TxU postpones

Public forums on taxes will be held in future

Salado aldermen will hold future public forums on property taxes and other topics, but have not announced the date for those meetings.

The board held a forum on property taxes and insurance service organization (ISO) ratings on Sept. 26, attended by five people.

The Forum was first announced by Mayor Rick Ashe at the end of the regularly scheduled Sept. 7 board of aldermen meeting as being Sept. 28.

Salado Village Voice reported the Forum as being set for Sept. 28 on page 11A of its Sept. 14 edition.

The Village of Salado placed a three column wide by three inch tall public notice advertisement in the Sept. 21 edition of the Salado Village Voice (page 5C) of a public forum at 6 p.m. Sept. 26 at the municipal building.

The Public Forum was announced by Mayor Ashe at the end of the regular board of aldermen meeting Sept. 21 as being at 6 p.m. Sept. 28.

The Sept. 26 meeting was held, but no meeting was held on Sept. 28.

Fire investigated, **\$2,000** reward set

Bell County Fire Marshal is investigating the cause of two similar fires in the Salado area involving fighters responded to that worth of hay bales over the weekend.

The first fire involved six bales of hay in a field on West Village Road, which Salado Volunteer Fire Department responded to at approximately 10:45 p.m. Sept. 29.

The second fire resulted in the loss of at least 350 bales of hay near FM 2268

and Gooseneck Rd., east of

Salado Volunteer Fireseveral thousands of dollars call at about 1 a.m. Sept. 30. SVFD firefighters were able to save an estimated 200 bales of hay from being lost to the blaze.

PUC hearing EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

TxU Electric Delivery has postponed its hearing before the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) on a 345 kV line from Salado to Hutto due to its current workload, according to a spokesperson with TxU Electric Delivery.

TxU Electric Delivery was preparing for an October hearing before the PUC with a proposed route for a 345 kV line from Salado to Hutto, but requested that the hearing be moved to December, according to spokesperson Carol Peters.

Property throughout the proposed route areas have voiced their opposition to TxU Electric Delivery, the PUC, State Rep. Dianne Delisi and State Sen. Troy Fraser. Opposition has come from both ends of the route, Salado and Hutto.

A proposed electric transmission line connecting an expanded Salado switching station on Rose Lane to the existing Hutto switching station on County Road 119 west of Hutto will be completed in 2010, if approved by the Public Utility Commission.

The Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT has determined that there is a need to provide another bulk electric power transfer path from the San Antonio are to the Temple area. A 345 kV transmission line is proposed to be constructed from the Clear Springs switching station east of San Antonio to the proposed Salado Switching station where the new 345 kV transmission line will connect with the existing 345 kV transmission line network. TXU Electric Delivery portion of the overall project is to provide the proposed transmission line between the proposed Salado switching station and the existing Hutto switching station.

According to Gordon Hood, a right-of-way consultant contracting with TXU Electric Delivery for the project, the right-of-way easement will be at least 160 feet wide to allow room for the towers that will be placed every 1,000 to 1,200 feet.

The 345 kV double circuit towers are typically 110 feet to 170 feet tall. The towers are typically 73'8" in width. A drawing of a typical double circuit tower can also be found at www. saladovillagevoice.com.

Once easements have been acquired and designs finalized, construction of the transmission line will take nine months to a year, according to Mike McWilliams, with TXU Electric Delivery.



The Sick Man of the Midwest

Liberals dissatisfied with the Bush economy have, through the wonders of federalism, an alternative. They can move to Michigan. The state represents a rough approximation of ideal liberal economic policy. It is heavily unionized, taxed and regulated in a failed attempt to close its eyes to the dynamic forces of the market and globalization all around it.

This stew has helped make Michigan the economic sick man of the Midwest. It is suffering from a one-state recession all its own, mostly because it has failed to foster the most profound economic force in the universe -- opportunity. The state has been losing out to more business-friendly environs both overseas and in other states for decades, but has refused to adapt accordingly.

This has given Michigan the rarest of breeds this election year, a vulnerable Democrat in the person of incumbent Gov. Jennifer Granholm. The state unemployment rate just ticked up again to 7.1 percent, substantially above the nation's rate of 4.7 percent. The rate of growth of its per capita gross state product is 49th in the nation; lowly Mississippi is 44th.

Michael LaFaive of the free-market Mackinac Center for Public Policy calls Michigan "the France of North America." Economically competitive states might have a personal income tax, or corporate income tax, or sales tax -- Michigan has all three. It has long been the only state with a European-style, value-added tax -- the Single Business Tax. A company can be in bankruptcy and still have a tax liability, making Michigan a bad state even to lose money in.

Business Tax effective at the end of 2007, but has punted the decision about how to replace it. A relative moderate, Gov. Granholm has resisted general tax increases, but levied new fees, sin taxes and other "revenue enhancers." The state still insists

on trying to target tax incentives and other special breaks to favored businesses, in a doomed replay of 1970s-era industrial

Meanwhile, unions make the state an inhospitable place to do business. A company can be bankrupt in Michigan and still face threats of a strike, as Northwest Airlines and the auto-parts maker Delphi have learned. Michigan's unionization rate of 21.8 percent is much higher than the national average of 13.5 percent. This accounts for it having the second-highest unit-labor cost in the nation, according to the Mackinac Center. States with right-to-work laws, and consequently less unionization, experience more growth and create more jobs, at the expense of troglodytes like Michigan.

It used to be that unions could force unnaturally high wages and benefits on U.S. manufacturers, and the costs would be passed along to consumers. Those were the days prior to globalization when the U.S. auto industry had a lock on the domestic market and experienced little international competition. It was inevitable that Michigan would find the new competition disruptive, but not that it would react

The way to thrive in a globalized envi-Michigan recently repealed the Single ronment is to create a low-tax economy without the rigidities that come with heavy unionization and regulation. For those who disagree, Michigan beckons.

To the Editor:

First, I have been a resident and homeowner in Salado for the past eighteen years and have served the community as President of the Chamber of Commerce and as a Village Alderman so have some basis for comment.

The proposed EHV transmission line that will encircle Salado is appalling, rising to the level of running a power line over the state capital. Ours is a vibrant historic community that remains a major tourist attraction for thousands each year who seek the peace and tranquility of yesteryear. This proposed power line would transform Salado into what would appear to be an industrial complex.

Over the years I have constructed many EHV lines throughout North America which are are AL-WAYS (I repeat ALWAYS) routed in a rural setting far from population, schools and sensitive historical areas. Also, the consolidated Salado Independent School District serves an extremely large area, thus there would be thousands of children in close proximity to this line and I join others who believe that EHV lines pose a considerable health risk, especially to young children. Indeed, I have been "shocked" more than once by induced voltage from overhead EHV lines and cannot begin to comment on the long term health risks of such projects. Finally, the arcing and crackling of such lines during humid weather, combined with the mantadory routine maintenance

would cause great harm to tourism and our quality of life in Salado.

In the strongest possible terms I object to this proposed EHV line and respectfully petition TXU to find a routing that is at least several miles from our schools and village center. After all, as a regulated public utility, TXU is provided the mechanism to recapture its costs, so there's no reason not to do this right in the first place.

I am writing to add my voice to those in opposition of TXU's proposed industrial power line through Salado, Texas.

In addition to the environmental/quality life/public health issues, I would add that this project poses a serious threat to the aesthetic and economic well-being of our fragile, historic village. Salado belongs to all Texans, not just those who live here. It is a beloved destination for its historic resources, shopping, dining, golf and beautiful Salado Creek, the first natural site in Texas to be awarded an Official Texas Historical Marker by the Texas Historical Commission. Indeed Salado is a rarity in Texas. It has one of the largest collections of good examples of Greek Revival architecture in the state, with 18 properties and sites listed in the National Register of Historic Places

A 250+ foot-wide swath of lines, towers and denuded earth will damage Salado irreparably. Additionally, it will provide a corridor for future industrialization in a community that relies heavily on its charming appearance and appeal to visitors for its economic health.

Please do not allow this project to undo more than 50 years of historic preservation efforts in Salado and to undermine the quality of our community for residents and visitors alike.

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




Revenge! Eagles trounce Academy

Call it revenge for last

Salado's 36-6 trouncing of the Academy Bumblebees Sept. 29 on the road was nothing at all like last year's loss.

Last year, the Bees drove 80 yards in the final two minutes to beat Salado, 26-20 on a 28-yard touchdown pass. This year, Academy had just 65 yards total offense, as Salado's swarming defense allowed only two first downs during the entire game and held the Bees to -11 yards total rushing.

Sacking Academy quarterback Klay Kuban three times, the Eagles defense allowed only one rusher double-digit yards, Daryl Williams had 11 yards on four carries. Kuban had double digit yards rushing, but it was negative, -28 on nine touches.

He was somewhat better throwing the ball, with six completions on 10 attempts for 76 yards. He was picked off once, which set up one of the Eagles five touchdowns.

The Eagles' offense was as dominant as its defense. Salado also used a variety of offensive sets and players; nine players carried the ball a total of 39 times for 228 yards.

Seth Collins was the most prolific, with 17 carries for 100 yards. Leo Galvan had eight carries

for 68 yards.

Salado showed its dominance early, driving 50 yards on eight plays, all but one were rushing, including Collins' three yard touchdown run with 2:46 left in the first quarter.

The Eagles forced Academy to its third straight three-and-out offensive sets, before driving 44 yards in six plays. Stephen Quick threw to Josh Fulfer for a seven yard touchdown with 10:47 left in the half. Another successful PAT brought the score to 14-0.

Tyler Wright intercepted a Kuban pass to set up the Eagles' next scoring drive. Salado drove 41 yards in 12 plays. Justin Konzen dove up the middle for the

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Lago Vista outlasts Salado

Ladies beat Bees in 5

The Salado Lady Eagle volleyball team earned its third win in district play Sept. 29, beating district rival Little River-Academy, as the girls outlasted the visiting Lady Bees to win a grueling five-game match by 25-8, 23-25, 23-25, 25-9 and 15-13.

Head Coach Bree Holz said her team had a difficult time stringing together consecutive well-played games. "We were in complete control of games one and four, but in games two and three we dug ourselves a hole and were down by eight points in both games, fought back and fell a little short," she explained. "Game five came down to who wanted it more, and after trading points until point 13, we finally showed some mental toughness and finished the match on top. The team played with so much confidence in the fifth game and never let up."

Senior middle blocker Molly Rooney paced the Lady Eagles with 18 kill, 13 dig, 3.5 block and one ace effort. Junior outside hitter Kamylle Palomino also had a nice game, tallying 12 digs, eight kills

and three aces. Junior middle blocker Lauren Haire put together eight kills and 3.5 blocks, while sophomore outside hitter Danielle Hazzard had nine kills, 14 digs and one block. Senior defensive specialist Cortney Dunnahoo had 10 digs and two aces, and sophomore Libero Lindsey Coffey closed out the match with 13 digs.

Prior to the win over Academy, the Lady Eagles faced Lago Vista Sept. 26 and were defeated 25-15, 14-25, 17-25, 16-25.

Salado got up early on Lago Vista, but could not put the Lady Vikings away. "I'm not sure if we

got overconfident after the first game, but our passing completely fell apart after that," said Coach Holz. "We couldn't get anything to Larissa, our center. which in turn meant we couldn't hit the ball."

Rooney had 14 digs, nine kills and 1.5 blocks. Haire had nine kills and one block, while Palomino had nine kills and eight digs, and Ingalsbe had 30 assists, two kills and one

In underclassmen play, both the Salado JV and the Salado freshmen were dispatched by Academy 2-1, while both squads defeated their Lago Vista counterparts 2-0.




Two of the routes are within viewing distance of the Salado Historic District, and the huge towers would seriously impact both property values and the tourist industry that is Salado's main source of income.



Understanding fat intake improves health

Last week I introduced a new phrase, a phrase that I hope sticks in America, and that phrase is "slow-food." Slow food, versus fast-food, is an approach to nutrition that is being "reintroduced" to Americans.

You see, it wasn't that long ago that we realized the importance in cooking nutritious meals that were loaded with quality meats and vegetables. Today many Americans' meals considered "fastfood," which should be an oxymoron, as they are cheap imitations of food and create damage to our

Today I would like to speak on one of the components in "fast-food VS. slowcomparison; fat. food" Fat, though essential to our optimal health, has become the villain today in America concerning our overall well-being. This truth is very unfortunate, though unhealthy denatured fats can and

should be avoided; there are a number of fats that should be part of our daily nutritional regimen.

If you break the studies down concerning the "lipid hypothesis" you will see some faulty reasoning concerning our phobia toward all fats. Unfortunately saturated fat and cholesterol have been singled out as the primary reason for our heart disease issues today, but a closer look will help you to see and understand that the real culprits are: vegetable oils, trans-fats and high-fructose corn syrup, among others.

Interestingly enough, our intake of saturated fat from animal fat and butter has declined in past century but the incidence of heart disease has sky rocketed. Why? We have replaced

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our intake of healthy with inexpensive fats polyunsaturated substitutes: corn, safflower, and SOV sunflower oils. These

unstable oils can be linked to cancer and heart disease as they create free-radicals when heated.

So, the best options for healthy slow cooking are: High Heat - 375 Degrees or over

Coconut Oil, Ghee (clarified butter), Palm Oil, and Lard Medium Heat -325 Degrees

What about butter? Butter can be used for low-heat cooking, but

Olive Oil

be aware that it can be denatured with high-heat because of its low levels of polyunsaturated fats.

What about Canola Oil? Though considered a healthy monounsaturated fat, it was created become a cheap replacement to Olive Oil, but because of its processing it has a level of trans-fats that you should not be comfortable with. I don't recommend it.

What about Peanut Oil as monounsaturated oil? Peanut Oil can be used sparingly, but because of its fair amount of Omega-6 fatty acids it can create an issue with your Omega-3 to Omega-6 fatty acid

Make an effort to find out if your fast-food is made up of the more expensive, but healthier forms of fat, like: Coconut

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
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




The Living Room Theatre of Salado (LRTS) announces an exciting new 2006-2007 Season of the Living Room Theatre of Salado. Total subscription fee is \$5 per address for printing and mailing costs to insure subscribers receive notification and reminders of events in advance of release to the public

This year's program will begin in November with a show about the life of longtime Salado residents, Jean and Jack Tarbutton, adapted by Ramon Carver as "The Best Thing that Happened That Year!"

The play celebrates the lives of two young men who became flying aces in WWII and then were

captured and incarcerated in German prisoner of war camps. This fall show will feature Ryan Hodge and John Tyson as the two brothers, with Vic Means as the Narrator.

A second show will be a comedy by Living Room Theatre Board Member Buzz Rahm, untitled to date, premièring in January, featuring Buzz and another LRTS Board Member, Tom McGlasson, This duo will be remembered for their amusing performances in a prizewinning Greene Festival play

In early spring, there will be a dramatization of "The Life & Times of Mo Cutler," author of the Stagecoach Inn Recipe Book and chronicler of

Cowboys Bar-B-Q

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the Van Bibber enterprise, which began as a whim but which has become "the restaurant that made Salado famous." Cutler notes that the Dining Room could not serve liquor because of a law stipulating that no alcohol could be served on the premises "in amounts less than one quart." (Evidently it was too much to expect customers to consume entire quarts of booze.)

Finally, the year will conclude with performances of the Judy and A. C. Greene Festival, June 15 and 16 at the Salado Civic Center. As always, scenes from a book by a Texas author will be presented, and a program will be dedicated to the memory of A. C. Greene.

The Living Room Theatre was established in 1996 as a nonprofit arts organization, producing shows based on short stories, playscripts, etc., for small audiences in homes and public places, utilizing professional and amateur writers and actors. Dr. Ramon Carver, director of LRTS, says "In

effect, we're home tours with entertainment."

LRTS shows are chosen for relevance to contemporary life, performance values, authors' and performers' capabilities, and physical limitations. A "Texas connection" has been selected in order to examine the works of local and regional authors who have lived in Texas or written about Texas.

Performances are scheduled on weekday and weekend evenings, usually beginning early at 7 p.m., lasting an hour or less. Subscribers are notified by mail and email approximately one week in advance of public announcements of show titles, dates and places for each performance.

Hosts volunteer the use of their homes for most performances, accommodating approximately 20 to 40 guests for each show. Guests reserve seats on a first come - first served basis, contributing \$5 per person for each performance except for annual fundraisers.

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

Pigot now cashed the queen of diamonds, discarding dummy's last spade, and made the key play of a low trump from his A-10-9, won by East with the queen. Garozzo could do no better than return a trump, won by South with the ace.

After ruffing a diamond with dummy's last trump, Pigot took a club finesse, which won, and led the J-10 of diamonds. West ruffed with his high trump and played still another spade, but Pigot ruffed and scored the last two tricks with the A-J of clubs to make four hearts doubled.

Thus it was that South, with 17 points, scored 10 tricks, while East-West, with 23 points, scored only three.

The outcome emphasizes that what counts in bridge is the number of tricks you can take and not the number of points you have. Pointcount enthusiasts eventually learn from bitter experience that while high-card points are a valuable measuring rod, they are by no means a perfect barometer of how many tricks can actually be made.
