# Village finances sitting pretty

government is sitting pretty financially.

The Village added \$316,435.07 to its fund balance in the 2011-12 fiscal year as actual income was more than \$100,000 higher than budgeted and the Village spent \$211,488.95 less than budgeted.

The increase in revenue last year is chiefly due to two sources: sales tax allocations and water franchise fees. Sales tax revenues were \$44,935.15 more than budgeted, an increase of about 13 percent. \$18,718.68 in the past fiscal year because the Village adopted a water franchise fee of 4 percent of the total bill rather than the 4 percent of the \$25 base bill. This resulted in a three-fold increase in water franchise

The Village also spent less than anticipated. The Village budgeted expenses at \$847,528, but spent \$636,049.05. This sav-



The village also did not expend the \$31,986.00 for public rest room construction. The Village budgeted a like amount for public rest room construction into the 2012-13 fiscal year.

The Village also spent \$66,470.70 less for police protection due largely to Water franchise fees were a reduced force because of an officer being out on workman's compensation. Aldermen added a police officer position this fall.

Finally, the Village spent \$22,258.40 less on street maintenance than budgeted last year. That amount will be rolled over into this year's street budget.

Taking in more and spending less every year has brought the assets for the Village to \$1.6 million.

# Sales tax allocations down 7%

For most of 2012, sales tax payments to Salado have been running remarkably ahead of 2011, but the November payment to the Village of Salado was about seven percent less than November 2011.

The Village received \$32,720.24 this month, which is seven percent less than last November's payment of \$35,250.56.

For the year, however, the Village is running more than 11 percent ahead of 2011. The Village has received \$350,367.35 in 2012, compared to \$314,798.15 paid through November 2011.

Salado Library District continues the upward trend as the November payment is 16 percent more than the previous year. The Library District received \$30,215.05 this month, compared to \$26,060.15 paid in November 2011. For the year, the Library District has been paid \$293,482.34 in sales tax rebates, which is 23 percent more than the \$238,233.76 paid through November

The November payment to Bell County is slightly higher than last year. Bell County was paid \$1.27 million this month, compared to \$1.24 million last November. For the year, the County is seven percent ahead of last year. The County has received \$14 million compared to \$13.08 paid throough November

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said that state sales tax revenue in October was \$2.03 billion, up 8.2 percent compared to October 2011.

"The state's growth in sales tax revenue continued to be led by collections from the oil and natural gas-related sectors," said Combs.

# **Being stupid on Sandy**

The new cover of Bloomberg Businessweek has a photo of a flooded New York City over a screaming headline, "It's Global Warming, Stupid."

The magazine thus joins the effort to make the devastation wrought by Hurricane Sandy into a piece of cheap agitprop. Global-warming alarmists are desperate for a threat from climate change more immediate and telegenic than the low-lying Maldives supposedly sinking one day beneath a rising sea.

They need disasters, and need them right away. There's a reason that Al Gore used an ominous photo of Hurricane Katrina as seen from space as the emblematic image for his propagandistic documentary, "An Inconvenient Truth."

In the case of Sandy, the alarmists revert to a simplistic style of reasoning (if it can be called that): Something bad happened. It must therefore have an easily identifiable cause. They then wrap this highly emotional appeal in the incontestable clothing of science. Bloomberg Businessweek's editor, Josh Tyrangiel, sent out

a tweet: "Our cover story this week may generate controversy, but only among the stupid."

On the face of it, though, it requires belief in a series of improbabilities to be smart enough to meet Mr. Tyrangiel's standards. Because of global warming, there was a Hurricane Sandy. Because of global warming, Sandy ran into a high-pressure system and took a highly unusual westward turn directly into the coast. Because of global warming, it made that turn into New Jersey and affected the richest, most populated areas in the country. Because of global warming, it hit at high tide during a full moon.

University of Colorado professor Roger Pielke notes that a Category 3 hurricane hasn't made landfall in the U.S. since 2005, the longest spell without one in more than a hundred years. "While it's hardly mentioned in the media," he writes,

"the U.S. is currently in an extended and intense hurricane 'drought."

On the other hand, there were fearsome hurricanes long before anyone dreamed up, let alone manufactured, an SUV. In 1938, the so-called Long Island Express devastated Long Island and New England. An old newsreel film describing it sounds like a report on Sandy. A high-pressure system kept it from blowing out to sea. It hit densely populated areas. It brought a huge storm surge. The Category 3 storm killed hundreds of people.

In 1821, another storm flooded New York City all the way up to Canal Street. If Bloomberg Businessweek had existed 190 years ago, it might have reported on the damage and warned: "This is our future if we develop modern industry and transportation and make them both dependent on fossil fuels, idiots."

The alarmists want us to crack down on fossil fuels and crimp our growth based on the bet that adjusting the climate to our liking in 100 years or so is within our power, and that when we endeavor to do it, China and India will feel moved to do the same. People who believe this shouldn't throw around the word "stupid" so lightly.

# Free concert kicks off opening of outdoor venue at Johnny's

Texas country artists Pauline Reese and Mack Abernathy will open the music stage at Johnny's Steaks and Bar-Be-Que outdoor venue during a free concert 7 p.m. Nov. 17.

Johnny and Josh Bratton invite you to join them for the opening of this new venue with the free concert.

Pauline Reese is an award-wining Texas country singer and songwriter. She has been blazing a path for women in the field of Texas outlaw country music. When radio programmers preferred spinning guys over gals, she persuaded them to give her a chance and earned such hit singles on the Texas Music Chart as "Trail to Monterrey," "One Less Honky Tonk" and "Lone Star Flag." She strengthened relationships by visiting every alternative/ country station in Texas and Oklahoma at least five times.

Legends were born when Pauline rode her horse Blue Diamond into shows at famed dance halls across Texas and sang the National Anthem from the saddle at rodeos and sporting events, including one for 83,000 people at a University of Texas football game.

At age 15, she joined a band composed of men in their 40s. Two years later, she fronted it as The Pauline Reese Band. About the same time, she met Willie Nelson and was welcomed into his inner circle of friends including legendary songwriters Sonny Throckmorton (George Strait's "The Cowboy Rides Away") and Merle Haggard sidekick Freddy Powers ("Natural High").

While writing songs with them and studying their music and the artists they admired, she toured and worked odd jobs, from fixing guitars and selling hot dogs on a stick to making titanium kneecaps in a machine shop.

Honing songwriting, guitar, vocals and show-manship while performing more than 170 concerts a year, Pauline steadily earned a fan base that allowed her to grow from opening act to headliner.

She performed at two of Willie's Farm Aid festivals that included Dave Matthews, Neil Young and John Cougar Mellencamp. She has also performed at six of Willie's fabled Fourth of July Picnics.

She had so much fun that four years ago she established her own, the Pauline & Outlaws Picnic. Guests have included Freddy Powers, Johnny

Lee, Gary P. Nunn, The Derailers, Tommy Alverson, Todd Frisch, Kelly Kenning, Davin James and Willie's daughter, Paula Nelson. Her fifth annual picnic is planned for late spring.

Her albums won critical acclaim since her self-titled debut in 1999. Willie joined her for a duet on "Pick Up the Pieces" on her 2004 CD "The Good, The Bad and The Ugly." The Texas Music Awards bestowed album of the year honors on her 2007 CD "Too Texas," a collection of her classics and others.

Her sixth CD, "Just Getting Started," reveals Pauline's growth as an artist in a powerful collection of folk, pop rock and alternative and contemporary country that reflects a life being lived to its fullest – from a leaving a rocky marriage and finding new love and a new role as a wife and mother with two young daughters to all the highs and lows in between.


Mack Abernathy will open the show at 7 p.m.



To show versatility, the second release from the album was the title cut, "Different Situations," a very upbeat song. The "Different Situations" video won the Lone Star Award at the Houston International Film Festival, and received airplay on The Nashville Network and CMT. This song featured Nashville guitar guru, Ray Flack (some pickers are still trying to figure out those licks!). The result was another Billboard Chart song and a 5-country, 55-city tour of Europe. When Mack says that he has ridden his tour bus all over the world, he is telling the truth as the Bandag Corporation, sponsor of the tour, shipped his tour bus overseas for this tour. Upon returning stateside, Mack played many various venues, from The Farm Bureau Convention in California to political conferences in Indianapolis, Willie Nelson's Fourth of July Picnic, and the Super Bull in Del Rio, Texas. # With 49-28 loss at home to McGregor, Eagles' season ends the way it started

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Salado Eagles ended their football season in much the way they began it, without much defense. Salado gave up 488 yards to the McGregor Bulldogs in a 49-28 home stand loss Nov. 9, finishing the season 2-8 and 2-4 in district

finished McGregor the season as the secondplace team with a 9-1, 6-1 district mark. Meanwhile Cameron Yoe, ranked second in state, finished with a 10-0, 7-0 perfect mark. Lago Vista is the third place team from District 22AA and also qualified for the playoffs.

The Eagles matched McGregor touchdown for touchdown through most of the first half, until the Bulldogs took a 28-13 lead at the 3:53 mark of the second quarter on a 26 yard run by junior running back C.J. Sims. Sims had 143 vards on seven carries to lead all rushers.

The Bulldogs and Eagles combined for three touchdowns in the last four minutes of the second quarter.

After Sims scored, Salado responded in less than two minutes. Chase Crenwelge returned the ensuing kick off 40 yards near midfield. He was then stopped for a short gain on first down before quarterback Ryan Simmons earned a first down at the McGregor 40 yard line. Simmons then hit Trey Mohler for a 29 yard pass and followed it up with an 11 yard touchdown run at 2:02 left in the first half.

McGregor responded with a quick drive of four plays. Troy Allison his Marcus Irons for a 48 yard pass and then found Brett Boles on a third and long for a 13 yard touchdown. The PAT kick brought the first half score to 35-21.

### **Christmas fills Husung home**

Secluded within a forest of great trees and circled by native stone walls, Jack Husung's contemporary California-style house of redwood and stone at 609 Willow Creek, is one of five homes to be opened on the annual Tour of Homes sponsored by Salado Historical Society Nov. 30 Dec. 2. Having been opened previously, it will be on this tour because many who visited before, in awe of what they have seen, go away wanting to see more.

Those desires are fulfilled as Christmas in all of its glory is seen in every room, from foyer to dining room, to great room centered by a 12 foot Christmas tree, its glitter reflected in tall windows that look out to the pool area. Elegant figures of Santa Claus in velvet, satin and faux fur and resplendent trees are in every room. A life-size Santa in the dining room, where Husung on occasions has seated 26 guests, peeps out from a pine tree glistening with lights and ornaments and yet another stands in the corner of the stair landing beckoning guests to enjoy more of the delights above.

The master suite features a king-size bed luxuriously dressed and a fire-

place-centered seating area where leather chairs and ottoman create an inviting ambiance. A slender tree, standing at tall windows opening to the patio and pool, sparkles under its trove of Waterford crystal ornaments. A chest displays multiple Santas, trees and other seasonal figures, also of Waterford crystal.

Upstairs are two bedrooms, decorated especially for the two children. For his daughter Maria, richly trimmed linens of shocking pink, yellow and gold on a white wrought iron bed and for his son Jackson, traditional colors, numerous toys and a miniature Santa dressed in white tie and tails. A cozy sitting room on this level displays a tree with a collection of over 100 Radko

ornaments.

The great room is warmed by a copper wood-burning chamber flued through the 25 foot stone firewall. Rustic pine trees are ablaze with sparkling white lights, and Santa figures strut around books and lamps.

French doors in the lower floor rooms lead to the pool at the back of the expansive property. Stone walls, wrought iron, water features and statuary compliment overhanging trees and climbing ivy filled with myriads of twinkle lights.

Four other gracious homes on the tour will be Calvin and Edith Phillips, 1014 South Ridge Road; Michael and Paula Quinn, 1009 North Ridge Road; Terry and Jan Whitley, 1317 Jack Nicklaus Circle; and the house on DeGrummond. Also open to the public will be the Salado Civic Center, Two 19th Century Log Cabins behind the Civic Center and Caliber Oaks Chapel, 5235 Royal Street, owned by Rick and Denise Thoms-

# Heads win, tails you lose

# Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

It goes without saying that a declarer should avoid making plays that can lose but never gain. Conversely, declarer should always be on the lookout for plays that can gain but cannot lose. This principle is surely not debatable, but its application in a given situation is not always easy to spot.

Consider this deal where South was in four hearts. West led the K-A of clubs and continued with the jack. Declarer ruffed and led a trump to the ace, discovering to his horror that West had all five missing trumps.

South did the best he could by abandoning further trump leads and playing diamonds instead. But West ruffed the second diamond and returned a trump, and South later lost a spade trick to go down one.

It is true that when five cards of a suit are missing, they will divide 5-0 only 4 percent of the time. So to that extent, South was unlucky. Nevertheless, the fact remains that he made an error in the play, and the gods saw fit to punish him for it.

Had South been a member of the school that always asks at the start of play "What can defeat me?" he might have found the way to safeguard his contract. He would have realized, when West continued clubs at trick three, that only a 5-0 trump break could defeat him. Then, in order to protect against this possibility, he would have discarded his seven of spades on the jack of clubs in order to maintain control of the trumps.

Discarding a spade on the club jack could not cost South a trick, but offered him a chance to gain one. It was therefore the correct play, although not an easy one to think of.

# **Update Thanksgiving traditions**

#### **ROASTED SWEET POTATO SALAD**

This sweet potato and tangy arugula salad just might become a new tradition for your holiday table.

- 2 small sweet potatoes, diced
- 1/2 red onion, thinly sliced 1/4 teaspoon ground black
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon, divided
- 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar 1/4 cup honey
- tablespoons finely
- chopped chives 4 cups baby arugula
- 3 medium radishes, sliced paper thin



Preheat oven to 400°F. Toss sweet potatoes with onion, black pepper and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon in a medium bowl. Transfer to a parchment-paperlined baking sheet and roast until tender, about 45 minutes.


# Deforestation and global warming; Green friendly "Bluesign" clothing

Dear EarthTalk: Is it true that cutting and burning trees adds more global warming pollution to the atmosphere than all the cars and trucks in the world combined? -- Mitchell Vale, Houston, TX

By most accounts, deforestation in tropical rainforests adds more carbon dioxide to the atmosphere than the sum total of cars and trucks on the world's roads. According to the World Carfree Network (WCN), cars and trucks account for about 14 percent of global carbon emissions, while most analysts attribute upwards of 15 percent to deforestation.

The reason that logging is so bad for the climate is that when trees are felled they release the carbon they are storing into the atmosphere, where it mingles with greenhouse gases from other sources and contributes to global warming accordingly. The upshot is that we should be doing as much to prevent deforestation as we are to increase fuel efficiency and reduce automobile usage.

According to the Environmental Defense Fund (EDF), a leading green group, 32 million acres of tropical rainforest were cut down each year between 2000 and 2009—and the pace of deforestation is only increasing. "Unless we change the present system that rewards forest destruction, forest clearing will put another 200 billion tons of carbon into



the atmosphere in coming decades...," says EDF.

"Any realistic plan to reduce global warming pollution sufficientlyand in time—to avoid dangerous consequences must rely in part on preserving tropical forests," reports EDF. But it's hard to convince the poor residents of the Amazon basin and other tropical regions of the world to stop cutting down trees when the forests are still worth more dead than alive. "Conservation costs money, while profits from timber, charcoal, pasture and cropland drive people to cut down forests," adds EDF. Exacerbating global warming isn't the only negative impact of tropical deforestation. It also wipes out biodiversity: More than half of the world's plant and animal species live in tropical rainforests.

One way some tropical countries are reducing deforestation is through participation in the United Nations' Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation (REDD) program. REDD essentially works to establish incentives for the people who care for the forest to manage it sustainably while still being

able to benefit economically. Examples include using less land (and therefore cutting fewer trees) for activities such as coffee growing and meat and milk production. Participating nations can then accrue and sell carbon pollution credits when they can prove they have lowered deforestation below a baseline. The REDD program has channeled over \$117 million in direct financial aid and educational support into national deforestation reduction efforts in 44 developing countries across Africa, Asia and Latin America since its 2008 inception.

Brazil is among the embracing countries REDD among other efforts to reduce carbon emissions. Thanks to the program, Brazil has slowed deforestation within its borders by 40 percent since 2008 and is on track to achieve an 80 percent reduction by 2020. Environmentalists are optimistic that the initial success of REDD in Brazil bodes well for reducing deforestation in other parts of the tropics as well.



Bluesign is an emerg-

ing standard for environmental health and safety in the manufacturing of textiles. The Switzerland-based organization, officially known as Bluesign Technologies AG, provides independent auditing of textile mills, examining manufacturing processes from raw materials and energy inputs to water and air emissions outputs. Each component is assessed based on its ecotoxicological impact. Bluesign ranks its audit findings in order of concern, and suggests ways to reduce consumption while recommending alternatives to harmful chemicals or processes where applicable. Textile mills that commit to verifiably adopting Bluesign's recommendations become certified "System Partners" and attract business from a wide range of brands and retailers around the world looking for greener vendors.

Eco-aware consumers can feel confident purchasing clothing items with the Bluesign label that they are buying the environmentally most friendly, socially conscious version of the jacket, shirt, sweater, pants, hat or gloves in question. Given the push for greener products of every kind, Bluesign has gained serious traction in the last few years among some of the leading brands in the outdoor clothing and gear business.

Patagonia was Bluesign's first "brand" member and has been supportive of the program since its inception in 2000. While only 16 percent of the products in its 2012 line contain Bluesign-approved fabrics, the company has set a goal with its suppliers to have all Patagonia fabrics adhere to the standard by 2015.

The North Face is a newer partner for Bluesign, but no less committed: The company has been going gangbusters for the standard since 2010, and offers several clothing items made with at least 90 percent Bluesign-approved fabrics.

Over the two years it has been converting its supply chain over to Bluesignapproved vendors, The North Face has saved 85 Olympic swimming pools worth of water, 38 tanker trucks worth of chemicals, and carbon emissions similar to taking some 1,100 cars off the road for a year.

Another leading outdoor clothing manufacturer embracing Bluesign is Norway's Helly Hansen. In its 2012 line, more than 100 of Helly Hansen's 500 products contain fabrics that meet the Bluesign standard; that number is expected to increase by 50 percent in 2013. Helly Hansen would go fully Bluesign except that some of its specialty products that need to be flame retardant do not meet the standard. The company is optimistic, however, that textile makers can solve that problem—and then it can offer a 100 percent Bluesign-approved product line. Some of the other big outdoor brands that have teamed up with Bluesign include REI and Canada's Mountain Equipment Co-op (MEC).

Whether Bluesign catches on more widely in this dog-eat-dog, economically stressed business climate remains to be seen. "Earning Bluesign approval costs mills and suppliers time and money," reports MEC. "They have to be convinced they'll get a return on their investment in the form of increased demand for their products from manufacturers like MEC and ultimately from consumers."

# Firewood Tips

Q: Last year, we ordered a cord of firewood, but the weather was so warm that we barely used half of it in our fireplace. Is the remaining half still good to use this winter? -- Frank in Marlborough,

A: Stored correctly, firewood can last for several seasons if need be, so your remaining half-cord should be fine for use this winter. It has continued to season and is probably much drier than it was last year, meaning it will likely catch and burn fast-

Large amounts of firewood that will be stored through the winter and into the next cold season generally should be kept several feet from the house at minimum. The wood should be kept off the ground -- loaded on a pallet or a storage rack -- and stacked evenly. This creates good airflow between the logs, allows it to dry quickly after a rain storm, and reduces the number of insects that take up residence in the stack, as well as discourages rodents from creating nests in it.

How much firewood you should purchase and store each year is entirely up to you. I've often passed homes in the Northeastern countryside that have several cords of neatly cut wood stacked underneath the crawlspace of outlying barns,

sheds, or sometimes even the houses themselves. In suburban and urban areas, this is probably not acceptable to the neighbors or may violate local ordinances.

Plan to have no more than two winters' worth of firewood stacked near your house. The amount depends on how much you use your fireplace, and whether it is a necessity to warm the home or just a decorative element.

HOME TIP: Order firewood from a source as close to your home as possible, to prevent pests -- particularly tree-killing insects -- moving from one area or region to another.


