The Fall time change is a good time for homeowners to test or change the batteries in their smoke detectors. On average, families have less than three minutes from the time the first smoke alarm sounds to escape a fire. Working smoke alarms provide the early warning and critical extra seconds needed to escape and cut the risk of dying in home fire structures in half. Local doctors expect to see a lot of visitors over the next week - not for treats but for treatment from Halloween accidents and injuries.

That's why they warn everyone to avoid the Top Six Trick-or-Treat Dan-

• Car Accidents - The American College of Emergency Physicians says children are twice as likely to be killed by a car while walking on Halloween night. Doctors recommend children carry flashlights, and stick reflective tape all over costumes and loot bags so drivers can easily spot them. Dress kids in glow-in-the-dark costumes so they really stand out. According to the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration, nearly 60 percent of Halloween highway fatalities involve impaired drivers, so partying adults should be sure to have a designated driver.

 Wounds and stabbings - Swords and knives make for fun adventures but not when they hurt someone. Doctors will see a lot of accidental stabbings and even eye wounds when people accidently pierce someone with these costume accessories. Buy costume weapons made only of flexible material.

• Fright Night fires and burns - Pumpkins with tive for sure, but they're a real fire hazard. Imagine the danger when children dressed in flowing ghost and princess outfits walk up your steps, knock over that pumpkin and catch their costume on fire. Replace real flame candles with battery operated candles. Also, make sure you read costume labels carefully and dress children only in "flame resistant" materials.

• Allergic reactions /infections - 'Tis the holiday for crazy makeup, body

State water fund is 1 of 9 proposed Constitutional amendments to be decided by Texas voters on Nov. 5

Texas voters will go to the polls Nov. 5 to vote on nine proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. In Salado precinct 203, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 5 at the Salado Church of Christ Activities Center,

North Chruch Street. Early voting ends on Nov. 1 with the five early voting locations in Bell County being open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 31 and Nov. 1. Those early voting locations are these: Salado, Salado Civic Center, 601 North Main Street, Salado; Belton, Bell County Courthouse Annex, 550 East 2nd Ave; Killeen, Bell County Annex, 301 Priest Drive; Killeen, Killeen Community Center, 2201 East Veterans Memorial Blvd; Temple, Bell County Annex, 205 East Central Ave.

The proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution are these, with descriptions from the Texas Secretary of State website:

Prop. 1 (HJR 62): constitutional authorizing amendment the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later quali-

fies a different property

as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

Prop. 2 (HJR 79): constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational."

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

Prop. 3 (HJR 133): constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption."

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being

subject to ad valorem taxa-

tion; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

Prop. 4 (HJR 24): constitutional authorizing amendment the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or

the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organization.

Prop. 5 (SJR 18): "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead property in addition to the current legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans.

Library prez gives annual report

Has this been an exciting year for the Salado Public Library or what? Our expansion project enabled us to add 3,200 square feet of space, and was completely paid for with our savings, that is: the library has incurred no debts whatsoever! We have a new look throughout the inside, due to the remodeling of the old space, and a new look outside, due to the landscaping committee's work. In this annual report on the library's status, I am pleased to report that the library has indeed grown during the past fiscal year (September 2012 through August 2013) due primarily to the major construction project.

From ground breaking on Sept. 14, 2012 to the May 19, 2013 opening reception, the library expansion enabled the Children's Section to add the much needed space for books, computers and activities. We created a new Teen Area exclusively for this age group. And, we gave back to the commu-

nity a classroom/meeting room, with a state of the art presentation board, that can seat 35 people, and is available for public use, even after library hours. And, the library has increased the adult seating area and added more book shelves that enables us to continue to expand our collection.

Because of the generosity of Salado donors, in the amount of \$20,000 and a \$50,000 Tocker Foundation grant for furniture and shelving, the furnishings throughout were completed without incurring any debt. Thanks to our Very Special Patrons for their contributions to the library expansion and to Jeanie Lively for securing the grant funding.

Book Ends got a face lift during the library ex-Bookshelves pansion. have been added to accommodate an expanded collection of books for sale. It must be the new look because the books keep coming in by the box load, almost daily.

And of course, we "get a little help from the Friends", those dedicated volunteers who give of their time to help out at SEE LIBRARY, PAGE 3A

SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

Prop. 6 (SJR 1): "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

Prop. 7 (HJR 87): "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less."

HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appoint-

Prop. 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54): "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district: the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas counties.

Prop. 9 (SJR 42): "The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitu-



Visiting Angels is currently collecting fleece, which will be made into blankets, for local Senior Citizens for Christmas. They are seeking community participation so that they can make as many blankets as possible. They suggest donations of two coordinating pieces of fleece, 1 and 5/8 yard each, or the donation of no-sew fleece blanket kits; the patterns should be appropriate for Senior Citizens. The fleece is needed as soon as possible, but prefer no later than Nov.

The project also provides for service hours for local high school student; they will prepare the fleece for assembly. Then, at the annual Christmas Party, over 200 attendees will tie the coordinating pieces of fleece together to make blankets. All blankets will be given to local senior citizens in need.

A Hometown Harvest will be held under the oaks at the French Legation Museum, 802 San Marcos Street, in Austin 3-7 p.m. Nov. 10. This family-friendly event includes dinner, cocktails, live music and a live and silent auction.

The historic house and reconstructed kitchen will be open for tours during the early hours of the party. Chefs Ben Wilcott and Madeline Pizzo Wilcott will serve a specially prepared menu of locally grown foods. Cajun band Gumbo ce Soir, will perform live music throughout the event. A silent and live auction will be held during the late afternoon with a celebrity auctioneer.

Tickets for the event are \$50 per adult; \$10 for young people aged five to fifteen. Ticketing information available at: www. flm.org and available for purchase at flm.ticketbud. com/nov10.

Proceeds from the event benefit the Museum's educational programs, as well as the interior restoration of the historic house. Major structural repair was completed in 2012, and now restoration work will begin on the inside of the house.

The historic house is the oldest wooden structure standing in Austincompleted in 1841 when Texas was a republic. Construction on the house began when the republic capital was moved to Austin from Houston; four years after Texas proclaimed its independence from Mexico. Alphonse Dubois the French chargé d'affaires was sent to the Republic

of Texas, after the King Louis Philippe recognized the Republic of Texas as a sovereign nation. Dubois purchased a twenty-acre plot of land from future Republic President Anson Jones and financed the construction of a modest bayou-style cottage.

In 1949 the State of Texas bought the property, asking the Daughters of the Republic of Texas to be the site's custodians. The DRT opened the site as a museum in 1956. Following archeological excavations in the late 1960s, a detached kitchen was built on the original kitchen's footprint. A carriage house style building serves as the site's visitor center, housing staff offices, a meeting

room and gift shop. Though the property has shrunk from twenty acres to two and a half, the house still stands as a reminder of the earliest days of Austin, and of Texas.

of unintentional injury on Halloween, according to the National Safety Council. Make sure eye openings on masks are wide enough so wearers can see clearly. Be careful of decorative high heels or wacky shoes and slippers that make it difficult to walk.

Children, should keep costumes as tight fitting and as short as possible so they don't trip.

• Stomach aches and nausea - Eat dinner or a snack before hitting the town to trick-or-treat or before heading to a costume party. Overindulging in alcoholic beverages or candy can lead to sickness and vomiting on an empty stomach. Avoid digging in a basket or bag of candy and scooping out a handful of germs. It's better if a homeowner hands out a piece or two.

What can parents do to keep them safe? Parents should inspect the candy their kids receive with their children when they get home, making sure to throw away any candy they feel is not safe, a choking hazard or where packaging seems compromised.

It's a good time to take advantage of teaching and explaining to your child why you think candy is not safe or good for them. You can then allow him/her to choose one to two candies that evening and set forth the expectation that they will be allowed to have a set amount per day/ or week. Make sure to have them floss and brush their teeth afterwards to decrease potential for cavi-

Additionally, encouraging children to stay out of the street, wear reflective clothing, and carry a flash light on Halloween night is a good start. Parents should accompany their children every step of the way while trick-or-treating, and drivers should be more cautious with the increased amount of children outside at night.

It's important that parents help kids find the balance between traditional fun activities and a safe, healthy lifestyle. Some important trick-or-treating tips for kids are to stay on the sidewalk, approach only houses that are well lit, and avoid petting unfa-

miliar animals.

For those who will have goblins and ghosts visiting your home, make sure your yard is clear of objects that can cause children to trip such as ladders, hoses, dog leashes, and flower pots. Often, pets get frightened on Halloween. Adults should leave pets in an area away from visitors to protect them from cars or inadvertently biting a trick-or-treater.

Candles can also be a hazard to children approaching your front door. Dr. Charles Stern from Scott & White Waco Clinic suggests using battery powered jack o' lantern candles compared to a real flame, reducing firerelated injuries. If you do use candles, place the pumpkin away from where trick-or-treaters will be walking or standing.

Also, remember that the flu season is upon us. Everyone six months of age or older should receive a flu vaccine, especially those at higher risk for serious complications, such as young children, pregnant women, and people with chronic health conditions. The other major preventative measure is good hygiene. Please wash hands with soap and water or alcohol-based hand rub to help prevent spread of germs.



After last week's 28-14 loss to the Academy Bees, the Salado Eagles aren't looking for a playoff spot, a winning record, or even an even record.

The Eagles, averaging almost 400 yards per game offense, are looking to better last year's miserable 2-8 record. To do that, though, they face two big walls, namely the top two defenses in the district.

The Lago Vista Vikings bring their top-rated defense in the district to Eagle field 7:30 p.m., coming off of a 42-0 crushing win over the Florence Buffs, against whom the Eagles have registered their lone win of the season.

Lago Vista has allowed only 974 passing yards in eight games. The Vikings have held their opponents to 224 yards total offense per game.

Salado junior quarterback McLane Carter will have to find openings in the Viking secondary to move the ball quickly, because he will not be given many opportunities behind center. With a grinding ground game, part of the secret of the Vikings' defense is its offense: you can't score points when you don't get the ball very

Scoring points has not been the Eagles' problem this year. Carter has thrown for over 2,425 yards so far this season, including 199 yards on 37 attempts against the Academy Bees on Oct. 25.

However, he threw two interceptions against Academy, one of which Malik Jackson returned 68 yards for a touchdown to take a 7-0 lead with 2:44 left in the first quarter.

Carter answered before the quarter was out, hitting Chase Crenwelge for a 30 yard touchdown to tie the score at 7-7.

Academy scored twice in the second, which ended up being the difference in the game. Both were touchdown passes caught

by Redwine for 6 and 66 yards. Academy quarterback Jackson threw just seven times in the game, three of them for touchdowns to Redwine. Jackson threw for 150 yards and three touchdowns on six completions.

Carter threw for 199 yards on 23-of-37 passing for two touchdowns and two interceptions.

Crenwelge caught four passes for 58 yards, including the 30 yard TD. Kase Spears had 50 yards on six catches.

Ryan Simmons caught three passes for 18 yards, including a 7 yard TD on fourth down in the third quarter. Simmons also carried the ball 22 times for 117 yards with a long run of 28 yards.



Salado College park will be open for part of Historic Homes Tour



History is alive in Salado during Salado Historical Society's 2013 Tour of Historic Homes and Sites, December 6, 7, and 8. History interpreters at 10 homes and sites will bring the history of Salado to life. This week's feature site is Tour Stop Number 1, Historic Salado College Park, located on College Hill.

The unique focus of the park is what remains of the walls of Salado College. Col. E.S.C. Robertson founded the school in 1859 to provide students with a superior education, which it did for several years. A succession of disastrous fires in the early nineteenth century reduced the school to a ruinous shell, partly as seen today.

The community used the school building for civic functions, political debates, social events, and even funerals. When Rev. James E. Ferguson, father of future Texas Governor James Ferguson, died of pneumonia in 1876, the Rev. Doctor Anderson presided over the largely attended funeral held at the college chapel. A piano used for music classes at the school also provided for the needs of the community.

Reconstruction brought trying times for the citizens of Salado and Salado College. Federal troops made frequent visits through the area in the summer of 1868; troops camped near the springs on Salado Creek, in town, and on College Hill. A period military shell casing

recently discovered in the park is on display at Central Texas Area Museum.

In 1877, financial constraints forced the sale of the school at public auction on the courthouse grounds in Belton. Col. Robertson, the highest bidder, purchased the school and grounds for \$1,600. Of this event, Robertson wrote in his journal, "Have bought an elephant and do not know what to do with it." When Robertson died two years later, he still owned that elephant.

Robertson wrote in his journal in 1874, "Clearance of College Hill by free work of the citizens." This effort was true then and continues today. Responsibility for maintaining the nearly eight-acre shrine falls on the leader-

ship of Robertson Colony-Salado College Foundation. The foundation and community volunteers contribute time and effort to caring for the grounds.

As they did in 1859, the

Masons still provide sup-

port to College Hill. Within the last two vears, the foundation's directors and the community took College Hill into a new and much improved direction, focusing on providing native landscaping, benches, and a walking path. Interpretive signage placed around the statue of Col. Robertson and the ruins of Salado College explain the early history of Salado College and the influence Col. E. S. C. Robertson provided in establishing the school.

Historical markers placed

at the base of College Hill and at the entrance provide additional information.

Texas sculptor Clay Dahlberg of Hunt, Texas, designed the bronze 6'6" statue of E. S. C. Robertson on College Hill placed at the top of the stairs going to the ruins. Placed in 1994, a Robertson descendant Alice Sneed West, wife of flamboyant Texas millionaire Jim "Silver Dollar" West, contributed most of the \$35,000 needed for the project. Lucile Armstrong Robertson and Dahlberg designed the uniform Robertson is wearing in the statue. Atop College Hill, the statue of Col. Robertson casts an eternal gaze over the town he founded in

Visitors to the park during the Home Tour are encouraged to look for Col and Mrs. E. S. C. Robertson.

Historic Salado College Park will be open on Dec. 6 (10 a.m.-5 p.m.) and Dec. 7 (1-5 p.m.) only. Other homes and sites on the tour will be open 5-8 p.m. Dec. 5; 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Dec. 6; 1-5 p. m. Sunday, Dec. 7.

Tour tickets are \$12 if purchased on or before Nov. 28 and \$15 if purchased after Nov. 28 (Thanksgiving).

Tickets for the tour are available at the Visitor Center (831 North Main Street), tourism@salado-events.com; and the following businesses: Charlotte's of Salado, Sofi's, Fletcher's Books, Taylors, and McCain's Bakery, all on Main Street in the historic Village of Salado.








Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Many contracts fail because of an unlucky lie of the cards, but some of them can be salvaged by careful play. Assume you're declarer at four hearts and West leads a diamond.

You should feel confident of making the contract, since the only thing that can beat you is the highly unlikely possibility that West has all three missing trumps and that East has the ace of spades. The odds against both occurring in the same deal are about 15-to-1. However, when you win the diamond lead with the queen and play a trump to the ace, East shows out, and your 15-to-1 odds drop enormously.

In fact, it now seems certain you will go down one if West has the ace of spades. But when you consider the matter more carefully, you realize there's a good chance of making the contract even if East has the spade ace.

So you continue with the king of trumps, then cash the A-K of clubs and ruff a club. Next you overtake the king of diamonds with dummy's ace and lead the nine of clubs. When East produces the queen, you heave a huge sigh of relief as well as a spade.

This is the first trick for the defense, and you are now sure to make the contract. East has to return either a spade or a diamond. In the former case, dummy's king becomes a trick; in the latter, you'll discard another spade from your hand as you ruff in dummy.

The outcome demonstrates how good play can sometimes overcome bad luck -- provided you keep a cool head when things go




