Aldermen discuss property taxes, homeowners' insurance ratings

Two things are certain, Ben Franklin told us, death and taxes.

For the first five years of its incorporation, the Village of Salado has been able to avoid both of those. But the future may bring the latter, following a frank discussion of what the Village needs to continue to serve its citizens balanced against the income it receives from sales tax and franchise

Salado aldermen discussed the possibility -- the "inevitability" in the words of alderman Michael Cooper -- of a property tax in the near future during a public forum on taxes and insurance Sept. 26 that was attended by a handful of citizens.

The Village of Salado has approximately \$215 million in taxable values, according to the Bell County Tax Appraisal District. A 25¢ per \$100 valuation property tax would generate \$537,500 in new revenue each year, which is almost as much income as generated by all other sources in the 2006-07 budget.

According to aldermen, if a property tax were approved by the board, it would take at least a year to implement the new tax.

The additional income would allow the Village to resurface more streets each

year. Currently, the Village spends \$39,000 for resurfacing and pothole repairs. Alderman Jackie Mills said that she has a \$60,000 bid for resurfacing Royal Street in the village limits. "Right now, we can't do it in one stage," she said. "We might be able to do it over a two year period."

Mills asked City Secretary Dianna Zulauf how often she gets complaints about the roads. "About one or two a month," Zulauf re-

"I don't think that's a whole lot of complaints," Mills said, adding that there is a time coming when the village will have to expand the number of roads to be resurfaced.

"We're going to get more complaints than we can fix," Mills said. "People are going to be very upset then."

Additional revenues are needed, village officials say, not just for street maintenance, but for public health and safety.

Curt Strong said that "there is no way to talk about a sewer system without a property tax." Strong heads a committee examining the feasibility of a central sewage system for the

Increasing Village revenues would allow the Village to hire additional police officers to obtain 24-hour coverage. Currently, the Village has four full-time officers, which provides almost 80 percent coverage.

An additional \$500,000 would also allow the Village to increase the amount it invests in fire protection, perhaps adding professional firefighters. Currently, the Village is researching cross-training the police officers to be firefighters as well so that when they are on duty, they are also on duty as firefighter.

This is one of many important aspects of the Insurance Service Organization rating given to Salado. Currently, the Village has a rating of seven with a nine in the ETJ areas. The rating is based upon the fire department, water department and alarm system in place. These factors are weighted into a rating system that can affect a property owner's insurance costs: the better your rating, the lower your

If Salado were to get its rating to a 5 from the current 7, the average property owner would see a savings of more than \$200 per year in their insurance.

The tax on a \$150,000 property at 25¢ per \$100 would be \$375 per year.

Aldermen took no action during the forum. However, the board of aldermen will hold other forums to further discuss the matter.

This leaves the statement by Franklin about death and taxes being certain unanswered for the time being.

Village keeps Bureau Veritas, but drops building fees 30%

Salado aldermen lowered the building permit fee schedule by 30 percent Sept. 21 when they voted to add on just 10 percent to the fee schedule offered by Bureau Veritas to conduct residential building inspections, as well as site plan review and inspections of commercial projects.

Builders and property owners cried foul after the board adopted a permit fee schedule in August that added 40 percent on top of Bureau Veritas' fees for the Village coffers. Now the Village will collect only 10 percent on top of Bureau Veritas' fees for administrative costs involved in the

Aldermen, after contacting Lorena and Dripping Springs -- two cities that are similar in size to Salado and that use Bureau Veritas for inspections and other work, found that those cities were pleased with the timeliness

and professionalism of the company. Curt Strong told fellow aldermen that Lorena had been doing inspections in-house "and they were losing money at it and they couldn't do it anymore."

Councilmen in the smaller cities were especially pleased to "remove themselves from the process," Strong said, and instead were utilizing licensed inspectors who were bonded and certified.

Dripping Springs also uses Bureau Veritas and sets its permit and inspection fees at eight percent over Veritas' base rate for commercial projects and 34 percent over Veritas' base rate for residential projects.

"Paperwork and administrative costs were reduced for the builder," Strong said. "There are no reinspection fees that would keep a builder guessing on the cost of the job."

Aldermen approved the 2006-07 budget of more than \$500,000, after receiving no input from citizens during the second public hearing on the matter. No input was given on the budget during the first public hearing on the matter on Sept. 7. The Village of Salado operating budget and Village of Salado tourism budget can be found on pages 10A and 11A this issue Salado Village Voice.

In other business during the Sept. 21 meeting, aldermen approved a \$3,600 bid for construction of concrete islands for a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Royal Street and Baines.

Village attorney Alan Bojorquez told aldermen that they did not have to conduct a traffic study in order to have the street sign installed.

Aldermen approved a conditional use permit for the construction of a summer house at 1601 Indian Trail, following the recommendation of the Planning



The Democrats' middle-class problem

All things considered, Democrats would rather be talking about the economy. They think it is favorable ground for them, but Democrats are often undone by talking about the economy -- more precisely, by how they talk about the economy.

That is the argument of a persuasive paper by Anne Kim and Jim Kessler for the moderate Democrat outfit Third Way. They note that for a self-styled "party of the middle class," the Democrats don't win many middle-class voters. Democrats tell themselves bedtime stories about why this is so, including the thesis of "What's Wrong With Kansas?" by author Thomas Frank that middle-class voters get lured into voting against their own economic interests by the GOP cultural message.

The evidence suggests, to the contrary, that what's "wrong" with Kansas is that it doesn't buy the Democrats' economic message. Kim and Kessler define the middle class as voters with household incomes between \$30,000 and \$75,000. Kerry lost it by 6 points, and by an astonishing 22 points among the white voters who "represent one-third of the voting population and three-fourths of the middle class."

In 2000, national security didn't loom large, but Al Gore still lost the middle class by 2 points and the white middle class by 15 points. In 1996, when Bill Clinton had muted hot-button issues by signing welfare-reform and toughon-crime initiatives, congressional Democrats still lost middle-class and white-middle-class voters by 3 points and 12 points, respectively. Clinton had the best Democratic performance among middle-class voters in three decades that year, winning them by a mere 1 point.

How does the Democratic message fall flat? Kim and Kessler count the ways. The public doesn't buy heedless pessimism; 80 percent believe it is "still possible to start out poor in this country,

work hard and become rich." It prefers opportunity over economic security; only about a quarter of Americans say that they prefer a low-income, high-security job. It doesn't like corporation-bashing; only 27 percent say big business is the biggest threat to America's future, while 61 percent say big government is.

Democrats essentially offer the middle class a nullity. Kim and Kessler run through the greatest hits of Democratic policy. The average family income for Pell Grant recipients is \$19,460. Head Start is for poor children. A married family of four can make a maximum of only \$37,263 to still be eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit (to the tune of \$1). Only 2.7 percent of American workers make the minimum wage, and half of them are under age 25.

Kim and Kessler recommend a Clinton-style, hopeful message focused on promoting middle-class aspiration through making college more affordable, helping working families, and encouraging savings and investment. Democrats are indeed calling for a college-tuition tax break, but otherwise are advocating their usual farrago of corporate-hating, minimum-wage-boosting doom-and-gloom.

It might work, given the anti-Republican political climate. Over the long term, however, pessimistic, anti-corporate Democrats will continue to be alienated from middle-class voters, and will need still more excuses as to why they can't reach them.

Autumn fails to cool hot Guv's race; Kinky top poli-prattler; **Grandma and Perry close behind**

Autumn has finally arrived with a tad of measurable cooling. And thankfully, a far cry from the hot and heavy gubernatorial tussle that's headed down the last 40 days of an expected political ad-blitz, and an even scruffier barrage of babbling between three of its noisiest candidates.

DIGRESSION MOMENT

Appropriate (and momentary) digression: Have you ever analyzed the word "gubernatorial" (referring to the title of "governor")? It starts out with the same sound as the word "goober," which is another word for a "nut!" Put them together and you've discovered the perfect description of this year's Texas "Goober-natorial" race. It's between a bunch of nutty folks, with nutty ideas, producing way too much nutty prattle.

TEXAS POLITICS "ZANY"

Texas politics have been politely termed "original" ("zany" has also been used - more in pride than disparagement) and candidates for the lofty position of Governor are often classified as "unusual" (to say the least).

This year is no exception starting with the current six year resident of the Governor's Mansion, "Crazy Hair" Perry, who has been feeding at the public trough for most of his post (yellleading) Aggie life.

Despite his long experience, the Guv has failed in recent years, to achieve respectable poll ratings (currently estimated in the mid-30's). However, he's happily spending his reelection campaign efforts (and money) blasting his closest challenger Carole "Just call me Grandma" Strayhorn, with high voltage verbal thrusts: "Strayhorn is the most corrupt politician in a generation." And that's the nicest thing he's said about Grannie in months.

Adding to the campaign foofarawblaze is the quirky Kinky Friedman, another Independent candidate for Governor, who recently made some gratuitous racial comments about Hurricane Katrina evacuees - most of whom are black. Several enterprising newspapers then dug up other racially tinged statements by Kinky.

One quickly hit the media circuit - from a 2005 CNBC interview, when he was asked what to do with sexual predators. His response: "Throw them in prison and throw away the key and make them listen to a Negro talking to himself."

When challenged that these statements were racist - Kinky bristled and retorted with a typical Kinkyism, that if folks don't like what he says - then "Let 'em vote for someone else!"

And what about the two "other" candidates? Democrat Chris Bell. is working his way around the State, without making much of a lasting impression; and James Werner, the lone-Libertarian, who hasn't had much to say (or spend) since leaving the post primary starting block.

Specific mention was made of how there is only one good restaurant. One restaurant was mentioned as too expensive for an average night out, while another was mentioned and described as "basty, just nasty," to which everyone chimed in and agreed: the steak is dry and full of gristle, the vegetables have no color, the service is awful....

The ladies spoke of how they used to visit Salado on the weekend, but now the shops are "never open." I found this surprising and asked when they have found the shops closed on the weekends. The response was that they have found shops closed on Sunday afternoons.

They also mentioned that when they go on-line to look for shops and restaurants in Salado, they find nothing but the Salado Chamber of Commerce salado.com website.

I work in Austin and a colleague recently requested information on Salado as she planned to bring her mother for a weekend visit. I provided her with our lo-

cal map (from the Salado Village Voice), highlighting and making notes about recommended places to visit. However, when they continued their research on-line, looking for more detailed iformation on the shops and restaurants, they found more interesting information on Fredericksburg and decided to visit there instead.

Recently, I was in Austin Visitor's Center on 6th Street and found mothing on Salaod, although there was quite a bit of marketing material on display for other small towns in Central texas. Even when inquiring at the front desk for any information they may have on Slaoad, they had nothing to provide.

I'll close on a positive note. The ladies I spoke with over the weekend all commented on how they still love to visit Salado during the holidays for Salado Stroll. They excitedly told one of the ladies who had not yet been how the shops stay open very late and the street is beautifully decorated. I think at least one more person will be coming to Salado during those first two weekends in



It takes a Village, pt. 2

Have you heard the joke about moving to Salado? You move here one week, and the next week they make you President of the Chamber of Commerce! That was told a few years ago at the Chamber Follies; so if you're new to Salado, let me explain the punch line. This is a town known for volunteerism. Newcomers get involved quickly here. Don't take the joke literally. Well, maybe just a little literally.

In fact the purpose of this article is to recruit volunteers for a new project created by Salado ISD this year called Salado Mentors. Our goal is to link caring adults who will spend time listening, encouraging and sharing their life experiences with a young student who may lack adequate support networks. Mentors do not take the place of teachers or parents; but planned mentoring programs are one strategy being used nationwide to help troubled children.

In a room full of people, if the question were "Did you ever asked have a Mentor?" bet you, the answer would be 100 percent in the affirmative. Maybe your Mentor wasn't school/ academic related, but at some point, you needed a little extra encouragement or instruction. Maybe help came from a relative, co-worker, neighbor, or boss who took you under their wing and helped through a tough you time. Mentors teach us the written and unwritten rules of life, how to problem solve, and their very presence in our lives said "You are not alone in this world".

I didn't need a mentor in my school years as a student, but as a rookie teacher, over- whelmed and unprepared for the reality of a classroom, I certainly did! There is no way I'd have survived those first years without the practical and emo-

tional support of seasoned colleagues. They literally sustained me when I was discouraged, frustrated, and ready to give up. Later in my career. I was a Mentor to student teachers passing on that gift of support.

Who was your Mentor and at what time of your life? These networks of support can be created for us or by us and they are very necessary for our mental and physical health. Angela Kennedy, assistant professor at the school of Social Work at Michigan State University, extensively interviewed ten young women who grew up in Chicago's ghettos. All of them had witnessed violence, some had been its victims, all were teenage mothers and none had good family support. Yet four of the young women managed to go to school, get jobs and escape the cycle of poverty. One thing they had in common was an ability to connect with someone outside the circle of trouble.

Consider the following words of some famous people about mentoring:

"A mentor is someone who allows you to see the hope inside yourself. A mentor is someone who allows you to know that no matter how dark the night, in the morning joy will come. A mentor is someone who allows you to see the higher part of yourself when sometimes it becomes hidden to your own view. I think mentors are important and I don't think anybody makes it in the world without some form of mentorship." Oprah Winfrey-TV per-

More new books for September: Fiction:

"Arizona Dreams" by John Talton

If you love the Southwest, this is a new author you will enjoy. A native of Phoenix, Talton, through alter-ego David Mapston, serves as a good storyteller-historian and a disenchanted tour guide for Phoenix in the 21st century. Dave Mapstone is a history professor turned sheriff's detective for cold cases. He lives with his computer sleuth young wife in the historic Willow District of Phoe-

Arizona Dreams is a terrific police procedural drama. Using the immigration issue as a political point maker adds to a fabulous investigation that will keep you fully occupied. This is the fourth in the series. (A personal note: I really took to this character (Mapstone/ author Talton) and found him to be totally engaging, delightfully humble, and an intelligent critic of Phoenix's New West ambience and the ugly urban sprawl creeping today into our great Southwestern states.)

"A Good Day to Die" by Simon Kernick

Fans of Patterson, Child, and Silva might take a look at this book. The fourth novel by Kernick, this is a tense tale about a British cop turned vigilante-for-hire, blurring the lines between right and wrong; a good cop turned expert hit-man. This is an action packed page-turner.

"The Gods of Newport" by John Jakes

Those familiar with this folksy storyteller (Charlteston, The Americans, North and South, etc.) will find this a relatively economical drama of scandal and bad manners amid newly rich robber barons in Newport, Rhode Islande. Historical personality combines nicely with the fictional in Jakes' neatly organized saga; and the folly and ambitions of rapacious businessmen are exposed and forgiven. This is a

other well-hewn history lesson for Jakes' fans.

Non-Fiction:

"Good Dog: The Story of Orson, Who Changed My Life" by Jon Katz

September has been a month of dog stories: A Three Dog Life, Marley and Me, Dog Year, What the Dog Did etc!! (I personally can vouch for A Three Dog Life by Abigail Thomas — a wonderful, curl-up-and-forget-the-world read for anyone--dog-lover or not!)

I guess the theme for all of the dog books is the same: there is something about a dog that makes us humans better - dogs really may be "man's best friend." This is a story about a "lifetime" dog - the dogs we love in special, powerful and sometimes inexplicable ways. This is a book about a beautiful border collie intense, smart, crazy, and unforgettable. This is a book to savor and, like his "lifetime dog," Katz's story is a "lifetime" treasure---poignant, timeless, and powerful!

"Redemption: The Last Battle of the Civil War" by Nicholas Lemann

Considered a very good literary journalist, Lemann captures our attention with this absorbing tale of a shameful era in America's Civil War history - a story tracing the prolonged war waged by white supremacist to overturn the 14th and 15th amendments which granted civil rights to freed blacks.

This is a story of the terrorist campaign that took them away. Recounting a story of horrific events in Colfax, Louisiana where white militia of Confederate veterans massacred hundreds, the start of an insurgency that changed the course of American history.

"Redemption" makes it clear that this insurgency is what led to the death of Reconstruction and of the rights encoded in the 14th and 15th amendments. Historians will find Lemann's work engrossing and it is highly recommended for those interested in Southern history, U.S. race relations, and the Civil War era.

Congressional candidate addresses Rotary

The Rotary Club of Salado hosted Congressional District 31 candidate Mary Beth Harrell at its Sept. 19 luncheon at Stagecoach Inn.

Harrell, a Democratic who is challenging incumbent Republican John Carter, is a native of New York, but moved to Texas when her husband's military career brought the family to Fort Hood. An attorney by trade, Harrell is a graduate of St. Mary's School of Law in San Antonio, and is a former prosecutor for the City of Nolanville.

Harrell explained that she currently has two sons on active duty in the Army, one of which is now serving in Iraq, and that she considers her husband a "Reagan Republican."

She began her discussion by presenting her position on Iraq. Harrell said that the U.S. must support the efforts of the military, but cannot "go it alone." She went on to say that she would support and international peacekeeping coalition. In order to

do this, she continued, the U.S. would have to return to its traditional allies for support.

According to Harrell, the Iraq War is costing the nation \$500 billion a year. Therefore, she advocates an end to the policy she referred to as "borrow and spend." To do this, Harrell recommended prioritizing expenditures and determining their cost. In addition, she feels Congressional names should be attached to earmarks. Also, she said a goal of hers would be to work toward "affordable health insurance."

Harrell closed by noting that she favors greater security along the borders. She cited an experimental program at Eagle Pass where captured illegals are immediately brought to court, then returned to Mexico. She also suggests going after those businesses which employ illegal laborers and force them to pay back payroll taxes.

Thus, a jump to four diamonds indicates that the real suit is hearts, while a jump to four hearts indicates spades. The notrump bidder then converts the "transfer" to the appropriate suit and so becomes the declarer. The principle underlying the convention is that it is usually advantageous for the stronger hand to be concealed during the play.

The convention has one big weakness. Players sometimes absent-mindedly forget they are using it. In fact, when Reese and Schapiro decided to play the convention, they also agreed that the first one to forget it would pay the other a fine of 100 Austrian schillings.

Sure enough, when the present deal occurred, Schapiro forgot and jumped to four hearts instead of four diamonds. Reese did not forget and so dutifully bid four spades. Panic-stricken, Schapiro now jumped to six hearts, hoping Reese would realize what had happened. Reese caught on and passed.

West led the spade ace and then, afraid Schapiro might be void of diamonds, mistakenly led another spade instead of the ace of diamonds. Declarer won with the queen and cashed all six of his trumps, discarding four diamonds from dummy. A low club to the king allowed Schapiro to discard his diamond on the spade king and also forced West to part with a club, so the end result was that the slam was made.

Commented Reese afterward: "So Britain got a lucky swing, and I got 100 schillings."



Some old Indian bones get a proper burial

There is a special grave in the Cochran County Cemetery in Morton. It contains the bones of an Indian. The bones were found years ago by a rancher who took them to the museum in Morton. The bones were undisturbed for more than 50 years until the museum moved into another building. Someone found the bones among cans of paint in a cardboard box. A note indicated the bones were those of a Native American.

A group of volunteers decided to give the bones a traditional Indian burial. They contacted someone at the Texas Historical Commission who told them they could do anything they wanted to with the bones except display them.

When the group approached the county commissioners court for permission to bury the bones, the commissioners were sympathetic to the cause and not only donated one burial site but also nine more in the county-owned cemetery just in case other Indian

bones are uncovered.

The volunteers asked Ken "Yazzie" Chambellan, a physician's assistant at Cochran Memorial Hospital, to help with the burial. Yazzie is a member of the Navajo tribe. He chose to wrap the bones in a red blanket with a Native American design and seal them in a pine box. At the burial service he sprinkled cedar ashes around the gravesite and spread smoke from native grasses. He played his flute and spoke for two and a half hours.

"We asked for blessings and I talked about living in peace and harmony. Buffalo soldiers escorted me and I placed the bones in the grave."

His remarks included the words from an Indian poem:

"I was born upon the prairie where the wind

blew free. There was nothing to break the light of the sun. There were no enclosures. Everything drew free breath. I want to die there, not within walls. I know every stream and every wood between the Rio Grande and the Arkansas. I have lived and hunted over the country I loved. I have lived as my fathers, and as them I have lived happily. The white man has the country I loved and we wish only to wander

on the prairie until we die. I want no blood upon my land to stain the grass. I want the land clean and pure. I wish it so all who go through among my people may find peace when they come in and when they leave.

Do not stand at my grave and weep. I am not here. I do not sleep.

I am the thousand winds that blow. I am the diamond glint on snow.

I am the sunlight on ripened grain. I am the gentle autumn rain.

When you wake in the morning hush, I am the uplifting rush of birds in flight. I am the soft starlight at night.

Do not weep. I am not here. I do not sleep."

Is it really that bad to burn leaves in the fall?



Dear EarthTalk: Now that autumn is here the leaves are going to pile up in my yard again. Is it really that bad to burn them? Why is it illegal to burn leaves in so many places now? -- Jeffrey Edwards, Westport, CT

Burning fallen leaves used to be standard practice across North America,

but most municipalities now ban or discourage the incendiary practice due to the air pollution it causes. The good news is that many towns and cities now offer curbside pickup of leaves and other yard waste, which they then turn into compost for park maintenance or for sale commercially. And there are other burn-free options as well.

Because of the moisture that is usually trapped within leaves, they tend to burn slowly and thus generate large amounts of airborne particulates--fine bits of dust, soot and other solid materials. According to Wisconsin's Department of Natural Resources, these particulates can reach deep into lung tissue and cause coughing, wheezing, chest pain, shortness of breath and sometimes long-term respiratory problems.

Leaf smoke may also contain hazardous chemicals such as carbon monoxide, which can bind with the hemoglobin in the bloodstream and reduce the amount of oxygen in

the blood and lungs accordingly. Another noxious chemical commonly present in leaf smoke is benzo(a)pyrene, which has been shown to cause cancer in animals and is believed to be a major factor in lung cancer caused by cigarette smoke. And while breathing in leaf smoke can irritate the eves, nose and throat of healthy adults, it can really wreak havoc on small children, the elderly and people with asthma or other lung or heart diseas-

Sporadic individual leaf fires usually don't cause any major pollution, but multiple fires in one geographic area can cause concentrations of air pollutants that exceed federal air quality standards. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), several leaf and yard waste fires burning simultaneously in a particular locale can cause air pollution rivaling that from factories, motor vehicles and lawn equipment.

Purdue University consumer horticulture specialist Rosie Lerner says that composting leaves is the most eco-friendly alternative to burning. Another option is to shred leaves for use as mulch for your lawn or to help protect garden and landscape plants. Lerner suggests adding no more than a two-to-threeinch layer of leaves around actively growing plants, chopping or shredding the leaves first so they don't matt down and prevent air from reaching roots.

Dear EarthTalk: I heard that using a solar powered water heater in my home would reduce my CO2 emissions significantly. Is this true? And what are the costs? --Anthony Gerst, Wapello,

According to mechanical engineers at the University of Wisconsin's Solar Energy Laboratory, an average four-person household with an electric water heater needs about 6,400 kilowatt hours of electricity per year to heat their water. Assuming the electricity is generated by a typical power plant with an efficiency of around 30 percent, it means that

the average electric water heater is responsible for about eight tons of carbon dioxide (CO2) annually, which is almost double that emitted by a typical modern automobile.

The same family of four using either a natural gas or oil-fired water heater will contribute about two tons of CO2 emissions annually in heating their water.

Surprising as it may seem, analysts believe that the annual total CO2 produced by residential water heaters throughout North America is roughly equal to that produced by all of the cars and light trucks driving around the continent. Another way of looking at it is: If half of all households used solar water heaters, the reduction in CO2 emissions would be the same as doubling the fuel-efficiency of all cars.

And that might not be such a tall order. According to the Environmental and Energy Study Institute (EESI), there are 1.5 million solar water heaters already in use in U.S. homes and businesses. Systems can work in any climate and EESI estimates that 40 percent of all U.S. homes have sufficient access to sunlight such that 29 million additional solar heaters could be installed right

Another great reason to make the switch is a financial one. According to the EESI, residential solar water heating systems cost between \$1,500 and \$3,500 compared to \$150 to \$450 for electric and gas heaters. With savings in electricity or natural gas, solar water heaters pay for themselves within four to eight years. They last between 15 and 40 years--the same as conventional systems--so after that initial payback period is up, zero energy cost essentially means having free hot water for years to

What's more, in 2005 the U.S. began offering homeowners tax credits of up to 30 percent (capped at \$2,000) of the cost of installing a solar water heater. The credit is not available for swimming pool or hot tub heaters, and the system must be certified by the Solar Rating and Certification Corporation.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy's "Consumer's Guide to Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency," zoning and building codes relating to the installation of solar water heaters usually reside at the local level, so consumers should be sure to research the standards for their own communities and hire a certified installer

familiar with local requirements. Homeowners beware: Most municipalities require a building permit for the installation of a solar hot water heater onto an existing house.




