# Site work on Salado Middle School could start in Dec.

Site work on Salado Middle School could begin as early as December, according to a timeline Salado ISD Trustees discussed at their May 14 meeting. Work on the expansion of the Salado Eagle Field could begin in January 2019 and be completed in time for the 2019 football season.

Design work on the Salado Middle School will begin with site work being put out for bid in November and awarded in December. in December. Design of the building is expected to continue to January 2019 when it is put out for bids in February. Bids could be awarded in March 2019.

Work on the Middle School would begin in March 2019 and continue to July 2020 in order for the new school to open for the 2020-2021 academic year.

Design on the corridor for Thomas Arnold Elementary will begin in July. Bids will

Site work could then begin be let in January and awarded in February 2019. Work will begin May 2017 and be complete for the opening of the 2019-2020 school year.

# Sales tax rebate to Village jumps by 16.49% in May

The Village of Salado will receive a payment of \$46,475.43, which is 16.49 percent more than last May's payment of \$39,894.46.

For the year, the Village is 11.31 percent ahead of payments through May 2017. The Village has received \$207,035.66 so far in 2018 and \$185,989.82 through May

The Salado Public Library District will receive \$36,229.20 this month, an increase of 11.93 percent over last May's payment of \$32,365.25. For the year, the Library District is running 9.65 percent ahead, having received \$154,407.40 through May 2018 compared to \$140,817.89 through May 2017.

Bell County's payment of \$1.87 million is almost 7 percent of last May's payment of \$1.75 million. To-date in 2018, the county is 3 percent ahead at \$8.11 million compared to \$7.88 million through May 2017.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$861.8 million in local sales tax allocations for May, 9.4 percent more than in May 2017.

These allocations are based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers.



# S&P gains 2.41% in one week

The Markets

Our favorite stock index, the venerable Standard and Poor's 500 (SPX) turned in a respectable gain for the week ending May 11, gaining 2.41 percent to end at the memorable number of 2727.72, demonstrating an economy in numeric usage that is almost elegant. More valuable was the fact that it is now up 2.02 percent yearto-date and 14.09 percent from this time last year.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury Note, from which many loan interest rates are calculated, continued its slow but consistent rise to close the week at 2.969 percent after once more crossing the 3 percent-line mid-week. Gold, that "magnificent anachronism" ended at \$1,319.50, up 0.27 percent. West Texas Intermediate Oil (WTI) rose 1.12 percent for the week and is up over 18 percent this year and almost 43 percent for 12 months, closing out the week at \$70.57. The dollar was largely unchanged versus other currencies but remains down about 4.37 percent from a year ago.

The Economy


Unemployment at 3.9 percent remains at the lowest level in 17 years and the number of Americans applying for jobless benefits last week hovered just above 200,000, the lowest level since 1969 when our economy was a fraction of today's size. At the same time, unfilled advertised job openings rose to a record 6.6 million. In an unusual parallel, the total number of unemployed Americans almost perfectly matches the number of job openings. Unfortunately, a combination of the skills of the unemployed and their geographical locations don't match up with those openings very well.

The Labor Department announced that the Con-

wage gain from a year ago, leaving workers with only a 0.8 percent real gain on average. The Personal Consumption Index, the one preferred by the Federal Reserve as an inflation indicator, is up exactly 2.0 percent for one year; precisely what the Fed has been striving to create for several years.

Historically, an unemployment rate below 4 percent and a clear shortage of qualified workers has led to an acceleration in wages as companies begin to bid up the cost of labor in order to fill empty slots. This time around it appears that historical relationship has vanished with the emphasis on the "appears." What has actually happened does not show up well in the "averages." Jobs that can be automated or which can be outsourced to lower wage areas are seeing a lower or constant wage while those jobs that involve complex skill sets and cannot be done either by automation or someone far away have seen hefty gains in hourly earnings. Truck drivers, hair stylists, plumbers, and other workers who both need to be physically present and have extensive training and/or experience are in high demand and are seeing the bidding war for their time rise just as we have seen historically.

On another note, the Wall Street Journal's survey of private-sector economists found that 59 percent expect this economic expansion that began in 2009 and is currently the second-longest on record, to end sometime in 2020. If they are right, then by that time it will have broken all records for longevity. The good news is that there is a consensus that 2018 will likely be a good economic year and it will be late in 2019 before things start to look not-so-good. As inflation has risen,

so have interest rates and there is another consensus that two years hence interest rates will be noticeably higher. Higher interest rates because of an accelerating economy will likely cause bonds and bond funds to decline in value, while an accelerating economy is good for stocks. Given that set of circumstances, it is both mystifying and historically normal to note we are seeing retail investors withdrawing money from stock ETFs and mutual funds and then investing the proceeds in bond funds. History teaches us that as long as that is happening, the stock market is probably under-priced, and the bull market is still alive and

Speaking of stocks, first-quarter earnings have now been reported for 444 of the S&P 500 companies and the results are encouraging. 78 percent beat earnings estimates and 75 percent beat revenue estimates. Earnings (profits) are up 24.5 percent from a year ago, at least partly because of the one-time tax-cut effect, but more importantly, revenues are up 9.3 percent for one year. The companies that make up the stock market appear to be doing quite well.



# Rosenstein has botched the Mueller probe

Rod Rosenstein is doing a star turn as principled defender of the law, but he's performed abysmally as deputy attorney general, and President Donald Trump would be fully justified in firing him.

The leaked questions that special counsel Robert Mueller wants to ask Trump in a prospective deposition are, if accurate, a sign that Mueller has spun out of control on Rosenstein's

watch. The questions (drafted by Trump's legal team after consultations with Mueller's investigators) suggest a free-floating investigation of the president's motives, undertaken by a subordinate of the president. This is unlike any special counsel investigation we've ever seen and represents a significant distortion of our system.

Per the questions, Mueller wants to know how Trump reacted to news stories in The Washington Post. What he thought of FBI Director James Comey during the transition. How he feels about his attorney general.

These questions grow out of an obstruction-of-justice probe centered, as far as we can tell, on Trump's exercise of the legitimate powers of the presidency.

What makes Mueller different is that his predecessors were given the mission of investigating specific alleged crimes. As my Lowry



National Review colleague Andrew McCarthy has repeatedly pointed out, Rod Rosenstein mentioned no crimes in his initial order to Mueller, a violation of the special counsel regulations. This amorphous, wide-ranging guidance appears to have allowed Mueller to effortlessly slide from an amorphous, wide-ranging investigation into Russian meddling into an amorphous, wide-ranging investigation into obstruction of justice. (Rosenstein followed up later with a more specific memo to Mueller.) Now, judging by the leaked questions, obstruction is the lion's share of Mueller's work. Absent smoking guns that we aren't aware of (always possible), this is bizarre and disproportionate. We now have an extensive obstruction investigation carried out by investigators who haven't been obstructed. There's been an intense focus, for instance, on Trump's Oval Office discussion with then-FBI Director Comey about going easy on Michael Flynn. But as Andy McCarthy also notes, no one went easy on Flynn, who pled guilty to

lying to the FBI.

says the president can't be indicted. If Mueller takes heed, he is limited to indicting underlings and writing reports on his findings, with Congress the most import-

This means Mueller is, in effect, the lead investigative counsel for a prospective House impeachment committee. It's an important position, just not one that should be housed within the executive branch.

Rod Rosenstein is ultimately responsible for the state of this investigation. On the merits, he should be fired and replaced by someone willing to exercise proper oversight of the special counsel.

A more practical lever would be to push for Rosenstein to recuse himself. As a party to the firing of James Comey, he shouldn't be overseeing a probe in which he's a witness.

To this point, the White House posture toward the Mueller investigation has been to cooperate and hope it goes away, when a root-and-branch legal and constitutional challenge to Mueller's work is now what's called for.

Surely, Mueller will want to ask questions about such an effort, too -- because he's the unbounded investigatory ombudsman of the Trump era.


Game one will be 7 p.m. May 18. Game two will be 11 a.m. May 19 with game three, if necessary, to follow game two.



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

# District pays teachers above state minimum SISD trustees approve pay scale, teaching contracts

Salado school trustees set the compensation plan for the district at their May 14 meeting.

According to the SISD compensation plan, a teacher with no experience and a bachelor's degree is paid \$41,000. The local annual pay increases by about \$482 per year until year 20. The district pay then increases by about \$334 per year through year 38.

The state minimum is \$28,080. It increases by \$600 or more each year through year 20 when there are no more step increases.

A Salado ISD teacher with a bachelor's degree and 20 years of experience is paid \$52,787. The state minimum pay for the same teacher experience is \$45,510.

A Salado ISD teacher with a bachelor's degree and 30 years of experience is paid \$56,128. The state minimum for the same experience is \$45,510.

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

convinced our government to tax the paper that is used in newspapers, books and other publications. The rest of the industry opposes this new tax.

Now, increased paper costs is threatening thousands of jobs in the printing and publishing industry. Is this how our trade laws should be used?





# **CTAS Public Star Parties**

**CTAS** THE CENTRAL TEXAS Astronomical Society (CTAS) will host public star parties on Saturday, May 19, from 8:15 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. These free events will be held at Overlook Park near the Stillhouse Hollow Lake dam outside Belton, and at the Hubbard City Lakes Park in Hubbard. CTAS members will provide telescopes for public viewing. Guests are also welcome to bring their own telescopes or binoculars.

In May, we are still able to look out of the plane of the galaxy during the evening. This makes other galaxies available for observation. Look for the two trios in Leo (M95/M96/M105 and M65/M66/NGC 3628). Also easily visible is M81 (Bode's Galaxy) and M82 (Cigar Galaxy) in Ursa Major.

Also visible in May are several globular clusters. M3 in Canes Venatici, one

of the largest, brightest clusters in the sky, was discovered in 1764 and the first object in the Messier catalog discovered by Charles Messier himself. In the constellation Hercules is M92 and the larger, brighter M13 (Great Hercules Cluster).

Venus is the evening star and is easily visible in the west even before the sun sets. Jupiter will rise in the east in the evening. Jupiter was at opposition on the night of May 8-9 so it should still be quite bright and large to view. Unfortunately Mars, Saturn, and Mercury are all visible in the morning for now. The moon will be a thin crescent in the western sky this weekend.

We will look at these and various other celestial objects this month. Please check our website, http:// www.centexastronomy.org, for directions to the site close to you and for more information. If this event is cancelled due to weather, a cancellation notice will be posted by 5 p.m. on the CTAS website. You may register online for this event and receive monthly notices of our future

Participants may want to bring a small flashlight (preferably with a red filter) to get around the parking lot and viewing area and a lawn chair to make viewing more comfortable. You will most likely want a light jacket/hoodie or even a heavy coat. With the possibility of wind coming off the lake, always dress for colder weather than you

# Contract Bridge

A declarer occasionally becomes so engrossed with trying to make the maximum number of tricks in a particular suit that he loses sight of the far more important goal of making the contract.

For example, take this deal where West leads a low club against three notrump. Declarer plays low from dummy, losing to the king, whereupon East shifts to the ten of hearts.

It does not matter what South does on this trick -- the damage has already been done. His ace of hearts is forced out, and whenever South gets around to leading diamonds,



South can make the contract very easily by taking the ace of clubs at trick one and immediately establishing four diamond tricks. The most he can then lose against any distribution of the cards is the ace of diamonds and three clubs.

Going up with the ace of clubs at trick one should not be a hard play to make, since nine tricks are then certain. Nevertheless, many declarers would automatically play low from dummy on the opening trick without giving the matter much thought.


The more cautious declarers would not risk losing the contract in order to try to gain an extra club trick or two by playing low from dummy. Rather, they would recognize that the contract was assured if they put up the ace, and would proceed accordingly.





# This frog lays eggs on land skips tadpole phase

As a rule, frogs are thought to be differentiated from toads (among other things) by the fact that frogs typically live in permanent bodies of water while the habitats that toads select is less restrictive. However, even in the natural world, there are exceptions to the rules, and one such case of rebellion is a small frog that has adapted quite well to life away from bodies of water

The Cliff Chirping Frog (Eleutherodactylus marnockii) belongs to a frog genus that has three representatives here in Texas, and it has the largest distribution of the group by a considerable amount. This particular variety occurs throughout most of the Edwards Plateau westward to the eastern edges of the Chihuahuan Desert. It is in these eco-regions that it resides almost exclusively within the humid cracks and crevices of limestone canyon walls and hillsides. It can occasionally be observed underneath fallen trees and rocks, as well as

trash and other human debris. Outside of Texas it can be observed in the border states of northern Mexico.

This small species of anuran can be quite variable in appearance with a ground color that varies from tan to gray to even greenish. Along the backside there are small, dark markings that are spaced randomly, forming reticulate lines and patterns. The head is similarly colored to the back and ends in a sharply pointed snout. The tympanum, or ear, is quite large, almost the same size as the dark eyes. The back legs are long and spindly and are patterned with faint bars. The front legs are also scrawny, and are used extensively as this frog prefers to crawl rather than hop. The toes are unwebbed and have tiny toepads. The skin is mostly smooth and slimy and the hip bones protrude along the backside, giving this frog the appearance of being in the throes of starvation.

As stated already, this species is rather minute with mature individuals seldom approaching one and one half inches in body length. There is virtually no difference in size between the sexes.

Breeding activities take place in the late winter months and can continue through the spring if the weather conditions are optimal. Males call the females with a series of trills and chirps (hence the common name) that sound akin to a deeper serenade of a cricket. Once mating occurs, females will lay a small (particularly by amphibian standards) clutch of eggs. Unlike most other species of amphibians that occur in Texas, Cliff Chirping Frogs do not undergo a typical amphibian metamorphosis. Rather than adults laying eggs in a body of semi-permanent or permanent body of water, females will deposit the eggs in the most humid areas of its subterranean habitat. It is in these moist egg casings that the young develop into tiny froglets – they skip the entire swimming tadpole stage. Once they hatch, the diminutive froglets will be replicas of the adults, save a

small tailbud. Cliff Chirping Frogs are alert and shy, and are rarely seen unless a concentrated effort is made to locate them. Unlike most frogs which will rely on their leaping prowess to evade predators, this species prefers to walk or crawl quickly into the safety that their limestone crevices provide. They are heard far more frequently than they are seen. Although rarely observed, at least visually, they are not rare, and population dynamics appear to be quite stable.
