## Texas School Planning meets with community members

Representatives from Texas School Planning, Inc., which has been contracted by Salado ISD to formulate a building needs study, met with community members and members of the Site-based Decision Making Committees April 10.

Dr. Arnold Oates, a former superintendent from San Antonio, and Dr. Lee Burch, an architect from Tyler, will utilize doctoral students at Texas A&M University for their study of Salado I.S.D. building needs.

In their study of Salado schools, they will consider the structure of the present schools and renovation needs, safety standards and issues, maintainability of the plant, educational adequacy and the education environment.

"We will also assess the community needs and wants," said Dr. Oates.

"Because many of you deal with the schools on a regular basis, you have an 'ownership' relationship with the schools. You are able to overlook the bumps and bruises," said Dr. Burch. "We can be objective and even brutal, if nec-

essary, in what we see."

After assessing the needs of the district, Texas School Planning, Inc. may present up to four different scenarios Salado ISD may consider, including expanding and utilizing the present site, or building a new school at a new location.

They also received input from community members, most of whom addressed the issue of cost and location of a new school.

Many community members who spoke, said that the district should give a great deal of consideration to utilizing the present location.

"If you come back to us and tell us we need to build off-site, you should also tell us why we cannot use our present site," said Darrell Street. "Most of the people I have heard were opposed to the location (of the last bond issue, which failed in January)."

"You have some tough choices ahead of you," said Dr. Oates. "We're here today to collect data, so you can make those choices."

Dr. Oates said that Texas School Planning, Inc. will continue to work with the community and the school board before presenting its findings in June.

## Chamber discusses crime in Salado with Sheriff Smith

Bell County Sheriff Dan Smith told Salado Chamber of Commerce directors Apr. 10 that his office would work with community members to establish a Citizens on Patrol program to combat problems with vandalism and other petty crimes in the area.

Sheriff Smith said that "Salado is not unique in its problems. Other communities and residential subdivisions in the county are encountering similar problems with vandals."

The Sheriff's Department has 20 patrol deputies, which translates to approximately 1 deputy to cover a 300 sq. mile area

during each shift.

"Because of the limited resources, we are being reactive rather than proactive in dealing with some crimes in the county," Smith said.

But programs such as Citizen on Patrol and educational programs may help reduce the problems Salado continues to experience in Mill Creek and other areas of the village.

One option may be to contract with the commissioner's court to provide security personnel and support to the village. "But I am not sure that there is an organization within Salado that has the financial resources necessary to do this."

"At some point in time you may need to address

incorporation to better handle the issue of petty crimes," Sheriff Smith said.

In other business, Ken Clapp reported to the Chamber that the note on the Salado Civic Center has been paid in-full and a celebration is planned Sept. 30.

"We will have a Thank You Salado Day complete with music, food, fun and no speeches," Clapp said.

Dr. Douglas Willingham reported on efforts the Chamber is engaged upon to place an appropriate memorial to Thelma Fletcher within the Salado Civic Center.

Plans are underway to have a large print of an oil portrait of Thelma Fletcher framed and placed in the Salado Public Library.

Mrs. Fletcher was a charter member of the Salado Public Library, the Salado Historical Society as well as many other organizations in the village.

The Chamber will also pursue having an historical marker concerning the pace family placed at Pace Park for the 50th Anniversary of the formation of the park.

The Chamber board, after an executive session, decided to pay the legal fees involved in the property dispute in Pace Park.

The property dispute was resolved when an offer by Jack and Pat Herrington to swap the disputed .26 acres of land for an acre of land adjoining the park on the creek was accepted by the Pace Park Trustees.

Today, April 12, 1995, marks the 50th anniversary of the passing of one of this nation's greatest leaders. It was on April 12, 1945, that Franklin Delano Roosevelt died in Warm Springs, Georgia. He was serving in his fourth term as President of the United States at the time of his death - an unprecedented achievement in the annals of American History.

Sadly, he died but a few days before the end of the second world war in Europe (V-E Day) and four months before V-J Day, which marked the end of all hostilities. A goal to which he gave the last bit of strength he had. He was 63 when he died!

President Roosevelt took office during the darkest days of the depression, on March 3, 1933, and immediately brought hope and light to millions of Americans who had lost a great deal of enthusiasm for the democratic experiment that had so recently proven its strength in winning the first world war and creating a post-war boom the likes of which we had never seen.

The story of the first two administrations of FDR are well known and for time and space reasons need not

be recounted here.

It was his decision in 1940, with the second world war already underway in Europe, to run for a third term - something no other president had even dreamed of - that began the second and perhaps most important phase of his presidency. Within less than a year after his third inauguration, America was attacked by Japan at Pearl Harbor and we began preparing to fight a two front war with little if any tools or manpower ready to wage such an all-out effort.

The story of FDR's leadership during the second world war is also a matter of record. No matter what our political persuasion might be today - few, if any, thinking American can doubt the value of having a leader of FDR's ability and capacity at the helm of this great nation during the tumultuous period that spanned the depression and later the war years.

Some have said FDR was the greatest president of the 20th century. Others have denounced him as a

demon for his liberal social leanings and his dislike of big business. Still others have accused him of allowing the nation to be dragged into the second world war.

No one then, or now, is neutral when it comes time to judge FDR!

What can truthfully be said about President Roosevelt is that he loved every minute of being president and for many people who were then at the bottom of the economic totem pole, he was the embodiment of a father figure leading his children out of the morass of a deep depression and through a war that has no parallel in world history.

It is historically accurate to say he was no saint - but to nearly every biographer or latter day writer of that time in our history - he was

most definitely the right man in the right job at the right time in our history!

According to his biographers he was writing a few words in preparation for a Jefferson Day speech on the day he died, actually off and on while he was having his picture painted and moments before he suffered the stroke that took his life.

Thus it was that he

Hosch followed with a bunt single. Both runners advanced via a stolen base. Josh Goodnight then received a base on balls to load the bases. Chris Frazier followed with a single to drive in Cabaniss. A single by Shawn Easley produced two more runs to give the Eagles a 3-0 lead after 3 innings.

After Hutto was shot-out in the top of the fourth, Salado iced the game with five runs in the bottom half. Cabaniss again started things this time with a single. Jereme Hosch drew a walk to put runners at first and second. A Goodnight double brought Cabaniss in. Chris Frazier hit a towering shot over the right field power alley fence for a 7-0 Eagle lead. Easley followed up with a single. He stole second and scored on a double by Jerome Peoples.

Salado ended the game due to the 10 run rule in the bottom of the fifth. Cabaniss doubled to right. Jereme Hosch followed with a homerun over the right field fence for the fi-

nal score. Jereme Hosch led the Eagles at the plate with a 3-3 performance. Cabaniss, Frazier, and Easley all

collected two hits on the night.

Frazier also pitched a complete game on the night. He allowed only two hits on the night. He did not walk anyone and struck out 8. The win gives Frazier a 4-0 record on the year.

Salado's April 7, night game against Somerville Yeguas was a little more exciting and had more drama than the previous game as it was not decided until the bottom of the seventh.

Buckley, Paul Mashburn and Courtney Dodge all collected hits on both games.

# Grill it right this summer

Grilling meats carefully can prevent excessive smoke and charring that may be unhealthy. To keep your cookouts both safe and fun, follow these simple tips in proper food preparation and grilling:

Choose meats for cookouts that are low in fat to avoid flare ups from dripping fat. Trim excess fat from the meat before grilling.

- Avoid marinades or basting sauces that contain a lot of fat.

- Cover the grill with aluminum foil. Punch holes between the grids to let juice drip out.

- If dripping fat causes heavy smoke, move the food to another section of the grill, rotate the grill or reduce the heat.

- Learn to control the fire. Cook meat until it is

done, but without charring it. Remove any charred or burned material that forms on the food's surface. Do not eat it.

- Wrap foods such as fish and vegetables in foil to protect them from smoke while grilling.

- Reduce grilling time by precooking many foods, including poultry and ribs, by boiling or cooking in the microwave. However, immediately place precooked foods on the grill to complete cooking and give it that grilled flavor. Partially-cooked foods may develop bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness.

Cookouts are popular family and social activities. Keep them safe by following common sense rules of cleanliness, food safety and healthful cooking.

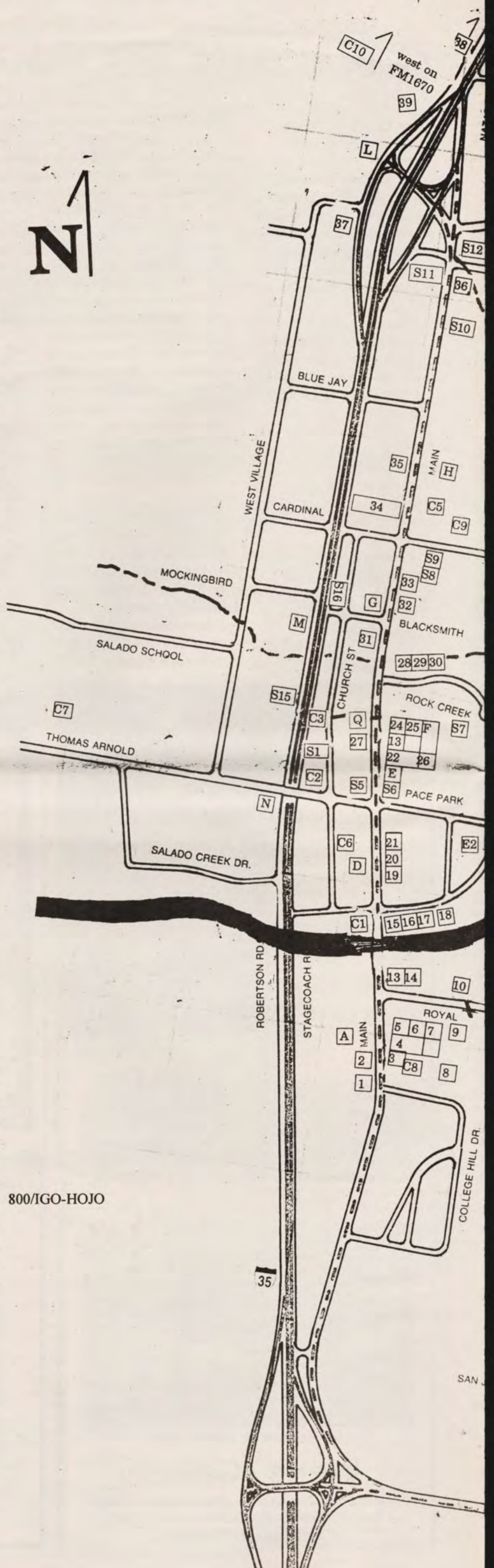

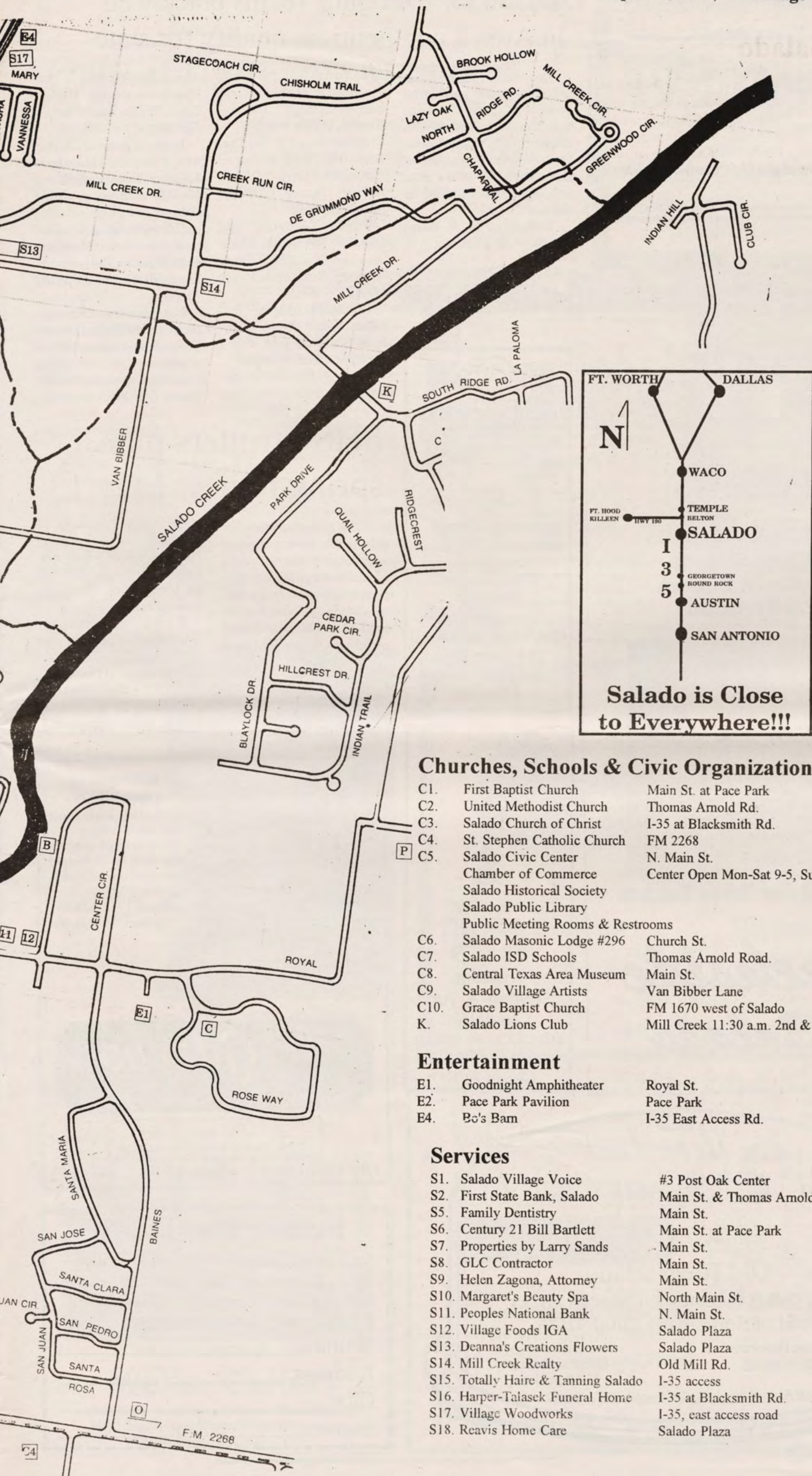

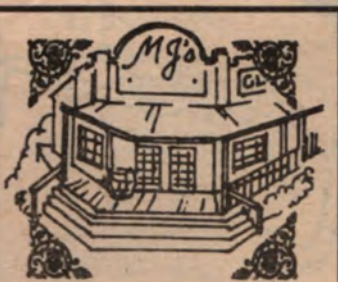

None of this helps Governor Bush as he tries to build a consensus between the parties to get some of his programs enacted.

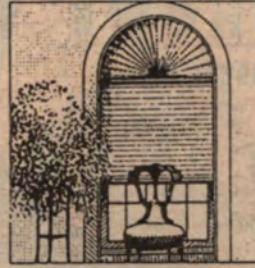
Especially since Chairman Pauken has listed Democratic House Speaker Pete Laney's district as one the Republicans plan to go after next year!

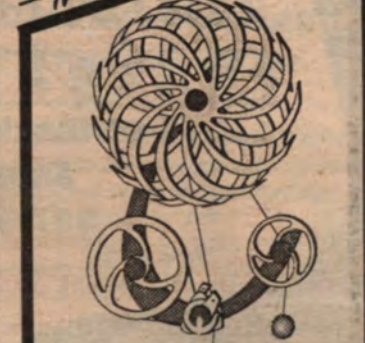

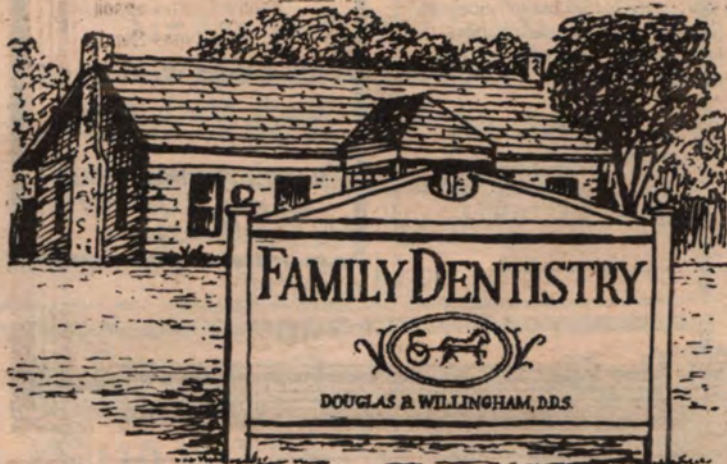

The Texas Lions Camp has provided over 40,000 children with various physical disabilities an opportunity to learn and enjoy the outdoors since it began in 1953. The Camp is a nonprofit organization funded by Lions and private donations. There is no charge for campers to attend.


