Vet. Memorial Blvd, Killeen and Bell County Annex, 205 East Central Ave., Temple.

Early voting will be open 8 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays Oct. 23-27; 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 28 and Oct. 30-Nov. 3 and 12-5 p.m. Oct. 29.

Election day, Precinct #203 Salado polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 7 at the Salado Church of Christ Activities Center, 225 North Church Street.

The last day to accept a request for a ballot by mail is Oct. 31.

In addition to the general election races, Village of Salado voters will cast ballots in a local option election to allow alcoholby-the-drink to be sold in local restaurants.



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# **McCain's Dubious High Ground**

For people supposedly occupying the moral high ground, John McCain and his band of Republican rebels defying President Bush on the issue of interrogation have a strange attachment to confused argumentation.

They maintain that the United States can't define more precisely its obligations for the treatment of unlawful combatants under the vague language of Common Article 3 of the Geneva Conventions to allow the tough interrogations of terrorists, as Bush proposes, lest our troops in turn be tortured upon capture. McCain warns that such a definitional exercise risks "the lives of those Americans who risk everything to defend our country."

What pleasant, alternate reality does the Arizona Republican inhabit? Perhaps he missed the story a few months ago about the two American soldiers captured by al-Qaida in Iraq. Al-Qaida released a video of them, described by the British newspaper The Guardian: "One of them, partially naked, had been beheaded and his chest cut open. ... Fighters were shown turning the bodies over and lifting the head of the decapitated man."

This is savagery immune to a domestic legal debate in the U.S. Maybe McCain and Co. think that the U.S. debate at least will influence our more reasonable adversaries. But since when have we fought a regime -- Saddam's Iraq, Milosevic's Serbia, North Vietnam, North Korea, Imperial Japan, Nazi Germany -- that is not barbarously committed to repression and murder?

No one in the U.S. had broached clarifying Common Article 3 in 1967 when McCain was shot down and captured by the North Vietnamese, who proceeded to beat him routinely and keep him in solitary confinement for years. The North Koreans were equally disgusting. As a U.S. Senate committee concluded: "American prisoners of war who were not



deliberately murdered at the time of capture or shortly after capture, were beaten, wounded, starved and tortured."

Ah, if only the North Koreans had known how committed we were to giving the widest possible Common Article 3 protections to terrorists, maybe they would have re-thought their detention policies. McCain and Co. have a case of treaty fetishism. That is the belief that a piece of paper will alter the behavior of thugs. But a government will abide by the Geneva Conventions only if it is civilized; and if it is civilized, it is unlikely we will be fighting it.

The irony is that, for all his preening, McCain supports what he would call "torture" if the conditions are right. He has said of a ticking-time-bomb scenario -- a terrorist has information of an imminent attack -- "you do what you have to do. But you take responsibility for it" (i.e. get sued or prosecuted). In other words, McCain wants to make it legally problematic for interrogators to undertake the very interrogations that he supports.

In real life, the closest we get to a ticking-time-bomb scenario is the one that prompted the CIA interrogation program -- the capture of high-level al-Qaida operatives with knowledge of ongoing plots. McCain can't bring himself to say that he opposes the program outright, so he professes to support it, but refuses to give the program the legal cover necessary for it to continue. And this is the moral high ground?

# GOP shaken over Foley scandal; House Ethics group investigating leadership inaction; Demo takeover is predicted

Politicians and their related state and national parties - both Republican and Democrat, need to be aware that by wrapping themselves in self-styled cloaks of righteousness, they are skating on very thin ice since the standards they embrace (for whatever purpose) brook no individual (or group) failures especially their ideas about "correct" moral behavior, superior virtue, and piety.

The Republican Party may have learned this "fact of life" the hard way in recent days, as their promotional banners and mottos touting "**Our** values," "**Our** belief system" and "**Our** Values- Voters" (whatever that means) have become tattered with embarrassment.

#### FOLEY SCANDAL EXPLODES

A repugnant scandal rocked the GOP on September 29, (last day of the current congressional session), when six-term Representative Mark Foley (R-Florida) abruptly resigned shortly before NBC released documented information that Foley, who headed the Congressional Caucus on Exploited Children, had a long history of sending sexually explicit e-mail, and other suggestive internet correspondence to teenage boys employed as Pages in the House of Representatives.

That explosion revealed yet another example of dishonoring a high public office. And adding to the horror were the emerging facts that House leaders and some followers, had created what appears to have been a "covert caucus," apparently designed to keep a tight lid on "in-house & member" problems.

These officials totally abused "their" power, by knowing about the despicable pedophilic activities and doing (or saying) nothing to protect the young people in their care.

Leaders of the "cover-up" group were Republicans Dennis Hastert, Speaker of the House; John A. Boehner, Majority Leader; and Rep. Thomas Reynolds, National Republican Congressional Committee Chairman.

One "interesting" mouthing came from Rush Limbaugh who serves as cheerleader for extreme conservatism. He's a guy who moves at mach-speed in full support of the Bushies, while rarely slowing down to pick up facts.

Limbaugh declared, following the NBC exposure, that the entire Mark Foley matter was the product of a liberal conspiracy!

Well folks, he was half right, which is better than average for "Mr. Standpattism," because this disgrace does have a conspiratorial slant to it, and that assigns culpability to both House Republicans and Democrats.

Members on both sides of the aisle knew about Foley's nasty predilection as an active pedophile years ago and did nothing - thereby creating a "conspiracy," and consequently all are guilty. #### To the Editor,

I find all the fuss about the proposed TXU power line routes interesting and some of it possibly misleading.

I have heard it said that this power line will benefit only TXU by allowing them to transport electricity to the south of Salado. I hardly think that line will benefit only power users to our south. Electricity can travel in both directions on that line and it will be tied into the Texas power grid established by ERCOT. If TXU finds that it cannot meet the demand for power in Salado for whatever reason, electricity can be moved North on that line to serve our needs. Bell County and the surrounding area are growing and will continue to grow. This means there will be a continuing need for additional power in this area. This power line is nothing more than evidence that Central Texas is continuing to attract people and industry.

As for the line being an eyesore and being a distraction for the Salado Historical District I don't think that will be the case. First, the proposed route east of Armstrong Rd. will be more than four miles east of Main Street. The towers may be as much as 170' tall, but I don't think they can be seen from Main Street. I'm not sure how far west of I-35 the proposed west route is to be located, but if it can be seen from Main Street, it will hardly be a distraction. And I think we may all rest assured that TXU will not locate that line close enough to any school for it to even remotely pose a problem for the students. As for people seeing the line from Main Street, that is a possibility, but most people are accustomed to seeing big power lines and to those people these lines are just a sign of continuing growth in

an area.

Speaking of distractions, I wonder how many people were even aware of the existing sub-station about 1.5 miles north of Salado before this debate started? I have lived in Salado seven years and I have seen the power line crossing I-35 from the West countless times. It was just another high voltage power line to me and I never looked to the east to see where it was going. I expect the new line will be just as unnoticeable after a few weeks. I will say the existing line on the west side of I-35 certainly does not seem to have any adverse effect on the grass growing in that pasture or the cattle grazing on that grass.

Mention has been made of the potential for illnesses from this line. I've heard similar stories for many years. I have yet to hear of one single illness known to be caused by one of these power lines. I lived by and worked in and around these lines and the power plants where the electricity is generated for more than 40 years and I suffered no ill effects. One writer mentioned that induced voltage from this power line could cause harm to a person. Of course that is true, but the person being harmed would have to be within a few feet of the line for this to happen. All I can say is if this happens to someone, they should not have been climbing on that tower in the first place.

There is talk about it damaging Salado Creek and disrupting the ecology in the area where the line is located. I'm sure an EPA mandated environmental impact study has been done for the proposed route. Any potential damage or disruptions will be addressed. TXU does not just draw a line on a map and say this is where we will put the line. They may select the route of preference, but they will have to prove it will not have an adverse effect on Mother Nature.

ERCOT may have determined the need for another power line from San Antonio to Temple. However, companies like TXU and Reliant use 10 to 20 year business projections to decide where to locate power plants and high voltage power lines. If they didn't plan this far ahead, many of us may not have the dependable power supply we enjoy. I read where this line is projected to be completed in 2010, That means construction probably will not be started before 2009. Since a line of this magnitude will take less than a year to construct many changes can occur before that date. From where I sit, this power line is just further proof of our ever-growing population and the energy needs that comes with that growth. Sincerely, Bob Smith







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# **Salado loses another** business due to codes

To the Editor:

Once again, the Village of Salado has lost another business venture.

My husband and I have been in the planning stages to open a new business on our property located at 700 N. Main Street since April 2006.

We got a permit, paid for an Environmental Survev and had the existing building that was on the property removed so that we could place a more tasteful and aestheticallypleasing structure on the property. We then met with the Inspector to measure and discuss the size of our building. At that time, we were told we had room for a 30' wide building. Just needed to be sure we allowed 5 foot setbacks on either side to comply with the fire code. After expenditures in excess of \$8,000, we were told by the Inspector that placing a 30' wide building on our property would be in violation of the "Historical District Ordinance." This ordinance states that there must be a 10' set-back from any existing structure or property line.

We submitted a written request to go before the Board of Aldermen and discuss the possibility that our property be removed from the "Historical District." There is no historical strucure located in the area from Old Town Salado on the west side of Main Street down to and including Compass Bank.

In response to our request, we were given two options: 1) submit a rezoning application to the Village, along with a \$300 fee, or 2) request a variance to the setback requirements which constitutes submitting an application along with a \$75 fee. Either way, all property owners within 200 feet of our property must be notified of our request at least 10 days prior to the public hearing. The P&Z meets on the second Tuesday of the month, therefore our request would not be heard until Nov. 14. AND our request to be put on the next Board of Aldermen agenda was denied.

What's up with that??? We, as citizens, feel we should be able to speak to the Board of Aldermen without paying either a \$300 or \$75 fee to discuss a variance or any other subject that might come to mind. Why are we subject to a P&Z committee of which the ordinance states two of these members making up the committee DO NOT even have to be citizens of the Village?

I would also like to add that copies of this letter denying our right to go before the Board of Aldermen were sent to Bruno Matarrazzo and Alderman Suzi Epps. Seems to me, the Mayor and all of the Alder-



men should be advised in such cases.

> In the event any of you reading this letter think our concerns are petty -- get ready for that "city tax" that will soon be imposed on all of the citizens due to lack of sales tax revenues.

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
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
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# EaglesdominateCougars,40-5

For the second straight week, Salado Eagles defense has held its District 25AA opponent to less than 100 yards offense while the Eagles' offense has amassed over 200 yards, this time en route to a 40-5 thumping of the Jarrell Cougars at Eagle Field Oct. 6.

The convincing win clearly puts the Eagles in the hunt for a playoff spot, if not an outright district championship two weeks into district play.

Just as they did against Academy, last year's district champs that are now 0-2 in district play, Salado exhibited its dominance early, drawing blood within the first three minutes of play. The Eagles defense sacked Jarrell punter Patrick Sherek for an eightyard loss at the Cougars' two yard line. The Cougars faced the fourth-downand-forever in their first possession due to a tough defense that threw Josh Fletcher for a five yard loss on first down and nabbed quarterback Kaleb Cox for a 13-yard loss on third down thanks in part to a bad snap.

Salado's Leo Galvan followed blockers around the left side of the line for the five-yard touchdown run. He had been caught in the backfield on first down

for a three-yard loss. Galvan added the point-after kick for Salado's early 7-0 lead.

Most of the first half looked like a defensive showcase as neither team was able to move the ball much. The Cougars took advantage of Andrew Sumner's interception of a David Rosenau pass at the Jarrell 48 yard line by driving to the Eagles' eight yard line in six plays, where they settled for a 25-yard Brodie Carlin field goal with 7:00 left in the half to get as close to

ll- Salado as they would for er the whole night, 7-3.

Salado's Tyler Wright blocked Sherek's punt when the Cougars faced fourth down at their own 27 yard line. This gave Salado the ball at the Cougar 17 yard line. Rosenau dropped back into the pocket and then dashed untouched through the Cougars defenders for the 17 yard touchdown at 2:07 in the half. The PAT was wide right, giving Salado a 13-3 halftime lead.

The Eagles blew the door off the hinges in the

second half, scoring 27 points, and allowing just two points by Jarrell on a point-after try that was returned 90 yards.

Salado drove 70 yards in six plays midway through the third quarter, with Galvan diving in from the one yard line. Rosenau hit Tanner Myers for 10 yards before running a quarterback draw up the middle for 12 yards to get across midfield. Galvan moved the ball eight yards before Blake Newman took the handoff, ran around the right end,

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# **Girls improve to 6-4 in district**, Lady Eagles sweep Jarrell, Troy

The Salado Lady Eagle volleyballers earned a pair of district victories in games last week, defeating first Troy, then following that up with a win over Jarrell.

Against Jarrell Oct. 6, the Lady Eagles won in three straight games, downing the Lady Cougars 25-21, 25-16 and 25-16. "We started this match pretty flat, but finally got something going in the last two games," commented Coach Bree Holz. "Jarrell served very tough in the match, which made it difficult to get into an offense."

If someone aims a gun at your head, it is a good idea -- as a matter of selfpreservation -- to disarm him if you can.

An analogous situation sometimes occurs at the bridge table when a particular opponent threatens your chance of making the contract. In that case, you try, if possible, to eliminate the threat.

Let's say you're declarer at three notrump in today's deal. West leads a spade -- presumably fourth-best -- and you win East's ten with the queen. You see that the contract can be made easily enough if West has the king of diamonds. He can be finessed repeatedly, and you would in all likelihood wind up with five diamond tricks, after which you can drive out the ace of hearts to assure either 11 or 12 tricks.

However, there's no way of knowing for sure that West has the king of diamonds, and if the finesse loses, East will return a spade and establish West's suit. Then, if West has more than four spades and also the ace of hearts, you will go down.

Once you reach this point in your considerations, you might see the advantage of leading the queen (or jack) of hearts at trick two instead of taking an immediate diamond finesse. The effect of this play is that, for practical purposes, you assure the contract.

West is the dangerous opponent, and he is the one who may have a pistol (the ace of hearts and spade length) in his pocket. You can disarm him by leading the queen of hearts before you do anything else. If he has the ace and takes it, you intend to duck the spade return and win the next spade. Now when you take the diamond finesse, you are on safe ground. If the finesse loses, either East will not have a spade to return (because he started with only three of them), or East will lead a spade (because he started with four of them), in which case the contract is safe. Of course, if West does not take the first heart, you can then try the diamond finesse with impunity and finish with at least nine tricks. Either way, the contract is assured by leading a heart first.

The athletic competition will expand this year from one day to two days, with athletes ages 18-39 beginning competition 10 a.m. Nov. 11 and athletes over 40 contending at 11 a.m. Nov. 12. Officiating will be David Boyens, a former Navy Seal who has been involved with Scottish heavy athletics for more than 20 years. Boyens, who formerly coached throwing events for the Baylor University track and field program, will oversee the tossing of the stone, hammer, weight for distance, weight for height and caber.

competition will be coordinated by Donna Cusack, assisted by renowned Canadian judge Joy Tolev. This highly athletic dance contest will feature continuous performances of the Highland Fling, Scottish Hornpipe, Sword Dance, Sean Triubhas and the Lilt. 
### **Friends Feeding** Friends Oct. 19


In Salado, the food collected will be delivered to the local food pantry at Salado First Baptist Church. Collection will be at Brookshire Brothers.
