Plans moving forward on purchase of golf course

By this time next year, Saladoans could be playing on a completely-restored 27hole golf course that they themselves own.

Terry Dill, working with investors, businesses and local residents, is closing in on a \$3.25 million proposal Golf and Country Club into member-owned entity called the Salado Golf Club.

Dill says that he has commitments of more than \$1.3 million toward the purchase, repair and operations total of \$3.25 million.

"We haven't hit it very hard just yet, but every day it looks more and more like it may come together," Dill said this week, after a conversation last week with Mill Creek owner Morris Foster.

Foster has been divesting himself of properties in Salado in recent years, including his former home Twelve Oaks and the Stagecoach Inn.

Mill Creek Country Club has been for sale for \$2.5 million in its current condition of having 18 of its 27 holes ready for play.

Foster will not repair the damaged by two historic floods in September of 2009 and 2010.

"Those were lifetime floods," Dill said, adding that his plans for repairing the flood-damaged holes would include building the greens up an additional six such a way that they flow the course, Dill says. water and debris more easily off of them.

Applicants for ballot by mail may submit applications to: Bell County Clerk, Attn: Election Department, P.O. Box 480, Belton, Texas 76513. Registered voters that fall into one of the four following categories are eligible to vote by mail: 1. Individuals 65 years or older; 2. Disabled; 3. Will be out of the county on Election Day and the entire period of early voting; 4. Confined to jail, but otherwise eligible to

President Obama's Birdbrained Attack

President Barack Obama can't even get his snark straight. In an attempt at the cutting cleverness that escaped him during his first debate with Mitt Romney, his campaign aired a TV ad hitting the Republican for his alleged hostility to Big Bird. "Mitt Romney knows it's not Wall Street you have to worry about," the ominous voice-over declares. "It's 'Sesame Street."

The problem with the widely panned spot is that it plays less like a spoof of Mitt Romney than a parody of one of the Obama team's own negative ads. It's as dishonest, over the top and -- for lack of a better word -- stupid.

The president of the United States himself -- the man who once pledged to elevate our politics and make the oceans recede -- has made Big Bird a recurring feature of his stump speeches. He also cites Elmo and Oscar as other characters who need to "watch out." (The president apparently cares nothing about the fate of Mr. Snuffleupagus, who never rates a mention)

Obama told an adoring throng at one of his events that Romney "said he'd bring down our deficit by going after what has been the biggest driver of our debt and deficits over the last decade -- public television, PBS." On "Sesame Street," they would tell you Obama's statement is spelled U-N-T-R-U-E.

Stipulating "I love Big Bird," Romney said he would stop the subsidy to PBS, not because it is a big expenditure in the scheme of things, but because he doesn't want to spend on unnecessary items we must "borrow money from China to pay for."

Romney's point is unremarkable. The Corporation for Public Broadcasting gets more than \$400 million a year from the federal government. If this is an essential expenditure at a time of \$1 trillion deficits

and a \$16 trillion debt, what is nonessential?

Besides, if the line item for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting were zeroed out tomorrow, it wouldn't ruffle a feather on Big Bird. On CNN, Sherrie Westin, executive vice president of the Sesame Workshop, cited all the organization's private funding and declared that, even without government help, "Sesame Street' will be here."

Someone should load that up in the president's teleprompter so he's sure to read it. Then, he might at least hesitate before whipping up a crowd -- like the one in Cleveland recently -- into chants of "Save Big Bird!"

To the extent it isn't purely cynical, the president's "Sesame Street" offensive is an extreme example of the belief that civil society is all but helpless without the guidance and succor of government. As if private actors can't be trusted to keep a popular children's program featuring iconic puppets on the air, or to preserve the "PBS NewsHour," or to find a way to broadcast "Downton Abbey" in the United States.

What really boggles the mind, though, is that the president is touring the country a few weeks before a consequential national election talking about a fictional bird. To paraphrase Joseph Welch at the Army-McCarthy hearings, "Have you no sense of self-respect, sir? At long last, have you left no sense of self-respect?" Innovation, Not Debt, Key To Better Schools

As Americans head to the polls for the November election, we will be choosing new servants to head our federal, state and county governments. Easy to overlook, but just as important, will be bond packages presented by local taxing authorities.

Bonds are not free money. They are instruments of debt repaid by tax levies over a defined period. A vote for issuing the debt – "for" the bond – is, consequently, a vote to impose a certain level of property taxes until the debt is repaid.

The advertising in support of such bonds is often predicated on the notion that new debt will provide better schools. But is that really what taxpayers are being asked to buy? The implication is that the debt-financed spending is for the children.

One thing is certain: the debt levied today will still be there for the children to pay off.

In many such bond proposals, a fifthgrader this year will enter her 30s and still be paying the debt. She perhaps had nicer buildings, but was her education improved?

The question really isn't about supporting or opposing any particular bond; rather, we must decide if expensive building projects actually provide a better education

First, it is important to remember taxpayers aren't just being asked to repay the debt listed on the ballot. The nice bankers who loan school districts money want to be repaid and make money off the deal. Taxpayers are on the hook for repaying the principal (the bonded costs) and the interest.

Taken over a 20 or more year period, the interest payment can rival the amount loaned; effectively, the cost to taxpayers is double the amount noted on the ballot.

But for the purposes of this discussion, let's not worry too much about the debt. (Though it should be noted Texas is second only to California in terms of combined state and local debt.)

We should instead confront the common claim made by proponents of school bond proposals: that it will make schools better. It will certainly make the buildings better, or at least more expensive. But will schools, the education provided, be improved?

Despite the hoopla, a new coat of

paint, or even new walls, won't ensure a better education. Only parents and teachers can deliver that.

When looking at the total spending reported to the Texas Education Agency, school districts only spend about 50 percent of your money on instruction. Building more buildings won't improve that statistic, or produce better academic outcomes.

One thing that can immediately improve education is putting more resources – a greater percentage of school money – directly toward instructional expenses, and less on administration and nonteaching positions.

Let's try spending more money in the classroom, rather than simply on a classroom

Rather than hire a plethora of new administrators or pay a bevy of architects, let's raise the salaries of our best and brightest teachers. A lot. While they are at it, school districts should base payraises and bonuses on merit, not seniority

School districts should bring in top charter-school managers, and let them offer a primer on efficient operations.

Meanwhile, let teachers and parents turn existing campuses into in-district charter schools, thereby freeing them from state (and local!) bureaucracies.

Finally, school boards should allow full in-district public school competition, letting parents pick which campus best meets their kids' needs.

Legislatively, we should demand that lawmakers free teachers from the mandates and regulations that – intentionally or not – are interfering with the professional creativity they need to effectively reach and teach the children in their classroom.

Better buildings, or better schools? There is a difference. Simply voting for new bonded indebtedness will definitely provide school districts with some measure of better buildings. Better schools will come only when parents and teachers partner for the benefit of the children.

Before spending more, let's govern better. Building buildings is fine, but fostering innovative academic communities should be our goal.



Recently, the ZBA was reduced from seven members to five members. Salado Board of Aldermen at their Oct. 18 meeting added three alternate members to the ZBA, all of whom are members of the Board of Aldermen: Shannon Ashe, Bryan Fritch and Hans Fields.

The Oct. 23 ZBA meeting was the first meeting in which the ZBA was composed of only five members and in which alternates had been appointed by the Board of Aldermen to fill in for missing ZBA members.

With an absent member, the ZBA flipped a coin to determine whether Fields or Fritch would fill in on the board.

ing hot metal casting techniques with his melting furnace and crucibles set up outside in the garden.



Contract Bridge

Assume you're in four spades and West leads the K-Q and another diamond, which you ruff. There seems to be nothing to the play, but when you cash the ace of spades and East discards a heart, the outlook changes completely. Now you are apparently doomed to fail in a contract that a moment before seemed cold for 10 or 11 tricks.

But faint heart ne'er won fair lady, and it certainly wouldn't be right to give up just yet. You still have a chance, since it might be possible to arrange a trump endplay against West if he started with exactly the right distribution (4-3-3-3).

So you cash the ace of hearts at trick five, cross to dummy with a club, ruff a heart, lead another club to dummy and ruff a second heart. Then, with fingers crossed, you play the ace of clubs, hoping West will follow suit. When he does, you've got him.

Ten tricks have been played thus far, and your last three cards are the K-10-7 of trumps, while West has the Q-J-8. All you have to do now is to lead a low trump toward dummy's nine, and West will find he can score only one trump trick rather than the two that seemed so certain at the outset.

It is true that West could have held many distributions other than the one he actually had, in which case he would have been able to ruff one of your club leads or overruff one of the heart leads from dummy to avert the endplay. But, even so, you would have been no worse off for having tried to make the contract and







Fracking Controversy

Dear EarthTalk: I have heard that fracking is becContinued on page CC vironmental issue in the U.S. Which parts of the country are already hosting fracking operations? Are there efforts underway to stop the practice in specific states or across the country?

-- Jim Ross, Toronto, ON

Fracking, short for hydraulic fracturing, is a process whereby drillers blast millions of gallons of water, sand and hazardous chemicals at highpressure into sub-surface rock formations to create fractures that facilitate the flow of recoverable oil or gas. The technique has proven so effective at reaching previously hardto-access reserves that it has helped spur a boom in natural gas production around the country.

This influx of domestic natural gas means lower home heating costs and thousands of new jobs in the industry. But opponents point to dozens of fracking-related accidents in recent years and worry that the technique is polluting groundwater and air and poisoning communities—all to get at more fossil fuels when we'd all be better off moving more quickly toward developing clean, renewable energy sources.

While fracking goes on all across the country, the Marcellus Shale, a layer of sedimentary bedding under the Allegheny plateau that spans nine northeastern and Mid-Atlantic States, has become America's primary fracking grounds. Thanks to fracking and other new extraction techniques, the gas industry is now able to access the natural gas in the Shale and beginning in 2006 commenced big extraction operations in parts of western New York State, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and elsewhere. Geologists estimate there may be as much as 489 trillion cubic feet of natural gas-400 times what New York State uses in a year-throughout the Shale. The race is now on to extract as much as possible as quickly as pos-

But it's this very gold rush mentality that has led to many so-called "fraccidents" in and around the Shale. The group Earthjustice tracks and



publicizes such incidents online via its "Fracking Gone Wrong" campaign. They list dozens of examples of tainted drinking water, polluted air and industrial disasters caused or exacerbated by fracking at or near extraction sites since operations began six years ago.

"Wherever Marcellus development has occurred in Pennsylvania, reports of poisoned water, sick kids and dead animals have followed," reports Marcellus Protest, an alliance of western Pennsylvania organizations seeking to halt fracking operations. The group coordinates anti-fracking efforts, organizes demonstrations and produces educational materials, including the website MarcellusShale.org, a clearinghouse on fracking and related activism. Its advocacy work helped convince the Pittsburgh city council to ban fracking there back in 2010 and is now working to extend the ban to other areas in the region and beyond.

The controversy has not escaped Hollywood. The 2010 HBO film, Gasland, followed Josh Fox around the U.S. on a quest to find out what impact fracking was having on communities after he was asked to lease his own land for hydraulic fracturing. And a forthcoming Gus Van Sant film, Promised Land, starring Matt Damon focuses on a small farming town that sells its agricultural land to frackers and pays a heavy price in losing a lifestyle and a livelihood while jeopardizing public health. Activists hope these films will go a long way to convince Americans and their elected officials to say no to more fracking.

Box 97, Salado, Texas 76571, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. WQoo10884001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 50,000 gallons per day. TCEQ received this application on May 30, 2012.

The facility is located at 401 South Stagecoach Road, Salado, 200 feet west of Farm-to-Market Road 2268, 300 feet south of Salado Creek, and 400 feet southeast of the crossing of Salado Creek by the Interstate 35 east frontage road in Bell County, Texas 76571. The treated effluent is discharged to Salado Creek in Segment No. 1243 of the Brazos River Basin. The designated uses for Segment No. 1243 are primary contact recreation, public water supply, aquifer protection and high aquatic life use. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit additional public comments or request another public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name; address, phone number; applicant's name and permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are germane to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.
