FM 2268 bridge to come down

Crews prepare for demolition of old structure

By this time next week, the FM 2268 bridge over I-35 could be gone and the new bridge open for traffic, weather permitting. Rains early this week caused James Construction to postpone a closing to set concrete barriers.

James Construction plans on taking out the bridge overnight with a mainlane closure on Nov. 11, beginning at 7 p.m. and ending at 7 a.m. Nov. 12. The southbound entrance and exit ramps for I-35 at Thomas Arnold will be closed for this period.

The traffic map for this mainlane closure, which will result in both northbound and southbound mainlanes being closed, has not been released yet, but will be published on Salado Village Voice website as soon as it is.


Prior to that, though, James Construction will close the existing FM 2268 bridge to traffic for four days, beginning at 7 a.m. Nov. 7 and continuing through Nov. 10.

During the bridge closure Nov. 7-10, west bound FM 2268 traffic will be routed to the new FM 2268 structure and will be able to turn left to the new section of the south frontage road heading south. Traffic will not be allowed to turn right and head north. This will occur as soon as the existing structure is closed.

Traffic heading south on the existing west frontage road will be allowed to continue through the FM 2268 intersection.

Traffic heading south on the west frontage road wanting to go east on FM 2268 will be detoured using FM 2115, u-turn and go north on the frontage road back to FM

The east bound lane of the new

Texas Department of Transportation officials announced an overnight closing beginning at 7 p.m. Nov. 7 and ending 7 a.m. Nov. 8 to allow for James Construction crews to move concrete barriers. Meanwhile, the FM 2268 bridge will be closed through Nov. 10 to prepare for its demolition. All I-35 mainlanes at FM 2268 will be closed overnight Nov. 11 for the demolition of the bridge.

FM 2268 will be opened to traffic on Nov. 10. At this time, the west frontage road north of FM 2268 will be moved to the new section of the south frontage road. The section of the south frontage road from Thomas Arnold to FM 2268 will remain two-way as it is currently.

Moving concrete barriers on Nov. 7

James Construction will also be closing part of the mainlanes of I-35 overnight Nov. 7.

This closing was originally planned for Nov. 4 and was postponed due to rains early this week.

The right hand lane of southbound I-35 from FM 2268/Main St. beginning at mile marker 285 to FM 2843 (mile marker 283) will be closed 7 p.m. Nov. 4 through 7 a.m. Nov. 5 to allow the contractor to move the concrete barriers. Also, the southbound exit ramp for I-35 and FM 2268/Main St. (exit 285) will be closed. The southbound exit ramp for Thomas Arnold (exit 284) will be closed. The southbound entrance ramp for Thomas Arnold will be closed and the southbound exit ramp for FM 2268 (exit 283) will be closed during this time. FM 2484 to FM 2268.

Less than 10 % turn out to vote

Texas voters turned out tion 680,883 for, 406,422 in very low numbers for the off-year elections, with just over 8 percent casting ballot statewide. Voters overwhelmingly approved all nine of the proposed amendments to the Texas constitution.

Proposed amendments to the State Constitution were these:

Prop. 1 (HJR 62): Ad valorem tax exempt of homestead for spouse of one killed in action. Statewide passed 995,782 for, 149,018 against. In Salado precinct 203, 441 for, 91 against.

Prop. 2 (HJR 79): Eliminates the State Medical Board and its Education Fund. Statewide passed 946,259 for, 171,054. In Salado, 467 for, 68 against.

Prop. 3 (HJR 133): Extends the number of days that aircraft parts are exempt from ad valroem tax. This was the closest of any of the propositions, passing by 57.73 percent Statewide 624,122 voted in favor, 456,955 voted against. In Salado, 286 voted for and 255 voted against.

Prop. 4 (HJR 24): Exemption from ad valorem tax of home donated to a disabled vet. Texas voters approved by 85.14 percent, 961,560 for, 167,820 against. In Salado, 415 for, 118 against.

Prop. 5 (SJR 18): Authorizes reverse mortgage loans when purchasing homestead property. Texas voters passed this proposiagainst. Salado voters were in favor 283 to 237 against.

Prop. 6 (SJR 1): Creates the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources. This amendment supported by state politicians and other groups was approved by 73 percent of Texas voter, 836,395 voted for and 303,531 voted against. In Salado, 374 voted in favor and 160 voted against.

Prop. 7 (HJR 87): Authorizes home rule cities to fill vacancy by procedures in its charter. Statewide, 806,735 voters were in fagor and 277,712 were against. Salado voters were in favor with 388 voting for and 134 voting against.

Prop. 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54): Repeals Texas Constitution's max tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district.

Proposition carried with 740,552 voting in favor and 282,820 voting against. Salado voters approved the measure by 372 in favor and 125 against.

Prop. 9 (SJR 42): Expands potential sanctions against a judge or justice. Across the state, 85 percent of voters were in favor: 921,863 for and 167,151 against. Salado balloted 457 for and 70 against.

Bagpipes will echo, kilts will sway, and dancers will leap at the pageant of Scottish culture, heritage, and tradition known at the Scottish Clan Gathering and Highland Games, Nov. 8-10 in Sala-

Guests can revel in Celtic cuisine, caber tossing, world-class dancing and as many as 100 bagpipers parading at the 52nd Annual Gathering at the Salado Civic Center at 601 N Main Street

Texas oldest Scottish gathering kicks off with a torch-lit ceremony atop the ruins of Salado's College Hill at 6p.m. Nov. 9, followed by a 7 p.m. Welcome Social in the Central Texas Area Museum's Hall of the Clans, at 423 S. Main Street.

Events begin at 9 a.m. Nov. 10. Guests who pay the entry fee at the Civic Center grounds can delve into Scottish ancestry and heritage with clan society representatives, tap their toes to lively folk performances, or wind amongst the many vendors and artisans selling Scottish

While the grounds open at 9 a.m., a formal Festival Opening Parade begins at noon, featuring the massed pipe bands and clan society representatives carrying tartan ban-

They can also watch the athletic competition on Nov. 10 with men ages 18 to 39 competing in the Open category, men over

40 making up the Masters class, and all adult women in their own category completing the same events. Athletic events include putting the stone, tossing the Scottish hammer, tossing weights for distance, as well as for height, and tossing of the caber. Athletic competition begins at 10 a.m. and runs continuously through the day.

More events on the grounds include the Highland Dance competition. The highly athletic dance contests will feature continuous performances of the Highland Fling, Scottish Hornpipe, Sword Dance, Sean Triubhas and the Lilt. Many past Salado competitors have been world champions.

Sending reverberations

across the grounds such as those that bounce off wild mountains and dark glens in the Old Country will be the bagpipe and drum competition, for individual pipers and drummers as well as for bands.

Even more competitions include the shortbread contest and the bonniest knees contests to be held mid-day on Nov. 10.

Featured folks singers at the festival will include Carl Peterson, Don Gabbert, Dene Foye, Hugh Morrison and Central Texas' own Oak and Ember.

In addition, a worship service to include a "Kirking of the Tartan" ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Nov. 11 in the Salado Civic Center Building. Jim Haney will preach at the service. The service will include a blessing of family tartans and a "Flowers of the Field" ceremony, honoring friends of the museum who have died in the last year.

Attendees can watch the children attempt athletic feats inspired by the adult Heavy Athletics performers. All children are invited to compete free of charge on Nov. 11.

Day passes to access all events on the Civic Center are \$15 for adults on Nov. 9 and \$10 on Nov. 10. A two-day pass can be purchased for \$20. Children's admission is \$6 either day. Admission on Nov. 9 include the 5:30 p.m. Tattoo atop the ruins of Salado College Tattoo guests enjoy a twilight

performance of bagpipes bands, along with performances by some of the top festival talent, including folk singers and dance contest winners. Cost for those attending the Tattoo only is \$6 for adults and \$3 for children. College Hill is located on South Main Street behind the Stagecoach Inn.

Another special event of the weekend will be the Tartan Ball at 8 p.m. Nov. 9 at the Stagecoach Inn Restaurant's Banquet Hall. Advance tickets are \$40 for individuals and \$75 for couples.

"It has been my honor

to serve in leadership roles in a number of affiliated organizations and associations," he said. He is the former chairman of the Texas Conference of Urban Counties. the Central Texas Council of Government, the Central Texas Economic Development District and the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization (former chairman). "During my tenure as chairman, we secured funding for several major projects on I-35 and U.S. 190 in Killeen," he

Gov. George Bush appointed Brown to the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Working Group,

which developed the blueprint for the award-winning courthouse preservation program subsequently created by the legislature.

Brown has also been a member of the Hill Country Community Action Association (Executive Committee member) and chaired the Texas Conference of Urban Counties Policy Committee.


Brown's experience has led him to serve in many capacities on infrastructure committees, including travel and water infrastructure.



State District Judge Adams announces for re-election

Judge Gordon G. Adams of Salado today announced his intent to file for re-election to the position of Judge of the 169th District Court of Bell County. Judge Adams, age 62, is a Republican and was appointed to the bench by then Governor George W. Bush in June of 2000. The voters of Bell County elected Judge Adams to office in November 2000, 2002, 2006 and again in 2010. Additionally, Adams currently serves as the Local Administrative Judge for the Bell County District Courts.

Prior to becoming the 169th District Judge, Adams served for over eight years as Title IV-D Court Master for the Third Administrative Judicial Re-

gion where he presided over child support dockets in six counties. The Bell County Bar Association honored him as the 2005 Government Sector Lawyer of the Year. Judge Adams currently presides over one-half of the civil litigation cases, 22 percent of the family law cases, and the entire tax docket

Judge Adams has over 37 years of experience as an attorney and judge. He is a member of the Texas Association of District Judges, the State Bar of Texas, and the College of the State Bar. He is also a life fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation. In addition, Judge Adams is a past president of the Bell County Young Lawyers Association and past director of the Bell-Lampasas-Mills Counties Bar Association and the Legal Aid Society of Central Texas. Adams currently serves as the Judicial Advisor to the Board of Directors of the Bell County Bar Associa-

Judge Adams is a former mayor pro-tem of the City of Killeen. He is also a past president of the Killeen Independent School District Board of Trustees and the Bell County Board of Education. He is a past member of the Curriculum Committee for the Texas Center for the Judiciary in Austin.

Judge Adams earned a bachelor's degree from Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos and a law degree from the University of Texas School of Law. He is married to Barbara Adams who retired as Chief of Staff for the Killeen ISD in 2008. The Adams have one son, Michael, who resides and works in Pennsylvania.

major funding decisions in recent years. To date, over \$5.25 billion have been committed to improvements on I-35, including over \$800 million in Bell County." The committee Brown chaired was recently recognized by the Texas Transportation Commission for its role in developing the plan.

Scott Zuefelt had two short touchdown runs of 1 yard and 5 yards respectively. Dawson Hernandez scored from five yards out in the second quarter.


The Eagles' lone score emy upsets Lago Vista in came on an 80 yard third quarter kickoff return by Kase Spears.




Museum will be stop on tour

Lying in the shadow of Historic Salado College Park is the two-story rock building that houses Central Texas Area Museum. The lot on which the native limestone building sits possesses an interesting genealogy. Col. E. Sterling C. Robertson sold the lot in Robertson's Small Lot Addition to W. B. Armstrong and J. P. Arnold in 1862. John T. Eubank acquired the property in 1866, and for a number of years, operated a drug store, grocery, and mercantile concern on the

The Museum will be one of 10 homes and sites that are part of the Salado Historical Society's 2013 Tour of Historic Homes and Sites Dec. 6-8.

Bell County tax records show a stable and consistent value of \$800 for the lot from 1862 to 1874. Records in 1875 indicate a significant increase in the value of the lot. That year the tax assessor applied a value of \$2,500 to the lot; indicating that some fundamental change occurred on the property. Either there was improvement to an existing structure or the building that stands today replaced an older structure. Eubank sold the building in 1876 to Salado Grange.

Over the years, a grocery store, telephone exchange, and a curio shop that sold ladies handbags created from armadillo shells occupied the building. Central Texas Area Museum has occupied the

building since 1959.

Museum artifacts tell the history and development of Central Texas and Robertson's Colony. The museum owns an untold number of historic items, including documents, photos, saddles, jewelry, coins, purses, clothing, tools, and household items such as a butter churn, and many of these items are permanent exhibits. One exhibit includes two folding chairs used during the Mexican War and at Fort Gates by Major Horace Haldeman, who served in the U. S. Army. Other exhibits include Native American tools and arrowheads; a barbed wire exhibit representing ranching interest; the 1860 cornerstone from Salado College laid by the Masons; an 1895 painting of Salado College by Susie Vannoy; and an 1871 diploma from Salado Col-

Special for this year's tour, visitors to the museum will see several special exhibits only available for viewing during the tour. These items include a include an archive and

beautiful black beaded ladies snuff bag; art by Carrie Bloomer of Belton; A. J. Willingham's 1862 State Troops certificate signed by E. S. C. Robertson; and scales used by Jeptha Talley in 1830 at Dahlonega, Georgia, site of the first major gold strike in the United States. Also, porcelain face dolls; an 1864 Confederate tax receipt for soldier's tax fund paid by Letitia Barbee; and an 1892 broadside of "Surrender of Santa Anna". Visitors will see two oil paintings by renowned local artist Ella Koepke Mewhinney; a large framed picture of Fannie F. Ferguson, wife of Rev. James Ferguson and mother of Governor James E. Ferguson; and the plaque from the Fannie Ferguson Memorial Hospital at the Confederate Woman's Home, built 1917 in Austin. In addition, birth, marriage, and death records listed in O. T. Tyler's family Bible, with information dating

back to 1790. The museum's holdings

genealogy collection. Original documents date from the Republic period. During the tour, the genealogy collection will be open but not for research.

Earlier this year, Salado Historical Society relocated their office and exhibits to the museum. The Salado Historical Society exhibit at the museum includes items associated with Salado College and Thomas Arnold High School

Much of the success of the museum is due to the dedication and hard work of the late Mrs. Sterling Robertson (1905-1997), who aggressively sought contributions to support museum operations. Be sure to look for Mrs. Sterling Robertson at the museum during the tour.

Decorated for Christmas, the museum will provide Celtic Christmas music, hot chocolate, coffee, and shortbread cookies.

With the exception of Historic Salado College Park, all homes and sites will be open 5-8 p.m. Friday, December 6; 10-5 p.m. Saturday, December 7; 1-5 p. m. Sunday, December 7. Historic Salado College Park will be open on Saturday (10-5 p.m.) and Sunday (1-5 p.m.) only.

Tickets for the tour are available at the Visitor Center (831 North Main Street), tourism@saladoevents.com; and the following businesses: Charlotte's of Salado, Sofi's, Fletcher's Books, Taylors, and McCain's Bakery, all on Main Street in the historic Village of Salado.





Brilliant defensive play **Contract Bridge**

By Steve Becker

The name of Shri D.V. Gore might not strike a responsive chord, but Gore clearly earned a niche in the bridge Hall of Fame because of a defensive play he made on this deal from a tournament played in Calcutta.

West led the ace of clubs against four hearts, then shifted to a trump. Declarer won with dummy's jack and played a spade, losing the nine to West's ten.

West led another trump, and it was on this trick that Gore made the remarkable discard of the ace of spades! As a result, declarer went down one. Regardless of how he continued, he could not avoid losing two more spade tricks to West's K-J.

In practice, South played another spade from dummy, but West took the trick with the jack, led a third round of trumps and later scored the setting trick with the king of spades.

To appreciate the beauty of Gore's extraordinary play, let's assume that he had made the more normal discard of a club or a diamond on West's second trump lead. In that case, South would have led a second round of spades from dummy, and East would have
