Aldermen address personnel issues

Stephen Peters will resign as financial/investment officer for the Village of Salado at the end of the year, Salado aldermen learned at their Nov. 21 meeting.

"He has put a great training program in place with Margaret Murray," City administrator Jim Reed said of Peters. "However, we will have a hole and there will be a need."

Aldermen also accepted the resignation of Salado Volunteer Fire Department Chief Shane Berrier as the Emergency Management Coordinator for the Village. Berrier recommended and the board approved SVFD volunteer and professional firefighter William Kline, who has a bachelor degree in Emergency Management, as the Emergency Management Coordinator.

In other personnel business, aldermen approved Chief Jack Hensley's recommendation for the hire of retired Bell Co. Sheriff Deputy Larry Berrier as the Village Code Enforcement Officer, a part-time position.

The board also approved renewal of a contract with Justice of the


act as the Municipal Judge for the Village of Salado.

Aldermen also approved the building permit for construction of a CEFCO convenience store along West Village Road and I-35. CEFCO will build a 5,000 sq. ft. convenience store with gas pumps at the location.

Reed told aldermen that in coming weeks they would need to develop an overlay district with specific ideas and goals in mind for "what you want the west side of the interstate to look like when the I-35 expansion is done."

The overlay district should consider pedestrian traffic as well as regulations to apply to buildings, such as height, material and architectural style.

Reed requested committee meetings during December, including the committee developing the west side overlay district and the sewer subcommittee. He told aldermen that the sewer subcommittee needed to meet to address "some options that will be available to us," adding that the northern option for a treatment center was no longer a viable option as planned.

Obama loses his cool

Barack Obama is the coolest president we've had since John F. Kennedy, at least according to conventional standards for such things. Obama has always been a brand as much as a politician, one that has been perceived as sleek, smart and up to date.

Then along came Healthcare.gov. Its failure to launch is a signal event in the long political battle over Obamacare and perhaps an inflection point in the president's image. It's hard to maintain a sense of truly being on the cutting edge of change when you can't build a website.

Obama's cool was, in part, an artifact of worldclass marketing. Graphic designer Michael Bierut writes in the book "Designing Obama" (yes, there's such a book) of how impressed he was watching Obama rallies in 2008: "The awe-inspiring part was the way all the signs were faithfully, and beautifully, set in Hoefler & Frere-Jones's typeface Gotham." If only the folks at Health and Human Services were consumed with



such attention to detail.

The Obama team's technological prowess reinforced the sense that it owned the future. Except it had no bearing on how the president would or could run the government. We've now learned that the president doesn't know how to make a government website work, or know to check to see if it's going to work. "Neither he and I are technology geeks," Vice President Joe Biden explained the other day.

When selling the prospective glories of his website, President Obama compared it to Travelocity and Amazon, leaders in a private sector that is highly flexible and reactive and where failure means extinction. Government is nothing like that. It never has been and never will be. It is plodding and bureaucratic, beholden to political imperatives and of-

ten stuck in practices that make no sense.

A presidential campaign can hire whomever it wants without taking account of procurement rules or any other bureaucratic impediment. It is a private entity subject to the laws of competition. It exists more in the world of Travelocity than Healthcare.gov.

At the end of the day, the

president has been a daz-

zling frontman for what

is, in essence, the Depart-

ment of Motor Vehicles.

He has created a glittering

image of hope and change

that has little to do with a rumbling, ramshackle federal government that is still largely built along mid-20th-century lines. Instead of imbuing government with his sense of cool, he has been left apologizing for a government failure that profoundly runs against the zeitgeist. We celebrate the Internet entrepreneurs who can take an idea and, with pluck and creativity, make it into a reality that we can't live without. It is one of the ironies of the Obama Era that the same kids whose lives are defined by a dizzying array of endlessly changing choices have voted for a president invested in protecting a government that embodies the opposite. It may be that after five years, they are beginning to get a clue. A new Quinnipiac poll shows young people disapproving of the

World's last flock of wild whooping cranes returns to winter in Texas

AUSTIN, Texas - The world's last flock of wild whooping cranes is now arriving in Texas, as the endangered birds make their annual winter migration to the coast from northern Canada. The flock has been growing slowly and it now numbers around 300 - despite the troubles of five years ago, recalled Myron Hess, Texas Water Programs manager for the National Wildlife Federation.

'They had a fairly big setback in 2008 and 2009. when around 23 or more of the whooping cranes died during winter on the Texas coast during drought conditions," Hess said, "but sort of generally, over time, the population has been growing slowly."

Following the whooping crane deaths, The Aransas Project filed a lawsuit under the Federal Endangered Species Act. Hess said a court determined that the management of water in Texas was harming the birds.

"But that ruling by the federal district court is currently on appeal," Hess said, "so basically right now any changes in management are on hold. There really haven't been any changes made as a result of that ruling."

Hess predicted that a ruling on the appeal could come at any time, adding that he hopes it will lead to the improved management of Texas water resources with wildlife impacts in mind.

"Here, we need to be managing it to help ben-

efit the whooping crane, but it's an issue all up and down the Texas coast as we're taking more and more water out of our river systems and depriving the coast of fresh water inflows. We're seeing impacts to species up and down the coast. We really have to do a better job of looking at the big picture," he said.

The whooping cranes will winter around the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge until about March, before migrating nearly 2,500 miles back to northern Canada and their summer breeding grounds. In total, about 600 whooping cranes live in the wild and in captivity in North America - a major turnaround from the 1940s, when unregulated hunting and loss of habitat pushed the species to the brink of extinction.

Sarah Kelarek led the Salado Lady Eagles past the Thorndale Lady Bulldogs 52-35 on Nov. 19, scoring 14 points.



Historical Society Tour bring history to life

A private home, a high Victorian home, two restored log cabins and a chapel will be open during the Salado Historical Society's 2013 Tour of Historic Homes and Sites, Dec.

History interpreters at 10 homes and sites will bring the history of Salado to life.

At Tour Stop Number 7 is Norwood House, built over 100 years ago in 1901. Descendants relive Christmas 1948, a time family members recall as one of their happiest times at the

home of Pearl and Josiah H. Norwood, known by all as "Towhead" and "Big Daddy." Family hosts dressed in period clothing greet visitors to their home filled with the aroma of fresh baked cookies and sounds of the season.

After purchasing the house in 1910, the Norwoods raised their six children and lived there until their deaths. Originally, the house had two rooms, built on pier and beam. Mrs. Norwood had a reputation for deciding when to move or add walls

as children were born. Over the years, the Norwood family expanded the house to eight rooms, with the addition of the living room, dining room, and indoor bathroom, porch enclosures, and replacement of the south side fireplace with a window.

J. H. Norwood built the Norwood Grocery and general merchandise store in Salado in the early 1920s. He operated the store for several years before going to work in Belton at Cochran, Blair, and Potts, where he worked until 1955.

At Tour Stop Number 8 is Vickrey House, built about 1885 by Granville Napoleon Vickrey, a graduate of Salado College, soon after his marriage to Sophia F. Stinson. He built the Second Empire style house with Mansard roof just south of the 1871 home of his parents. The house is listed on National Register of Historic Plac-

Granville Vickrev came to Bell County with his family in 1858. His father, Confederate veteran J. W. Vickrey, became proprietor of Lone Star Hotel, located on the same lot as the family home, and a trustee of Salado College.

Tour Stop Number 9 are the Boles-Aiken and Denman Log Cabins. In 1986, demolition of a house on Center Circle led to the discovery of this two-room log cabin named the Boles-Aiken by Salado Historical Society after they restored and moved the structure to its present location on the grounds of Salado Civic Center. Restoration focused on use of original logs, boards, and rocks, including those of

the foundation and rock fireplace.

The Denman cabin is a 20'x20' native timber one-room clay-chinked log cabin that rests on the grounds of the Civic Center. Moses Hampton Denman (1803-1885) built the cabin in 1867 in the Tennessee Valley community, northwest of Belton. When the waters of Belton Lake threatened the pioneer structure, newspaper reporter Maude Smith had it moved to her yard in Belton, where it served as her office. In 1978, Gary Graham purchased


the cabin and moved it to Troy. Robert Denman, a descendent of Moses Denman, purchased the cabin and moved it to Salado in 1983, and in 1996, he donated the cabin to Salado Historical Society. The cabin is a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark.

Always a favorite on the tour, the cabins offer a unique look at homes of early Texans. History interpreters tell about Bell County pioneers, who lived in cabins like these.

At Tour Stop Number 10 is St. Joseph's Episcopal Church. Tim Brown, Gilbert Rendon, and Cliff Rendon remodeled an existing building using architectural features similar to those of historic churches in Central Texas. In use here are about a dozen pews acquired from the 1874 St. Luke's Church in Belton. Tyler Fletcher obtained the yellow stained glass windows from the First Lutheran Church in Temple. The large figural windows, circa 1890, depicting Saints are from St. Mary's Church in Taylor.

With the exception of Historic Salado College Park, all homes and sites will be open 5-8 p.m. Dec. 6; 10-5 p.m. Dec. 7; and 1-5 p.m. Dec. 8. Historic Salado College Park will be open on Dec. 7 (10 a.m.-5 p.m.) and Dec. 8(1-5 p.m.) only.




Docents bring Salado history to life

Salado Historical Society's 2013 Tour of Historic Homes and Sites takes place this weekend, Friday through Sunday, Dec. 6-8. You will have the opportunity to see 10 historic homes and sites in Salado, many decorated for Christmas and offering refreshments. All tour stops are conveniently located on either Main Street or Royal Street in the heart of the Village of Salado, with a map of the tour included with ticket purchase.

Members of Salado Historical Society, supported by members of Betty Martin Chapter NS-DAR, Sons of Confederate Veterans Camp 1250, and Bell County Chapter 101 UDC, serve as history interpreters at homes and sites on the tour.

The tour takes place during the first weekend of the Salado Christmas Stroll, and the location of the homes and sites on this year's tour makes it possible to enjoy both events at the same time. Homes and sites on this year's tour

Stop #1: Historic Salado College Park (South Main Street at College Hill) Interpretive signs along a pathway through the park tell the history of

Robertson's Colony, Salado College, and the founding of Salado.

Stop #2: Central Texas Area Museum and Salado Historical Society (423 South Main Street) Permanent and special exhibits include artifacts associated with people and events in the history of Salado and Central Texas. Enjoy Celtic Christmas music and refreshments in the Wee Scots Shop.

Stop #3: Grace Jones Shop and First State Bank (2 Royal Street) Once the home of Salado's first bank and later Grace Jones of Salado, an upscale clothing shop that specialized in couture designs she acquired on her shopping trips around the

world. View this historic structure and clothing sold by Grace Jones.

Stop #4. Baines House (220 Royal) Built circa 1866 and once the home of Rev. George W. Baines, President of Baylor University at Independence, and the great-grandfather of United States President Lyndon Baines Johnson.

Stop #5. Anderson House (33 South Main Street) James Anderson, the builder, greets visitors to this house typical of early Salado homes built in the 1860s by families who moved to Salado so their children could attend Salado College.

Stop #6. Armstrong-Adams House (2 North Street) Owners

A place for weary travelers, thirsty

Doug and Carol Willingham's home is an excellent example of adaptive reuse transforming a residential structure of the old to the new, with family history, local history, and talent of Salado artists reflected throughout. History interpreters tell about the house, elaborately decorated for Christmas, and its owners.

Norwood Stop #7. House (231 North Main Street) Built in 1910 and occupied for many years by the Norwood family, the house is decorated for Christmas and descendants are baking cookies.

Stop #8. Vickrev House (402 North Main Street) Vickrey descendants tell family stories in this circa 1885 house.

Stop #9. Boles-Aiken and Denman Log Cabins (Main Street at Van Bibber Lane) Always a favorite on the tour, the cabins offer a unique look at homes of early Texans. History interpreters tell about Bell County pioneers, who lived in cabins like these.


Stop #10. Episcopal Church (945 North Main Street) A serene place to end the tour. History interpreters give architectural details of this unique church and furnishings.

With the exception of Historic Salado College Park, all homes and sites will be open 5-8 p.m. Dec. 6; 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Dec. 7 and 1-5 p.m. Dec. 8. Historic Salado College Park will be open 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Dec. 7 and 1-5 p.m. Dec. 8 only.

Tickets will be available for \$15 from any of the 10 stops on the tour.

Proceeds from the tour benefit Salado Historical Society as their only fundraiser.

You might wonder how South managed to make four hearts on this deal. It seems he must go down one, even if you look at all four hands. But make it he did, and it all came about in a perfectly logical fashion.

West started with the K-A-Q of diamonds and shifted to a trump. Ordinarily, declarer would win with the ace, draw trumps and play the A-8 of clubs, planning to finesse the jack as his best hope of avoiding a spade loser.

But South realized that if he did this, he would surely fail. He recognized that West would not have passed as dealer had he held a five-card or longer spade suit headed by at least one honor, the A-K-Q of diamonds he had already shown up with, and the queen of clubs as well.

Since the club finesse was therefore bound to lose, South adopted another line of play that offered a legitimate chance for the contract. He won the trump return with the ace, led a low trump to dummy and returned the jack of clubs!

East covered with the queen, taken by South with the ace. Declarer then drew the missing trump and led the eight of clubs to dummy's king, picking up West's nine along the way. Next came dummy's seven of clubs, and poor East, holding the 10-5-3 over the 7-6, was a dead duck whether he covered or not. Either way, South could not be stopped from sooner or later disposing of a spade on one of dummy's clubs.

It's true that South needed to find West with the 10-x or 9-x of clubs for his plan to succeed, but he had the kind of luck that is so often asso-






