; Putin granted him asylum. When Putin related to a group of Russian students that he had told Snowden to stop doing damage to the United States, the students did the only thing appropriate upon hearing such a patently insincere claim -- they laughed out loud

Vladimir Putin surely isn't the only one in the world who regards the president of the United States with barely disguised contempt. As the Syria crisis burns hotter, President Obama has never looked so feckless. He has perfected the art of speaking reproachfully and carrying little or no stick. The grand theory of his foreign policy coming into office, that more national selfabasement would win us greater international good will and respect, has done the opposite. Adversaries don't fear us, and allies don't trust us.

When Assad prepared to use chemical weapons last year, President Obama warned of a fearsome "red line," with no intention of following up on it. When Assad called his bluff, the president announced he would provide small arms to the rebels in retaliation, but he hasn't actually done it yet. Is it any wonder that Bashar al-Assad would, like Vladimir Putin, think he had taken the measure of the man? Last month, he killed hundreds in another chemical-weapons attack.

The sharply worded warning ignored by everyone has become the Obama administration's characteristic rhetorical trope. It warned the military junta in Egypt not to crack down on the Muslim Brotherhood, which was taken with all the seriousness of its admonitions to Assad to step aside.

Meanwhile, Iran progresses toward a nuclear weapon, Iraq reverts to civil war, and al-Qaida gains in Yemen and Somalia. In an essay in Commentary magazine, analyst Elliott Abrams argues that the guiding principle of Obama foreign policy is, as he once put it, to end the old "habits" of American international activism and leadership. The new habit, evidently, will be tolerating irrelevance and humiliation.

THE DRIVE TO PAY WORKERS LESS AND LESS IS LEAVING AMERICANS UNABLE TO BUY MUCH BESIDES ESSENTIALS.

America's economic recovery can be measured not only in the performance of stocks — but also of socks.

Most economists, pundits, and politicos see this year's boom in the stock market and say: "See, the recovery is going splendidly!"

What if they went to such stores as Kohl's, Target, and Walmart to find out what's selling? The answer would be: Socks.

During this back-toschool season, usually the year's second-biggest buying spree, sales are sluggish at best. Customers are foregoing any spending on their kids except for socks, underwear, and other essentials.

The sock market isn't just a key economic indicator. It's a way to gauge the widening inequality in

America.

The highly-ballyhooed "recovery" has been restricted to the few at the top who own stocks, get paychecks that top \$100,000 a year, and drive BMWs. Meanwhile, the rest of us don't have any cash to spare beyond necessities.

Charles M. Holley Jr., Walmart's chief financial officer, seems puzzled by this. As he puts it, there's "a general reluctance of customers to spend on discretionary items."

Golly, sir, could it be because job growth in our supremely-wealthy country has been both lackluster and miserly?

Yes, for jobs today are typically very low-pay-

ing, part-time, and temporary, with no benefits. Mr. Walmart-man should know this, since his retail behemoth is the leading culprit in downsizing American jobs.

In recent months, headquarters has directed Walmart managers not to hire at all or to concentrate on hiring temporary and part-time workers, while cutting the hours of many full-time employees and making it harder for all workers to get the corporation's meager health care

Walmart's sales and profits are stagnant today because — hello — even its own workers can't afford to buy anything besides socks.

"We typically will set up a portable clinic in an elementary school and treat as many children as we can during our week long trip," he says. "On many of the trips I have brought a dental hygienist who cleans and provides preventative sealants. I usually will do fillings and

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Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 5, 2013

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action?

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operation-

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.'

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead propthe length of time that aircraft erty in addition to the current

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

Proposition Number 7

(HJR 87) HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appointment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County.

Proposition Number 9 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Con-

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

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
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
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Faith & Freedom in the Lone Star **State: Baylor Hosts Lecture Series**

Religion played a key role in the revolution that brought an independent Texas republic into existence, and today, religion thrives in the State of Texas, with perhaps a greater diversity of faiths than in any other state.

Scholars of religion will offer a look at Texas' religious history through a three-part lecture series in Waco called "Faith and Freedom in the Lone Star State: Exploring the Religious History of Texas." The Thursday lectures, which are free, will be hosted by Baylor University's Institute for Studies of Religion on Sept. 19, Oct. 10 and Nov. 14.

When Texas became a republic, a variety of churches - among them Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian – appeared, and the Roman Catholic Church found a new start, he said. Through the decades, new denominations found homes in the state, among them Episcopalians, Lutherans and Eastern Orthodox. African-Americans, meanwhile, organized African Methodist and National Baptist churches. Adding to the diversity were Jewish families, Christian Scientists, Spiritualists and Swedenborgians.

Scholars of religion estimate more than 2,300 denominations exist in the United States, with Texas having representatives of at least 500 of those, said Melton, founder and director of the Institute for the Study of American Religion, which publishes Melton's Encyclopedia of American Religions.

The series will be held Thursday, Sept. 19, at Lee Lockwood Library and Museum, 2801 W. Waco Drive; , Thursday, Oct. 10, at Congregation Agudath Jacob, 4925 Hillcrest Drive; and Thursday, Nov. 14, at The Palladium, 729 Austin Ave.



McLane throws for most yards by 2A quarterback in 75-67 loss loss

You know how when you get up in the middle of an action movie to get a Coke or popcorn and come back to your seat and the whole storyline has changed?

Well, Salado's contest -- let's face facts, it was a gunfight from the start -with the Lorena Leopards Sept. 6 was just like that.

If you left your seat at Lorena stadium to go to the concession stand or restroom you probably missed a 70 yard touchdown, two lead changes, an 80 yard drive, maybe an onsides kick or an interception thrown in for good measure.

What you didn't miss was much defense as the Eagles and Leopards combined for the third most points scored by two teams in a single Texas high school football game. Unfortunately, the Leopards edged Salado, thanks in part to two plays that went against the Eagles, handing Salado their second loss under coach Brent Graham. Lorena escaped their own field with a 75-67 hard-fought win over Salado, knocking Salado to 0-2 and improving to 2-0 on the season.

In doing so, the Leopards chewed up more than six lengths of the football field, with overpowering quarterback Harris Coleman rushing for 286 yards on 26 carries and three TDs. The Leopards had 611 rushing vards.

Meanwhile, Salado's junior left-handed quarterback McLane Carter had a game for the record books as well, throwing 25 completions for 613 yards, the fourth most passing yards in a single Texas high school game. For the

records buffs, one-time Salado quarterback Michael Richardson set the top passing yardage mark last year throwing for 725 yards for the Marble Falls Mustangs in their game with Boerne.

McLane's 613 yards is the most thrown in any 2A Texas high school football game. For that, he has been nominated for the Gridiron Legends Player of the Week award, presented by Dave Campbell's Texas Football on behalf of Cavender's and Wrangler.

McLane is one of ten nominees (along with Lorena's Coleman) for the weekly statewide award, which is 100 percent decided by fan voting. The poll, located at www.texasfootball.com, closes at noon on Sept. 13.

While the game was explosive from the first whistle to the last, when Lorena recovered an onsides kick SEE EAGLES, PAGE 2B

"It all starts with the snap," Salado Head Coach Brent Graham said.

"Jacob Popple was perfect for us and it gave us the opportunity to do great things," he added about the 617 yards passing by junior quarterback McLane Carter. "He (Carter) was never pressured by the defense and we hope to continue that this week."

The Salado Eagles play their first home game 7:30 p.m. Sept. 13 against the China Spring Cougars, who bring their 2-0 record into town.

The Cougars outscored Glen Rose 40-21 last week and opened with a 49-28 win over Mexia.

"They can definitely score," Graham said of China Spring. But so can Salado, as the Eagles scored 67 points in a 67-75 losing effort on the road against Lorena, the thirdhighest scoring game in Texas high school football history.

While Graham wants his offensive line centered around Popple to continue to do the stellar job of protecting Carter, he says that his defense has to improve. "We have to stop the run," he said, something the Eagles were unable to do in their past two outings.

Defensively, the Eagles seem to have adopted a "maybe next time" attitude, according to Graham. "They know that our offense can score, so when they don't make a stop, they think they can stop them next time. We've got to stop them now."

Graham said that is something that has been inculcated and worked on repeatedly in training.

"We've been doing a good job of it in practice, but it has not translated into game day yet," he said.

If and when it does, the Eagles will be a formidable opponent, as they move from non-district play on Sept. 13 to their first district football game at home against defending state champions Cameron Yoe on Sept. 27.

The Eagles face an offense that returns five starters from last year's 6-5 bi-district finalists.

Tucker Johnson moves from defense to take over the helm of the offense as quarterback. He will be bolstered in the Cougars' spread offense by sophomore running back David Feliciano and tight end Tyler Smith.

"They can score points against anybody," Graham

The Leopards trailed by 21-0 in the first quarter and 27-15 in the second becore scoring back-toback touchdowns as Salado could not get Coleman to the ground.

Coleman, Andrew Marrero and Duggan Burch all had three rushing touchdowns in the game and 100-plus yard rushing performances for Lorena.

The Leopards turned their one-point halftime lead into a 51-35 lead early in the third quarter after driving for a touchdown on the second half kick and then recovering an onsides kick in Salado territory and converting the opportunity into a quick touchdown. The Eagles

answered back with touchdown strikes from Carter to Davis Little for 30 yards and 55 yards to Kase Spears. Little had four TD catches, including a long one of 69 yards Spears had three TD catches and had 275 yards on 15 recep-

Closing within two points with five minutes left in the third quarter, the Eagles took over the ball at their own 40 when Clayton Cole fell on a Burch fumble that Jace Habiger caused. Carter hit Spears for 29 yards on a third down to move into Leopards territory. Ryan Simmons then blew through the Leopards defense, spinning through tackles at the 12 yard line to be stopped just short of the goal with about three minutes left in the third.

But the Eagles could not get the ball across on two running and one incompleted pass, settling for a 20 yard field goal by Chase Crenwelge, who was perfect in kicking for the night. The field goal gave Salado a 52-51 edge.

Within the next three minutes, Lorena would take the lead and then Sal-

ado would tie it at 59. Burch scored from the 5 and Coleman threw to Jared Poteet for a twopoint conversion and 59-52 lead with 10 seconds left in the third.

Salado answered by driving 74 yards, thanks to the Little brothers. Jacob Little caught a third and 15 pass from Carter for 49 y ards to get the ball to the 40 yard line. Two plays later, Davis took a pass and turned it into a 32-yard score with 1:56 left in the

Lorena scored twice more in the fourth quarter to seemingly put the game out of reach with a 73-59 lead with 2:15 left to play.

Coleman booted the kick out of the endzone, but the Eagles drove 80 yards in six plays, all passes with Carter connecting with Davis Little for 44 yards, Spears for gains of 11 and 10 and Little again for a 15 yard touchdown with 1:21 left to play. Carter hit Spears for a twopoint conversion.

The Eagles attempted an onside kick, but Lorena's Kyle Perlowksi fell on the ball at midfield to dash the hopes of the Eagles.

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Bridge is much too difficult a game for anyone to always play perfectly. Mistakes are fairly frequent, even at the highest level. The most that anyone can realistically hope to do is to hold their mistakes to a minimum.

Consider this deal from the 1977 world championship match between the United States and Sweden. When the U.S. held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. North's two-club bid over one notrump was "Landy," showing length in both major suits.

West led a diamond against four hearts doubled, and the American declarer took East's king with the ace. A trump to dummy's queen, West following low, revealed the 3-0 trump division. South then returned to his hand with a diamond and this time led a spade.

West followed low, as most defenders would, and declarer went up with the king, since West was marked by the bidding with the ace of spades. Next came a low spade to West's ace, after which it didn't matter what West played next. With proper play, South was bound to make the contract.

However, West could have defeated four hearts by going up with the ace of spades at trick four and exiting with a spade. South would then have found it impossible to stop West from scoring two trump tricks with the A-J no matter how he continued.

It is not difficult to prove that the correct play at trick four was for West to go up with the ace of spades and return the suit. But in the heat of battle -when a defender does not have the time to analyze a situation completely and instead reacts instinctively -- it is easy to make a mistake. West was only doing
