I-35 officials lay out plans for next six months

Representatives from Texas Department of Transportation and James Construction will be on hand 6:30 p.m. Oct. 22 at the Salado Intermediate School cafeteria to outline plans for the expansion of I-35 through Salado and its impact on the community over the next few months as the Thomas Arnold Bridge will be taken out and a new overpass built in its place.

The representatives will also speak with local residents and business owners about informing the public when high impact lane closures will be happening so that locals can make alternate travel

Currently, TXDOT maintains an email list of those who have signed up for the notices which are sent out before a major lane closing is put into effect. The most recent major lane closing was done on the north end of town when traffic was routed off of the interstate and onto the access roads so that supports could be put in place for the overpass bridge being built at I-35

and FM 2484.

Work has begun on the access roads where they intersect with Thomas Arnold Road to make room for the longer and wider bridge which will be placed at that location. Because of the right-of-way footprint for that intersection, the bridge itself will have to taken out and a new bridge constructed in its place. TXDOT officials say that the project to replace the Thomas Arnold Bridge is expected to take between three and five months.

While no firm dates have been given on when the bridge will be taken down, local officials have told Salado Village Voice that they do not expect it to be done until after the start of the new year. Others have said that the bridge will be taken down in mid-November.

In other locations of the project, TXDOT has been able to replace the overpass bridge before taking out the current bridge, as it is doing at the intersection of I-35 and FM 2268 (Holland Rd.) and the intersection of I-35 and FM 2484.

bership meeting of the Friends of the Salado Public Library will be at 5 p.m., Oct. 21 in the Library Meeting Room. Officers for the coming year will be elected. A By-laws revision will be presented for adoption. The annual meeting is open to all members of the Friends of the Library and members

of the community. The Friends of the Library will discuss the growth of the library in the past year, including the 3,200 sq. ft. expansion that began on Sept. 14, 2012. The Friends of the Library sponsored an Open House on May 19 to celebrate the opening of the new addition. The size of the Library was almost doubled allowing the creation of separate children and teen areas, a high tech meeting room with a computerized presentation screen and a separate Historical and Genealogy section.

The Friends of the Library worked to raise funds for the completion of the project and volunteers helped with every-

thing from landscaping to the moving of all the bookshelves. The Friends also provided table and chairs for the patio, seating for the children's area, custom door mats for both entries, artwork for the meeting room and landscaping plants.

The Friends of the Library developed and placed rack cards at the Visitors Center. Additionally, a half page ad was placed in the Chamber of Commerce brochure to advertise library services such as fax, copies, the Cemetery Directory, History & Genealogy Section, free Wi-Fi, the library www.saladoliwebsite: brary.org, and Book Ends, the used book store operated by the Friends.

Book Ends now sports a new front door and colorful awning to invite visitors to the store. Book Ends is open the same hours as the library and has quite an array of used books priced from 50 cents to \$2. Book Ends also accepts donations of used books.

Village sales taxes leap 31%

rebate to the Village of Salado jumped by 31 percent compared to last October's payment as State Comptroller Susan Combs issued a rebate check of \$31,051.12 to the Village of Salado. Last year, the Village received \$23,746.42 in October.

Despite the increase, which far exceeds the increases of local municipalities, Bell county and the state, the Village of Salado is still down 1.7 percent for the year. In 2013, the Village has received \$312,199.07, compared to the \$317,647.11 paid through October 2012.

The Village of Salado levies a one-cent local sales tax.

The Salado Library District saw an increase of almost 9 percent in its October sales tax. The Library district received \$29,345.85 for ber 2013, compared to \$26,971.87 last October. For the year, the Library District is running almost 22 percent ahead of 2012. So far in 2013, the Library District has received \$319,992.76. Last year, the Library District received \$263,267.29 through October 2012.

The Library District levies a half-cent sales tax in its boundaries which are the same as the Salado In-

dependent School District. Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced last week that state sales tax revenue in September was \$2.01 billion, up 2.7 percent compared to September 2012.

"State sales tax revenue collections continued to grow at a moderate pace," Combs said. "Growth was led by collections from the construction, telecommunications and retail sectors. State sales tax revenue has now increased for 42 consecutive months."

Combs sent counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their October local sales tax allocations totaling \$579.8 million, up 5.2 percent compared to October 2012.

Jennings deserves better

To The Editor

You made several valued points in your commentary on Oct. 3. However, the attack on John Jennings wasn't one of them.

I first met Mr. Jennings just a month ago following my own public comment regarding Johnny's Outback being too close to the elementary school.

I've since learned that Jennings spent a 23 year career in San Antonio law enforcement. He's a devout family man with integrity, intelligence and a passion to follow the law and do what's right. Like any other citizen in our democracy, Jennings has the right to his freedom of expression/speech and to protect his property rights to every extent permitted by law. Within these constitutional, state and local rights (and laws), he spoke publicly in order to hold elected officials accountable for real or perceived ignorance to ordinances, permits, and zoning rules already on the books.

Now Jennings himself has been vilified and publicly accused of slandering, harassing and lying - though homebuilder Jim Boynton, who spoke immediately prior to Jennings at the 9/19 Aldermen meeting, lodged the exact same public grievance as Jennings, complete with his own supporting documentation.

The bar for slander/ defamation of government officials is appropriately high and occurs only if statements were made with "actual malice". This wasn't the case for Jennings or Boynton.

Further, it shouldn't matter whether Jennings has lived here two months or twenty years, or whether he brings two hundred dollars or twenty thousand dollars to the village coffers. Neither he nor his surrounding neighbors' voices should be diminished or dismissed by their spent time here or money contributed to the tax base. Jennings is a citizen with equal rights under the law and he's proudly served his community by putting his life on the line to serve and protect for 23 years.

My comments and evidence, including pictures, incriminating were pointed directly to the Mayor and never intended to besmirch the reputations of any business owners, who could have been led to believe it must be legal if the Mayor was supervising their project.

In fact, after my presentation, two Aldermen immediately commended me. The new Village Administrator, who the Board respects, called me directly the following week and we had a productive conversation about the new direction of Salado. In the very next BOA workshop the main topic was taking away the authority of the Mayor to issue and make decisions on building permits. That is currently in the works.

Mr. Fleischer refers to "those who screamed to the roof tops about live music" and compared them to fictional characters in Foot Loose, the imaginary town that forbids dancing. How ridiculous. The truth is when the issue of music and dancing was brought up for conditional use; I spoke publicly in favor of many places that had done it well, including The Range on Main St. I was not in favor of a live concert facility so close to residences.

I am dubious that encouraging more alcohol in Salado, as some have suggested will be the saving of the future. I like the wineries and restaurant use as it was in the past.

Many in Salado have advised me to give it up because the "Good Old Boy "system is well known, and will never change. Some have explained that they respected what I was doing, but unfortunately they did business here and could not publicly support my efforts. Their livelihoods depended on overlooking the misdeeds. We must change that, so business and contractors that previously stayed away will begin to trust that there is a level playing field, where future decisions about building and doing business will not be decided by a connection at

the top, the amount of time someone has lived here, or the amount of money they have previously invested. Thankfully the Board of Alderman is working on those issues.

Warren "Doug" Lincoln December 3, 1949 - October 15, 2013

Warren "Doug" Lincoln of Salado, TX, passed away on Tuesday, October 15, 2013, having valiantly battled cancer for over six years. He is survived by his loving family, wife Susan of 22 years, their four children, Aaron, Shawn, Ashley, Alex, and two grandchildren. He is also survived by his brother, Don Lincoln of Lago Vista, TX.

Doug was born in Dallas, TX, December 3, 1949. He is preceded in death by his parents, Roy E. Lincoln and Margaret A. (Robinson) Lincoln, both of Dallas. In 1968, Doug graduated from South Oak Cliff high school in Dallas and enlisted in the Marine Corps immediately afterward. For the last six months of his enlistment, he was a permanent member of the honor guard at Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, CA, conducting funerals for Marines who were killed in Vietnam. Doug considered this a "spiritual" bookmark in his life. He learned a great deal about self-discipline and leadership as a Marine. These experiences were to be used in many other areas of his life.

In 1981, Doug started his own computer consulting business. For the next 26 years, he worked as a free-lance software developer. At age 56, he re-enrolled in college and completed his MBA. In 2010, he completed his Project Management Professional (PMP) certification and returned to work at the V. A. Austin Information Technology Center where he and his brother were employed.

Doug taught Bible study for eight years, was deacon in his local church, and was involved in the children's and youth ministries. Doug was also a dedicated Boy Scout leader for over 10 years. For two years, he worked as a Christian counselor at the Bell County jail to help inmates develop a relationship with God and get a fresh start on life. During his many trips to the VA Medical Center in Temple, he visited disabled and bedridden vets to provide comfort and to "give something back".

Doug is remembered as a devoted Christian, husband, and father who loved his family with all of his heart. He believed the family unit was God's design for mankind's procreation and survival. Doug placed his family above all other earthly things and continually strove to be the best husband and father possible. Doug did not wish for others to mourn his passing, but rather they celebrate the beginning of his new life with the Creator in eternity. Doug had a wonderful life and looks forward to seeing his family another day.

A graveside service with military honors will be held at Salado Cemetery in Salado at 10 a.m. on Oct. 18, 2013. Following the service, refreshments and a celebration of Doug's life will be held at First Baptist Church Salado.



Eagles win battles in the trenches to secure homecoming victory

Nothing is quite as dangerous as a football team seeking its first win, especially in front of a homecoming crowd. This became apparent as the winless Eagles hosted 1-4 Buffaloes Oct. 11.

Regardless of the numerous penalties against the Eagles or the Buffalo offense cutting Salado's lead in the second half; The Eagles still maintained their focus and defeated Florence, 34-12.

The Eagles scored early, and they scored often. Junior quarterback McLane Carter (19 completions for 346 yards and 2 touchdowns) was able to keep the Florence defense off balance, but what was unexpected was the smash-mouth nature of the Eagles' running game, spearheaded by senior Ryan Simmons. Simmons who had a breakout game with 17 carries for 128 yards and 3 touchdowns (an average of 7.5 yards per carry).

Whenever the Florence defense was able to guard Carter's favorite target, senior receiver Kase Spears (7 receptions for 114 yards and 1 touchdown), Simmons would power through the middle of Florence's defense and keep offensive possessions alive. Salado head coach, Brent Graham, stated, "Ryan's a warrior. You can tell he is a student of the game, and it helps us tremendously," said Eagle head coach Brent Graham. "It almost feels like you're playing with twelve people on the field because of his leadership capability." Simmons scored his first touchdown of the night on an 8 yard run halfway through the 1st quarter, and it he never let up on the throttle.

Despite their offensive performance, Salado kept finding a way to shoot themselves in the foot by committing costly penalties, six in the first half alone for 70 yards. This not only cost the Eagles yardage but scoring opportunities, as a 28 yard touchdown pass from Carter to Senior receiver Davis Little would be ne-

gated due to a holding call.

However, Coach Graham and the Eagles overcame these difficulties and kept the offense rolling. Pivotal plays such as the 52 yard reception by senior receiver Caden Eary halfway through the 3rd quarter and the 30 yard reception by Davis Little three minutes into the 4th quarter sparked the Salado offense in the second half.

As the Eagles' offense cut through the Florence defense, the Salado defensive line really stole the show. Anchored by Peyton Womack, James Robison, James Collins and Jace Robison, the defensive line found themselves in the Florence backfield numerous times throughout The night. Accounting for 21 tackles, these four defensive linemen were able to disrupt the Florence offense throughout the game. This defensive performance was capped off with a fumble by Florence running back Lendell Freeman halfway through the fourth quarter, which led to another Salado touchdown.

"The offensive line has got to come off the ball, Florence head coach Paul Smith said. "If they do that, we will be successful and if not, then we won't. [Salado's defensive line] won the line of

scrimmage quite a bit." Coach Graham was pleased about their performance, "Our defense gave our offense an opportunity. They re-established the line of scrimmage and they did a great job getting tackles for a loss. And





The case of the missing damsel

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

If you and your partner agree that certain bids show certain types of hands, you will naturally understand each other better in a great many situations.

But it's also true that your opponents, who are entitled to know as much about your methods as you do, can occasionally put this knowledge to deadly use against you.

Consider today's case where declarer profited greatly from information acquired during both the bidding and play. East, playing 13 to 15-point opening notrumps, bid one notrump, after which North-South quickly got to four hearts.

West led a spade, and East's ten forced the ace. Declarer returned the queen of trumps, taken by East with the ace. East then played the king of clubs, queen of spades and ace of clubs in that order. South ruffed, cashed the jack of trumps, ruffed a spade in dummy and was then faced with the critical problem of which way to take the twoway diamond finesse.

You might think that declarer would assume that East, who had opened one notrump, must have the diamond queen and would finesse accordingly. But South did not fall into this trap.

East had already shown up with the Q-J-10 of spades, ace of hearts and A-K of clubs -- a total of 14 points. Declarer was thus able to deduce that East could not have the queen of diamonds for his 13 to 15-point notrump open-

South therefore took the diamond finesse through West, and as a result made four hearts. East had unintentionally let the cat out of the bag by innocently opening with one notrump.






