The Battle of Lansing

Michigan gave birth to the United Auto Workers. The union was founded at a convention in Detroit in 1935. After its famous sit-down strike in Flint, Mich., in 1937, the UAW won recognition by General Motors and, in the next several years, by Chrysler and Ford. It was the advent of an era of industrial unionization that may be coming to a symbolic end in the same place it started.

Michigan just passed the kind of "right to work" law that is anathema to unions everywhere and is associated with the red states of the Sun Belt, not the blue states of the Rust Belt. To say that such a development is stunning is almost an understatement. The union model hasn't just been central to Michigan's economy, but to its very identity.

At its inception, UAW officials got roughed up by company thugs at the famous "Battle of the Overpass," when Ford was still resisting signing a contract with the union. Some 70 years later, the union movement is getting undone by simple economic realities.

The effect of right-to-work laws, which permit employees to work at unionized companies without joining the union and paying mandatory dues, is hard to pin down precisely, because so many other factors affect a state's economic condition. But Michigan began undergoing a real-world experiment after neighboring Indiana adopted a right-to-work law earlier this year, the first Rust Belt state to do

The early returns weren't encouraging. The Mackinac Center, a free-market Michigan think tank, reports that Indiana added 43,300 jobs -- 13,900 of them in manufacturing -- while Michigan shed 7,300 jobs. Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder, a Republican reformer but not a bomb thrower, says seeing 90 companies from around the country decide to settle in Indiana after the labor change influenced his willingness to sign a bill doing the

same thing.

Michigan was already losing out to right-to-work states before having one on its border. Shikha Dalmia of Reason magazine points out that, with the exception of a brief foray by Mazda, no foreign automaker has set up shop in Michigan, despite the state's pool of experienced autoworkers. It is hard to be a manufacturing state specializing in autos if you can't attract new automakers.

Election Day in Michigan brought a stark illustration of the declining political power of the unions when they failed to pass an amendment to the state's constitution banning right-to-work. More Michiganders voted "no" on the amendment, the Mackinac Center notes, than voted for President Barack Obama. The failure emboldened the Republican-held legislature to push ahead on a right-to-work measure.

The unions so fear right-to-work laws because mandatory dues are such a boon to them. There's nothing like forcing people to belong to your organization to boost the membership rolls and the treasury. In one month in 2011 after Gov. Scott Walker ended mandatory dues for public-sector unions in Wisconsin, the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees shed half its members, according to The Wall Street Journal

So many decades after they, in effect, won the Battle of the Overpass, the unions have lost the Battle of Lansing.

Remembering Christmas past
By U.S. Sen. John Cornyn In 1920, a third-grader In the 1890s, Mrs. V

"We just got up on Christmas morning... and we'd usually have an apple and orange in our stockings. That was about the only time we ever had oranges. I can smell an orange to this day, and it always makes me think of Christmas. We didn't get many toys. We got necessities."

This was a Christmas memory of Zulieka O'Daniel, who was born in 1911 and was raised on a farm southwest of Hart, Texas. Zulieka's Christmas mornings were much the same for many other Texas children in the early 1900s. While the settings were simple and the gifts limited, Christmas inspired the same anticipation and excitement then that it does for children today.

Elora Riddle, who lived on a farm to the west of Kress, Texas, recalled that her older siblings traveled into town by buggy to purchase surprise Christmas gifts one year for the younger children in the family: "Lucindy and Elbert went to town and it snowed and they couldn't get back on Christmas Eve. We hung our stockings on Christmas Eve and Papa and Mama put an orange and an apple, nuts and candy in, so we had that for Christmas and we thought that was all we were going to get." The morning after Christmas, Elora went to the breakfast table to find a "celluloid doll" at her place at the table. "We were so happy that Santa came back," she

In 1920, a third-grader by the name of Mill Boyd of Dumas, Texas, attended a community Christmas celebration at her schoolhouse. Instead of individual Christmas celebrations at home, the entire community would gather at the schoolhouse and Santa would visit all of Dumas' children at once. Mill left that year's gathering in delight, carting home with her a "wicker doll buggy and a Schoenhut doll." According to Mill, the Schoenhut dolls were hand-carved, German-made dolls who were "jointed and had real hair." In addition to the doll and buggy, Mill also received two boxes of chocolates from her "little boyfriend" that year. Her mother was not pleased and told Mill she was too young to receive the chocolates and would have to return them. Mill's father, however, interjected, "Leave her alone now. I'm gonna eat that

candy." An even earlier Christmas recollection in 1863 by the daughter of former Texas Governor E.M. Pease, Julia, included a description of the family Christmas tree: "Not tall and stately as the German Tannenbaum, but just a common cedar." Julia recalled that the ladies of the household spent the weeks leading up to Christmas preparing the trimmings for the tree, including stringing popcorn. Julia noted that because of the Civil War, goods had been blockaded from the North and all food and clothing that year had to be made at home.

In the 1890s, Mrs. W.H. Thaxton of Onion Creek, Texas, told the Austin American-Statesman that "real" eggnog was served "liberal portions" among her family and the neighbors at Christmas. She also noted that "all laws, short of murder and arson, were suspended for the time, and many were the mutual misunderstandings that were settled at Christmastime." At the end of Christmas day, "dancing was engaged in, and the nights were enlivened by the merry strains of the fiddle (not violin), and the calls of the prompter as merrily the dance went on far into the night."

Today, as many of us find ourselves caught up in the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, there is something to be said about the simplicity of Christmas past in Texas. May we all take the time to enjoy the small things, the time together with family and friends, and the real meaning of the season. From my family to yours: Merry Christmas, happy holidays and best wishes for a safe and prosperous New Year.

Fee-for-All

Nearly every airline these days is addicted to charging you fees

Those who say we should run government like a business must not be frequent flyers.

Flying, which was once a fairly good experience, now amounts to being herded, harassed, barked at, and squeezed — while being dunned every step of the way for onerous fees. Make a reservation? Do it yourself, or pay extra. Check a bag? The fee for that is so pricey that most passengers have had to turn themselves into mules, toting their full load on board - which the airlines view as a new fee opportunity, planning to charge us for storing the stuff we schlep onto the plane.

What's next — a charge to use the toilet?

Yes! Here's the CEO of Ryanair in Europe: "One thing we are looking at again is the possibility of maybe putting a coin



slot on the toilet door." After all, mused another Ryanair exec, a toilet tax would be voluntary, since passengers have the option of not using the toilet.

Even though the airlines are in the black again and keep raising their ticket prices (three times this year alone), they still keep jacking up fees...because they can. It's free money they can simply lift out of travelers' wallets. "We're all about finding ways of raising discretionary revenue," gloated the chief of Ryanair.

Nearly every airline

these days is addicted to fees, and the already huge take is growing — these add-ons will pluck \$36 billion dollars from us customers this year, \$4 billion more than last year.

Is there a tipping point at which consumer grumbling about these gouges turns to rebellion? A group called AirFareWatchDog. com thinks so. Noting that airlines are making profits again, it reports that the flying public has had it up to here with fees. Delta, for one, has responded. Not by cutting fees, but by excluding from its public reports the full amount of fee revenue it takes from

There is a better way to protect Social Security

Going over the fiscal cliff on January 1st would mean huge income tax increases for all Americans and across-the-board cuts in most federal programs (except Social Security). I believe Congress and the White House will do all that must be done to avoid such a shock to our economy.

But the reason for the fiscal cliff - an exploding national debt - won't go away until Congress and the White House reach agreement on a long-term deficit-reduction solution. Although there are differences over the details, there is broad agreement in Washington that this should consist of comprehensive, pro-growth tax reform and common-sense spending reforms that include shoring up the finances of Social Security and other entitlement programs.

More than 60 percent of current federal spending goes to entitlement programs, mostly Social Security and Medicare. To put that in perspective, if we eliminated all federal spending except entitlements – that is, if we spent no money on highways, national defense, medical research, food safety, etc. - this year's federal budget would be just barely balanced and would not affect the debt at all.

In a few more years, eliminating all non-entitlement spending wouldn't be enough to balance the budget. That's because both Social Security and Medicare costs will grow faster than our economy for the next several decades, as the largest gen-

eration in our nation's history gets ready to retire. At the same time, there are fewer Americans in the workforce to contribute payroll taxes to cover those benefits.

Some have pointed out that both programs are financed by payroll taxes and have accumulated surpluses in previous decades (essentially IOUs from the U.S. Treasury). But payroll taxes no longer cover the costs of benefits, and surpluses are dwindling. The non-partisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) currently estimates a payroll tax shortfall in Social Security of \$59 billion in 2012, \$76 billion in 2013, and \$86 billion for both 2014 and 2015.

Social Security's situation is on course to run out of money for full retirement benefits in 2033. Although that seems a long way off, waiting until then to address Social Security's finances probably would require a big payroll tax increase or a cut in benefits - or both. But modest, incremental changes over the next few years will protect benefits for current retirees and for those who are about to retire, as well as preserving Social Security for the next generation.

I have put forth a plan, the Defend and Save Social Security Act, to preserve and strengthen Social Security. My approach is sensible, fair, and easy to implement.

First, as Americans live longer, it makes sense to increase the retirement age gradually – without impacting those who are about to retire. Under my

bill, anyone who is currently 59 years or older would not be affected.

For everyone else, both the normal retirement age and early retirement age would increase by three months each year, starting in 2016. That means the normal retirement age would reach 67 by 2019, 68 by 2023, 69 by 2027, and 70 by 2031. The early retirement age would also be gradually increased to 63 by 2019 and 64 by

Second, the annual cost-of-living adjustment, or COLA, would be computed as it is under current law. However, my bill would shave off 1 percent of the COLA in any year it exceeded 1 percent. (If an annual COLA adjustment is less than 1 percent, there would be no change.)

Social Security's Chief Actuary calculates that my legislation would ensure full retirement benefits for at least 50 years – as well as reducing deficits by \$631 billion over the next 10 years.

In its current form, Social Security is headed for insolvency. The question isn't whether to act, it's when. I believe it is better to act now, while there is time to gradually implement changes, over the course of several years, rather than suffering a massive disruption to the program all at once. By doing this, there would be no cuts in Social Security's core benefits and no payroll tax increase on workers today.





In the third installment of this series, La Follia performs more of Bach's concerti for 1-4 harpsichords. This concert will also include a four-harpsichord concerto composed in 2010 by guest artist/ composer Asako Hirabayashi.

Concertos for multiple harpsichords are rare, so it is surprising that Bach wrote so many of them. It is believed he performed them with his sons as show pieces while he directed the Collegium Musicum in Leipzig. While some of the concertos are arrangements of earlier works for violins, the harpsichord parts are re-worked to be thoroughly idiomatic to this remarkable instrument. There is nothing so energizing as the unique sound of multiple harpsichords, and the music will astound and delight audidid back in the day.

After its disappearance from the musical scene around 1800, the harpsichord has emerged with renewed vigor in the 20th and 21st century. Nothing demonstrates this better than the fine four- harpsichord concerto by Asako Hirabayashi presented on this concert. Far from being arcane it is engaging with a gypsy-inspired last movement. Featured harpsichordists are Asako Hirabayashi, Keith Womer (director of La Follia), JiMin Kim, and Jeffrey Jones-Ragona. The harpsichords are backed by the La Follia Austin Baroque string ensemble.

Be Careful DPS increases holiday DWI enforcement

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols Dec. 21-Jan. 1, which includes both the Christmas and New Year holidays.

DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target intoxicated drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation.

During the Christmas/ New Year holiday enforcement effort last year, DPS troopers made more than 1,100 DWI arrests, and approximately 350 were the direct result of the increased patrols.

Slow down – especially in bad weather, construction areas, heavy traffic and unfamiliar areas.

Eliminate distractions, and don't text while driv-

reach your destination. Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present



The art card reading

Contract **Bridge**

By Steve Becker

Card-reading -- the art of diagnosing how the unseen cards are divided -- is the backbone of good card play. Knowing where the missing cards are located is like playing a hand with all 52 cards exposed, and to play a hand well when all the cards are in view is seldom a difficult challenge.

Consider this declarer wrong. East won the spade lead with the jack and continued with the A-K of spades. South ruffed the third spade, drew trumps, led the ten of diamonds from dummy and went up with the king after East followed low.

West won with the ace and returned the jack of diamonds to South's queen. Declarer later tried a club finesse that failed, and the contract went down one.

The critical clue that declarer missed (aside from East's failure to play the ace with a singleton diamond in dummy) was that East had passed as dealer and was therefore highly unlikely to hold the ace of diamonds (having shown up with the A-K-J of spades and a singleton heart on the first five tricks).

Once South assumes that West has the ace of diamonds, it becomes clear that instead of covering dummy's ten of diamonds with the king, he should play low from his hand. In the actual case, even though West wins the diamond with the jack, he is stymied.

A diamond return, whether high or low, allows South to score two diamond tricks with the help of a ruffing finesse and in that way eliminate his potential club loser. A spade or club return also allows South to avoid the club loser -- again with the aid of a ruffing finesse in diamonds -- and so make



Savory Tarts are a hit

Onion, Bacon And Butternut

Tart

Serves 6 as a main course, 12 as an appetizer.

The sweet and savory flavors of caramelized onions, bacon and butternut squash make this rustic tart a winner. If you'd like to make it ahead you can refrigerate it whole or in portions and reheat it in a 300°F oven.

All-purpose flour for rolling dough

14 ounces whole wheat pizza dough, thawed if frozen

5 slices thick-cut bacon 1 large onion, halved and

thinly sliced 2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced

1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt 1 (10 ounces) package frozen diced butternut squash (1 1/2 cups), thawed

1 1/2 cup (about 6 ounces) grated Fontina or Gruyère cheese 2 teaspoons extra-virgin

olive oil, divided 1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme

On a lightly floured

surface with a lightly floured rolling pin, roll dough out to a circle about 14 inches in diameter;



if the dough pulls back strongly, stop rolling, cover the dough with a kitchen towel and let rest 10 minutes before continuing. Transfer dough to a round pizza pan, stone or large greased baking sheet; reshape dough as needed, but you can leave any edges of the dough hanging over the sides of the pan (they will be folded in later). Cover with a towel and refrigerate.

Preheat oven to 475°F and place a rack in the middle of the oven. Cook bacon in a large skillet over medium heat until crisped, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer bacon to a papertowel-covered plate to drain. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon of grease left in skillet. Return skillet to medium heat and add onion, garlic and salt. Cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is golden and tender, about 15 minutes. Add

squash and cook, tossing gently once or twice, until any excess moisture evaporates, 2 to 3 minutes.

Scrape onion mixture into middle of dough and spread evenly, leaving a 1-inch border around edges. Sprinkle top with cheese. Brush edge of dough with half the oil and fold it over to make a ½-inch rim. Brush rim with remaining oil. Bake until tart is deeply browned and dough is cooked through, 20 to 25 minutes. Sprinkle with thyme and cool 10 minutes, then transfer to a cutting board and cut into wedges or squares for serving.





Transfer pan to a rimmed baking sheet and bake for 10 minutes. Gently remove paper and beans, then sprinkle 1/2 cup of the cheese evenly over the bottom of the crust and set aside. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F.

more. Stir in crème fraîche and simmer again until liquid has almost evaporated, about 10 minutes.

Transfer contents of skillet to tart pan and spread out evenly. Sprinkle remaining 1 cup cheese over mushroom mixture, arrange pan on a baking sheet and bake until crust is golden and tart is bubbly, 35 to 45 minutes. Set aside to let rest for 10 minutes then cut into slices and


