# Looking back at 2013

The past year has seen a great deal of change in the Village, including the sale of Mill Creek golf course, the potential listing of the Salado salamander as endangered and growth and change in the Village government.

The Village finally got a City Manager, but saw longtime city secretary Dianna Barker leave to work for the City of Killeen this year.

City Manager Jim Reed, who contracts his services to the Village through the Central Texas Council of Governments, started work this fall after aldermen discussed the pros and cons and costs of city management since January.

He is expected to lead the Village through discussions in early 2014 that may move the city government to be housed in the Salado Civic Center. Reed may also help bring Salado closed to having a village sewer system as he works to conduct due diligence of a proposed \$3.4 millin gift from Morris Foster of a 50,000 gallon per day waste water treatment plant that might be utilized to serve downtown Salado businesses.

As citizens look back on 2013, the coming year will hold just as much in store as Saladoans ring in 2014 next week.

The Salado salamander and its possible listing by the federal government as Endangered looms as early minimal compared to the economic impact of listing the Georgetown salamander, Austin blind salamander and the Jollyville Plateau salamander.

The economic impact of listing the Salado salamander will be just \$30,000 in Bell County. Williamson County and Travis County did not get off so easy for the proposed listing of three other salamanders. The cost of protecting those species is \$29 million over a 23 year period.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) released its draft economic analysis on Jan. 25.

The Bell County stakeholders group of county and village government continued its opposition to the listing of the salamander and submitted further public comments, which contributed to the USFWS announcing in August that it was postponing a final listing of the Salado salamander until Feb. 2014.

In the meantime, US-FWS announced a grant to protect the salamander. One of this year's grants will provide the Solana Ranch Preserve with \$881,250. This funding will allow the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to acquire a conservation easement on a 256-acre tract located in Bell County to benefit the Salado salamander. The acquisition will provide protection for the species in three of the seven springs in which it is known to occur. Acquisition of the Solana Ranch Preserve will protect an area of 75 percent of the proposed critical habitat units for this species in the Service's Southwest Region.

as Feb. 2014.

The US Fish & Wildlife services (USFWS) was supposed to have a final listing announcement this fall, but postponed that listing for an additional six months to gather more data concerning the habitat of the salamander.



# **A Manufactured ADHD Epidemic**

If at any time while reading this article your attention wanders, you may have ADHD. If you pause to check your email sometime during the next three paragraphs, you should consult a doctor. If you fail to read this article all the way to the end, you should get on Adderall, Ritalin or some other drug to treat your condition as soon as possible.

This isn't quite the standard for diagnosing attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder, but it's close. The New York Times ran a long expose on how the drug industry has stoked the diagnosis and treatment of ADHD that had a revelatory quote from Keith Conners, a doctor who has long advocated for the recognition of the disorder.

Conners called the overdiagnosis of ADHD "a national disaster of dangerous proportions," telling the Times that the rising number of cases "is a concoction to justify the giving out of medication at unprecedented and unjustifiable levels." This isn't bomb-throwing from an outsider, but a critique from the namesake of the Conners ratings scale widely used to evaluate kids for ADHD.

There is no doubt that ADHD is a legitimate neurological condition that makes kids (and those around them) miserable,



that blights their potential and that can be alleviated by prescription stimulants like Adderall and Ritalin. There also is no doubt that diagnosis and treatment of the disorder has run wildly out of control. According to the forthcoming book "The ADHD Explosion," 19 percent of highschool-aged males have received a diagnosis. The numbers differ from state to state. In North Carolina, an astounding 30 percent of boys over age 9 are supposedly suffering from ADHD. Overall, 6 percent of children and adolescents in the United States are on drugs to treat ADHD.

It's a wonder more kids aren't diagnosed with it, given the overlap between the description of the disorder and failings to which we are all prone. The New York Times points out that the American Psychiatric Association criteria for ADHD include "often has difficulty waiting his or her turn" and "makes careless mistakes," hardly rare childhood behaviors.


The drug companies -- for whom ADHD is a \$9 billion-a-year business -- target mothers

with alluring ads suggesting their children will become little angels through the wonders of risk-free stimulants. Their kids will get better grades, spend more quality time with the family and remember to take out the trash. Who wouldn't want their child thus magically transformed? According to the Times report, the Food and Drug Administration has constantly rebuked the companies for going beyond the evidence in selling visions of childhood Valhalla secured through the right drug.

Undertrained primarycare physicians and worried parents default much too often to the diagnosis of ADHD and to the answer of a prescription. The next frontier is adult ADHD, with the promise of a vast new pharmaceutical market made up of people deprived of ADHD diagnoses when they were children. Some of these diagnoses will be warranted and life-changing, but others will be overreach prompted by vague and dubious symptoms, like inattentive op-ed reading. Sure, you got to the end of this article. But how about the next one?

water and spring flow, and be down by Thanksgiving exclude cattle and feral hogs.

A private developer sought and received support from the Village government for the construction of an affordable housing senior living facility. Ultimately the proposed facility failed to get the tax abatements that would have brought it to fruition. It is unclear whether the developers will attempt to reapply for abatements in the next funding cycle.

Billy Helm led a group of private investors to purchase the Mill Creek Country Club this summer. Another effort failed to purchase the course from Morris Foster, but Helm and his investors brokered a deal this summer. During the fall, the group began cleaning up the course and further work in the spring on holes that were damaged by floods. During the winter, the group will renovate and expand the grill and pro shop and pool area.

Memberships in Mill Creek have grown from 90 to about 170 members.

Work continued on the expansion of I-35 through Salado and the village has suffered this year through that transition as sales tax revenues have fallen remarkably.

The Thomas Arnold bridge will come down early in the new year. Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) and James Construction officials told an audience at a town hall meeting on the progress of construction that the bridge would

(2013). They later changed that to Dec. 16 2013 and have since changed their projected date again.

## Churches see change, growth

This has been a year of change and growth for the churches of Salado, as well.

The St. Joseph's Episcopal Church was officially consecrated by Bishop C. Andrew Doyle in April.

The Salado United Methodist Church called Rev. Lara Whitley to serve as the senior pastor after Rev. Travis Franklin left to serve as the executive director of the Methodist retreat in Glen Rose. The two announced their engagement and approaching marriage in 2014.

First Baptist Church of Salado bought property at the corner of Thomas Arnold and Church St. and renovated the buildings there for a Youth Activity Center, which they formally opened this fall. The church property was once home to the Salado United Methodist Church.

The congregation of 3C Cowboy Fellowship completed the shell of a new sanctuary this summer that will be able to seat 1,000 people. Plans continue for the interior buildout of the building.

Ray Don McIntosh began his work early in May as the Salado Church of Christ's new Family Life Minister.

Salado Presbyterian minister Carl V. Thompson marked his 40th anniversary in the ministry in June.



# **Eagles celebrate Lone Star Cup,** other successful efforts in 2013

Thanks to an Academic State Championship and third place One Act Play, a state semi-finalist baseball team and region semifinalist boys basketball team, Salado High School won the coveted UIL Lone Star Cup for the 2012-13 school year.

The Lone Star Cup was formally presented to the Eagles during the Aug. 24 Meet the Eagles to kick off the 2013-14 school year and an effort to repeat as Lone Star Cup Champions in 2A division.

After that, the Eagles

will be moving up in classification, as it was announced that Salado will compete in a new 4A division in the 2014-16 biennium. The enrollment figures for the UIL biennial realignment were announced in November. The actual realignments will be announced in February.

This is the second time in five years that Salado has won the Lone Star Cup. Points are awarded based upon the placement of athletic, music and academic at the District, Region and State levels.





Salado earned points from its boys and girls basketball teams. The girls qualified for the playoffs, while the boys won district and made it to the Region semi-final round. The Eagles lost to eventual state champions White Oak 63-44 at the Regional tournament in Nacogdoches. The Eagles also earned

athletic points from both soccer programs, which qualified for the playoffs, both golf teams and from softball and baseball teams.

The girls golf team won the State Championship with Meredith Ward earning a silver medal and the boys team placed third with Dane Hankamer earning individual gold.

The Eagles baseball team qualified for the state championship and ranked as high as #2 in the state rankings. They ran into eventual state champions Hallettsville in the semi-final round and were rudely ousted 16-3.

As a result of the deep playoff run, several Salado Eagles received All State honors in baseball.

Jon Franz was named on June 10 to the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association (THSBCA) All State Team as a First Team selection for his utility play at short stop. Franz was also picked as a utility player on the UIL 2A Baseball All-Tournament State Team for his game against the Brahmas, in which he had two hits and two runs batted in. Franz will also play on the All-Star South Team, selected as one of the very best at shortstop among Texas 1A-3A players.

Casey Frazier, who pitched his way to an

The Texas Sports Writers Association (TSWA) named three Salado Eagles to its All State Team and gave two others Honorable Mention.

Junior ace Frazier (11-1) was named to the Second Team. Franz was named to the TSWA Third Team at his shortstop position. Marshall Mann joined Franz on the TWSA All State Third Team at his position at third base.

Coby Giniewicz and Cole Haag received Honorable Mention for their play at second base and catcher, respectively.

The UIL Academic Team won its EIGHTH State Championship to add points to the Lone Star Cup tally. The team also dominated at District and

points to the tally late in the year.

The tremendous success of the Salado extra curricular activities was mirrored by reports this fall that Salado High School ranks in the top five percent of schools nationwide for college preparedness. Salado was highlighted as a top performing school in both Newsweek and U.S. New and World Report.

Because of this success, Salado schools increased enrollment by more than 120 students in the first days of school compared to the first week of 2012. That trend has continued throughout the school vear.


Salado school trustees were able to maintain the \$1.30 tax rate and the district cut spending by some one percent in the budget adopted for the current school year.

High School principal Burt Smith was named the Region 12 Principal of the Year by the Texas Associa-



Principals (TASSP). Before coming to Salado, Smith was named the 2011 Texas Association of Secondary School Principals (TASSP) Region X Principal of the Year.

Salado students returned to the school for the first day of classes and were greeted by many new faces among the staff, including Beth Aycock who began her duties as Salado Intermediate School principal on July 15. She came to Salado from Killeen ISD where she had been Curriculum Director for Killeen High School since 2010.

Aycock began her teaching career in Killeen as a history teacher in 2006. Rachel Ray was crowned Homecoming Queen this fall and Chase Manning was crowned Homecoming King during the Eagles' only win this football season against the Florence Buffs. Although the Eagles struggled on the field, quarterback McLane Carter set the record for most passing yards in a single game by a 2A quarterback. He threw 25 completions for 613 yards, the fourth most passing yards in a single Texas high school game. For the record buffs, one-time Salado quarterback Michael Richardson set the top passing yardage mark last year throwing for 725 yards for the Marble Falls Mustangs in their game with Boerne. McLane's 613 yards is the most thrown in any 2A Texas high school football game.

# Teaching Children About Climate Change



Dear EarthTalk: Do you have any tips for explaining global warming and other complex environmental problems to my kids?

-- Peter Buckley, Pittsburgh, PA

Children today may be more eco-savvy than we were at their age, but complex topics like global warming may still mystify them. Luckily there are many resources available to help parents teach their children how to understand the issues and become better stewards for the planet.

A great place to start is the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) "А Student's Guide to Global Climate Change" website. The site is divided into sections (Learn the Basics, See the Impacts, Think like a Scientist and Be Part of the Solution) so children can get just the right amount of detail without feeling overwhelmed. One feature of the site is a virtual trip around the world to see the

effects of climate change in different regions. An emissions calculator with questions tailored to a childs's lifestyles—helps connect everyday actions (like running the water while brushing teeth) and climate change. And a FAQ page answers some of the most common questions about climate change in easy-to-read short paragraphs.

Another great online resource is NASA's Climate Kids website, which engages children with games, videos and craft activities and offers digestible info on what's causing climate change and how kids can make a difference. A guided tour of the "Big Questions" (What does climate change mean? What is the greenhouse effect? How do we know the climate is changing? What is happening in the oceans? and others) uses cartoon characters and brightly colored designs to help kids come to grips with the basics.

Perhaps even more engaging for those eight and older is Cool It!, a card game from the Union of Concerned Scientists (UCS). The game, designed in collaboration with science educators, requires players to collect "solution" cards in the categories of energy, transportation and forests, while slowing opponents down by playing "problem" cards along the way. "The game enables teachers and parents to talk about global warming in a fun and hopeful way," reports UCS. "Kids, meanwhile, will learn that all of us make choices that determine whether the world warms a little or a lot, and which of those choices reduce global warming emissions." The game is available for purchase (\$7.95) directly from the UCS website.

Younger children curious about climate change can consult the Professor Sneeze website, which features online illustrated children's stories that present global warming in a familiar context. The stories for five- to eightvear-olds follow a cartoon bunny on various warming related adventures. A few of the story titles include "The Earth Has a Fever," "Where Are the Igloos of Iglooville?" and "Tears on the Other Side of the World." The site also features stories geared toward 8- to 10-year-olds and 10to 12-year-olds.

Of course, teachers can play a key role in making sure children are well versed in the science of climate change. A recently launched initiative from the National Center for Science Education (NCSE)—long respected for its work in defending

# **Can Outdoor Furniture Outlast Winter?**

THIS IS A HAMMER By Samantha Mazzotta

Q: My brother purchased new outdoor furniture for his deck this summer, some nice cedar chairs and end tables. But I'm astounded that he hasn't yet taken in or covered his new furniture yet. Even though we haven't had snow yet, the temperature change alone must be taking its

toll. Should I warn him about leaving his expensive furniture outside in winter? -- Carey in Chicopee, Mass.

A: I think warning him is a bit strong, particularly in this case. Cedar furniture designed for outdoor use can be very resilient in most weather, something the dealer may have told your brother when he purchased the set.

You can bring it up

as part of a conversation about the furniture by asking if it's all-weather, and letting your brother tell you all about it. Considering how much quality cedar furniture costs, he's likely pretty proud of his purchase.

Cedar outdoor furniture is desirable to many people. It's a durable wood, doesn't easily warp or rot, and resists insects. Unfinished cedar furniture starts out as a natural reddish color, which over time fades to gray as wind and weather season the wood. Owners who prefer the warmer reddish color can apply a wood sealer, or enhance the color using a wood stain. Paint or finishing oils aren't typically used with cedar furniture, since they can trap mois-

ture, encouraging rot. Your brother can clean his furniture a few times


