Susan Rice's Dodge

'To see what is in front of one's nose," George Orwell wrote, "needs a constant struggle." Ambassador to the United Nations Susan Rice is losing the struggle -- although, in fairness, it's not clear how hard she's trying.

After the deadly attacks on our embassies, Rice appeared on the Sunday TV shows in what was widely taken as an audition for secretary of state in a second Obama administration. She proved herself willfully clueless and morally obtuse. In other words, perfectly suited for the job. Based on this performance, she should start measuring the drapes on the State Department's seventh floor.

The ambassador insisted that the protests in Egypt and Libya were a spontaneous eruption of Islamic rage over a rancid, barely coherent anti-Muhammad video posted on YouTube. It was an unusually purposeful spontaneity, though.

In Egypt, a crowd that included the brother of al-Qaida leader Ayman al-Zawahiri showed up to tear down the American flag and replace it with an al-Qaida banner on the anniversary of 9/11. What are the odds?

In Libya, the attackers were described by House Intelligence Committee Chairman Mike Rogers as coordinating indirect and direct fire. The militants launched, he said, "two different separate attacks on locations there near the consulate, and they repelled a fairly significant Libyan force that came to rescue the embassy."

In Rice's telling, the protests aren't an "expression of hostility in the broadest sense to the United States or U.S. policies." Yet the Egyptian rampagers reportedly chanted, "Obama! We are all Osama!" In Afghanistan, protesters cried, "Death to America." Demonstrators routinely burn American flags. It's hard to imagine how to make broader expressions of hostility to the U.S.

For Rice, they love us; they just hate

what we post on YouTube. She blamed "a very hateful, very offensive video that has offended many people around the world." Note the euphemism. "Offended" is what you are when someone uses the wrong dinner fork; "stark raving mad" is what you are when you storm an embassy over an amateurish video. The "many people around the world" happen to be concentrated in one region and one reli-

The fact is that video is more a pretext than a provocation. As in prior such episodes of violence over alleged Western offenses against Islam, the people who are enraged need to be *told* to be enraged, and perhaps paid a little on the side for their trouble.

To blame the laughably bad anti-Muhammad video for the violence, rather than the provocateurs on the ground, is a concession to the logic of blasphemy laws giving aggrieved Muslims a veto over free speech. The administration has already shown itself disturbingly sympathetic to these efforts, co-sponsoring a U.N. resolution in 2009 against religious hate speech. In free societies, religious hate speech is simply free speech, otherwise Richard Dawkins and Sam Harris wouldn't be allowed to publish. Any hedging on this principle is a betrayal of who we are.

There's no assurance that Susan Rice sees that, any more than she sees anything else in front of her nose.

Sequestration A looming threat to national security

Despite warnings of the dire consequences, America is teetering at the edge of a fiscal cliff, with January 1st, 2013 as the tipping point. On that date, unless Congress and the White House can reach agreement on how to cut the federal deficit, all taxpayers will be hit with higher taxes and deep cuts called "sequestration" - will occur in almost all government spending, disrupting our already weak economy and putting our national security at risk.

According to the House Armed Services Committee, if sequestration goes into effect, it would put us on course for more than \$1 trillion in defense cuts over the next 10 years. What would that mean? A huge hit to our military personnel and their families; devastating cuts in funding for critical military equipment and supplies for our soldiers; and a potentially catastrophic blow to our national defense and security capabilities in a time of increasing violence and danger.

All Americans feel a debt of gratitude to our men and women who serve in uniform. Texas in particular has a culture that not only reveres the commitment and sacrifice they make to protect our freedom, we send a disproportionate number of our sons and daughters

The burden is not borne solely by those who continue to answer the call of duty, but by their families as well, as they endure separation and the anxiety of a loved one going off to war. These Americans have made tremendous sacrifices. They deserve better than to face threats to their financial security and increased risks to their loved ones in uniform, purely for political gamesmanship.

Sequestration would also place an additional burden on our economy. In the industries that support national defense, as many as 1 million skilled workers could be laid off. With 43 straight months of unemployment above 8 percent, it is beyond comprehension to add a virtual army to the 23 million Americans who

are already out of work or under-employed. Government and private economic forecasters warn that sequestration will push the country back into recession next year.

The recent murder of

our Ambassador to Libya and members of his staff, attacks on US embassies and consulates and continued riots across the Middle East and North Africa are stark reminders that great portions of the world remain volatile and hostile to the US. We have the mantle of responsibility that being the world's lone super-power brings. In the absence of U.S. military leadership, upheaval in the Middle East would be worse. As any student of history can attest, instability does not confine itself to national borders. Strife that starts in one country can spread like wildfire across a region.

Sequestration's would reduce an additional 100,000 airmen, Marines, sailors and soldiers. That would leave us with the smallest ground force since 1940, the smallest naval fleet since 1915 and the smallest tactical fighter force in the Air Force's history. With the destabilization in the Middle East and other areas tenuous, we would be left with a crippled military, a diminished stature internationally and a loss of technological research, development and advantage – just as actors across the globe are increasing their capabilities.

Sequestration can still be avoided. But that will require leadership from the President that has thus far been missing. Congress and the White House must reach a longterm agreement to reduce \$1 trillion annual budget deficits, without the harsh tax increases that could stall economic growth and punish working families.

Despite that, Mayor Danney McCort called Melissa Paxton, the current President of PALS, which is working on a new installation of outdoor sculpture for the Salado Sculpture Garden.

The Lovers was cast by Gist when the Salado Garden Club folded. Money that the Club had saved and raised through Garden Tours was dedicated to purchasing a piece of art to donate to the Village of Salado for all to enjoy.

The Garden Club chose the Public Arts League of Salado (PALS) to channel the effort through its 501(c)3 status and charge supporting public works of art.

PALS chose the location for The Lovers to bookend the green bridge with art. At the time the green walking bridge was placed on Main Street, it was called a work of art itself by many, including the late Jim Cowan, who was the area engineer for TxDOT who worked to get the lenticular bridge placed in Salado.

PALS worked with local artist Troy Kelley to place Billy Goat Gruff at the south end of the walking bridge in 2000, before the Village government was established. Kelley asked and received permission from TxDOT to place the sculpture in the right-of-way.

Almost a decade later, PALS placed The Lovers, having been told by thenmayor Merle Stalcup that they could place it there temporarily. Since then, Paxton said, PALS has contacted TxDOT officials to seek state permission to place the sculpture in the right-of-way, but to no avail.

Meanwhile, others have protested the sculpture, calling it obscene. Petitions to the Village and TxDOT have circulated both opposed to and in favor of the sculpture -- or even its name, The Lovers. Until the phone call to Paxton from McCort on Sept. 24.

Since then, PALS has been offered a half dozen locations in downtown as a new home for The Lovers. Paxton told the Salado Village Voice Sept. 25 that The Lovers would temporarily move to the Sculpture Garden for a three-day event in which the Garden unveils its new collection of outdoor sculptures, beginning with a private preview on Oct. 26 and continuing through that weekend.

Artist Aaron Gist will be on-hand that weekend demonstrating his techniques and talking about The Lovers and other works he has created.

And then, The Lovers will move down Main Street to its new home.

On The Range.

The Lovers will soon sit at its new home The Range at the Barton House where another PALS piece of art sits nearby.

When Ludlam wrote and starred in the award-winning play in 1984, he said: "Our slant was actually to take things very seriously, especially focusing on those things held in low esteem by society and revaluing them, giving them new meaning, new worth, by changing their context."

The main characters of "Irma Vep" are connected to Mandacrest, a gloomy mansion on the edge of a murky English moor. The plot is far too complex and silly to describe. Suffice it to say that Mandacrest and its new mistress, Lady Enid, are haunted – perhaps literally – by the memory of Lord Edgar's first wife, Irma Vep.

Also, there is something mysterious out there on the heath, and Lord Edgar's interest in lycanthropy (person-to-wolf transformation) and Egyptology may hold the key to the mystery. Throw in ancient curses, spooky omens, werewolves, vampires and a mummy's tomb for good measure, and you have a plot that is both complex and ridiculously funny.

First things first

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

When there is a sure way to make the contract, declarer should not adopt any approach that might jeopardize it. This principle is self-evident, but the fact is that players occasionally violate it without intending to do so.


Take this case where West led a club against three notrump. Declarer took the queen with the king and tried a heart finesse, losing the jack to East's king. Back came a club, won by West with the ten, and another club forced out the ace.

South led a heart to the queen, and West showed out. Forced by the bad heart split to turn his attention to diamonds, declarer played the queen from dummy and finessed, whereupon West took the king and cashed two club tricks to put the contract down one.

South was certainly unlucky, but, even so, the outcome was entirely his own fault. He could have ensured nine tricks at the start by attacking diamonds instead of hearts, and he should not have allowed himself to be distracted by an alternative, but uncertain, line of play. All declarer had to do was to lead a spade to the ace at trick two, return the queen of diamonds and finesse. Win or lose, he would make at least nine tricks against any distribution.

The early heart finesse opened the door to defeat if East had the king and the suit was unfavorably divided, and therefore should have been avoided. In effect, South allowed himself to be diverted from his goal because he happened to be in his hand at trick one, making it more convenient to take a heart finesse than a diamond finesse. Declarers must learn to reject such luxuries.

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

Try a different take on Chili

White Turkey Chili

We love this non-traditional chili made with tomatillos, green chiles and white beans. The optional toppings add fresh color and bright flavor.

- 1 1/2 tablespoon olive oil, divided
- 2 pounds ground turkey breast
- 1 green bell pepper, cored, seeded and chopped
- 1 medium yellow onion, chopped
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- 2 tablespoons ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 bay leaf

drained

- 1 can tomatillos, drained
- and chopped 1 can diced green chiles,
- 1 small jalapeño, seeded and finely sliced



low-sodium cups chicken broth

3 cups cooked Great Northern beans, drained Chopped cilantro, for garnish (optional)

7 teaspoons grated Monterey Jack cheese, for garnish (optional)

7 teaspoons sour cream, for garnish (optional)

Heat 1/2 tablespoon of the oil in a large pot over medium high heat. Add turkey and cook, stirring often, until browned. Transfer to a bowl and return pot to heat. Add

remaining 1 tablespoon oil, bell pepper and onion and cook until softened and golden brown. Return turkey to pot and add coriander, cumin, oregano and salt. Stir well to combine. Add bay leaf, tomatillos, chiles, jalapeños and broth, reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, 45 to 50 minutes. Gently stir in beans and cook for 30 minutes more. Stir in cilantro, ladle chili into bowls and garnish with cheese and sour cream, if you like.

Lentil Chili

This simple vegetarian chili recipe uses lentils instead of beans. Brown lentils work best as they will hold their shape even when tender after cooking. Serve over brown rice or with whole-grain hearth bread.

8 cups low-sodium vegetable broth, divided

- 1 medium yellow onion, chopped
- 1 large red bell pepper, chopped
- 5 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 4 teaspoons salt-free chili powder
- package brown lentils (about 2 1/4 cups lentils) 2 cans no-salt-added diced
- tomatoes 1/4 cup chopped cilantro



Bring 3/4 cup broth to a simmer in a large pot over medium-high heat. Add onion, bell pepper and garlic and cook about 8 minutes or until onion is translucent and pepper is tender. Stir in chili powder and cook 1 minute, stirring constantly.

Add lentils, tomatoes and remaining 7 1/4 cups broth. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to medium-low and simmer, partially covered, 30 minutes or until lentils are almost tender. Uncover and cook 10 minutes longer. Stir in cilantro and serve.

Bison Chili

This chunky, veggiepacked chili is just the thing for cold-weather comfort or watching the game. A surprise ingredient—cauliflower-adds even more flavor.

- 1/2 pound ground bison
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 1 large carrot, finely chopped

head cauliflower, stemmed and cut into small florets (about 3 cups)

- 1 medium green bell pepper, finely chopped 3 large garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin 2 tablespoons no-salt-added
- chili powder 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar
- 1 can no-salt-added diced tomatoes
- 1 can no-salt-added crushed

tomatoes



1 can no-salt-added kidney beans, drained and rinsed 1/2 cup loosely packed cilantro leaves, chopped

Heat a large Dutch oven or pot over high heat. When the pot is very hot, add bison and brown it, stirring often for 5 minutes. Add onion and carrot, and cook, until both begin to soften, about 5 minutes. Add 1/2 cup water to deglaze the pan, scraping brown bits from the bottom of the pan

as the water evaporates.

Add cauliflower, bell pepper and garlic and cook until vegetables begin to soften, about 5 minutes. Add cumin, chili powder, vinegar, tomatoes and beans along with 1 cup water. Bring to a boil; reduce to a simmer, cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are fork tender, about 45 minutes.

Serve garnished with chopped cilantro.

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

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Plant seeds now for spring wildflowers

Do you have an area in the back of your yard that is not very attractive? Do you plant bluebonnets and wonder why you have little success in having them grow and bloom? Do you drive around in the spring and gaze in awe at the beautiful wildflowers of Texas? Hopefully, some of the following tips will help you to achieve a beautiful display of Texas's wildflowers in your own yard.

Contrary to popular opinion, wildflowers should be planted in the fall rather than the spring. According to John Thomas at Wildseed Farms in Fredericksburg, wildflowers need fall rains and a wet winter. Site location and weather patterns are a big factor in planting. If you plant the seeds September through December, many of the species will germinate and allow the seedling enough time to establish a healthy root system before going dormant in the winter.

Pick a location that receives at least eight hours of sunlight a day. Also

select a site that drains well. Wildflowers do not like wet feet; that is why so often vou see them on slopes. It is recommended to start with a mix of seeds so that you can determine which ones do the best in your area. Be sure to buy bluebonnet seeds that have been scarified. The seed has to be treated to remove inhibiting properties of the seed's coat, which prevents water intake, and the initiation of growth. Seeds that have been properly scarified will germinate in 10 days after planting in moist

To prepare the seed bed, rake the surface of the soil to a depth of one inch. Then broadcast your seed as uniformly as possible, broadcasting half of your seed in one direction, then the remaining in a direction perpendicular to the initial sowing. Press the seed into the bed by walking or rolling over the newly planted area. Do not cover the seed.

The seeds require ample moisture to germinate, so the area should be kept moist for 4 to 6 weeks. Do not keep the soil too wet, just moist. After the seed-

lings are 1 to 2 inches in height, watering should be gradually reduced and applied only if the plants show signs of stress. Your wildflowers will return yearly after blooming if allowed to reseed. When the dead brown foliage offsets the floral color, the area can be mowed to a

height of 4-6 inches.

Lawn Care Safety

This is a Hammer

Q: I was working in my vard and noticed my neighbor's landscaper using a weed trimmer without any protection from flying debris. Gas-powered professional weed trimmers can be quite powerful and sure enough, almost as soon as I saw him, he struck an area that contained a bit of gravel. A stone flew up and hit him in the eye, resulting in a trip to the hospital and several days out of work. Josh G., Indianapolis

A: That's a good point, and one well worth paying attention to. Often, we're in a hurry to just finish up with the yard work. Or, it's too hot or too aggravating to put on safety gear like impactresistant goggles and sturdy gloves. But spending a couple extra dollars to purchase the right equipment and safety gear, and taking a few extra seconds to put it on, can prevent injuries and even save your life.

In fact, there are a number of preventive measures to take before starting yard work. The folks at Topical Biomedics (which, handily, sells a pain relief and healing cream for those postyard work sore muscles) offer a few additional tips:

--Before doing any heavy yard work, warm up for at least 10 minutes with some

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lighter tasks.

-- Cover any exposed skin with sunscreen to prevent sunburn.

--Sturdy gloves will protect your hands from blisters, scratches, insect bites, poison ivy, the heat from gaspowered, handheld lawncare tools, and flying debris. --Sturdy boots with slipresistant soles are critical safety gear when working around any power tool.

--Eye protection -- goggles specifically made to resist high-impact strikes -- will protect you from flying debris, accidental chemical spills, and many eye irritants and allergens.

-- Face protection: a dust or filter mask should be worn when spreading fertilizer or spraying yard chemicals, and can be a big help to those with seasonal allergies while doing yard work.

--Wear long-sleeved shirts and pants to protect skin from scratches caused by low-hanging tree branches and other plants.

--Wear noise-reducing earmuffs, a hard hat and a steel mesh face visor when using a chainsaw.

HOME TIP: Always give your lawn a quick walk through before mowing, and remove debris that could damage your equipment or injure you.
