Water Corporation to make improvements in service area

Salado Water Supply Corporation has applied for financial assistance for improvements to its existing system to the USDA, Rural Utilities Service.

As required by the National Environmental Policy Act, the Rural Utilities Service has prepared an Environmental Assessment that evaluated the potential environmental effects and consequences of the proposed project.

The Environmental Assessment is available for public review and comment at this time.

The proposed improvements to the existing Salado WSC system consists of installing transmission lines to allow for the movement of needed water from the existing well field to the elevated storage facilities. The proposed distribution system improvements include the construction of approximately 23,000 linear feet of 12-inch and 8,500 linear feet of 8-inch PVC pipeline. The proposed pipelines will cross prime farmland, flood zones, and wetlands in some areas.

An on-site inspection was made of all areas of the proposed construction. Proposed installations will result in minimal impact to the environmental resources of the area. The proposed ditches for the 8

and 12 inch pipes will be approximately 24 inches wide and 36 inches deep. The impacts to the local environment will be short in duration. Topsoil will be stripped and stored for use on the effected construction area. The affected area will then be re-vegetated with native grasses. The proposed transmission lines will transport water from the well field to the elevated storage facilities.

Alternative routes for the proposed piping in the service area were considered and determined not to be feasible. Installing the pipes along the roads through the middle of the Village of Salado would disrupt commerce, traffic patterns, and existing utilities. This route would require a larger expenditure of capital and affect sensitive creeks in the Village. A route around the western side of the City would be a longer route than proposed and affect a larger area.

Helen Epstein is an author and cultural journalist with a special interest in music and the cultural history of Europe. Her books include *Where She Came From: A Daughter's Search for her Mother's History*, which was declared a notable book of 1997 by the New York Times.

Her seminar on "The Uses of Historical Memory" will be 10 a.m.-3 p.m. at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall. Her lecture on "The Importance of Where My Mother

Came From" begins 4 p.m. Oct. 8 at Creekside Banquet Hall.

Luis Alberto Urrea has written *The Fever of Being*, a collection of poems that won the Western States Book Award. His *nobody's sons: notes from an american life*, is a collection of essays that won the American Book Award in 1998.

He will give a seminar on 10 a.m.-3 p.m. Oct. 21 at the Allen Hall: "Nobody's Son: Life on the Border of My Heart." He will lecture Oct. 22: "The Hummingbird of God: Teresita Urrea, the Saint of Cabora."

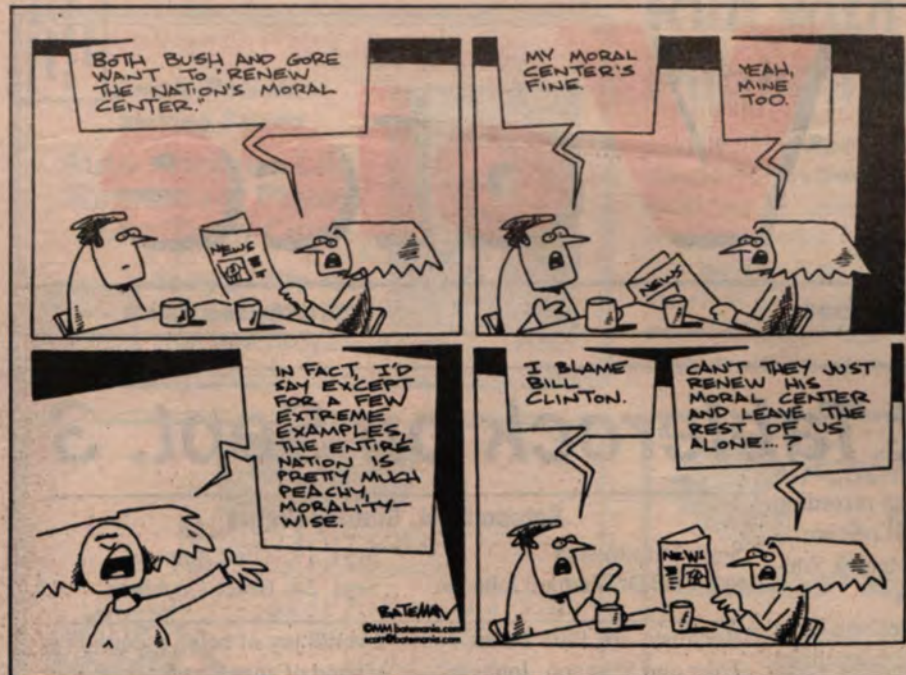
Thomas R. Cole is Professor at the Institute for the Medical Humanities at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

Presidential hopefuls see polls do flip-flop over divvying up surplus

It takes more than talk to save lives...it takes research

Take Heart! With heart disease being the number one cause of death in this country, and stroke the number three cause, a new initiative has been set up to prevent and better treat these devastating diseases.

The initiative, created by the American Heart Association and called *Take Heart 2000*, is designed to educate candidates and elected officials about critical heart and stroke issues, including the need for increased federal research funding.

"We cannot win the fight against heart disease and stroke without the help of candidates and elected officials," says American

Heart Association Chairman of the Board William J. Bryant. "It takes more than talk to save lives. It takes heart, commitment and action."

According to the Association, the fight against heart disease and stroke cannot be won without additional funding for heart and stroke research.

Past investments have led to a number of medical advances and has improved the quality of life for many Americans. Despite these advances, one in five Americans has heart disease, stroke or other forms of cardiovascular disease.

Cardiovascular diseases will cost this country an es-

timated \$327 billion in 2000, more than any other disease, and will kill more Americans than the next seven leading causes of death combined.

According to a recent poll, increasing heart and stroke research funding is supported by the majority of Americans. The poll found that 73 percent of Americans said it was very important for Congress to increase funding for heart research, and 66 percent thought it was very important for Congress to increase funding for stroke research.

The American Heart Association's more than four million volunteers are

joining together to encourage candidates and elected officials to pledge their support for increasing federal funding for heart and stroke research.

"It is important that Americans join our effort to help educate candidates and elected officials about the importance of increasing heart and stroke research funding. People should ask their candidates where they stand on this important issue," says Bryant.

Keeping your loved ones healthy begins with hand washing and disinfecting

Aging parents have always been a cause of concern for their children. As our loved ones grow older, they become more prone to falling ill. For many of us, this brings about a sense of feeling powerless as we see our parents lose their abilities to fight off illnesses quickly. But while there is little we can do to help our elders once they fall ill, a new study has found that there is a way we can help reduce how often they get sick.

A recent study found that a carefully regimented disinfecting program together with regular handwashing can help reduce the rate of respiratory infections. The study, conducted over the span of two years and published in the February edition of the *American Journal of Infec-*

tion Control, indicated that a reduction in upper-respiratory tract infections, which could lead to serious complications in the institutionalized elderly, may result when a proper disinfection regimen is employed in Long Term Care Facilities. Overall, the study recorded a decrease of 25 percent in the number of upper-respiratory infections.

The elderly, especially those in a Long Term Care Facility, are more prone to falling ill. They have a lower level of immunity, and their closer level of contact means that viruses can spread very quickly, from one person to another. It is therefore very important to regularly disinfect and wash hands to stem the spread of viruses.

Cold causing germs like

the Rhinovirus are spread principally through contact with the contaminated hands of a person with a cold, or contact with surfaces and objects touched by these people. The virus is unsuspectingly picked up on the hands and then introduced to the eyes and nose. Through regular hand washing, germs are routinely removed from hands, while disinfecting surfaces reduces the chances of picking up new viruses.

Bart Astor, the author of *"The Baby Boomer's Guide to Caring for Aging Parents"* notes that cleanliness with the exception of truly unlivable spaces, is an issue many people overlook when choosing a care facility for their parents. "Many believe that all homes are the same and therefore focus on other issues such as

costs and medicare policies," he says. "But not all homes are the same. When choosing a home, you want to choose one that has the highest standards of cleanliness and that uses a regular disinfection program. They will give your parents and loved ones a head start in staying healthy in their later years."

The results of the study however, are applicable beyond in Long Term Care Facilities. They are applicable to the home environment as well, through a proper disinfection and hand washing regimen. Rhinovirus and other cold causing viruses that cause upper respiratory tract infection may be contained and help reduce the spread of the virus in the home.

Chicken pox can and should be prevented

Chicken pox. The mere mention of it can make a person's skin crawl. For generations, chicken pox has been considered a normal, if uncomfortable, part of a childhood, almost a rite of passage.

Although chicken pox is a common disease, it should not be taken lightly. Chicken pox, or varicella, is a highly contagious viral disease that most often strikes children. It causes fever and those itchy skin lesions that torment about four million people each year. However, many people do not realize that chicken pox also can lead to serious complications or even death.

About 9,300 people, mostly children, are hospitalized each year for complications resulting from chicken pox. About 100 die. Skin infections are the most common complication, leading to scars or even serious illness. Other serious problems that may result from chicken pox include swelling of the brain,

pneumonia, ear infections and loss of muscle coordination. The risk of developing severe infections from chicken pox increases as people get older.

The good news is that a relatively new vaccine is available to inoculate children and adults against the disease. The Food and Drug Administration approved the varicella vaccine in 1995 for use in individuals at least 12 months of age who have not previously had chicken pox.

Effective August 1, 2000, the state of Texas requires the varicella vaccine for children who have not previously been diagnosed with chicken pox. The varicella vaccine (or proof of past chicken pox infection) will be a school requirement for two age groups: (1) children ages 12 months through five years who were born after Sept. 2, 1994; and (2) children 12 years old or older who were born between Sept. 2, 1988 and Sept. 2, 1994.

Children ages six

through 11 years (during the 2000-2001 school year) will not be affected by the requirement until they turn 12 years of age. In addition, children who were born before Sept. 2, 1988 (i.e., children 13 years of age and older during the 2000-2001 school year), will not be affected by the requirement. Even if a child is not required to receive varicella vaccine, the physicians of the Texas Medical Association recommend parents vaccinate their children against chicken pox if they are at least 12 months of age and have never had the disease. The vaccine provides a high level of protection against both chicken pox and shingles, a painful rash illness also caused by the varicella virus. The protection lasts about 20 years and is 80 percent effective. In the event that a child does develop chicken

pox after being vaccinated, the infection will be much less severe.

The vaccine not only makes good health sense, but also good economic sense. The cost of the varicella vaccine is relatively low, costing up to \$80 per dose, although many children qualify for free or reduced-cost vaccines. When compared to the high cost of missed work, doctor visits and possible hospitalization, the varicella vaccine is a bargain. A study published in 1994 estimated that routine use of the vaccine would save \$384 million per year in the United States.

However, use of the varicella vaccine is far from routine. Fewer than half of the nation's youngsters are being vaccinated, according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The physicians of the Texas Medical Association urge parents to take chicken pox seriously and vaccinate their children against the disease.

Heat related illnesses are compounded by lack of fluids

As the temperature soars across the state of Texas, so does the number of unnecessary illnesses and deaths related to the heat. Infants and young children, in particular, are vulnerable to heat related illnesses.

"Infants and children often don't have the ability to get to hydration or to get out of the heat, and those are two normal responses adults would have when we get hot," says Dr. Edward Racht, medical director for Austin's EMS services. "When we get thirsty, we go to the refrigerator and get something to drink or go to the water fountain. Infants and children just can't do that. Similarly, they can't get themselves out of a hot environment."

The physicians of the Texas Medical Association recommend that families take several precautions during hot weather to protect their children from heat related illnesses.

Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, not even for a minute. The temperature inside a parked car can soar into triple digits within minutes, literally baking a baby. "It's never appropriate to leave children in the car when you go into a building, even if it's just to drop something off," says Dr. Racht. Similarly, avoid leaving an infant or a small child in a sunroom or other enclosed structure.

Make sure babies and children drink plenty of fluids. Heat related illnesses,

such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke, are compounded by a lack of fluids. When people become dehydrated, they lose the ability to sweat and cool down their bodies. "Once the outside temperature exceeds the body temperature, we lose most of our heat by sweating, so the inability to sweat can be catastrophic," says Dr. Racht. If parents are thirsty, chances are their children could also use a beverage.

What are the warning signs of heat illness? A person suffering from heat exhaustion may look pale, feel weak or tired, dizzy or nauseous, sweat profusely, and experience muscle cramps. He or she may also demonstrate other warning signs,

including a weak but rapid pulse and fast, shallow breathing. If someone demonstrates these signs, get him or her to a cool, dry environment immediately and provide plenty of fluids. If someone with heat exhaustion is not treated, the illness can progress to heat stroke.

"In most all of the heat related catastrophes with kids, if you go back to the parents or the adults who were with them,...they say, 'I never thought that would happen,'" says Dr. Racht. The physicians of the Texas Medical Association urge parents to take precautions with their children, also they won't have to regret decisions they made in the heat of the moment.



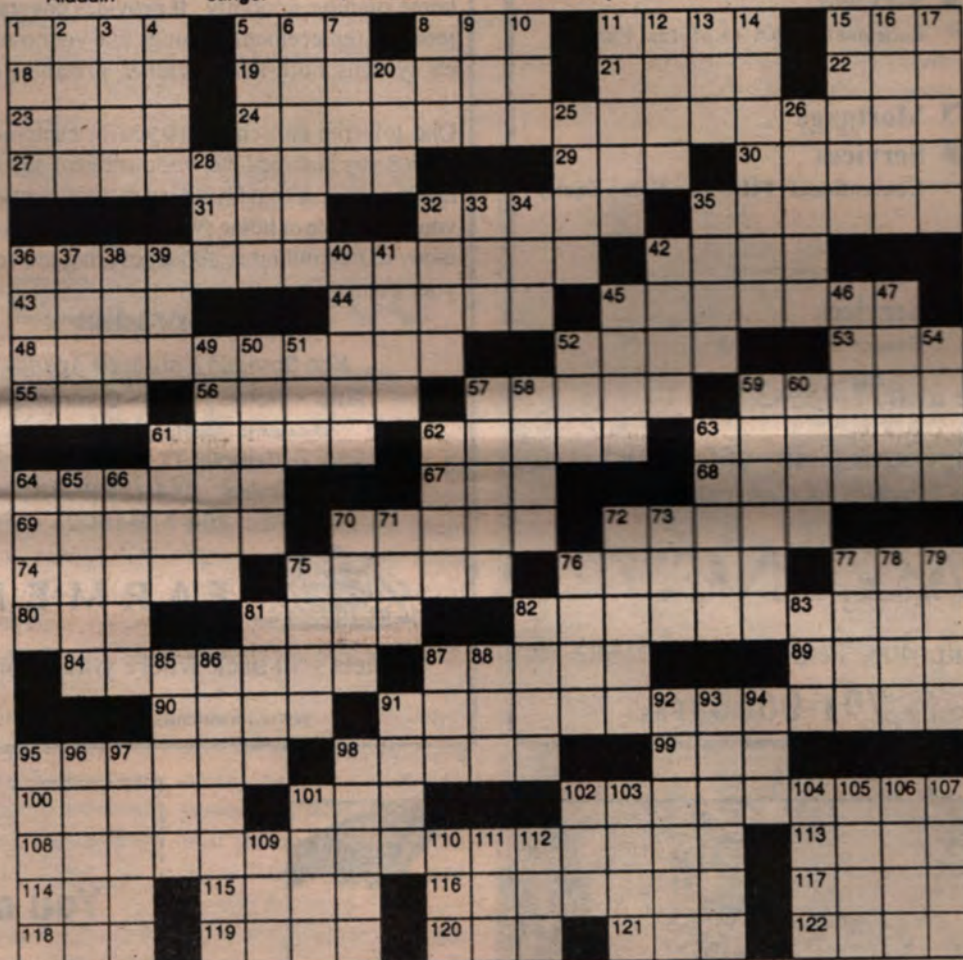

2 tbsps. butter or margarine
3 medium leeks or onions, sliced
1 cup cooked, diced chicken or turkey
1/2 lb. bacon, cooked and crumbled
1 egg white
4 oz. Gruyere or Swiss cheese, thinly sliced
4 eggs
1 egg yolk
1 cup milk or buttermilk
1 cup sour cream or whipping cream
1 tsp. sugar
1/4 tsp. grated nutmeg
1/8 tsp. Escoffier sauce or steak sauce
Salt and freshly ground pepper
3 medium tomatoes, peeled, very thinly sliced
Minced parsley

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Fit pastry into quiche and bake 5 min. Set aside. Melt butter over medium high heat in large skillet. Add leeks and saute until very soft. Stir in chicken in bacon. Remove from heat and set aside. Beat egg white slightly and brush over pie shell. Spread leek mixture evenly over crust and cover with cheese. Combine eggs, yolk, milk, cream, sugar, nutmeg and sauce with salt and pepper to taste in medium bowl and beat thoroughly with whisk. Carefully pour into pie shell. Arrange tomatoes over top. Bake 12 minutes. Immediately reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake an additional 45 to 60 min., or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Yield: 8 servings.

1 (3 1/2 oz.) pkg. instant vanilla pudding
1 1/3 c. water
1/4 c. vegetable oil
1 c. chopped pecans

4 eggs, room temp.
2 c. coconut

Frosting:
4 T. butter, divided
1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
3 1/2 c. confectioners' sugar

2 c. coconut
2 tsp. milk

In a large bowl, blend cake mix with pudding mix, water, eggs and oil. Beat at medium speed for 3 minutes. Stir in coconut and nuts. Pour into 3 greased and floured 8-inch cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes, or until cake springs back when touched in center. Cool in pans for 10 minutes. Remove rack to complete cooling.

Frosting: Melt 2 tablespoons butter in skillet; add coconut and stir constantly over low heat until golden brown. Spread coconut on paper towel to cool. Cream remaining butter with cream cheese, milk and vanilla. Add sugar, beating well to blend. Stir in 1 1/2 cups of the toasted coconut. Frost between layers, then top and sides of cake. Sprinkle remaining coconut over cake.

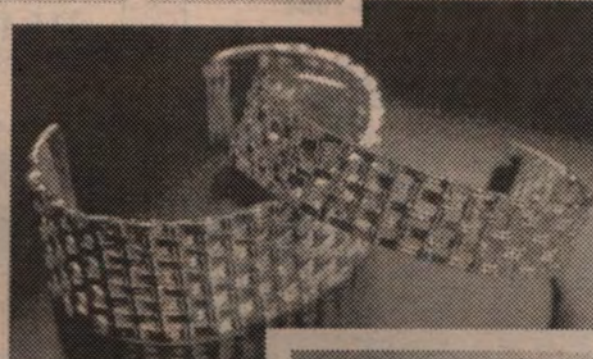

The Amazing Peppy Blount

R. E. Blount lives in Longview. His nickname is Peppy. "To tell you the absolute truth, my mother called me Precious," says Peppy. "I tried to say Precious and it came out Peppy. So I've been Peppy ever since."

Peppy grew up in Big Spring and was active in sports. During his years at Texas University he played on championship teams in Cotton, Orange and Sugar Bowls. He played professional football with the Chicago Bears.

"Coach George Halas paid me \$500 to sign a \$7,500 a year contract, which was more money than I had ever seen."

Peppy went into the Army right after graduation from high school in 1943 and became a pilot. He had an impressive war record before entering college. So, here he was a war hero and

super college football player, so someone suggested he run for the state legislature. At the age of 21, he became the youngest person ever elected to that office and represented Big Spring and San Angelo six years.

In the 1940's he was in Chicago attending a National Council of Governments convention and managed to get on a popular nationwide morning radio show. "It was Don McNeil's Breakfast Club, a very entertaining program that everybody listened to. I got up at 5 a.m. and hiked myself down to the show, which was in the largest building in the world at the time. I filled out a card and told about myself being from Big Spring, the youngest state representative, and how I sat in the legislature during the week and played football for Texas on weekends.

"They take all these

cards audience members have filled out and look at them to select people to be interviewed by Don McNeil. So when the show started, they were looking for Peppy Blount.

"Don asked me where Big Spring was located. I told him thank you, Don, I thought you would never ask. Big Spring, the main spring of West Texas, is a thriving little metropolis centrally located halfway between Fort Worth and El Paso, Texas with a population of 18,106 not counting the cattle. But to be more specific, Big Spring is located at the convergence of Mustang and Elbow Draws, which, when it rains, flows in a mighty torrent some 40 miles to the east into the Colorado River, which in turn meanders and flows on down through the great state of Texas, eventually forming the gulf of Mexico.

"I'll tell you, from that moment on, he kept coming

back to me during the program and everybody in West Texas heard it and it was as good as catching a pass for Texas because everytime I caught a pass on the field my team mates would tell me that was worth 5,000 votes, Pep, you just did great there."

Peppy went to law school, got a job with an oil company and moved to Longview. In 1962 he was elected Gregg County Judge on a write-in-vote. "I announced on Sunday, campaigned on Monday and was elected on Tuesday."

Peppy Blount is an impressive figure. Wherever he goes, he draws a crowd. He wrote a book about his war experiences titled "We Band of Brothers." It has just been reprinted by Eakin Press.

Antiques and more antiques

To get a patent on a new invention, it was necessary, from 1836-1880, to make an actual model to present to the U.S. Patent Office. Several hundred thousand models were eventually stored with the government. In 1907, 1,061 models were given to the Smithsonian Institution, 3,000 models were sold for a total of \$62.18, and the rest remained in storage.

In an economy move in 1925, more models were sold. The Smithsonian took another 2,500, museums took 2,600, and 50,000 were sold for \$1,550. The remaining 125,000 crates were sold, unopened for \$6,540. That collection was bought and sold several times. In 1942, it was purchased by O. Rundle Gil-

bert, an antiques auctioneer, for a little more than \$13,000, including overdue storage charges. There was a series of auctions and shops ever since. Each model is part of the history of the United States.

Collectors today like to buy a model related to their special interest, like a bottle closure for a bottle collector or a barber's chair for a shaving mug collector. The model for brass tilters on a Shaker chair, made by a Shaker from New Lebanon, N.Y., in 1852, auctioned for \$17,000. The models are small works of art, carefully made miniatures of a quality not often found today. Each is tagged with the name of the inventor, the date and the patent information.

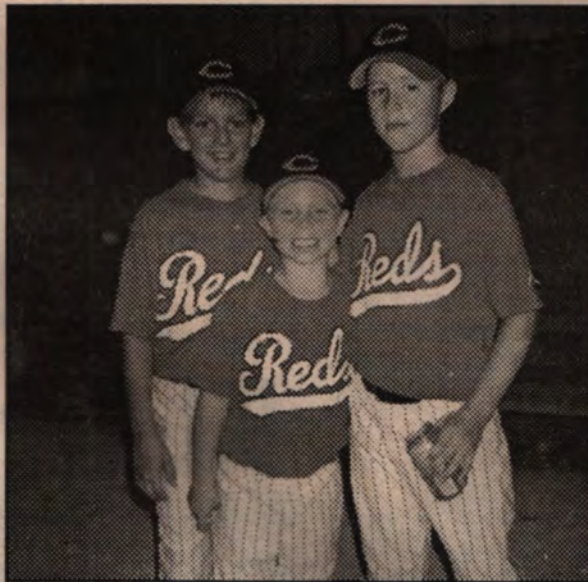

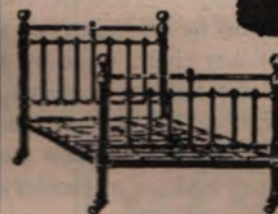

UMHB adds Master of Theological Studies

University of Mary Hardin-Baylor began fall 2000 with a new masters program called Master of Theological Studies.

Religion Department Chair Dr. Stephen Von Wyrick said that the new program is designed to provide graduate theological education for individuals who are engaged in Christian Ministry and for persons who seek a graduate theological degree that will prepare them for a life time of theological inquiry.

"The Department of Religion believes that a core of knowledge and experience is common to every area of Christian ministry. The M.T.S. is built upon that core. Therefore, the program of study shall (1) educate and equip women and men for effective Christian leadership and Christian service; (2) promote theological inquiry and reflection; (3) encourage a lifetime commitment to the mission of the local congregation," said Dr. Wyrick.

Specifics about the new program:

Length of the Program

The Master of Theological Studies (M.T.S.) degree normally requires two academic years of full-time study. Applicants admitted with prior extensive undergraduate studies in religion may complete the program with one year of full-time course work, in addition to the comprehensive exam.

A student has, however, up to five years after enrollment to complete all requirements for the degree.

Program Location

Courses for the (M.T.S.) degree will be taught on the campus of the UMHB.

Admission Requirements

Admission requirements to the M.T.S. program require the student to demonstrate appropriate levels of experience in the areas of academic preparation, personal growth, and spiritual maturity.

Applicants must hold a baccalaureate degree from an institution accredited by an agency recognized by the Commission on Higher Education Accreditation or holding membership in the Association of Universities and Colleges in Canada, or the educational equivalent.

Applicants must submit an application for admission and three Letters of Recommendation: one letter from the applicant's home church, and two letters from individuals who have knowledge of the applicant.

Accelerated Program

Applicants with a strong undergraduate background in theological studies may complete the program with one year of full-time course work, in addition to the comprehensive exam.

In order to complete the M.T.S. on this accelerated

track, the applicant must meet the following criteria.

1) The student must meet all regular admissions requirements.

2) The student must have graduated with a major in Religion granted by a regionally accredited institution of higher education.

Students in the Accelerated Program who receive the Ministerial Tuition Grant provided by the Baptist General Convention of Texas must have graduated with a major in Religion granted by a Baptist college or university.

3) The student must have an overall undergraduate G.P.A. of 2.75.

4) The student must have an overall undergraduate G.P.A. of 3.0 in religion classes.

5) The student must present a letter of recommendation from the Department of Religion from which the student graduated.

6) The student's undergraduate religion major should include the following qualifying courses: nine hours of Old Testament, nine hours of New Testament, six hours of Theology, six hours of Church History.

The student must attain a minimum grade of B in the qualifying course(s).

Additionally, the student must demonstrate through an appropriate written or oral assessment that the stu-

dent possesses the required competency in the subject area. The student will be required to remove any deficiency in the above areas through enrollment in the appropriate graduate course(s).

Program Content

Course of Study for the Master of Theological Studies. The Master of Theological Studies normally requires two academic years of full-time study or the equivalent.

Areas of Concentration

Area 1 - Scripture and Culture. Select courses from: Biblical Languages, Biblical Backgrounds, Archaeology, Hermeneutics, Old Testament Literature, Intertestamental Literature, New Testament Literature.

Area 2 - Christian Tradition and Culture. Select courses from: Studies in Church History, Studies in Christian Theology, Studies in Ethics, Studies in Philosophy, Studies in World Religion.

Area 3 - Christian Ministry and Culture. Select courses from: Ministry, Leadership, Proclamation, Sermon Preparation/Preaching/Congregational Proclamation, Bible Teaching, Worship/Music/Liturgy, Evangelism and Missions, Internship, Spiritual Formation, approved university electives outside the Department of Religion.

Texas Forest Services warns we're facing a dangerous fire season

Due to the ongoing drought condition, there is extreme fire danger over much of the state. The Texas Forest Service was extremely successful in reducing the loss of property and lives in the 9,400 fires that occurred during the 1998 drought due to pre-

positioning of large amounts of fire fighting equipment and utilization of some 5,000 fire fighters from out of state. These assets will not be available this summer due to the overwhelming amounts of fire in the western United States and the tinder dry conditions over much of the south. While it appears we may be able to access a few helicopters from Oklahoma and Louisiana, we will face this fire season almost exclusively with the assets of Texas agencies.

It is the opinion of the Texas Forest Service that we are facing a very dangerous fire season, and within two weeks without major changes in the weather, we will be in Stage 3 wildfire alert over two thirds of the state. Stage 3 is a period when the capacity of local and volunteer fire departments is exceeded and major mobilization and assistance from the Texas Forest Service will be required. In Stages 3, TFS deploys assets (helicopters, bulldozers, fixed wing air-

craft, radio communications, etc.), to centers around the state in eminent danger from wildfire in order to be close enough to assist local firefighters. The first deployment will be in or near Abilene, Decatur and Waco.

Under the present conditions, fires can be expected to exhibit explosive behavior. They will grow bigger, burn more intense and be more threatening than what has been experienced to date. Fires of those type will require more fire fighting

resources to control and they will need to arrive on the fire sooner to try and keep it at a manageable size.

Bell County and many Central Texas counties are under an outdoor burn until further notice.

Extension programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability.
