Halloween safety tips from Salado police dept.

Salado police chief Pat Boone gives the following tips for having a safe Halloween night.

Safe Trick or Treating

• Cross the street at corners, using crosswalks. Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.

• Put electronic devices down, keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.

• Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.

· Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.

• Watch for cars that are turning or backing up.

• Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

• Join kids under age 12 for trick-or-treating. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, tell them to stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trickor-treat in groups.

Costume Safety

• Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.

• Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision.

• Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.

• When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

Driver Safety

· Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods. Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.

• Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.

• Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.

· Get rid of any distractions - like your phone - in your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.

• Turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.

Popular trick-or-treating hours are 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Be especially alert for kids during those hours.

The second weekend in November is everyone's chance to be a little bit Scottish for a day!

The 58th annual Scottish Gathering and Highland Games (www.saladoscottishfestival.com) are coming to the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, Nov. 8-10.

This family-friendly event is the oldest Scottish festival in Texas and has been sponsored continuously by the Salado Museum

since 1961. All proceeds benefit the museum, a 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization.

Young and old alike will enjoy hearing the bagpipes play, seeing the Tossing of the Caber, watching the famous Sword Dance, listening to Celtic singers and musicians, visiting the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clans in Texas where Clan members share information on Scottish history and genealogy,

and, of course, all those men in kilts!

The Calling of the Clans is held at 6 p.m. Nov. 8 on the banks of Salado Creek just north of the museum, a solemn torchlight ceremony recreating the gathering of Scottish clans in 1314 to fight for Scotland's freedom.

The Civic Center grounds open at 9 a.m. on Nov. 9 with a full slate of activities that include sanctioned competitions in Scottish athletics,

bagpiping, drumming and Highland dancing.

Official opening ceremonies are held at noon Nov. 9 with the Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street followed by presentations and massed bands on the grounds.

The parade starts at North Pace Park Road and moves north on Main Street to the Civic Center.

People are encouraged to bring lawn chairs for viewing along the route.

Activities continue with the hilarious Bonniest Knees Contest, a large Celtic marketplace, food court and live Celtic music. Featured entertainers are Scottish singers Ed Miller and Carl Peterson, renowned guitarist Rich Brotherton, and Celtic band Murder the Stout.

Grounds open at 9 a.m. Nov. 10 with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan devotional service, bagpipe bands, Clan

An Open Exchange of Ideas

Record high markets despite record high fed borrowing

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose a delightful 1.22% for the week to close at 3022.55, finally clearing the "3000 ceiling" off which it has been bouncing for several months. That rise puts the Index at only a 0.11% loss for the trailing three months and up a whopping 13.69% from a year ago. Before we get too excited, the SPX is still three points below where it was in late July when it rose to 3025 before succumbing to more tariff-related bad news. It is also only about 5% higher than it was in January of 2018, 21 months ago. In short, the stock market appears ready for either a breakout or a slap back.

The yield on the 10year U.S. Treasury note fell during the middle of the week but soared to close at 1.80% by the close on Friday, confirming the end of the inverted Treasury yield curve. West Texas Intermediate crude oil closed out at \$56.63, 5.44% higher than a week ago although still down over 16% from last year at this time. Both the Treasury yield and the price of oil were credited to optimism that the U.S. and China might have a breakthrough to end the trade war. The Economy

The U.S. Treasury finally closed out the books on the fiscal year 2019 and, as of the end of September when the federal fiscal year ended, the federal deficit for the year was officially \$984.4 billion, up 26% from 2018. 2019's overdraft brings the total official federal debt due to 78% of GDP. Barring some major unseen event, all forecasts anticipate that the total for the calendar year will exceed \$1 trillion and keep on doing so for at least the next decade. In past economic cycles, the federal government borrowed heavily during times of war and depression then paid down much of the debt in good

times. This time around we have decided to give ourselves a tax cut and increase spending. Economists generally do not see a good end to this practice but only time will tell.

We can say that the record-high levels of short term borrowing by the federal government are having an unprecedented effect. Beginning about six weeks ago, the Fed was infusing \$35 billion per week into the short-term Treasury market each weak as it bought freshly issued Treasury bills to fix a sudden and unexpected cash shortage in the economy. Two weeks ago, as it became apparent that there was still a short-term cash flow problem, the weekly infusion was raised to \$75 billion. Last week came the announcement that the ceiling was to be raised to \$120 billion. On Friday, the Fed announced an extra \$77.3 billion would be added to major banks' liquidity to cover the weekend. While the intervention of the New York Federal Reserve bank to offset a cash crunch in the money-center banks is absolutely one of the prime missions of the Federal Reserve, to trigger an emergency relief function of the U.S. central bank in a time of economic boom should be taken seriously. We have triggered a stress crack in the system. The culprit is the decision not only by Congress to run amazingly high deficits in a time of high economic demand but also by the Trump Administration to focus the borrowing on the short end of the curve. As the short-term Treasury securities mature, the Treasury must not only sell new ones to cover the



deficit but also more to cover the maturing issues. This cycle is piling up and in doing so draining the cash from the system and forcing the Federal Reserve to step in to prevent a crisis.

Meanwhile, in the bigger economic picture, durable goods orders in the U.S. were down 1.1% in September. Shipments to fill old orders have been declining for the past three months and were down another 0.4% for the month. At the same time, inventories continued to increase, suggesting that manufacturers are still producing more than they are selling each month. Capital goods, which are the high-dollar items companies use to make other things and to do new business, declined 2.8% in September.

We certainly don't know if history will repeat itself but in 1920, one hundred years ago, largely because of tariffs, fiscal mismanagement, and an unexpected cash shortage, our economy experienced the largely forgotten "mini-depression" of 1920-21. It followed a record-low unemployment period and a decline in domestic manufacturing. There are similar forces in play today but there are also striking contrasts. As always, all we can do it watch and be aware.

Our district enrollment is 2,074 students. This is an increase of 133 students from last year, which is the largest one-year enrollment increase in the history of our school district.


Here are our district enrollment numbers from the past several years:

2012 = 1,3482013 = 1,4612014 = 1,5562015 = 1,6562016 = 1,7482017 = 1,8622018 = 1,9412019 = 2,074

This increase of 726 students over the past seven years represents a 54% increase, which is the largest percentage increase out of the 76 school districts in our Waco Region.

Texas school districts also use our high school snapshot date enrollments for the University Interscholastic League (UIL) realignment every two years. In 2017 the 4A size classification had a high school enrollment range from 505 students to 1,149 students and Salado High School had 563 students.

While the UIL can adjust the enrollment ranges for each size classification, our current high school enrollment of 644 students will most likely still be within the 4A size classification. The first week of December the UIL will release the 1A through 6A classifications and cutoff enrollments. The first week of February the UIL will release the UIL districts and regions.

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rapid impeachment

The Ukraine story hasn't been good for President Donald Trump, and there's only one way out -- to get impeached, and the sooner, the better.

Trump obviously hates the idea of being impeached. He thinks it's unfair, and is raging against the process with every political and legal argument his team can muster and every insult and countercharge he can make on Twitter. But he doesn't have any choice in the matter.

Impeachment is baked in the cake. There's no way that Democrats, having opened an impeachment inquiry (although without a vote), can pull up short now. How could they, after touting revelation after revelation, including a supposed "confession" by Trump's chief of staff?

As impeachment rumbles on, it puts every Trump lapse (Syria, Doral, etc.) in starker relief and places it in the context of the question of whether he should be impeached and removed.

Meanwhile, if support for impeachment is about 50 percent or a little higher, there's every reason for Democrats to stretch it out. The current process suits their purposes nicely. They interview officials in private and then leak the most damaging parts. There's no danger of public hearings bouncing the wrong way ...



because there are no public hearings.

The impeachment inquiry also has the advantage of giving the Democratic base what it wants, and creating a strong sense of action against Trump. When Republicans took the House in the middle of Barack Obama's first term, they had trouble controlling the expectations of their own base, which wanted immediate results when the GOP had limited power. Impeachment allows Democrats to forestall such a feeling among their own voters, even though they, too, aren't getting anything substantive done.

This suggests that, as of this moment, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi looks to have judged the politics of impeachment shrewdly, holding off when it still seemed politically premature and striking when the prospect of moving the needle of public opinion presented itself.

Given how impeachment is playing, she should welcome the White House embracing the normal strategy in these fights of attempting to frustrate and delay the inquiry. Not only is this

standard approach not fully working -- former and current officials are talking to House investigators regardless -- at the margins it lengthens an inquiry that's working for the Democrats. All that said, it's always possible the public will tire of the probe, especially if it reaches past the first month or two of an election year.

What can Trump do about any of this? Absent a mea culpa and promise of full transparency, which aren't in the cards for temperamental reasons if nothing else, Trump can't change the dynamic or the timing. But he should be secretly rooting for the rapid arrival of Impeachment Day (and the near-inevitable acquittal in the Senate).

It will be one of the biggest stories of the Trump presidency. Then, like everything else, it will grow old very fast. Impeachment won't be forgotten, but it will fade into part of the tapestry of endless Trump controversies and outrages, from Charlottesville to his Helsinki press conference with Vladimir Putin.

Democrats will believe they struck a decisive blow against Trump, when they really may have helped him turn the page.

The Norwegian declarer heart, crossed to dummy with a diamond, took a trump finesse, returned to dummy with a diamond, took a second trump finesse and so made four spades. His only losers were two clubs and a ruff. The same series of plays occurred at the second table, where the English declarer also made four spades. The deal was thus a standoff, but later received wide attention because both Easts could have defeated the contract by making an extraordinary play. East can stop the contract by discarding a diamond at trick three instead of ruffing the third round of clubs! Declarer can then reach dummy only once, and — since he requires two trump leads from dummy to stop East from making two trump tricks — he must go down one. The contract is easy enough to defeat on paper. But at the bridge table, where second thoughts don't count, practically any player holding the East cards would ruff the third club and then start thinking about what to do next.
