## Williams, Carlson win trustee election May 2

Voters elected Carse Williams and Frank Carlson to serve three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees May 2.

Turnout was heavy for a local election as 723 voters cast ballots, 22.5 percent of the 3,206 registered voters in Salado ISD.

In early voting, 265 cast ballots, while 458 voted on election day.

Carse Williams was the top vote-getter with 479 votes, 37 percent of ballots cast.

Frank Carlson was next with 438 votes, or 34 percent of the ballots cast.

Juana Preston had 381 votes, or 29 percent of the ballots cast.

Carlson ran strongest in early voting with 189 votes, followed by Williams, 179, and Preston, 120.

Williams led election-day voting with 300, followed by Preston's 261 and Carlson's 249 votes.

"It's humbling," Williams told the *Salado Village Voice* after the election. "I pledge to work as hard as I can for the schoolchildren in Salado and for the taxpayers who pay the bills."

"There are a whole lot of things that are right in Salado schools," he said, "but there are some things that need to be fixed. I hope we can address these issues in a constructive manner."

Williams added that, "We owe Juana Preston and Donnie Jackson a debt of gratitude for the many hours they worked on behalf of all Saladoans. Anyone who is willing to work for the community in that job should be thanked."

Carlson told the *Salado Village Voice*, "It's time to go to work. We face some very challenging issues. And I am excited about the opportunity to be part of this team."

The election results will be canvassed during a short meeting 5:45 p.m. May 6 at the Salado Civic Center. Carlson and Williams will then be given their pre-oaths of office.

Following the short meeting May 6, there will be a reception to meet the new Salado ISD Superintendent, Dr. Robin Battershell.

The reception begins at 6 p.m. at the Salado Civic Center on Main St. and the public is invited.

## History buff has house with a secret stairway

Ricky Richards is an attorney in Jacksonville. The desk in his office is the one Ann Richards used while she was governor. The library in his house is a replica of the oval office. The curtains in the library are from different presidential administrations. The shape of the curtains is from the Kennedy era. The color of the curtains is from the Reagan white house. The texture of the curtains is from the Clinton years.

His house, a replica of an 1824 southern mansion, also has a secret stairway.

"When I was a kid I saw THE GHOST AND MRS. CHICKEN, a Don Knotts movie," says Ricky. "In the movie, someone kept disappearing into a secret stairway and as a kid, I said when I grew up I wanted to have a secret stairway in the house. So we built one. You push the wall in a certain place and it opens and you're able to go up and down the stairs. It serves as a fire escape for the family and it's a great place for the kids to play and hide from their buddies because they can't find them once they get in there."

Ricky has lots of stuff. On his place are chickens, geese, a goat, a sheep, some horses, an old military jeep, an Amish cart and a civil war cannon. He calls his residence Teaberry Farm. "It came from how my wife and I met," says Ricky. "I was in the eighth grade at Rusk, Texas and my wife was in the sixth grade. I was walking across the junior high campus one day and a little girl that looked like an Indian dressed in leather and fringe and go-go boots from back in those days asked me for a piece of gum that I was chewing. It was

Teaberry gum. That's how we met so we named the farm after that."

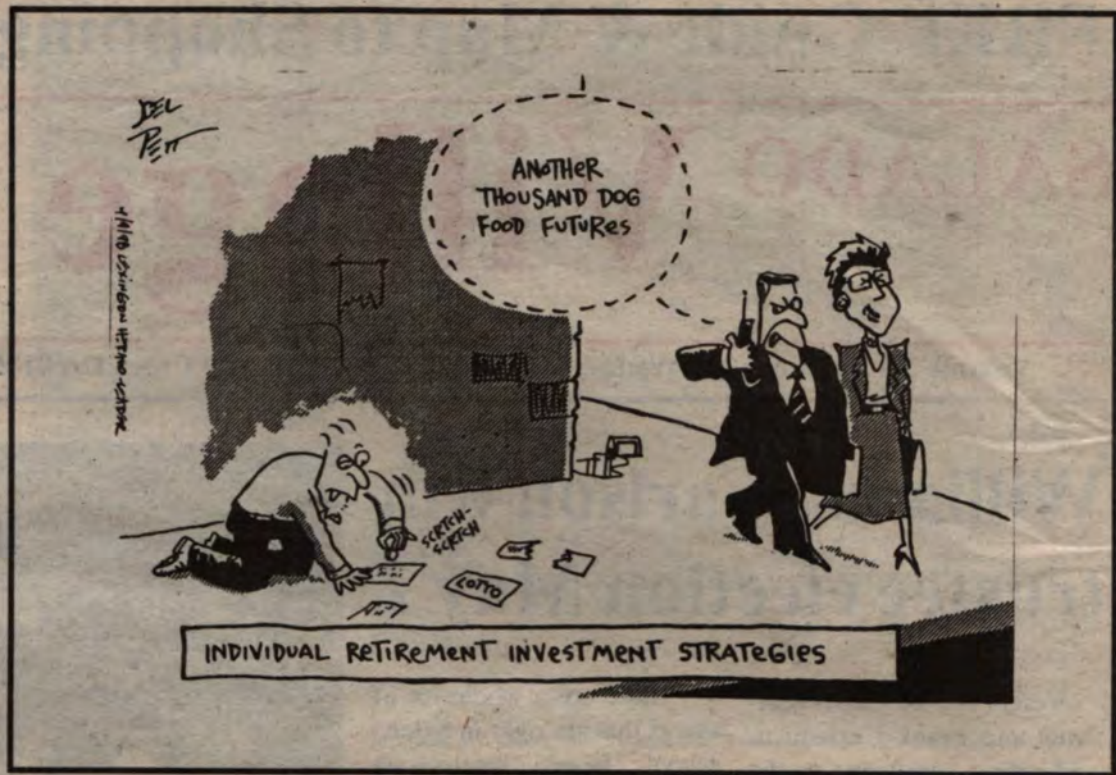
Ricky had some caps made with the Teaberry name on them. They're green and gold because Ricky went to Baylor and loves the Baylor colors.

Ricky has a big barn on his place where he and some buddies gather every Wednesday night for fellowship and a meal. They do their own cooking on outside grills. Antiques are everywhere. He has a picture of his grandfather, a blacksmith in Attoy who used to make pocket knives.

When Ricky was in high school studying American history, a teacher had a few artifacts from the civil war and brought them to school to show the students. "It made history come alive for me," says Ricky. "I was able to see the size of some of those cannon balls. I was able to feel how heavy the rifles were and how much trouble they were to shoot."

After Ricky got established in his practice of law, he began seriously collecting civil war artifacts himself. He has been to all the major battlefields and has collected all sorts of memorabilia and stories from each one. Now Ricky goes to schools in his area and shares his items with the kids. "The teachers tell the kids not to touch them," says Ricky. "But I tell the kids to go ahead. I want them to feel them and get to realize what those civil war soldiers had to work with."

He and his wife have been married without children for twenty-two years. They've just adopted a baby girl. "It has definitely changed our life," says Ricky. "It's been a change for the better. Although we were extremely happy before she came, we're very extremely happy now."

# Salado Public Library District approved by nearly 200 votes

Voters overwhelmingly approved the formation of the Salado Public Library District with 433 voting for the proposition and 242 voting against.

Over 21 percent of the 3,206 registered voters in Salado ISD cast ballots in the election.

In early voting, 189 voted in favor and 76 voted against the proposition.

Election day, 244 voted in favor and 166 voted against the proposition.

During the election, the first slate of trustees of the Library District were elected: Luther Brewer, 204; B.J. McConnell, 203; Carolyn Britt, 196; Susan Shobe, 194 and Lynn Epps, 191.

The results of the election were canvassed and certified by the Bell County Commissioner's Court May 5.

The five new trustees will be sworn in to office by County

Clerk Vada Sutton at 4:30 p.m. May 11.

The first meeting of the Library District Board of Trustees will be 5:30 p.m. May 18. An agenda will be posted at least 72 hours prior to the meeting at the Salado Civic Center.

During the first meeting, the board of trustees will organize and elect officers of the board.

According to Luther Brewer, the next few months will serve as a transition period in which the assets of the Salado Public Library are transferred to the authority of the Public Library District.

During that period, the Library District board will determine inventory, bylaws, book-keeping procedures and other procedures necessary for the transfer of the Library.

The Library District has authority to levy local sales tax

of up to ½-percent. "But we won't be seeing any of that money anytime soon," Brewer said.

The State Comptroller will likely begin collecting the ½-percent sales tax for the Library District in October.

Which means the first check to the Library District will come in the beginning of 1999.

At that time, the Library will probably begin hiring additional personnel, Brewer said.

"We are incredibly grateful to Bob (McConnell) for his leadership of the campaign committee and his leadership for many years of the Library," Brewer said.

He added: "Vada Sutton provided us with a great deal of help and information during the election process. She is the model of a public official to make sure things were done correctly."

John A. Lomax, The Father of Folklore, will always be remembered for his preservation of a longstanding tradition in the American West. The John A. Lomax Gathering will be held on May 9 in Meridian, 40 miles north of Waco. The legendary event will honor the life of Texas Cowboys, both past and present. This is a chance to hear the true sounds of traditional country-western music.

The festivities begin with an early morning Cowboy Break-

fast on the banks of the Bosque, followed by a long-horn cattle drive into Meridian that is scheduled to arrive around noon. The event will feature several live performances of both traditional cowboy music and cowboy poetry. The crowd will also have a chance to participate in an open microphone opportunity, "bull fire." The proceeds for the event will benefit the restoration and preservation of the Bosque County Collection. The John A. Lomax Gathering is a chance to step back in time and understand the life of the Texas Cowboy from a realistic perspective.

The infamous Chisholm Trail, and the cowboys who worked it, served as a tremendous influence on the young John Lomax, while growing up

in Texas. He was born in Bosque County only a few miles north of Meridian and discovered his love for traditional cowboy music at an early age.

John A. Lomax captured the ballads and folklife by writing them down and preserving them in the Library of Congress. In essence, John A. Lomax is responsible for the traditional music and cowboy

lore as know it.

The John A. Lomax Gathering will not only honor the man himself, but also those who worked so hard to settle the western frontier. This event is sure to satisfy even the strongest desire to preserve the past, which is imperative if we are to continue down our present path.

The Help Stamp Out Hunger food drive is a nation-wide effort of the National Association of Letter Carriers, in conjunction with the United States Postal Service.





# May is best time for panfish

If you're looking for a fun and easy to catch fish, you don't need to look far. The month of May is the time when fish catching is at its best when it comes to panfish. The reason is May is when most of them spawn.

On lakes like Toledo Bend, Sam Rayburn and Lake Austin where the water is clean, anglers can see spawning beds lining the shore in shallow water. These fish are extremely aggressive and easy to catch. There's no limit on them and they are great eating.

Blue gill, perch, bream and sunfish are just some of the species of panfish that spawn in May. Small lures like the Blakemore Roadrunner or tube jigs work well. Also live crickets fished on the bottom or un-

der a bobber in the spawning bed will get a bite almost every cast.

The best equipment is an ultralight spinning or a spin casting combo outfit. Spool with 6-pound test line and use 1/16-ounce lures or weights to hold down your cricket. Sight-casting to the beds is easier for the anglers using a pair of polarized fishing glasses. These glasses help reduce the surface glare and enable the angler to actually see under water. They can be purchased at tackle stores for under \$10.

Panfish are great fish to take first time anglers fishing for. They will enjoy the nonstop action which will help them want to make another fishing trip.

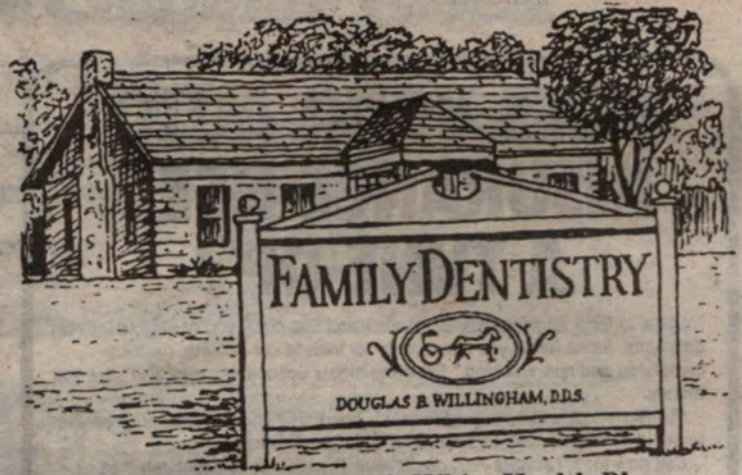
While there are lots of different species of fish to catch in our lakes, I don't think

there's an easier fish to catch than the panfish.

If you haven't tried eating them, you don't know what you're missing. Simply scale, remove the head and guts, rinse clean and they are ready to cook.

I've had them many different ways, but dipped in cornmeal and deep fried is hard to beat.

## Children's nutrition ...

**Q: How important is exercise for overweight children?**

**A:** In most cases, obesity is not solely defined by the amount of calories you consume or food you eat, but by inactivity. When children sit in front of the computer or TV they tend to eat more and gain weight.

Parents should encourage children to get out of the house and exercise. Encourage them to walk to and from school if it is safe. Basketball, volleyball, swimming, and biking are all good forms of exercise. Keep exercise equipment in the house, not the garage, encourage kids to play during recess. Parents should also seek out churches or other organizations that offer activities for children.

Parents can help overweight children get in shape by eating right and exercising themselves.

**Q: I plan to breast-feed my child when I return to work. Is there anything I should know before heading back to the office?**

**A:** It would help you if you took it easy in the beginning until your body gets used to being back at work. If your employer will permit, see if you can start out taking one day a week off. If your employer is not flexible, you can begin to get your body ready a couple of weeks before returning to work by trying to get on the same feeding schedule the baby will be on when you return. This usually means breastfeeding in the morning and evening, and pumping or nursing only at break times during the day.

It is also important to make sure your infant can take milk from a bottle before leaving them with a babysitter. It is best to introduce a bottle about three weeks after birth. Also, check with your employer to see if you will be given a couple of breaks during the day to pump your milk.

**Q: What is Rett Syndrome?**

**A:** Rett syndrome is a disabling developmental disease that strikes only females. Girls stop growing at around 18

months of age, and may develop mental retardation, display repetitive, involuntary movements involving their hands, feet and other parts of their body. They may experience problems walking, breathing, and communicating.

Studies at the Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine found girls with Rett syndrome to be malnourished. Researchers found a poor diet, not repetitive movements, lead to the girls' altered energy balance and subsequent growth failure.

Girls with Rett syndrome do not eat as much as healthy girls because it is hard for them to chew and swallow. In studies they were given large amounts of a high-quality liquid formula through a button gastrotomy, a device placed directly into the stomach. All the girls gained weight and grew in height.

It is important for parents of girls with Rett syndrome to seek out nutritional advice early on to combat the growth abnormalities.

Donner and Lily Gaa, daughter of Peter and Sheila Gaa of Temple, received a superior rating for their skit.

Donner also received a superior rating for prose reading and an excellent rating for poetry reading.

In addition to the skit, Gaa received superior ratings for both her prose and poetry readings. Michael Koehler, son of Bruce and Geri Koehler of Temple, received a superior rating for both sight reading and poetry reading, and an excellent rating for prose reading. John Reilly, son of Philip and Donna Reilly of Temple re-

ceived a superior rating for poetry reading and an excellent rating for prose reading.

As a team, Holy Trinity Catholic High School placed eighth overall in German competition.

The students were accompanied by their German teacher, Heidi Clement-Owen, who was recently named the Texas Foreign Language New Teacher of the Year.

Holy Trinity Catholic High School of Temple is a private, college preparatory, Christ-centered high school open to students of all faiths. HTCHS is a Catholic Christian school upholding Christian values where different faiths are welcomed and understood.

## Cholesterol-lowering drugs may prevent heart attack

Cholesterol-lowering drugs may help people prevent a first-time heart attack.

Cholesterol experts at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital in Houston say cholesterol-lowering drugs may be beneficial in people who have never been diagnosed with heart disease.

"Our studies have shown that people who markedly reduce their total cholesterol level lower their risk of heart attack by one-third," said Dr. Peter Jones, associate professor of medicine at Baylor and Methodist.

More than half of American adults have high or borderline high cholesterol levels, according to the National Cholesterol Education Program. Too

much cholesterol can lead to heart disease—the No. 1 killer in men and women.

Many people work at lowering their low density lipoprotein (LDL) or "bad cholesterol" and increasing their high density lipoprotein (HDL) or "good cholesterol" to prevent a heart attack. Jones recommends that people with a high risk of heart disease regularly keep their cholesterol level in check.

Heart disease risk factors for people with high cholesterol include:

- Age (men ages 45 and older and women ages 55 and older or who are postmenopausal)
- Diabetes
- Hypertension

- Cigarette smoking
- Low HDL (below 35 mg/dl)

- Family history of early heart disease

Jones says the greater the number of risk factors, the more important it is to get treated.

"If you have more than one of these risk factors, seek medical advice," Jones said. "Sometimes a low-fat diet and exercise aren't enough. Cholesterol-lowering drugs may be more helpful in lessening your chances of a heart attack."

The DeBakey Heart Center is a joint program of Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital supporting cardiovascular research, treatment and education.

Pietro's held a ribbon-cutting April 24 at its location on the corner of North Main Street and Blacksmith in the peach-colored house.

The restaurant serves traditional southern Italian food in a friendly home setting.

Its diversified menu offers everything from authentic hand-tossed pizza to lobster scampi, and a variety of entrees in between.

Owners Pete "Pietro" Culin and Katherine "Kate" Menard

stress that Pietro's is not just pizza.

"Salado has perceived us as a pizzeria," Pete says, "but we are much more than that. Our pizza is great, but our pasta, seafood, veal, chicken and desserts are second to none."

*My mother's parents both came to America from Sicily in the early 1900s. With them, they brought the recipes from the "Old Country." They were passed down from generation to generation.*

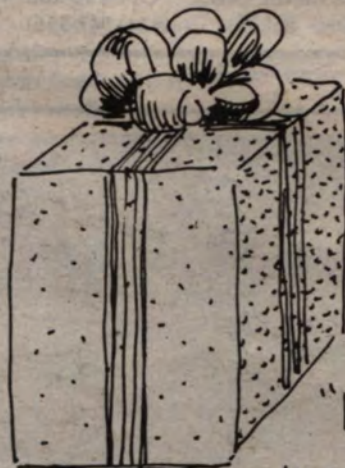

# Defying Gravity

## Ft. Worth artist returns to Art Fair

Fort Worth artist Scott Moore is returning to show his unique acrylic paintings at the 32nd Annual Salado Art Fair Aug. 1-2 in Pace Park.

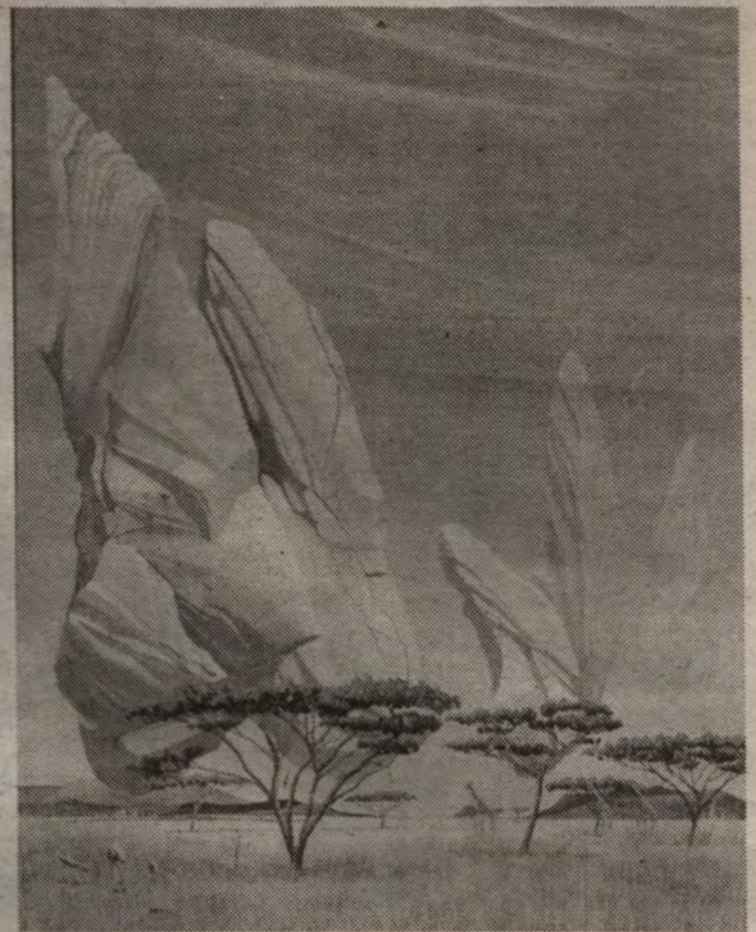
He will be among 150 artists to show their work here in one of the oldest and most well-respected shows in the state of Texas.

A native Texan, Scott has been painting and sketching since childhood, always with an eye for the unusual and unorthodox. He says that early influences of Salvador Dali, Rene' Magritte and Roger Dean stimulated the evolution of his "surrealistic style."

In the mid-1980s, he began displaying and selling his work to the public. A self-taught artist, his studies in Geology, Architecture, Astronomy and Illustration continue to mold his style.

"A single concept can take months to years to develop before it finds expression on canvas," Moore said of the research required to satisfy his desire for accurate representation of the elements in his work.

"Execution of the piece occurs in a marathon event which

takes a number of hours to a few days," he said.

Moore's medium is acrylic applied with brushes to canvas or masonite, which he prefers

for its speed, bold colors and durability. He employs the application of thin washes to allow creation of subtle colors, blending and shading.

His technique earned the Best in Media: Acrylics award in 1996 at the Laguna Gloria Art Show in Austin.

In an effort to break the bonds of "linear thought," Moore frequently portrays alternate views of reality and a defiance of the laws of nature. A predominant signature of his work is the levitating object(s) giving rise to the title of his collective works: *Defying Gravity*.

The final effect is artwork which provokes thought and elicits conscious and subconscious reactions to both humorous and melancholy aspects of reality.

Moore feels art is subject to interpretation. "The interpretation of my images defies description with words. So, while I will provide you with titles and pertinent data, I encourage you to seek meaning within your own imagination."

You can find your own interpretation of Moore's work during the Salado Art Fair Aug. 1-2 in Pace Park.

Admission to the Art Fair is \$3 for adults, children under 12 free.

**Teach Respect, not rage to our children**

We are a busy nation. We scurry around with our over-committed schedules, and too often dispense with civility in our attempt to save time. We cut one another off in traffic. We bump into one another on the street. We pursue our personal and business agendas without the slightest regard for other people. Our children see that we care little for our fellow Americans.

Similarly, our politicians play scorched earth games with

one another and generally demonstrate a supreme disregard for civil or reasoned discourse. There is no limit to what our leaders will say about one another. And guess what — there are children listening and watching!

The average child entering fifth grade has seen hundreds of thousands of acts of violence on television. This barrage of violence continues throughout their school years, and many psychologists believe that it desensitizes youth to witnessing violence.

When this omnipresent violence is coupled with the demonstrated incivility among adults and the easy availability of guns in our nation, trag-

edy can result. The tragic incident in the Arkansas schoolyard provides us an excellent opportunity to reflect on what we can do, as a society, to lower the decibel level and encourage constructive discourse and problem solving.

We must move toward a more civil society. We need to turn down the volume on our voices, remove the hate from our speech, and begin to teach a radical concept to our children — that each human being has value, and that such value deserves respect.

Peer mediation programs in schools can help. They teach students how to listen to one another, how to solve conflict without violence, how to manage anger, communication skills, self respect, trust, and how to express feelings in a constructive manner. The American Bar Association is doing its small share to promote peer mediation — volunteer lawyers in 21 cities are working to bring peer mediation to schools that cannot afford to hire a private organization to implement a program, or that do not have volunteer programs available in their communities. Skills learned through peer mediation can be used not only in the schools, but in the students' neighborhoods and throughout their lives.

Peer mediation programs alone won't end school violence. But they can go a long way toward returning us to the more respectful approach to human interaction we seem to have lost. Until we increase the positives in the sum of influences on our children, we will be left with only the negatives — lack of civility in everyday interaction, media violence, gutter politics, and the ready availability of guns. The ABA encourages community leaders to start mediation programs in their schools, and to make training in conflict resolution available to parents.

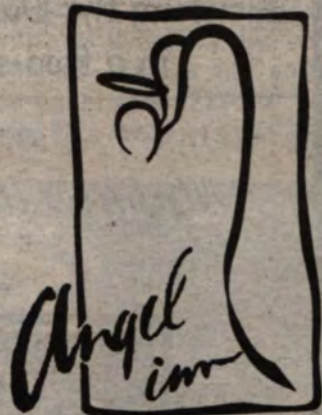

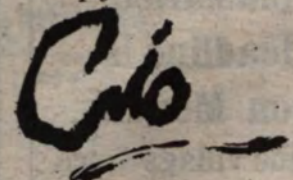

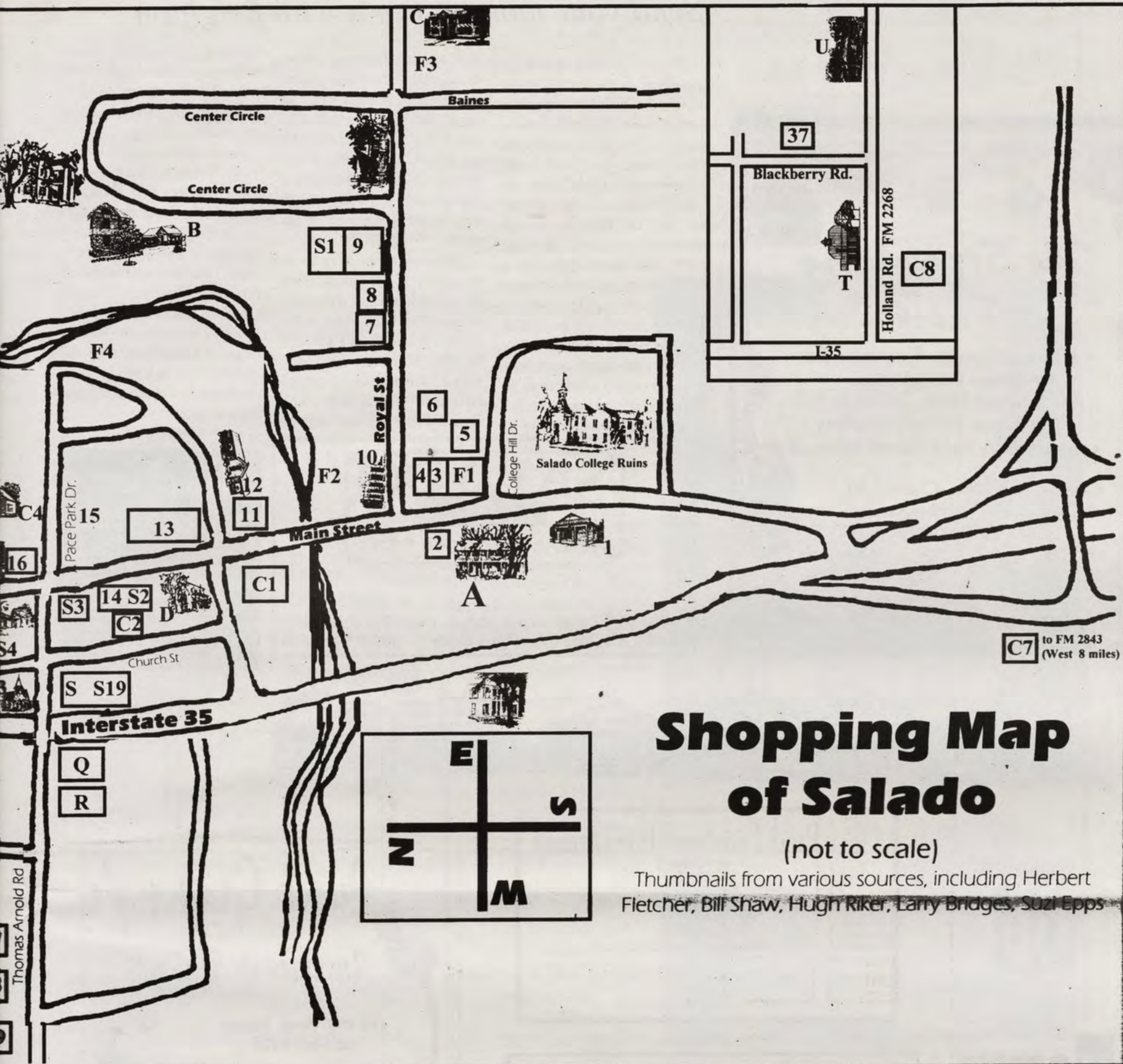

# You say potato ...

Potatoes are America's favorite vegetable and for good reason. Not only are they delicious, versatile and economical, but now potatoes have a better nutrition story than ever before. New studies show that a medium potato (1/3 pound) provides 50 percent of the U.S. RDA of vitamin C, 15 percent of vitamin B6 and iodine, 10 percent of niacin, and 8 percent of thiamin, iron, folacin, phosphorus, magnesium and copper.

The potato also has the most potassium, 750 mg., of any commonly eaten food and provides 2,710 mg. of dietary fiber. And, all that nutrition is packed into only 110 calories, with little sodium and no fat.

So, why does the potato have a fattening image? All too often the vegetable is guilty by allusion and by association. Actually, although the potato appears to be a bulky vegetable, it is 80 percent water. It's association with high calories toppings like butter, sour cream, gravy and mayonnaise dressing, puts the low calorie potato at a disadvantage. Just one tablespoon of butter will double the number of calories in a baked potato.

Here are some storage tips to help your potatoes keep better!

\* Store potatoes in a cool, humid (but not wet) dark place that's well ventilated. The ideal temperatures are 45 to 50°F.

\* At 45° to 50° F potatoes will keep for several weeks. At temperatures much over that, potatoes should not be stored for more than one week.

Warmer temperatures encourage sprouting and shriveling. Sprouting potatoes can still be used but there will be some waste. Just break off sprouts and you may want to peel them before cooking.

\* Avoid prolonged exposure to light which causes potatoes to turn green. This greening causes a bitter flavor so it should be pared off before the potato is used.

\* Don't refrigerate potatoes. Below 40° F. potatoes will develop a sweet taste, the result of an accumulation of sugars in the tubers. This increased sugar will cause the potato to darken when cooked.

The Airlines Reporting Corporation (ARC) is based in Arlington, Virginia and is a central clearing house for all air-

line ticketing. ARC was formed by the airlines and travel agents following the deregulation of the airline industry. ARC reports that, effective January 1, 1999 an ARC Certified Specialist will be required for all new Travel and Air Freight agency startups, branches and remote locations. Eventually, an ARC Certified Specialist will be required at all locations where airline tickets and air freight are handled. Interestingly enough, air freight also requires an airline ticket, and thus Air Freight Agents are subject to the same ARC standards as Travel Agents.

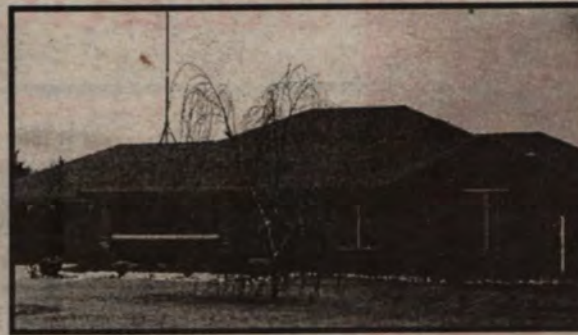

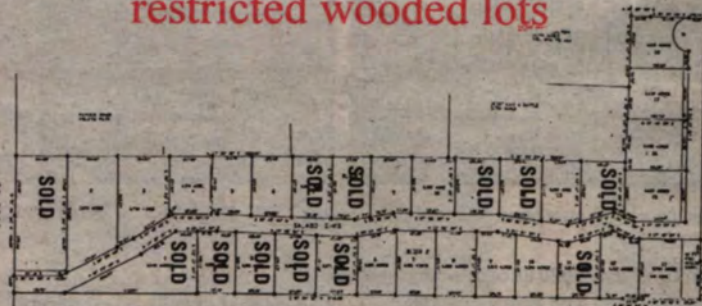
