# **Texas GOP fights off Democratic blue wave**

Despite predictions of a blue wave nationwide, Precinct 203 (Salado) remained devoutly Republican in the 2018 midterm elections, voting for GOP candidates by a four to one margin.

The biggest surprise of the election was a race that most people in Bell County thought Republican Brad Buckley had in the bag.

Buckley will be elected to the State House District 54, but it will be due to voters in Lampasas County, not his home county of Bell.

With all Bell County precincts reporting, Richerson led Buckley by a narrow margin, 20,805 votes to 19,911 for Buckley.

District 54 includes part of Bell County and all of Lampasas County.

Buckley carried Lampasas County with 80.87 percent, tallying 6,013 votes compared to Richerson's 1,417 votes.

This was enough to give him a narrow win. Buckley tallied 54 percent with 25,924 votes while Richerson had 21,779.

Several of the precincts in western Bell County went heavy toward Richerson, including precincts 210, 404, 405 and 408.

Salado's Precinct 203 voted overwhelmingly for Buckley, who moved here from Killeen, giving him 82.74 percent of the vote, 3,702 to Richerson's 772.

Salado also voted heavily for Rep. John Carter, with 3,501 votes to MJ Hegar's

Ted Cruz was successfully re-elected to the U.S. Senate, outlasting Beto O'Rourke by a narrow margin.

If Carter is returned to office, he can thank Salado and Bell County specifically. Bell County remained a deep red county with Carter taking 56.83 percent of the vote, 44,912 votes to Hegar's 33,047.

Interestingly, a big chunk of Killeen was carved out of Bell County and put in District 25. That precinct overwhelmingly voted Democrat this time, with unknown Ju-

close to call as Carter had a narrow edge of 131,958 to 123,509 for Hegar with 26 polling places remaining in Williamson County to report their numbers.

Williamson County, once a deep red county, is apparently turning blue this time around, with Beto O'Rourke and MJ Hegar both outpacing Republican incumbents Ted Cruz and John Carter. In 2016, Rep. Carter won

re-election by more than 20

In 2012, Cruz was elected to his first term as the U.S. Senator from Texas by a large margin, winning 56.46 percent of the vote with 4.44 million votes compared to Paul Sadler's 3.19 million votes.

While the U.S. House may have turned Democratic in 2018, Texas remains Republican, Bell County remains heavily Republican and Salado remains deeply Republican.

The SFRF protects the identity of the children receiving the gifts. No groups or individuals will know the names of the children they have agreed to adopt.

The Christmas drive, and other efforts of the Salado Family Relief Fund, benefits from the annual Salado Empty Bowl Project, which will be 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m. Nov. 10 at the Salado Intermediate School cafeteria.

For just \$25, you can purchase a handmade bowl by area potters, fill it with soup provided by area restaurants and help support the Salado Family Relief Fund. You can have all-you-can-eat soup for just \$10 per person.

Soup will be provided by local restaurants and bed and breakfast inns: Ambrosia Tea Room, Baines House, The Barton House, Cathy's Boardwalk Café, The Inn at Salado Bed & Breakfast, Inn on the Creek, Lively Coffee House & Bistro, McCain's Bakery & Cafe, The Pizza Place, Ramble Restaurant & Farmhouse Grill, The Shed, Stagecoach Inn, Stonecreek Settlement Bed & Breakfast and Sylvia's Tacos.

The Empty Bowl Project comes at a great time for the Salado Family Relief Fund, according to Oas. It helps replenish funds used for the annual back-to-school drive to provide school clothes and supplies to 150 Salado ISD students.

None of these projects would be possible without the support of local churches, civic groups, school groups and individuals who give of their time and money each year.

The annual Christmas drive began in the mid 90s.

"I heard of a couple of school teachers and volunteers who were gathering things for kids in the schools. Dana Britt and the late Mary Ribeiro were doing this on their own for a long time without much help," founding president Marilyn Fleischer said of the beginnings of the Family Relief Fund.

The first year that the Fund began to take shape, collections of used toys and clothes were gathered at the fire station. "It was discouraging sifting for hours through used toys that were broken or should have been thrown away," Fleischer said.

The Fund continued its work at Christmas, but changed gears when the tornado ripped through Jarrell, causing such devastation to that small community. "We solicited and took donations for relief efforts in Jarrell, which was when we changed the name of the group to Salado Family Relief Fund," Fleischer said. "We collected more than \$12,000 for those victims."

At that point, Fleischer said she realized it was time to organize the group formally. "We invited all of the churches and civic groups in Salado to join us in forming this organization," she said.

Since forming in 1996, the Fund has helped families in the area in a variety of ways, including temporary assistance for medicines, rent, clothing, food and other necessities.

# **Highland Games is oldest Scottish Festival in Texas**

Heralding all things Scottish, the 57th Annual Scottish Gathering and Highland Games is the oldest Scottish festival in Texas and has been sponsored continuously by the Salado Museum.

This year, Salado celebrates the 57th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games (www.saladoscottishfestival.com) on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, Nov. 9-11.

The three-day event includes the skirl of bagpipes, wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Highland dancing, Celtic musicians, shopping, food and more. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clans in Texas where members from 40 Scottish clans and societies will share information about Scottish history and genealogy.

On the evening of Nov.

9, a solemn torchlight ceremony is held on the banks of Salado Creek that recreates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn. The Calling of the Clans ceremony is free to the public and starts at 6 p.m. Nov. 9 Creekside off Royal Street just north of the museum building. A ticketed "Welcome Social" follows at the Museum.

The Gathering begins at 9 a.m. Nov. 10 on the Salado Civic Center grounds. Scottish athletics competition (including Tossing the Caber), Highland Dancing competition, bagpiping and drumming competitions, Bonniest Knees Contest, Scottish shortbread baking contest, live Celtic music, a Celtic marketplace, local and Scottish food vendors and more.

The official opening ceremonies begin at noon with the Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street followed by presentations and massed bagpipe bands on the Civic Center grounds. The parade will start at North Pace Park Road and move north on Main Street to the Civic Center grounds.

Events begin at 9 a.m. Nov. 11 with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, a traditional devotional service in which family groups carry banners of their family tartans and ask blessings on the families. Sunday activities include bagpipe band competition, Scottish athletics, Clan tents, pet parade and contest, children's games, live Celtic music, food, and shopping.

# Oil prices drop 7 percent could indicate slower future gas demand

The Markets

Our dear old Standard & Poor's 500 Stock Index (SPX) turned in a very respectable 2.42 percent rise for the week ending 11/02to close at 2723.06. The recovery in this correction started on Oct. 30 as the forward price to earnings (P/E) ratio dropped below 15 and at least some investors realized that stocks had gone from fairly priced to cheap. An interesting and quite sensible shift occurred at the same time as investors began to favor value stocks over the more exciting, but more volatile, growth stocks. That kind of shift historically does not mark the end of a bull market but rather that it has reached a degree of maturity that bodes well for the next six months to a year. The Index returned to positive territory, up 1.85 percent year-to-date, and has risen 5.23 percent since this time last year.

As we have written before, individual stock valuations have historically tended to be driven by either anticipated future growth in earnings (growth stocks) or the underlying value of a company's assets (value

so far this year. Gold, too, was largely unchanged at \$1,233.30, still down over 7 percent for the year. Like Treasuries, gold, and oil, the dollar barely rose against world currencies but was up about 6 percent for the year against the Chinese Yuan, continuing to largely offset the 10 percent U.S. tariff on many Chinese goods.

The Economy

The Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that U.S. employers added about 250,000 jobs and the unemployment rate remained at 3.7 percent while wage growth rose 3.1 percent from this time last year. Moody's is predicting unemployment to fall to about 3.2 percent in 2019 before reversing. The indicators suggested too that wage growth was accelerating as recent gains equated to 3.4 percent on an annualized basis. The accelerating wage growth is consistent with the observation that, on average, the U.S. produces about 100,000 new workers each month while creating well over twice that number of new jobs. Since hiring is running ahead of new worker creation, higher wages are needed to bring older workers back into the market. Among people ages 25 to 54, when decisions about school or retirement are less likely to influence whether people are in the workforce, 82.3 percent are participating and 79.7 percent have jobs. Using that as the basis for comparison, the maximum level of employment we have seen since measurement began was 81.7 percent in the year 2000. The next high spot

was an even 80 percent in 2007, suggesting we don't have a lot more reserve in the labor pool and wages may be headed up.

In another bit of good news, worker productivity rose at an annualized rate of about 2.2 percent in the last couple of months, suggesting that many newly hired workers are becoming more productive. Year over year productivity is only up about 1.3 percent, a low number that, with the wage increases, could create higher inflation.

Those are the numbers that make it likely that the Federal Reserve is likely to continue to raise rates at a quarter percent per quarter at least through mid-2019. They are also the most visible evidence that economic growth will likely begin to slow in 2019 and there is a danger of recession by 2020. More employed persons and higher wages drive greater consumption which, with a lag, drives higher production. Eventually, the consumption growth tops out but production continues, leading to excesses that force layoffs. The layoffs further depress consumption and so on. Thus, is the classic supply/demand economic cycle perpetuated. Historically, goosing the economy with a tax cut when it is already in a boom tends to make the next recession come sooner and be worse when it arrives. The current tax and spending bills passed for this year are challenging that historic record. The great macroeconomic fiscal experiment continues. Only time will tell if it is indeed "different this time."



stocks). Over the long-term, value has done better than growth, but particularly in the late stages of a bull market, growth stocks tend to run off and leave reality behind. We may not see record levels in the SPX again any time soon, but the underlying market looks healthier to us than it did before the correction began.

Despite the looming imposition of an oil embargo on Iran scheduled to take effect on Nov. 4, U.S. oil prices dropped nearly 7 percent to close at \$62.91, suggesting the markets see slower demand growth ahead. The life of Cesar Sayoc, who mailed crude pipe bombs to Democrats ranging from George Soros to Hillary Clinton to Robert De Niro, was a pitiable wreck. His father abandoned his family as a child, and after dropping out of college, Sayoc lived with his grandmother. Then he went from place to place, performing as a male stripper. He compiled a record of petty crime, lost his home, declared bankruptcy. He was estranged from his family and resisted its pleas for him to get help. Sayoc lived out of his van, bizarrely festooned with pro-Trump stickers.

Not much is known about Robert Bowers, the Pittsburgh synagogue shooter, besides his vile social media postings. A childhood friend called him "pretty much a ghost." He may have dropped out of high school.



As an adult, he lived alone in an apartment, and no one ever came to see him. One neighbor said she couldn't remember Bowers ever talking to anyone."

The Parkland school shooter, Nikolas Cruz, was left with no parents after the death of his adoptive mother. He was expelled from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, where he was an outcast. He was reportedly depressed and had other behavioral problems. Police were called constantly to his home. A defense attorney called him "a broken child."

None of this, of course, is to excuse in the slightest the heinous crimes of these men, or to deny the existence of pure, unadulterated evil. Murderous haters and kooks have been with us forever, as has anti-Semitism. Yet the social pattern is clear.

The phrase "deaths of despair" has entered the nation's vocabulary to denote the rise of mortality among a subset of working-class whites from suicide, drugs and alcohol. Its declining longer life expectancy is one of the most stunning

marginally employed and largely on their own.

One way to look at recent mass killings (or attempted killings) is as the handiwork of a very small, violent fringe of the socially disconnected. Their destructiveness is directed outward, in cowardly acts of mindless malice, rather than inward. They marinate in hate and proudly share their lunatic obsessions online, in a twisted simulacrum of community. They seek their identity in political extremism, Jew-hatred or the hellish idolatry of school shootings.

Their crimes are, in their diseased view, feats of grandeur. They give them a chance at perverse consequence and notoriety otherwise not available to them in their marginal lives and social isolation.

It's evil and pathetic, infuriating and sad, and, by the looks of it, a persistent feature of 21st-century American life. What Emile Durkheim called anomie has been weaponized, and it's horrifying to behold.



Local families, churches and groups are busy transforming empty shoeboxes into fun gifts filled with



tract with an overtrick. But when he next led a low spade to dummy's nine to repeat the trump finesse, the hand collapsed. East ruffed the spade, led a diamond to his partner and ruffed another spade, and South wound up down two for a loss of 300 points. The play by both sides was deficient. East could have ensured defeating the contract had he overtaken West's king of clubs with the ace at trick two and returned his singleton spade. From his viewpoint, this play would guarantee him a trump trick, since there could then be no way for declarer to take two trump finesses without subjecting himself to a spade ruff. However, declarer failed to capitalize on East's blunder at trick two. He should have taken steps to guard against a possible 4-1 spade division. After ruffing the club at trick three. South should next have led a diamond! This play would have rendered the defense helpless. Let's say that whichever defender wins the diamond returns a club. Declarer ruffs and trumps a diamond in dummy. He then takes his first heart finesse, returns to dummy with a spade and takes a second heart finesse, thus making four hearts doubled. The outcome is the same if the opponents shift to a spade after winning the diamond. ### **Brown Recluse are timid but dangerous**

This west Texas spider is among the most feared - the Brown Recluse.

The Brown Recluse belongs to the family Sicariidae, or the Six-eyed Sicariid Spiders. Six-eyed Sicariid Spiders are a large and diverse family of spiders with approximately one hundred twenty something species that can be found in all of this planet's temperate regions. This group is represented in Texas by one genera with five species. However, the most familiar and most feared member of these species is the Brown Recluse, Loxosceles reclusa.

The Brown Recluse, like other species of arachnids, has a body that consists of two parts (the cephalothorax and the abdomen) as well as the customary eight legs. Overall, this species of spider is rather drab in coloration, for as the common name implies, the dorsal coloration of adults is primarily brown, although their color can range from tan to almost a pale yellow. Oftentimes, the abdomen is darker than the cephalothorax. There are very few distinctive markings on the backside, save for a dark blotch that superficially resembles a violin. This violin shaped marking starts right behind the eyes and extends towards the abdomen, with the neck of the violin pointing backward. This violin shaped marking is also the source of the common name "Fiddleback Spider". Occasionally there is a darker line that extends along the midline of the abdomen, although this is not always the case.

It is a rather small species of spider, with males having a body length of just one third of an inch. Females are ever so slightly larger, and both sexes have a legspan that approaches one inch.

Whereas there are several other species of spider that resemble the Brown Recluse in pattern and size, one morphological characteristic can be utilized

there are a total of eight eyes placed in the front portion of the cephalothorax. However, the Brown Recluse, as with all other members of its family, has a total of only six eyes. The eyes are arranged in three pairs: one pair centered in the front and one pair on either lateral side of the cephalothorax.

Because it is a predatory rather than an ambush hunter, the Brown Recluse is not an intricate web maker. It naturally has a preference to live in reclusive places such as under rocks and rotting logs, although it has adapted well to human encroachment by thriving in cellars, attics, woodpiles, garages, and sheds. In these human created habitats, this species prefers areas that are dark, dry and undisturbed, and many times will be encountered in shoes and clothes piled in closets or corners of rooms. The Brown Recluse is

native to the United States and can commonly be observed from western Texas northeastward to Ohio and eastward to Georgia.

Prey items accepted by this species include just about any invertebrate creature that is small enough to be tracked down and overpowered, including many harmful and nuisance species, including the non-native fire ant.

As with other spiders, food is eaten in a very odd, if not disturbing, way. The fangs are inserted into the prey item, much like short, hollow straws, and the insides of the food are literally sucked from within. The exoskeleton that remains is discarded after the feeding. This is akin to a person drinking a milkshake. We drink the contents of the cup, (usually with just one straw) but then we throw away the inedible container.

Unbelievable to most people, given their dastardly reputation, most Brown Recluse spiders are quite timid. Typically they will retreat when confronted by a larger animal, biting only as the last line of self defense. As with all other spider species, this species is venomous. However, only two species that can be observed in western Texas are considered to be dangerous to man: this species and the Black Widow. Unlike the vast majority of other spider bites, the bite of a Brown Recluse can be of serious consequence, depending on a plethora of variables. Rather than going into the gory details here, if one feels like they have been bitten by a recluse, the best course of action is to remain calm, make a positive identification of the spider, and get to a medical facility as quickly as possible. Fatalities from Recluse bites are extremely rare, but that is still no reason to not seek medical attention if bitten.






