Number Sense, Math teams to defend State Championship

Ten Salado High School students competed at the Region IV Conference 2A Academic Meet at Palo Alto College in San Antonio April 20 with the Number Sense and Math Teams winning first place.

In the individual Number Sense competition, Vinny Michna won first place with a score of 346. Kyle Anderson placed second with a score of 292 and Michelle Lenis placed third with a score of 211. Salado won first place in the Number Sense Team competition with 849 points. Stockdale High School was second with a score of 506.

In the individual Mathematics competition, Michna won first place with a score of 258, Anderson won second place with a score of 184 and Marissa Lindley won sixth place with a score of 104. The

Mathematics team took first place with a score of 546. Shiner High School was second with a score of 238.

Also competing at Regional were these Salado students: Kristin Cawthon in Literary Criticism, McKenzie Brown and Jason Williams in Persuasive Speaking, Amanda Morris in Science and in Computer Applications, Marissa Lindley in Computer Applications and Michelle Lenis, Chad Kiphart and Chris Frazier in Computer Science.

Salado will defend its State Championships in Number Sense and Mathematics at the State Meet May 3 at the University of Texas at Austin. This will be the fourth consecutive trip to the State Meet for Michna and Anderson.



The Farr House

Spring Homes Tour May 4-5 in Salado

Contrasts in time and life-style are seen in the variety of houses and properties featured on the Salado Historical Homes Tour May 4-5. The Salado Tour of Homes is held concurrently with the Salado Antique Show, on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center on Main St.

The two properties in which the contrast is sharply defined are the Farr House, 20 Rose Way, and the Jimmy Murchison home at 601 Old Mill Road. Mr. and Mrs. George Kolb own the Farr House.

George Kolb moved the Farr House from its original site in Belton in 1993 and restored it to its 1870 appearance. A family den and two additional bedrooms were added later.

Features of the house include barn lumber in the kitchen with etched glass cabinet doors, original hardwood floors and a blend of primitive and early Texas antiques.

The Murchison home, contemporary in style, was

one of the first houses built east of the creek by Desmond Fletcher, in 1981. Constructed of native stone and cedar, it blends with the surrounding trees and topography.

Interior decor contrasts with its exterior lines. Antique heirlooms, traditional furniture and numerous collections and conversational pieces are displayed in rooms with unexpected color schemes.

Other structures to be opened 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. May 4 and 1 - 5 p.m. May 5 include:

The Barton House, a three-story stone home of one of Salado's earliest physicians, presently owned by Robert and Doris Denman.

The Veranda, a professional office complex, originally a Lampasas hotel erected in the mid-1800's, moved last year to Salado by a partnership of Tim Brown, Joe David Stanford, Glenn Hodge and Billy Pipes. Doors and flooring in the building came from the old state

capitol.

The Fowler House, 1301 North Main St., built in 1872 by Confederate veteran and professor of mathematics at the Old Salado College, now the residence of Rev. and Mrs. Dale Gore. The cottage on the property, home of Frances Bissett, will be open also.

The Boles-Aiken Log Cabin, on the grounds of the Old Salado School, discovered and restored by the Salado Historical Society in 1986.

The Car Barn, east side of the access road, housing a collection of vintage automobiles restored by Dr. Don Ellis.

Tickets for the tour of homes are available at the Salado Chamber of Commerce office at the Salado Civic Center on Main St. for \$7 in advance or \$8 when purchased the day of the tour at any of the properties.

The Salado Antique Show will feature over 40 quality antique dealers from around the state and country, according to Show chairman Jimmy Murchison.

The Antique Show will be open 9 a.m.-6 p.m. May 4 and 10 a.m.-5 p.m. May 5. Tickets are \$3 per person the day of the show.

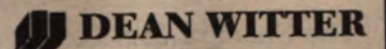

On August 10, 1976, in Belfast, Northern Ireland, Betty Williams witnessed English soldiers shoot and kill an IRA soldier whose car then careened out of control, killing two young children and fatally wounding a third. This horrible violence ignited this Catho-

lic daughter of a converted Protestant into action. Williams formed an organization called the "Community of the Peace People" and became the catalyst for thousands of Northern Irish women, both Protestant and Catholic, and later women and men of all reli-

gions and nationalities to unite and denounce violence of any kind by any side. Williams was awarded the Nobel Prize for her initiatives.

Williams recently spoke at the United Nations "Visions of Peace Forum" with Desmond Tutu, Arias Sanchez, and Lech Walesa.

Non-violence and cooperation are her means and world peace is her goal; while Mahatma Ghandi and Martin Luther King, Jr. are her models. She will be the keynote speaker at the Second Congress for the Synthesis of Religion and Science in Calcutta, India.

SIGNALS CHANGE IN BELTON, ROGERS

Motorists traveling through Belton and Rogers in the late night or early morning hours will see a change in traffic signals late this week.

Crews from the Texas Department of Transportation are currently upgrading the signals on Main Street (Texas 317) and Central Avenue (Spur 253) in Belton and Texas 36 and FM 437 in Rogers. Beginning Thursday, these

signals will no longer switch to the flash mode after 10:30 p.m. Drivers should exercise caution while everyone becomes familiar with the change.

SIGN CONSTRUCTION WORK BEGINS

A project set to begin this week will make it easier for travelers on state highways in Bell County to locate intersecting county roads.

struction Company of Eddy is placing approximately 660 directional signs along all state highways. No lane closures are required, but motorists are urged to slow down and watch for workers and equipment.

These signs are designated to assist emergency personnel when responding to 9-1-1 calls. This \$94,000 project should be completed in approximately four months.

Bell County Museum seeking information on Chisholm Trail

The Bell County Museum requests information relating to the Chisholm Trail in preparation for an upcoming exhibit.

The Chisholm Trail started in South Texas, extended north into Kansas, and passed through Bell County at Salado and Belton. The trail was named for fur trader Jesse Chisholm, whose wagon tracks marked a path from Wichita, Kansas to Council Grove, Oklahoma.

Henry Spekes was the first to drive cattle along that trail in 1866. In the following twenty years, thousands of Texas longhorns were driven north on the Chisholm Trail to markets in towns such as Abilene, Wichita, and Ellsworth, Kansas.

"We hope to exhibit equipment used on the trail, such a chaps, spurs, saddles and maps," said curator Jodi Wright. "We are also interested in stories and photographs of

people from Bell County who participated in the cattle drives on the Chisholm Trail." The museum welcomes donations, but will also accept loans for the exhibit.

Anyone with information on the Chisholm Trail may contact the Bell County Museum at 933-5243. The museum is open Tuesday through Saturday from 1 to 5 p.m. and is located at 210 North Main, in Belton. Admission is free.

Silver-haired Legislature election set May 25

Election day for the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature will be May 28, 1996 and voting sites will be set up in each senior center in Bell, Coryell, and Milam counties for those Older Texans who choose to vote in person. However, the primary method of voting for the 1996-1998 legislative candidates will be via an absentee ballot. Absentee ballots may be secured at area senior centers or may be requested from the Area Agency on Aging of Central Texas, P. O. Box 729, Belton, Texas 76513 or phone 817-939-1886. Senior Centers will have an absentee ballot box where ballots may be deposited or they may be mailed the Area Agency on Aging.

A qualified voter for the Silver-Haired election is a person who is 60 years or age or older on date of voting, a registered voter and a resident of the County and Place that will be represented by the candidates.

Representing West Bell and Coryell Counties (Place 2), will be CLAY J. DAVIS of Moody, Texas. He has 38 years as a public school teacher/principal and is currently Elementary Principal for the Bruceville-Eddy ISD and is running unopposed.

Representing Belton, Temple and East Bell County (Place 3), running unopposed, will be EARL WINDELL ROBINSON of Killeen, Texas who is retired from the U.S. Army. Representing Milam County (Place 4) will be MILDRED N. SPINN of Cameron, Texas who is retired from 31 years of personnel recruiting with Texas Employment Commission and Scott & White; and BONNIE BELLE HOLDER of Cameron, Texas, who was a self-employed income consultant and is now retired.

Voters are encouraged to use the absentee ballot. The absentee balloting pe-

riod will commence May 1, 1996 and ends May 22, 1996. Voters are reminded to deposit their absentee ballots in the nearest senior center. Ballots mailed to the Area Agency on Aging must be postmarked not later than May 22, 1996 to be counted.

The Texas Silver-Haired Legislature is a statewide, volunteer, non-partisan legislative body, authorized by the state legislature to recommend legislation on issues affecting the state's elderly population for their consideration. Central Texas representatives, elected in May, will join the 116 member body for a five day orientation and training session to be held in Jester Hall on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin during the period of July 29, 1996 to August 2, 1996. The legislators will return to Austin for the Legislative Session to be held in the State Capitol's House of Representatives' chambers from September 9-13, 1996.

SURPRISE!

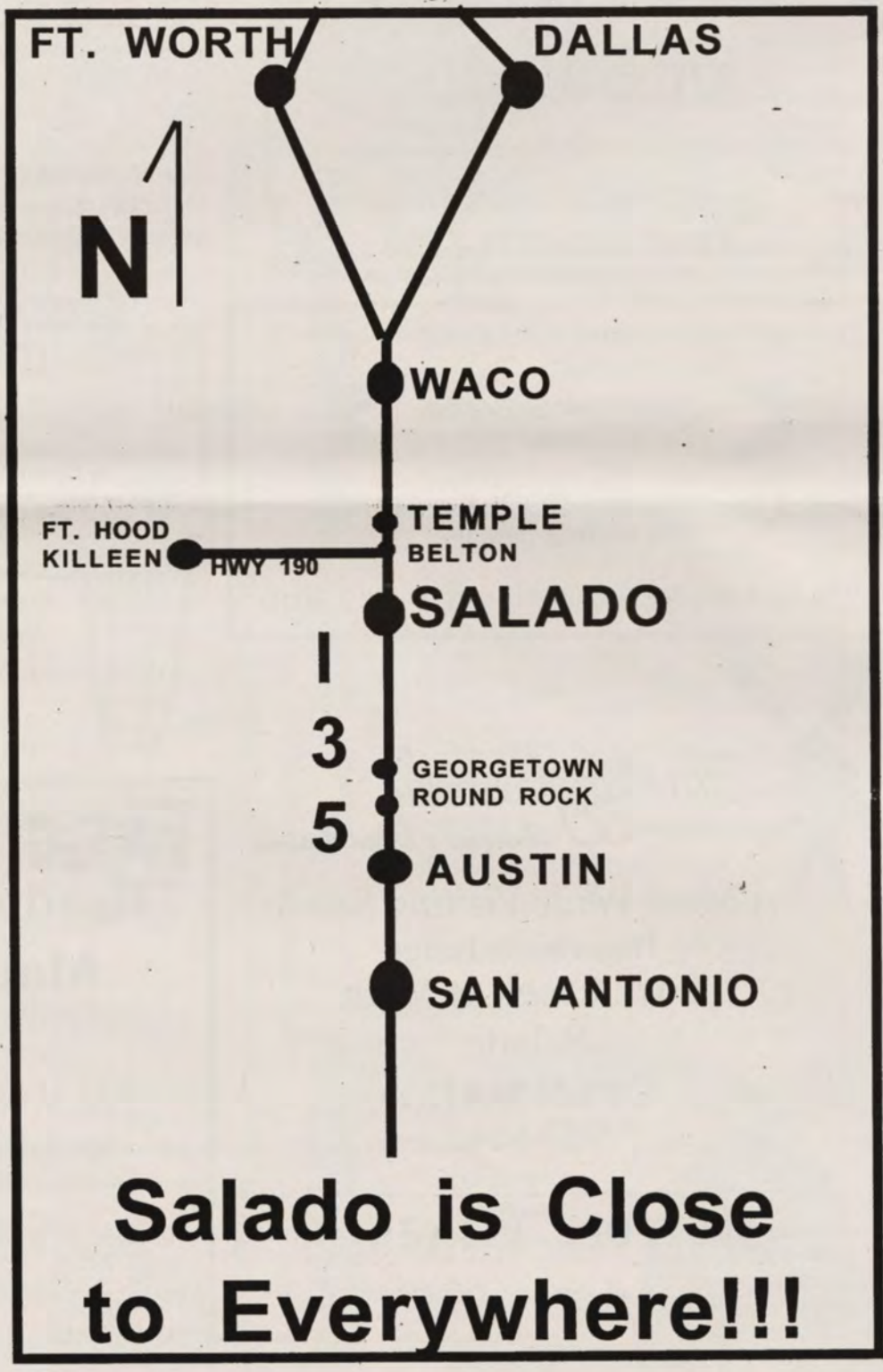
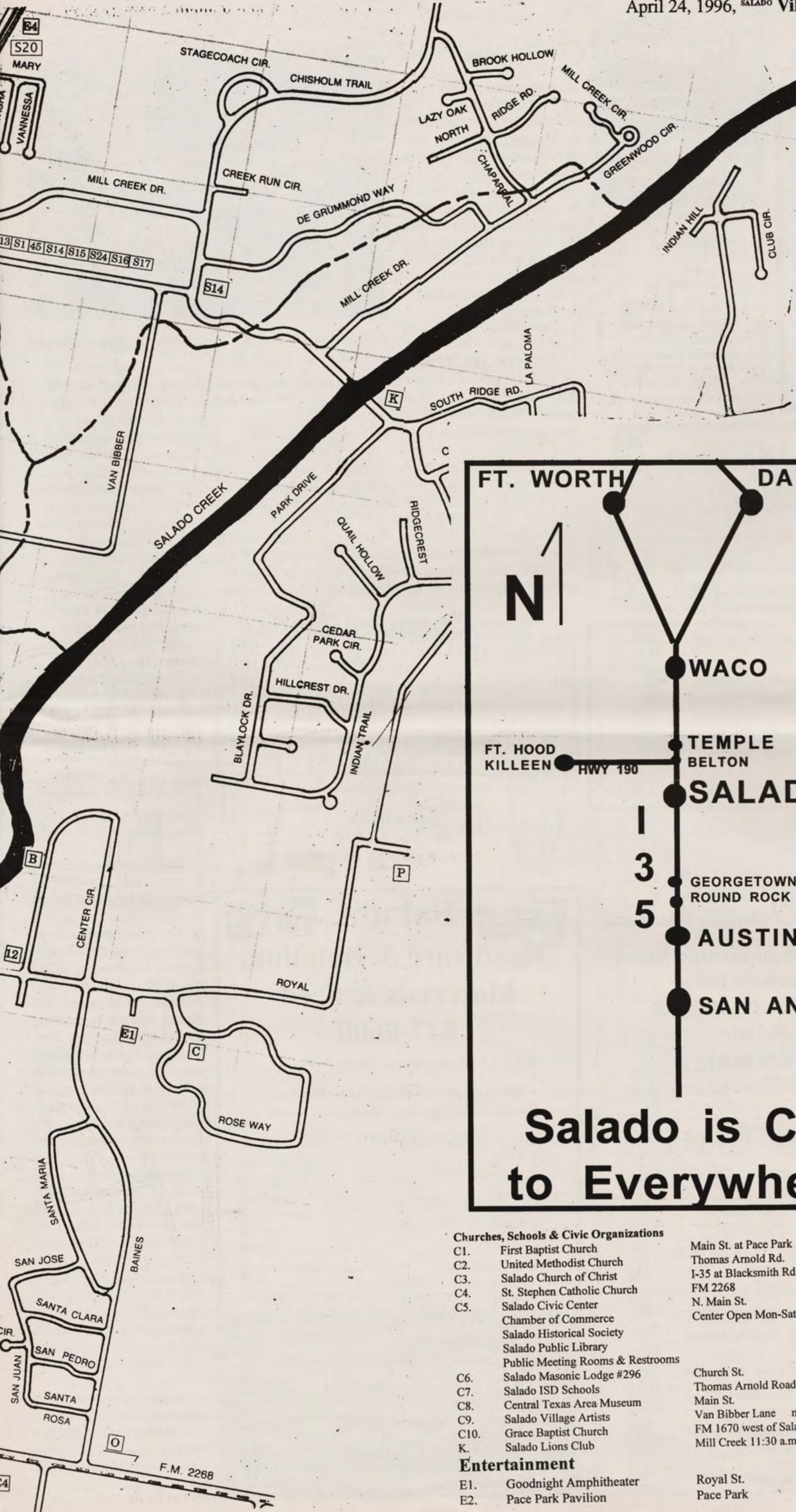

Kirk scored on an error on Clint Carroll's grounder. Hughes came on around when another error was committed on Easley's ground ball. Frazier followed Peoples single with one of his own to drive in two more runs.

Salado ended the game in the sixth inning with six runs, three walks (Kirk, Steven Cloud, Easley), three singles (Buckley, Jon Phelps, Frazier) and a double by Paul Mashburn produced the runs.

Chris Frazier was 3 of 4 on the night with four runs batted in. William Culp was 2 of 3 with two rbi's.

Roger Buckley pitched the first four and two third's innings allowing only one hit and striking out six. Frazier received credit for the win, pitching the last one and one third. He struck out three. The win gives the Eagles a 13 and 5 record for the year.
