County Commissioner fined \$500 by Ethics Commission

Texas Ethics Commission determined on Nov. 20, 2019 that Bell County Commissioner Robert D. "Bobby" Whitson told *Salado Village Voice* that when his campaign created its website, it went "live" for two weeks, but that it was never announced to the public. Before the website was publicly

provided to the newspaper included a political advertising disclosure statement."

Whitson provided the Commission with a copy of the flyer he said he provided to the newspaper to publish with the statement "Political ad paid for by Bobby Whitson for County Commissioner."

Whitson, in response to the complaint, filed corrected reports and provided invoices showing that he made political expenditures that were not disclosed in his original reports. Whitson reported on the 8-day pre-election report a \$650 expenditure to Temple Daily Telegram for political advertising that ran between Feb. 5 and March 6 for the 2018 primary election. The invoice is dated December 12.2017 and should have been reported in the January 2018 semiannual report or the 30-day pre-election re-

(used for expenditures made by credit card).

Whitson did not disclose a \$500 expenditure he made to Bell County Living for an ad that ran in the Winter 2017 edition of the maga"This threw the dates for reporting into the earlier period so I missed them," he said.

The Texas Ethics Commission determined that credible evidence indicated that the respondent (Whitson) did not disclose four political expenditures totaling \$3,267.04 on the 30-day and 8-day pre-election reports for the Marhc 2018 primary and the runoff report for the May 22, 2018 primary runoff.

Whitson violated section 255.001 and 254.031 of the Election Code and settled the complaint against him (SC-31809313) by assessing a \$500 civil penalty.

The complaint against Whitson alleged that he did not include a political advertising disclosure statement on political advertising (section 255.001) and did not report political contributions and/or expenditures in violation of section 254.031 of the election code.

The complaint alleged that Whitson did include the political advertising disclosure on a flyer inserted into a newspaper and published on his website.

Whitson swore that he corrected his website to include the disclosure when he realized the error. announced, the political disclosure line was added to the website appropriately.

"I am brand new to politics," Whitson told *Salado Village Voice*. "I ran my campaign by myself. I did not have any professional help. Looking back, that was a mistake. I made rookie mistakes."

He added that when he found out about them he filed the corrected reports concerning the expenditures.

"I'll know better next time," he told *Salado Village Voice*. "I've learned a tremendous amount."

According to the Ethics Commission, Whitson swore that he "did not know why the newspaper flyer did not include the political advertising disclosure statement. He swore that the flyer he The Commission concluded that "There is insufficient evidence the respondent knowingly caused to be published or distributed the flyer lacking a political advertising disclosure statement. Consequently, there is insufficient evidence of a violation of section 255.001."

The complaint also alleged that Whitson did not disclose on his campaign finance reports multiple expenditures or in-kind contributions for the purchase of political advertising in advance of the March 6, 2018 primary election, the May 22, 2019 primary runoff and the November 6 general election. Whitson did not report a \$420 political expenditure to *Salado Village Voice*. Based on the invoice date of Feb. 15, the expenditure should have been reported on the 8-day pre-election report.

Whitson, in response to the complaint, filed a corrected 8-day pre-election report on Oct. 16, 2018 to include the expenditure in *Salado Village Voice* on Schedule F4 zine. Whitson swore that he did not receive an invoice until August 30, 2018 for the ad and would report the expenditure in the October 2018 finance report.

Whitson did not report a \$1,697.04 political expenditure for campaign signs for the runoff. Based on the invoice date, he was required to report the expenditure on the runoff report, due eight days before the May 22, 2018 election. Whitson filed a corrected runoff report on Oct. 16, 2018 that included the expenditure for signs.

Whitson told *Salado Village Voice* that he did not realize that the dates for reporting expenditures were based on when the obligations were made by the campaign, not when invoices were received by the campaign and paid.

The commission cited credible evidence of violations of section 254.031(a) (3) of the Election Code and section 254.031(a)(6) of the Election Code.

The Commissioner stated that Whitson "paid for all political advertising at issue with personal funds." Therefore, there is credible evidence of no violation of section 254.031(a)(1) of the Election Code regarding the allegation that "the respondent did not disclose acceptance of political contributions."

Salado will remain 4A, Division II for 2020-22

Salado High School will remain in 4A-Div. 2 after the University Interscholastic League released updated conference and division cutoff numbers and preliminary enrollment figures for the 2020-2022 reclassification and realignment on Dec. 9, updating previously released figures from Dec. 3.

Salado High School turned in an enrollment of 644 for the 2020-2022 reclassification and realignment. SHS turned in an enrollment number of 563 for the 2018-2020 reclassification.

In an effort to increase transparency and accuracy, the UIL released conference and division cutoff numbers and preliminary enrollment figures last week. New information was brought forward updating numbers previously submitted by schools which has caused conference cutoffs to be revised.

The updated conference cutoff numbers provide the range of enrollment for each of the six conferences, including divisional cutoffs for football.

The updated enrollment numbers and number of schools in each division are the following.

6A: 2,220 +: 245 schools; 245 in Basketball and Football, 243 in Volleyball. 5A: 1,230-2,219: 255 schools: 254 schools in Basketball, 253 in Football, 255 in Volleyball.

4A: 515-1,229: 205 schools: 201 schools in Basketball, 186 in Football, 200 in Volleyball.

3A: 230-514: 235 schools: 235 schools in Basketball, 211 in Football, 222 in Volleyball.

The changes in the enrollment numbers were in the 4A and 5A divisions. In 5A, the bottom number was moved up from 1,210 to 1,230. In 4A, the top enrollment number was moved up from 1,209 to 1,229. In 4A, Division 2, the top number was moved from 864 to 879. In 5A, Div. 2, the top numbed was moved from 1,899 to 1,921.

Preliminary enrollments have also been released to increase transparency and provide for additional verification of enrollment figures. These figures were submitted by school districts based on enrollment on Oct. 25. Preliminary enrollment numbers can be found at www.uiltexas.org/alignments.

No numbers are considered final until the final alignments are released on Feb. 3, 2020. The 2020-22 alignments will be released Feb. 3 for basketball, football and volleyball.

District alignments for other activities will be released in the order of their seasons.

U.S. adds 266,000 jobs, drops unemployment rate to half-century low of 3.5%

The Markets

Despite the exceptionally good news on the employment front, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) limited its gain for the week ending December 6 to 0.16%. Early in the week, the index dropped substantially as the President indicated that there may not be a trade agreement of any kind until after the election, then bumped up as both the U.S. and Chinese trade offices announced that talks were on track. The final gain on Friday morning was with the Labor Department's announcement of an unexpectedly good jobs report.

The employment report buoyed the yield on the U.S. Treasury ten-year note to 1.844%, a rise of 4% from last week. The same tweets that dropped the stock market on Tuesday drove the note's yield down to 1.7% before it recovered late in the week on the employment news. West Texas Intermediate oil (WTI) joined in the surge of optimism as it rose 1.69% for the week to close at \$59.11.

The Economy

The week's big news was that the U.S. economy added 266,000 jobs in November. About 41,000 of those new jobs were a result of the end of the General Motors strike, but the other 225,000 was a pretty impressive number. All those new jobs resulted in the unemployment rate dropping to 3.5% from last month's 3.6%, tying a record and the best we have seen in half a century. Job growth in 2019 has averaged 180,000 per month, compared with 223,000 in 2018, so the growth is slowing, but it is still good growth. The biggest nonstrike related gains were in health care, professional and technical jobs, and in leisure and hospitality. The new employees appear to have come from previously discouraged and marginal workers who were either

working part-time or sidelined for some reason. Wages, on an annualized basis, rose at a 3.1% rate.

One of the great economic mysteries we face is why we are not seeing wages rising faster. Inflation is running just under 2% per year, which means that real wages are only growing at about 1.3%. In every post-WWII expansion, as unemployment dropped to the low single digits a wage war cranked up with employers competing for employees and bidding wages up at ever-increasing rates. Those rising wages, in turn, drove inflation as there was more money to spend on the same number of products. In this expansion, neither wages nor inflation has risen in response to a shortage of employees.

Even as the good news from the labor market sends the signal that the U.S. economy is on firm footing, at the same time other signals suggest that there is an underlying weakness. About one-third of the companies in the S&P 500 stock index are reporting shrinking profits (earnings). That contraction has now been going on for most of 2019 and it matches the earnings pattern we saw in the one or two years prior to previous recessions. At least part of that contraction appears to be from corporations absorbing the extra cost of tariffs without raising consumer prices. ues to rise. In our experience, The Institute for Supply Management reported that the manufacturing sector of the economy scored a 48.1 on its Purchasing Managers Index. Anything below 50 means the business flow is shrinking. Construction

spending, while still at a 1.1% higher level than this time last year, has declined for the past two months 0.3% and 0.8% respectively. Despite tariffs that were intended to help the metals industry, steel and aluminum foundries are laying off employees and some are being shut down. What is clear is that the American consumer is leading the economy and driving this economic expansion. The question is how long the consumer can be the only driving factor while the rest of the system is shrinking.

The tariffs may be working. American companies bought fewer Chinese made consumer goods in October than in recent months, but the drop may be caused by the heightened purchases made by U.S. firms in the months leading up to the current level of tariffs. Still, China remains by far the largest source of imported goods to the United States at 18.2% of imports. That activity has shown in the trucking industry where a year ago we had a critical shortage of trucks to move goods across the country while today there is excess capacity and a shrinking volume.

The signals in the economy remain conflicted with manufacturing, mining, and industries that make or grow things contracting while consumer spending continsuch a dichotomy is unlikely to persist, and something will need to change. Optimists are hoping for a new surge in growth while the more conservative analysts cannot see where the continued growth will come from.

Our Faltering Social Vitality

The economy is in robust good health, but our social fabric isn't.

By two basic measures of social vitality, births and deaths, American society is faltering. Both the fertility rate and life expectancy are declining, in a sign that people feel less secure and, in some cases, have no hope at all.

We are attuned to headline-grabbing economic statistics -- GDP growth, the unemployment rate, wages -- as monthly and quarterly metrics of American well-being, but they aren't as telling as these more fundamental indicators.

To put it bluntly, contemporary America is characterized by less pro-creation and more self-destruction. This suggests something is profoundly wrong with the state of the union, although it doesn't receive the attention and the debate it deserves.

The fertility rate in 2018 dropped for the fourth straight year. It has hit a record low, and has fallen 15% since 2007. With the recovery after the Great Recession, the rate bumped up a little in 2014 before receding again.

Part of the story is a steep drop over the years in teenage pregnancy, a welcome and long-sought development. Women in their 20s have also been having fewer children, though. The trend



is toward women delaying having children and having fewer of them.

As demographer Lyman Stone notes, the survey data tends to show that women still want kids, in fact perhaps more children than before. But later-in-life childbearing is inherently more difficult, and student debt, high housing costs and intense parental investment in children make having kids more burdensome (or at least feel that way).

While we now have fewer births, the death rate is increasing. A new study published in JAMA notes that after stalling out in 2010, life expectancy in the country has been declining since 2014, down from 78.9 years to 78.6 in 2017.

The U.S. has been losing ground to other countries in life expectancy since the 1980s. According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, it now has the lowest life expectancy among comparable advanced nations.

The decline isn't hitting older Americans, who are still making improvements, but is cutting down people in the prime of their life, ages 25-64. "The odds," Lyman Stone writes, "that a 32-year-old will die in a given year rose by almost 25% between 2012-14 and 2015-17. American adulthood has suddenly become more lethal than it has been in decades."

Drug overdoses are a major driver (midlife mortality from drug overdoses has increased almost 400% over the past 20 years), with liver disease and suicide also contributing.

In 2017, an astonishing 150,000 Americans died from drug or alcohol abuse and suicide, more than U.S. combat deaths in World War I, the Korean War and the Vietnam War combined. Evidence suggests that the increased mortality is concentrated among persons with lower levels of educations and income.

If we can get a handle on the opioid crisis, it will make an enormous difference, but the trends in life expectancy and fertility ought to occasion soul-searching. How is it that a society as technologically advanced and affluent as ours can't provide a more inviting environment for childbearing or the supports to keep people from doing themselves grievous harm? Even if there are no ready policy answers, the question must be asked.

Cutting food aid promotes more hunger, not more work

As a kid, food stamps helped me eat, study, and succeed as an adult. Americans today deserve the same investment.

You may have heard about the Trump administration's latest attack on very poor Americans: a punitive new restriction that will cut SNAP benefits for 688,000 people. SNAP, formerly known as food stamps, is our country's most popular and effective nutrition assistance program.

Growing up, my family got food stamps — and oh, I hated it. I hated standing in line at the grocery store, knowing we'd be paying with coupons that would brand us as "poor" to anyone who noticed.

And yet I loved the fact that we had food. As a growing kid, I knew what it was like to come home to a bare kitchen. Those dreaded vouchers meant we got cheese, milk, fruit, eggs, cereal, beans, tortillas, and yes, sometimes even ice cream. That food — and the stability that came with it sent me on my way. Because I wasn't hungry in school, I could pay attention. And I excelled.

I scored in the top few percentiles on every standardized test I ever took. I got into college, where I scraped by with some low-interest loans, scholarships, and waitressing jobs. And now I make a good living for myself.

In fact, I've paid more in taxes over the past 25 years than my family ever got in government assistance. But I haven't forgotten our past, and that's why I strongly support making SNAP available to all families who need it. They deserve the same leg up we got.

That's why threats to SNAP — from the latest attack on "work-capable adults" without kids to other changes that would throw kids off school lunch assistance — make my blood boil.

We don't know what hardships these people tar-

geted by the latest rule face. We do know they are very, very poor, earning less than \$2,200 a year, according to Feeding America.

The stereotype floated by Trump is that adults without children are freeloaders, but how do we know that? How do we know they didn't get laid off from their jobs six months ago? How do we know they are not in school? How can we presume to make assumptions about them or walk in their shoes?

Taking food away from very poor people doesn't promote work — it just makes them hungrier.

Think about it. Could you go out every day looking for work if your stomach was empty? Would you hire someone whose belly growled at you from the other side of the interview desk?

This is just one in a series of efforts by the administration to literally take food off the table for millions of Americans. A recent analysis by the Urban Institute found that if all of Trump's attempts to restrict SNAP had been in place in 2018, 3.7 million would have lost SNAP benefits.

You'd be looking at all sorts of Americans being harmed — the elderly, the disabled, low-income women. And, sadly, children. Children like me.

SNAP is as an investment. As my mother-in-law used to say, "First feed the face, then teach right from wrong."

How can we expect kids who are hungry, ignored, or penalized for being poor to succeed? How can we expect under-nourished adults to lead productive lives, or seek self-improvement, when they're scrounging through dumpsters looking for lunch?

My plea to anyone reading this is to lend your support to continued funding of anti-hunger programs. My brothers and I were worth that small investment 40 years ago. Don't we owe the same to the kids and adults who are worth it today? **DISTRIBUTED BY OTHERWORDS.ORG.**



"Our outreach programs bring people together and we use the opportunity to show how God gave us this heritage and how God's word can change their lives," Johnston added. "No outreach program event is presented without a strong biblical message and the goal of each outreach is to bring the lost to Christ. We continue to guard against letting the outreach be about the event and we keep the focus on the goal of bringing people together to hear God's message."

Johnston said that the need for a centralized piece of property "that will meet the needs of our church outreach teams has been probably the most constricting issue to successful outreach. The task of finding suitable venues for the programs and issues with transportation, set up and landowner use permission make participation difficult."

To meet that need, 20 acres in close proximity to the current church location on Lark Trail was donated and the church congregation recently broke ground on a three-phase construction project.

"From the beginning,

beyond? The potential for our new property far exceeds any expectations of how our mission can be carried out," Johnston said. "God continues to remove barriers to show us that all things are possible through Him."

The property is a beautiful site, according to Johnston, located on 20 acres and close to Temple, Belton, Salado and surrounding communities.

The Heritage Country Church building program will be completed in three phases to include 16,000 plus square feet consisting of the Church, a Fellowship Hall suitable for church fellowship, weddings and community needs, and an Event Center for outreach purposes. The Fellowship Hall and Event Center will be made available for community and local church use.

The ground work for all three phases will be completed at one time. The buildings will be constructed in phases with the church building as the first phase.

Some of the teams and activities associated with Heritage Country Church outreach program include these:

• Western Heritage Team -Events such as horsemanship training for youth, roping events, barrel racing, ranch

• The Pioneer Cooking Team -- Chuck Wagon cookoffs, Pioneer cooking events, and a concession stand in the Event Center for use at all events.

• The Hunting and Fishing Teams will have events inside the Event Center such as Archery Tournaments, hunting and fishing related training and events, public shows and events providing the opportunity to introduce Gods message to the participants.

• Gospel concerts, guest speakers with a gospel message, and the many community events participated in by area churches for the youth that previously were held at the Wildfire Arena could be held in this center. We will have use agreement contracts, applications and rules for the use of the Church Event Center that meet biblical values.

• Other outreach teams include Camping, Hiking and Kayaking, and Craft making.

• Future plans include a fishing pond to have a readily available fishing location for the youth and outreach training courses such as "fly fishing", kayaking, etc.

St. Stephen celebrates 30 years by burning note on debt for new church

St. Stephen Catholic Church celebrated 30 years of serving the community as well as retiring the note on the house of worship located at 601 FM 2268.

The Most Reverend Bishop Joe Vasquez from the Catholic Diocese of Austin joined Reverend Jude Uche of St. Stephen Catholic Church and Deacon Bill Scarmardo of St. Anthony in Bryan as celebrants during the special Celebration of Praise and Thanksgiving on Dec. 8.

At the end of the service, congregants joined Bishop Vasquez, Father Uche and Deacon Scarmardo in a representative burning of the note to mark its final payment by the church congregation.

Glenn Pritchett acted as Master of Ceremonies for the celebration, which included Mayor Skip Blancett reading a proclamation honoring the church congregation and a presentation on the history of the St. Stephen Parish by Mike Reed, Pastoral Council representative.

Food and fellowship followed the burning of the note.

"It is awe inspiring to realize that we are celebrating both the 30th anniversary of Saint Stephen Parish as well as retiring the note on our beautiful house of worship," Reed said, reading a history prepared by Helen W. Simonette.

In the spring of 1989, there were 12 families in Salado that approached then-Bishop John McCarthy to explore establishing a Catholic parish in Salado. Father Charles Davis agreed to shepherd the new parish. The first Mass was held in a room at the old Stagecoach Inn. Of the original group that founded the parish only Winnie and Tom Buckley have been in the parish the entire three decades. Jordan Pfunter, a newly ordained deacon, was assigned to be the parish administrator. During his tenure, eight acres was purchase by the Diocese to act as the site for the new church. The name of the Parish was also changed from Holy Trinity to Saint Stephen in honor of the first Deacon. A portable classroom was located and moved from Waco to Salado to serve as an office, living quarters for Pfunter and his wife Marge and the first

Rectory of the church. "This church would not be here today without the work and dedication of the Pfunters," Reed said.

Mass was celebrated on Sunday evenings at Tablerock's backstage area. "Larry and Kathy Michna and their three children were always there to arrange the altar and seating," Reed said.

Father Arthur Michalka, retired from Corn Hill, son added Mass at Saint Stephen as visiting priest.

Stephen and Mary Catherine Ervin then came to Salado. "Steve arranged to make the cafeteria of the elementary available to hold Mass every Sunday," Reed said. Mass was held there until Easter Sunday 1992 when the church finally had its own building.

The church acquired a building donated by a local credit union, as long as the church would move it from Temple to Salado. "It served as our parish home for 23 years," Reed said. The building, still on the property, is now called the Jordan Pfunter Center. Nelda and Buddy Roessler transformed the building into a church, Reed said. After Deacon Pfunter, Deacon John Petter served as Pastoral Administrator. "He and wife Janie were a team dedicated to the growth of our church" Reed said. Father Charlie Davis returned to Saint Stephen to served as pastor and remained until 2008. Father Gregory Mc-Laughlin became pastor when Father Davis retired. He was responsible for the Five-Year Strategic Facilities Plan which "resulted in the construction of the church building we have today," Reed said.


Rev. Aloysius Nzekwe of the Missionaries of Saint Paul came to the church from this order in Houston. "This wonderful poster arrived with his Bible under his arm and the most ingratiating smile," Reed said.

Three years later, Father Aloy would return to Houston and Father Jude Ummunna Uche would come to Saint Stephen.

"The energy he possess is God given," Reed said. "He is so loved and admired by this church as he leads us to a closer relationship with our Lord and Savior."

"The dynamic duo of Aloy and Jude will always be remembered," Reed said. "Father Aloy built this new church and Father Jude retired the note on the church and rectory."

wins with the king. However, he soon finds himself in trouble after East next takes the ace of diamonds and returns a club. If declarer finesses, he is defeated at once when West wins the king of clubs and returns a second heart, allowing East to score four heart tricks for down two. And if South puts up the ace of clubs instead, he can collect only eight tricks before meeting a similar fate. The battle lines can be completely reversed, however, if declarer puts up dummy's queen of hearts at trick one. This forces East to win the trick to prevent South from scoring two heart tricks instead of one. Furthermore, it stops East from returning a heart, which would hand South a trick with dummy's ten. East therefore shifts to a club, but declarer must still be careful. If he finesses, West wins and returns a heart to establish three heart tricks for East before the ace of diamonds has been driven out. Instead, declarer should rise with the ace of clubs and attack diamonds. East wins, but the conflict is now over. He still cannot play a heart without permitting the ten to become South's ninth trick, so he must try another suit. A club return develops a trick for declarer in that suit, while a diamond or spade return allows South to win and establish the club trick himself. As is so often the case, the very first trick determines which side ultimately wins the battle.
