Water Corporation to make improvements in service area

Salado Water Supply Corporation has applied for financial assistance for improvements to its existing system to the USDA, Rural Utilities Service.

As required by the National Environmental Policy Act, the Rural Utilities Service has prepared an Environmental Assessment that evaluated the potential environmental effects and consequences of the proposed project.

The Environmental Assessment is available for public review and comment at this time.

The proposed improvements to the existing Salado WSC system consists of installing transmission lines to allow for the movement of needed water from the and 12 inch pipes will be approximately 24 inches wide and 36 inches deep. The impacts to the local environment will be short in duration. Topsoil will be stripped and stored for use on the effected construction area. The affected area will then be re-vegetated with native grasses. The proposed transmission lines will transport water from the well field to the elevated storage facilities.

Alternative routes for the proposed piping in the service area were considered and determined not to be feasible. Installing the pipes along the roads through the middle of the Village of Salado would disrupt commerce, traffic patterns, and existing utilities. This route would require a larger expenditure of capital and affect sensitive creeks in the Vilalge. 

Presidential hopefuls see polls do flip-flop over divvying up surplus

Take Heart! With heart disease being the number one cause of death in this country, and stroke the number three cause, a new initiative has been set up to prevent and better treat these devastating diseases.

The initiative, created by the American Heart Association and called Take Heart 2000, is designed to educate candidates and elected officials about critical heart and stroke issues, including the need for increased federal research funding.

"We cannot win the fight against heart disease and stroke without the help of candidates and elected officials," says American

Heart Association Chairman of the Board William J. Bryant. "It takes more than talk to save lives. It takes heart, commitment and action.'

According to the Association, the fight against heart disease and stroke cannot be won without additional funding for heart and stroke research.

Past investments have led to a number of medical advances and has improved the quality of life for many Americans. Despite these advances, one in five Americans has heart disease, stroke or other forms of cardiovascular disease.

Aging parents have always been a cause of concern for their children. As our loved ones grow older, they become more prone to falling ill. For many of us, this brings about a sense of feeling powerless as we see our parents lose their abilities to fight off illnesses quickly. But while there is little we can do to help our elders once they fall ill, a there is a way we can help reduce how often they get

sick. A recent study found that a carefully regimented disinfecting program together with regular handwashing can help reduce the rate of respiratory infections. The study, conducted over the span of two years and published in the February edition of the American Journal of Infection Control, indicated that a reduction in upper-respiratory tract infections, which could lead to serious complications in the institutionalized elderly, may result when a proper disinfection regimen is employed in Long Term Care Facilities. Overall, the study recorded a decrease of 25 percent in the number of upper-respiratory in-



Chicken pox can and should be prevented

Chicken pox. The mere mention of it can make a person's skin crawl. For generations, chicken pox has been considered a normal, if uncomfortable, part of a childhood, almost a rite of passage.

Although chicken pox is a common disease, it should not be taken lightly. Chicken pox, or varicella, is a highly contagious viral disease that most often strikes children. It causes fever and those itchy skin lesions that torment about four million people each year. However, many people do not realize that chicken pox also can lead to serious complications or even death.

About 9,300 people, mostly children, are hospitalized each year for complications resulting from chicken pox. About 100 die. Skin infections are the most common complication, leading to scars or even serious illness. Other serious problems that may result from chicken pox include swelling of the brain,

pneumonia, ear infections and loss of muscle coordination. The risk of developing severe infections from chicken pox increases as people get older.

The good news is that a relatively new vaccine is available to inoculate children and adults against the disease. The Food and Drug Administration approved the varicella vaccine in 1995 for use in individuals at least 12 months of age who have not previously had chicken pox.

Effective August 1, 2000, the state of Texas requires the varicella vaccine for children who have not previously been diagnosed with chicken pox. The varicella vaccine (or proof of past chicken pox infection) will be a school requirement for two age groups: (1) children ages 12 months through five years who were born after Sept. 2, 1994; and (2) children 12 years old or older who were born between Sept. 2, 1988 and Sept. 2, 1994.

Children ages six

through 11 years (during the 2000-2001 school year) will not be affected by the requirement until they turn 12 years of age. In addition, children who were born before Sept. 2, 1988 (i.e., children 13 years of age and older during the 2000-2001 school year), will not be affected by the requirement. For more information, log onto the Texas Department of Health website at http:// www.tdh.state.tx.us/immunize/uparch/w00faq.htm. Even if a child is not re-

quired to receive varicella vaccine, the physicians of the Texas Medical Association recommend parents vaccinate their children against chicken pox if they are at least 12 months of age and have never had the disease. The vaccine provides a high level of protection against both chicken pox and shingles, a painful rash illness also caused by the varicella virsus. The protection lasts about 20 years and is 80 percent effective. In the event that a child does develop chicken

The vaccine not only makes good health sense, but also good economic sense. The cost of the varicella vaccine is relatively low, costing up to \$80 per dose, although many children qualify for free or reduced-cost vaccines. When compared to the high cost of missed work, doctor visits and possible hospitalization, the varicella vaccine is a bargain. A study published in 1994 estimated that routine use of the vaccine would save \$384 million per year in the United

ricella vaccine is far from routine. Fewer than half of the nation's youngsters are being vaccinated, according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The physicians of the **Texas Medical Association** urge parents to take chicken pox seriously and vaccinate their children against the

including a weak but rapid pulse and fast, shallow breathing. If someone demonstrates these signs, get him or her to a cool, dry environment immediately and provide plenty of fluids. If someone with heat exhaustion is not treated, the illness can progress to heat stroke.

"In most all of the heat related catastrophes with kids, if you go back to the parents or the adults who were with them,...they say, "I never thought that would happen," says Dr. Racht. The physicians of the Texas Medical Association urge parents to take precautions with their children, also they won't have to regret decisions they made in the heat of the moment.

Heat related illnesses are compounded by lack of fluids

As the temperature soars across the state of Texas, so does the number of unnecessary illnesses and deaths related to the heat. Infants and young children, in particular, are vulnerable to heat related illnesses.

"Infants and children often don't have the ability to get to hydration or to get out of the heat, and those are two normal responses adults would have when we get hot," says Dr. Edward Racht, medical director for Austin's EMS services. "When we get thirsty, we go to the refrigerator and get something to drink or go to the water fountain. Infants and children just can't do that. Similarly, they can't get themselves out of a hot environment."

The physicians of the **Texas Medical Association** recommend that families take several precautions during hot weather to protect their children from heat related illnesses


Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, not even for a minute. The temperature inside a parked car can soar into triple digits within minutes, literally baking a baby. "It's never appropriate to leave children in the car when you go into a building, even if it's just to drop something off," says Dr. Racht. Similarly, avoid leaving an infant or a small child in a sunroom or other enclosed structure.

Make sure babies and children drink plenty of fluids. Heat related illnesses,


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Booster Club elected officers for 2000-2001 school year



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The Amazing Peppy Blount

Tumbleweed Smith

R. E. Blount lives in Longview. His nickname is Peppy. "To tell you the absolute truth, my mother called me Precious," says Peppy. "I tried to say Precious and it came out Peppy. So I've been Peppy ever since."

Peppy grew up in Big Spring and was active in sports. During his years at Texas University he played on championship teams in Cotton, Orange and Sugar Bowls. He played professional football with the Chicago Bears.

"Coach George Halas paid me \$500 to sign a \$7,500 a year contract, which was more money than I had ever seen."

Peppy went into the Army right after graduation from high school in 1943 and became a pilot. He had an impressive war record before entering college. So, here he was a war hero and

super college football player, so someone suggested he run for the state legislature. At the age of 21, he became the youngest person ever elected to that office and represented **Big Spring and San Angelo** six years.

In the 1940's he was in Chicago attending a National Council of Governments convention and managed to get on a popular nationwide morning radio "It was Don show. McNeil's Breakfast Club, a very entertaining program that everybody listened to. I got up at 5 a.m. and hiked myself down to the show, which was in the largest building in the world at the time. I filled out a card and told about myself being from Big Spring, the youngest state representative, and how I sat in the legislature during the week and played football for Texas on weekends.

"They take all these

"Don asked me where Big Spring was located. I told him thank you, Don, I thought you would never ask. To get a patent on a new invention, it was necessary, from 1836-1880, to make an actual model to present to the U.S. Patent Office. Several hundred thousand models were eventually stored with the government. In 1907, 1,061 models were given to the Smithsonian Institution, 3,000 models were sold for a total of \$62.18, and the rest remained in storage.

In an economy move in 1925, more models were sold. The Smithsonian took another 2,500, museums took 2,600, and 50,000 were sold for \$1,550. The remaining 125,000 crates were sold, unopened for \$6,540. That collection was bought and sold several times. In 1942, it was purchased by O. Rundle Gil-





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

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UMHB adds Master of Theological Studies

University of Mary Hardin-Baylor began fall 2000 with a new masters program called Master of Theological Studies.

Religion Department Chair Dr. Stephen Von Wyrick said that the new program is designed to provide graduate theological education for individuals who are engaged in Christian Ministry and for persons who seek a graduate theological degree that will prepare them for a life time of theological inquiry.

"The Department of Religion believes that a core of knowledge and experience is common to every area of Christian ministry. The M.T.S. is built upon that core. Therefore, the program of study shall (1) educate and equip women and men for effective Christian leadership and Christian service; (2) promote theological inquiry and reflection; (3) encourage a lifetime commitment to the mission of the local congregation," said Dr. Wyrick.

Specifics about the new program:

Length of the Program The Master of Theologi-

cal Studies (M.T.S.) degree normally requires two academic years of full-time study. Applicants admitted with prior extensive undergraduate studies in religion may complete the program with one year of full-time course work, in addition to the comprehensive exam.

A student has, however, up track, the applicant must dent possesses the required to five years after enrollment to complete all requirements for the degree.

Program Location

Courses for the (M.T.S.) degree will be taught on the campus of the UMHB.

Admission Requirements

Admission requirements to the M.T.S. program require the student to demonstrate appropriate levels of experience in the areas of academic preparation, personal growth, and spiritual maturity.

Applicants must hold a baccalaureate degree from an institution accredited by an agency recognized by the Commission on Higher Education Accreditation or holding membership in the Association of Universities and Colleges in Canada, or the educational equivalent.

Applicants must submit an application for admission and three Letters of Recommendation: one letter from the applicant's home church, and two letters from individuals who have knowledge of the applicant.

Accelerated Program

Applicants with a strong undergraduate background in theological studies may complete the program with one year of full-time course work, in addition to the comprehensive exam.

Texas Forest Services warns we're facing a dangerous fire season



James M. Davis Extension County Agent

Due to the ongoing drought condition, there is extreme fire danger over much of the state. The Texas Forest Service was extremely successful in reducing the loss of property and lives in the 9,400 fires that occurred during the 1998 drought due to pre-

positioning of large amounts of fire fighting equipment and utilization of some 5,000 fire fighters from out of state. These assets will not be available this summer due to the overwhelming amounts of fire in the western United States and the tinder dry conditions over much of the south. While it appears we may be able to access a few helicopters from Oklahoma and Louisiana, we will face this fire season almost exclusively with the assets of Texas agencies.

It is the opinion of the **Texas Forest Service that** we are facing a very dangerous fire season, and within two weeks without major changes in the weather, we will be in Stage 3 wildfire alert over two thirds of the state. Stage 3 is a period when the capacity of local and volunteer fire departments is exceeded and major mobilization and assistance from the Texas Forest Service will be required. In Stages 3, TFS deploys assets (helicopters, bulldozers, fixed wing air-

craft, radio communications, etc.), to centers around the state in eminent danger from wildfire in order to be close enough to assist local firefighters. The first deployment will be in or near Abilene, Decatur and Waco.

Under the present conditions, fires can be expected to exhibit explosive behavior. They will grow bigger, burn more intense and be more threatening than what has been experienced to date. Fires of those type will require more fire fighting resources to control and they will need to arrive on the fire sooner to try and keep it at a manageable size.

Bell County and many Central Texas counties are under an outdoor burn until further notice.

Extension programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national orgin or disability.


