Goodnight and Charles A. Fleming were both placed in the Plaza of Honor for the work they have done for the youth of Bell County.

Saladoan Gene Goodnight has been active with the Bell County Youth Fair for the past 22 years and continues to give his support to the youth of Bell County.

Goodnight served as Treasurer of the Bell County Youth Fair in 1973, he was then elected to the office of President and served from 1974 through 1975. Again, he accepted the office of Treasurer and served from 1976 to 1985. During his years as Treasurer, Gene supplied personnel from his office staff to keep books, pay bills, and do all the Youth Fair

paperwork and schedules at no cost to the Fair. As Treasurer, Mr. Goodnight brought the Fair from the red to black by securing money to meet the expenses not covered. He donated many hours of his time in securing money for ribbons and awards for the Ag. and Home Economics Divisions.

He was highly instrumental in getting the show to a level where all in Bell County could participate. He then had great part in securing funds for the new Bell County Expo Facility, having served as a member of the Planning Board.

Natural Born Killers is easily the worst film I have seen in recent memory. It is disgustingly graphic and senselessly violent.

I did not miss the point of the movie, which is our fascination as a people with killers. Olive Stone ridicules American society by putting forth his two serial-killing heroes, Mickey and Mallory.

Mickey and Mallory go on a killing spree and become national heroes, complete with a fan club bearing signs "Kill Me, Mickey!"

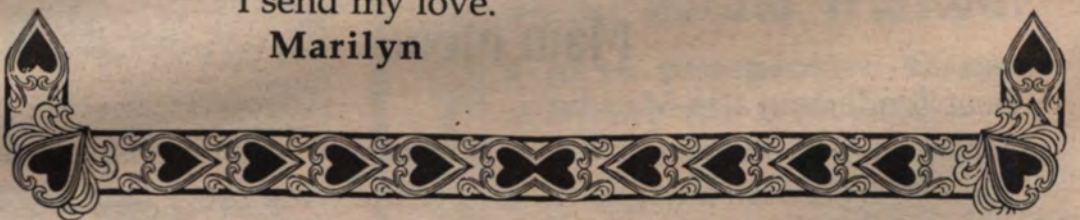

Fox Tales: First Valentine's & loves remembered

My mother never threw away much, and she never threw away anything of mine after I left home. Recently, I came across an old envelope of Valentines marked 'JDF'. At first I thought they were some that I had saved for my oldest son, but to my surprise, they were some that my mother had saved from my school days!

It was a treat to read some from 'girl friends' of long ago. Almost sixty years have passed since I received some of those cards, but they still have the power to bring a smile to my face and funny memories from the past.

I had one from Mrs. McGee who was my third grade teacher, and my first love. Yes, I was deep in love with Mrs. McGee. She was so pretty, and she was so nice to me. She always called on me when I raised my hand, and though it never occurred to me before, I wonder if she could have helped in developing my habit of talking too much?

It was a terrible day that I fell out of love with Mrs. McGee. I remember it very well. In childish error, I called her 'Mama' instead of Mrs. McGee. Now never mind telling me that such a thing happens all the time, because it doesn't help. I was mortified. My face must have looked like it was on fire, and the class wouldn't stop laughing at me. I was terrible. I couldn't love her after that, it was too embarrassing. I didn't even want to hold my hand up to go to the restroom.

Was it the age or was it some other circumstance of the time? I don't know, but next year in the fourth grade, I discovered girls of my own age. The two I remember best were Pauline Bradley, and Ruth Coffee. Pauline was a favorite of mine to love, but she didn't give me much encouragement. That love lasted only a year or two and then starved to death. In the meantime, Ruth Coffee moved in from Michigan, and she was just too cute for words. She had

'bangs'. I knew she liked me because she smiled at me all the time. That love perished as well due to lack of attention. I was a very bashful boy in those days.

Junior High School brought a whole new crop of females for my consideration. Lottie Mae Sepkowitz was one of the first to 'plus' me. You know, that's when they are always writing 'LMS+JDF' on things where you can find them. That's kind of embarrassing for a bashful kid like me, but it was exciting as well. Lottie taught me how to kiss. Well, maybe I should say she tried to teach me, because even though I was a willing student, I was a very bashful kid . . . in those days.

I went to a party at Lottie's house one evening and didn't get home until well after dark. What's the significance of that? Well, in the first place it was all the way on the other side of town (Wichita Falls, Texas), and I had to go on my bicycle. Bicycles in the

dark are a little dangerous even in those days. But the main thing was that my chores had to be put off until I got home. The old milk cow stood at the fence and 'mooed' when her regular time passed to be fed and milked. Making the milk cow wait was a serious offence, but the worst part was when Mama found 'evidence' of what I had been doing at the party.

At the party, I learned a new game called 'Post Office'. I don't remember all the rules, but remembering all the rules was not important even in those days. The girls all went into a room together and each assumed a different name of a postage stamp. There were names like First Class, Parcel Post, Special Delivery, etc. and so forth. On a signal that the girls were ready, each boy, in turn, was allowed to enter the room and sit in a chair in the middle of the room. With the lights turned out, he was told to request something from the 'Post Office', and when he called for a stamp, he was then kissed by the girl with

that title. It didn't take me long to find out that when you asked for Air Mail, then all the girls had to kiss you.

Lottie took me aside and told me that I needed some special instructions before I went into the room, because I had confided in her that I wasn't familiar with the game. After some 'special' instructions and a little practice, she told me what her stamp name would be. Hey, it was her party, so, I guess she could cheat a little if she wanted.

It was great fun, but not when I got home and Mama found out what I'd been doing by the evidence . . . in my eyebrows. I had wiped all the lipstick off except the part I couldn't see in my eyebrows. I didn't get to go to any more parties at Lottie's house after that.

Well, those were the 'Valentine' days for me. That was when you gave them to your boy friends as well as your girl friends. I don't know what the young people of today think of exchanging Valentines, but in the simpler times it was fun. The memories are even more fun.
