## Water co. asks folks to conserve resource

Due to the ongoing drought conditions in our area and excessive pumping from our only water resource currently available, I am updating you on our situation and our planning.

The Edwards Aquifer has not caught any significant recharge in the past two years, while at the same time more and more water is being extracted from it. Our service portion of the aquifer is over two feet below normal conditions at this time.

We urge our customers to be conservation minded

in using water in this period of extremely dry conditions. A common sense approach and a good faith effort by all who use the aquifer will assure a plentiful supply of water in the future. We ask that you maintain your lawns and landscape instead of making them lush. We ask that you cut back on washing cars and washing driveways as often as in the past.

If by voluntary rationing we are unable to reduce flows from the aquifer we will be forced to implement a set of mandatory rationing procedures. With the help of all involved this will not be necessary.

## Villager has concerns over proposed walkway, bridge along Main St.

To the Editor:

I hear we have a new walk bridge coming to Salado as part of state highway departments' renovations to Salado's Main Street. I have to admit that from the information made available to me, this is really a Texas size walk bridge - 87 feet long, 13.5 feet wide and 20 (?) or so feet tall (all of these are approximates because I have never seen the actual measurements anywhere nor do these measurements include the ramps to the bridge on either end). Now I have lived in a number of places over the years, but I have never seen a walk bridge this large outside of Texas. And what better place to put it than on Main Street Salado.

When I first heard of this project many months ago, it was described as an old metal walk bridge that was to be re-constructed over Rock Creek. Of course I made the assumption that a walk bridge would be in the neighborhood of 5-6 feet wide and cover the distance of Rock Creek. I also made the assumption that it would be on the east side of Rock Creek because there is absolutely no need for it on the west side at that point where there are only residences and not one business. It seems as if the State Highway Department has a lot more insight than I ever would. They decided to relocate a single lane highway bridge from Coryell County to Salado and make it a walk bridge that serves no-one at a price of \$500,000 (which does not include the cost of maintenance over the next 50 years). I am not saying that there was

no room for improvement for pedestrian traffic over Rock Creek, but this seems a little extreme.

Over the past few weeks I have asked a number of Salado citizens what they think of the new walk bridge that is planned for Main Street, most have never even heard of the bridge or have thought it was something in the area of 5-6 feet wide and 20-30 feet long on the east side. None ever thought it was going to be this large. I did however run into a couple of people who actually knew what the project was all about and they stated "It will receive a historical marker as soon as it is finished". I never knew that Salado needed any help in receiving historical markers (I guess if the Washington or San Jacinto Monuments become available we will welcome those also).

I also wonder if and how our Chamber of Commerce could be in favor of this project. Since I know that the bridge itself would never become a safety issue or be the bearer of unsolicited graffiti and the Chamber would not be asked to repaint, etc. because the State Highway Department would come out immediately and respond to these situations. And besides our Chamber is trying to divorce itself of additional civil responsibilities.

I heard the bridge would help improve pedestrian safety along Main Street. I guess this is why we are forcing the pedestrians to cross Main Street in front of the Barton House (one of the busiest areas of Main Street) to get to a sidewalk and walk bridge that would

look into three residences on the west side. And let us not mention the cutting of the state owned trees that will be removed to make room for the 13.5 foot wide walk bridge.

I also wonder when Salado is so environmentally conscious if it is the most intelligent solution to be placing asphalt "extensions" as sidewalks along Main Street. Safety for the pedestrian could be another concern. Is something akin to a speed bump separating the street from the sidewalk sufficient for our tourists-granted something is better than small dirt paths that we have now. But, if the State Highway Department is spending money to enhance our community, is this the best solution?

I would bet if all of you had the opportunity to dream "What could be done for Salado with a half of a million dollars?", would it be an out of scale, out of place one lane bridge? I think all of our cards need to be on the top of the table - this isn't a walkway - it isn't what it sounds to be.

# Civic Center dedication set Aug. 10

The Board of Directors of the Salado Civic Center announced this week that plans for the Aug. 10, dedication of the new bandstand and Lion's Park are complete and all that remains is for a large crowd of villagers to circle that date and be on hand at 9 a.m. to hear one of the finest military bands - The Fourth Infantry Division Band - present a concert honoring the volunteer work accomplished by the citizens of Salado.

III Corps and Fort Hood Commander, Lt. General Thomas Schwartz, will speak on the subject of "Volunteerism" as it is not only reflected in the life of the village but also as a part of today's all-volunteer military force.

General Schwartz will also announce the very first in a series of "Partnerships" between units at Fort Hood and the communities surrounding the largest military base in the world.

Salado's "Partner" will be the First Battalion of the Fourth Aviation Regiment. This 4th Infantry Division unit is com-

manded by Lt. Colonel Doug Eller, who will be introduced to the village by General Schwartz.

Chamber President Lloyd Parks will accept the "Partnership" arrangement on behalf of the village. He and Colonel Eller have been in a series of meetings to go over preliminary plans that will result in various programs that will assist both Salado and the Apache helicopter warship unit - code named "Dragons".

### EARLY MORNING PROGRAM

Civic Center leaders set the early morning program in hopes of avoiding some of the normal hot weather found in August. Seating will be arranged on the side of the bandstand that provides the greatest amount of shade so guests will be out of the sunshine throughout the one hour program.

Foundation Director Bob Cottle will be the master of ceremonies and he noted that the program will start promptly at 9 a.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Eagle Scout Lamar Kirk.

The band, under the baton of Warrant Officer Fred Catchings, will direct the singing of "God Bless America" which will be followed by a half hour concert featuring popular military numbers.

General Schwartz will speak on the subject of "Volunteerism" and finish with the presentation of the "Partnership" plan and introduction of Colonel Eller as Fort Hood's part of the unique union of military and civilian groups.

The program will finish with the introduction of special guests who have had a part in the construc-

tion of the new bandstand, Lion's Park as well as the major financial donors to the overall civic center renovation project.

Free refreshments will be provided following the one hour program and guests are invited to visit the new Art Center where the Salado Village Artists will have their fine work on display.

The entire civic center building will also be open and guests are especially urged to see the work recently completed in the Foster Room.

The library, Chamber of Commerce, school administration offices and the Historical Society room will all be open for inspection during the open house following the outdoor program.

The band will entertain the villagers in attendance before and after the formal program with numbers from their vast repertoire, according to Civic Center Foundation Board Chairman Ken Clapp.

Other Foundation directors helping plan and direct the special August 10, program include: Lloyd Parks, Patsy Sanford, Wilma Williams, Pete Jennings and building manager Hulda Horton.

# Water is essential to good health

Water is not mentioned in the USDA Dietary Guidelines, the American Heart Association Guidelines nor the American Cancer Society guidelines. However, water is as important to your health and well-being as the food you eat. Here are some water facts:

- The human body contains 40-50 quarts of water.

- As little as a 3% reduction of your body weight due to water loss can affect your strength and endurance.

- A 15-20% water loss can be fatal.

Additionally, water performs many important functions in the body. Water quenches your thirst and helps the digestive process. Water, in the form of perspiration, sets up a self-cooling system for you during exercise. It carries nutrients to the cells and removes waste products. A healthy complexion de-

pends on a water-enhanced skin tone. Joints are lubricated by water.

On the curative side, water can often help relieve headaches and decrease premenstrual bloating. And, for those who wish to maintain or lose weight, drinking large glasses of water during the day and right before meals can help curb your appetite and avoid impulse snacking. Alcoholic beverage consumption, which should always be in moderation, should include other liquids dilute the effects of alcohol.

Nutritionists continue to advise everyone to drink 6 to 8 glasses of liquid a day, and they mean water. Caffeine; or alcohol containing beverages are not recommended because they are diuretics that will act to remove water from your body. Other drinks such as regular soft drinks and milk shakes are not recommended in excess because

of their high caloric count.

It is important to increase your fluid consumption in situations that stress the body like extreme heat, exercise, fever, infections or even travel to high altitudes. Don't rely on thirst to tell you when your water is low. Drink fluids before, during and after exercise. If you are ill or have traveled to a higher altitude than your body is accustomed to, drink at least 2 glasses of water a day more than usual.

Drinking sufficient water will help you feel your best during the hot summer days ahead. Remember not to neglect water as in integral component of your dietary plans and practices.

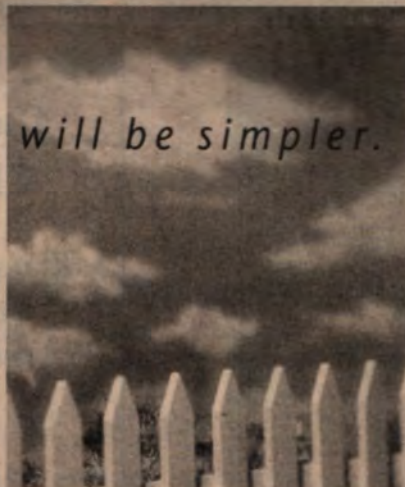

## Brazos River Authority advisory meeting

The Brazos River Authority invites residents of the Brazos River basin who are interested in water quality to attend an advisory group meeting in Waco on July 24. The Upper Central Basin Subcommittee meeting of the Brazos River Basin Steering Committee will be held from 1:00 p.m.-2:30 p.m. in Room E-232 of the Community Services Center at McLennan Community College located at 19th Street and College Drive in Waco.

Steering Committee members are civic, business and environmental leaders throughout the basin who have an interest in water quality issues.

The Authority's planning and environmental division staff will present a review of a draft of its 1996 *Brazos River Basin Assessment Report*. The draft report details the Authority's efforts to collect and inventory water quality information and to identify known or potential water quality concerns in the basin.

"There are a number of agencies that collect useful water quality data throughout the Brazos River basin," said Dale Pahmiyer, the Authority's Clean Rivers Program administrator. "The Authority's goal is to gather existing information and coordinate future data collection efforts to provide the greatest amount of data possible for public use."

The Salado Creek Watch Committee turns in the results of the monthly water quality tests to the Brazos River Authority. The Creek Watch Committee was formed with assistance from the Brazos River Authority.

"BRA Steering Committee members volunteer their time to help guide the Authority as it implements the Clean Rivers Program throughout the 42,000 square mile basin," says

Tom Ray, planning and environmental division manager for the Authority help us develop relationships with cities, industries, water districts, government agencies, educational institutions and interested organizations. "This allows the Authority to identify problems and concerns with the Brazos basin and to develop and evaluate practical solutions."

The Clean Rivers Program was created by the Texas Legislature in 1991. The Brazos River Authority contracts with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission to implement the Clean Rivers Program in the basin. The Authority has been assessing water quality within the basin for many years.

Brazos River basin residents interested in attending the meeting are encouraged to contact Dale Pahmiyer. His phone number is (817) 772-6010.

### About the Brazos River Authority

The Texas Legislature established the Brazos River Authority in 1929 to conserve, develop and put to beneficial use the surface, water resources within the Brazos River basin. The basin includes all or part of 65 counties, from the New Mexico state line to the Gulf of Mexico. It covers about 42,000 square miles in Texas, an area roughly the size of Tennessee.

The Authority owns and operates the dams and reservoirs at Possum Kingdom Lake, Lake Granbury and Lake Limestone. The authority also contracts with the Corps of Engineers for water supply storage space in the Corps' nine multi-purpose flood control and water conservation reservoirs in the Brazos basin.

These 12 reservoirs have a combined water supply capacity of more than 210 billion gallons. The Au-

thority contracts to supply water from these reservoirs on a wholesale basis to municipal, industrial and agricultural water customers throughout the basin.

The Authority has recently completed construction of the John T. Montford Dam in Garza County. It will impound Lake Alan Henry, which will serve as an additional water supply source for the city of Lubbock.

The Authority owns and operates a regional water treatment facility at Lake Granbury and regional wastewater treatment facilities for Sugar Land, Temple-Belton and the Waco metropolitan area. Each of these four systems has earned environmental awards from state and federal agencies in recognition of the excellence in maintenance and operation.

The Authority operates as a self-supported, non-taxing state agency. The governor appoints the 21 members of the Authority's board of directors, subject to confirmation by the Texas Senate. The Authority's directors serve six-year terms. Its headquarters are in Waco.



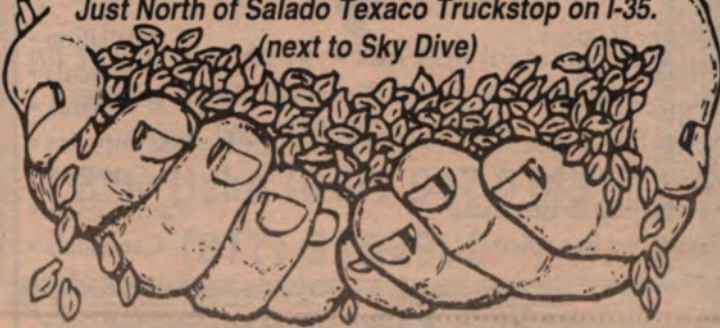

### Bomb Blast Shows U.S. Troops Remain Vulnerable to Terrorist Attack

The truck bomb that exploded in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia June 25 came as a shock, but not a surprise.

On that day, a tanker truck stopped outside the fence in front of an American military barracks in Dhahran. U.S. security forces stationed on the roof of the building observed two men fleeing the truck into a nearby getaway car. Realizing what was taking place, they began evacuating the building and succeeded in clearing the two top floors before the truck exploded.

Nineteen Americans were killed, and 450 others were injured — a terrible tragedy, in which our sons and daughters, husbands and wives, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters paid the ultimate price in the service of our country.

Given the World Trade Center bombing, given our experience in Beirut, given the November, 1995, bombing of Americans working with the Saudi National Guard and the May beheading of those responsible, it is incredible that a bomb-laden vehicle was able to park within 80 feet of a barracks filled with U.S. military personnel.

We had reasonably reliable intelligence that Americans would be targeted for attack again. There had been suspicious activities involving a similar truck two weeks before the bombing. We knew the barracks were under surveillance. At the Dhahran barracks, we settled for much less protection than recently was deemed essential to secure the perimeter around the White House. These facts pose the questions we must ask.

But already it is evident that we know too little about Saudi militants and their capabilities. And already it is clear that the future defense of our troops must include two inseparable components: better physical defenses (barriers, weapons and the like) as well as better intelligence.

Likewise, we know now that we must institute procedures which result in our military commanders opting without hesitation for the most careful, the most conservative course of action when it comes to protecting our forces — even if that option is the most costly or inconvenient or politically sensitive. The lives of our fighting men and women must come first. Their well being and security must be put before any other consideration. Where American troops are deployed abroad, we can't take no for an answer.

Congress is now engaged in an inquiry to determine exactly how this bombing came about, who was responsible, what went wrong and how. The ultimate sacrifice made by the American victims of this terrorist act should remain in the front of our minds from the beginning to the end of this investigation.

Our object shouldn't be to play Monday-morning quarterback, but rather to determine what we can do to make sure a tragedy like this doesn't happen again. Finally, we have an obligation to dedicate all resources necessary, as do our Saudi allies, to track down and punish those responsible for this deadly act of cowardice.

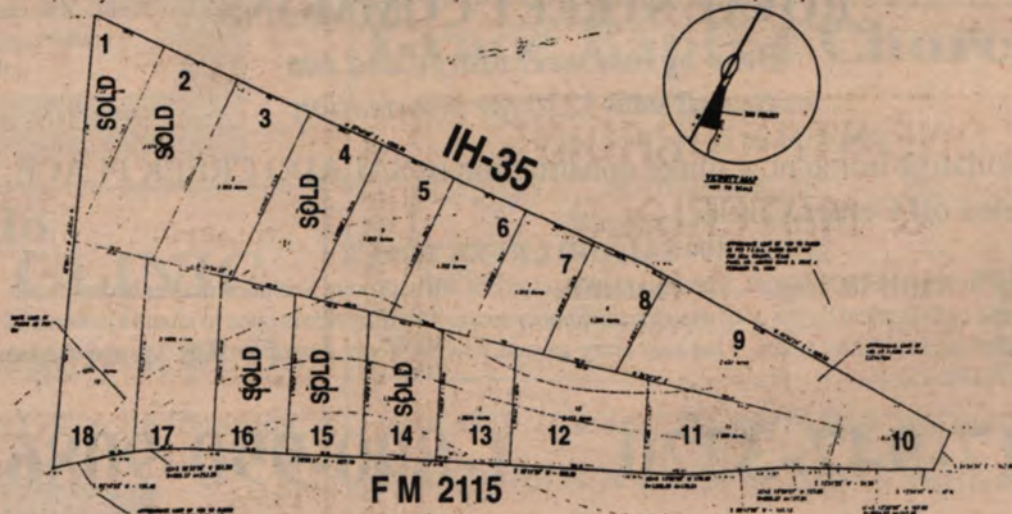

### PENSION SECURITY TOP PRIORITY FOR AMERICAN FAMILIES

There are millions of Americans who contribute to their pension funds every month.

In most cases the company also contributes to the plan. These plans guarantee that workers will be able to retire with some level of economic security.

Can you imagine what it would feel like if you were about to retire and your company said, "Sorry, there is no money for your pension."

We all know that it is nearly impossible to live on Social Security benefits alone. We *must* have a secure pension system.

During this era of corporate downsizing, more and more Americans are working for small companies. I support efforts to expand pension coverage by making it easier for small businesses to offer pensions and expanding Individual Retirement Accounts to another 20 million families who earn up to \$100,000 per year.

Government cannot and should not try to do everything for everyone. But government can and should help workers by protecting and preserving the retirement benefits that they have earned.

These steps will ensure that families who are working today will have these benefits when they retire tomorrow.

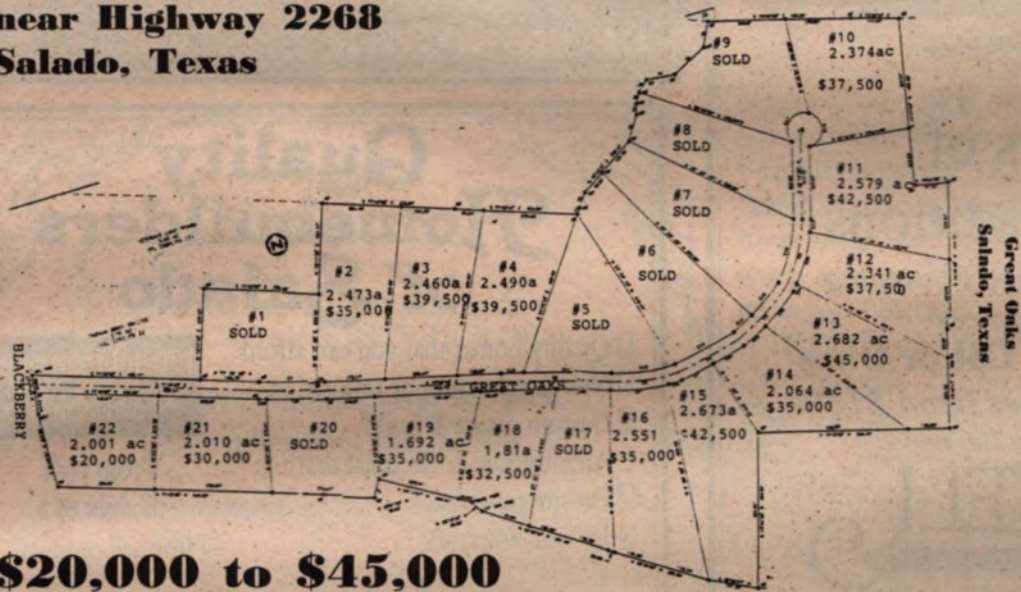

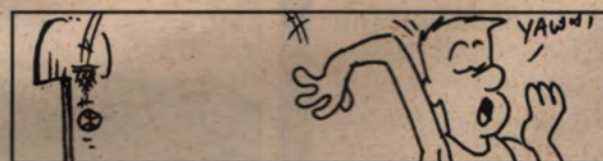

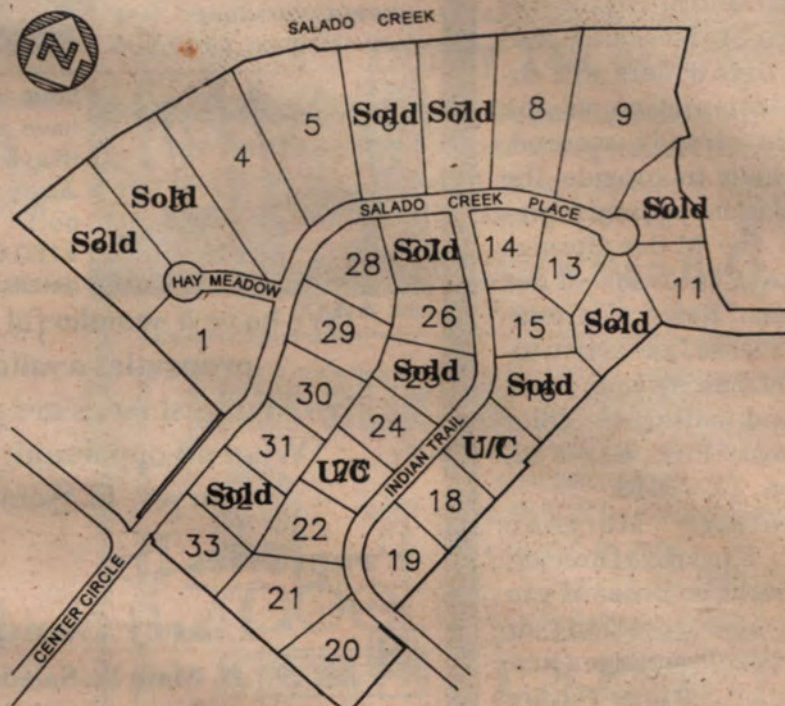

## Do "split-face" test for new wrinkle creams

Thinking of trying a wrinkle cream?

Start with realistic expectations, 'and do a "split-face" test.

"If you are 40 and want to look 20, it just Isn't going to happen," said Dr. Suzanne Bruce, associate professor of dermatology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "However, some of the products are helping to smooth fine lines, even blotchy pigmentation and soften dry spots."

Improvements, she says, will be gradual and subtle.

Since most wrinkle creams are marketed as cosmetics, Bruce encourages patients to be cautious before buying.

"Over-the-counter cosmetic creams have not been subjected to the rigorous scientific testing needed to be sold as a drug," she said. "Take a look at the ingredients before buying." The active ingredients found in products sold as wrinkle creams include glycolic acid, lactic acid, salicylic Acid, vitamin C or E t h o x y h e x y l - Bicyclooctanone.

Only two prescription medications are currently used to combat photo-aging, or wrinkles from sun damage. These are Renova, which is approved by the Food and Drug Administration for improving signs of sun damage, and Lachydrin, which is approved for dry skin.

"Creams, whether prescription or cosmetic, can cost from \$40 to \$100 dollars for a small supply," Bruce said. "To make sure they are not wasting money, I encourage patients to do a split-face test for three to four months."

By applying wrinkle cream to half the face and applying their normal moisturizer to the other half, patients can test the cream's effectiveness

"It takes discipline, but it's really the best way for

them to see if they like the results,' she said. 'If you apply it to your whole face from the start, it will be difficult to judge how well it is working.'

Another key factor in wrinkle cream use is sun protection. "If you are still going to the tanning salon or laying out, it is crazy to use wrinkle creams,' she said. 'You can't fight sun


damage while triggering new damage.'

Men and women should use a facial moisturizer with SPF 15 or higher every day even if they do not use a wrinkle cream.

'It's a good idea to discuss wrinkle cream selection with a dermatologist, especially if your skin has been easily irritated in the past,' Bruce said.

# Got motion sickness? Get used to it

Got motion sickness? Get used to it.

So advises Dr. Helen Cohen, an assistant professor of otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston who specializes in treating patients with inner ear disturbances such as vertigo.

"Motion sickness, like Vertigo, is a condition that you can learn to live with through practice," Cohen said.

Cohen says a process called habituation 'teaches' the inner ear to adjust to the dizziness associated with vertigo. She suspects people who spend a (great deal of time at sea, for example, have learned through habituation or repetitive training, to adjust to unexpected motion.

"Motion sickness is caused when there is a conflict between what you see and how the inner ear feels it," she said. "This causes your brain to be confused, sending signals that can result in higher heart rates, rapid breathing, nausea and sweating." Cohen says. "It's important that if you are experiencing motion sickness, to get outside or look out a window. This helps your eyes confirm that motion is occurring, reducing this conflict."

While it's true that people who are constantly exposed to motion sickness conditions can 'habituate,' Cohen admits for the average land-based person who vacations once a year medications and a few common-sense tips are still the best hope.

According to Dr. Alan Blum, a Baylor family physician who has occasionally battled motion sickness, over-the-counter medications such as meclizine or diphenhydramine are recommended.

"I recall one trip on Lake Superior aboard a tour boat to Isle Royale known by the locals as the 'barf barge,'" said Blum, who is now a believer in over-the-counter preparations. Most should be taken at least an hour before they are needed.

Some other tips for the queasy-at-heart include:

- Stay in well-ventilated areas. Go outside if you must or open a window.
- Avoid over-eating or alcoholic beverages prior to your trip. Focus on an area slightly above the horizon to help your brain 'realize'

that motion is occurring. In planes sit over the wing where there is less motion; in cars, sit in the front seat or drive if possible. Try to calm fear and anxiety which can exacerbate motion sickness.

An estimated two-thirds of America's fish are imperiled because of human actions.

Like oil reserves, aquifers are nonrenewable, pumping water from them depletes the supply in the same way that extractions from an oil well do.

Effective pricing, regulations and public outreach efforts can help curb excessive water use outdoors. Sprinkling of lawns accounts for one-third to one-half of the water demand. Practice low-maintenance landscaping and conserve precious water.

Residences in many industrialized and third-world countries are not equipped with water meters, making it impossible to charge appropriately for water usage.

Totaled, industries account for nearly one-quarter of the world's water use.

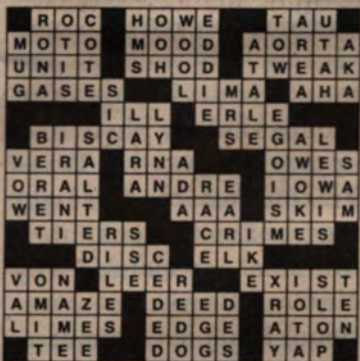

**Folklife Festival celebrates Texas cultures**

When the Institute of Texas Cultures hosted the first-ever Texas Folklife Festival in 1972, 2,000 participants representing 26 ethnic groups in Texas presented their music, dancing, foods, games, contests, arts, crafts, and skills brought from other countries by their ancestors. The Festival was declared a success and repeated not once, but 24 times! When gates to the 1996 Festival open Aug. 1, over 10,000 participants representing 42 ethnic groups will host more than 75,000 visitors to the state's multicultural extravaganza. Visitors are encouraged to join the Institute, Aug. 1-4, as it gears up for the biggest party in Festival history to commemorate this Silver An-

niversary celebration. Festival hours are 5-11 p.m. Aug. 1-2, noon to 11 p.m. Aug. 3 and noon to 9 p.m. Aug. 4.

**Opening Ceremony**  
The Festival has expanded the popular New Braunfels Wurstfest area, featuring a German Hofbrau House. This area will be the site of the Silver Celebration Ceremony at 9 p.m. Aug. 1. The event, which will be held in place of an opening ceremony, will feature a spectacular fireworks show.

Winners will be chosen on Monday following the Festival.

**Eight Stages offer Entertainment Galore**  
Along with honoring the Festival's charter members and longtime participants, visitors can welcome the many individuals and groups making their first appearance at the Texas Folklife Festival. The eight stages of continuous entertainment are sponsored by NationsBank International Bank of Commerce, Nurses Who Care, Coca-Cola Bottling Company of the Southwest, Frost Bank, H-E-B, Sea World of Texas, and Dixie Flag. New groups performing on these stages include the Bolivian dance group, Ballet Folklorico Illimani from Houston; country-western dancers, Trinity University Ropers; and the Pakistani American Cultural Association Dancers.

New musicians are Rocky Benton from Corpus Christi who describes himself as a "Black, Blind, Blues, Harmonica Player and Singer; popular Tejano artist Estefan; Forgiven, a Christian rhythm and blues band from Houston; the New Covenant Church Multi-ethnic Gospel Choir from Austin; the Wheatley Heights Baptist Church Youth Choir from San Antonio and Wayanay Inka from San Antonio, which performs Andes music.

Visitors can learn about Texas' past by visiting the story telling stage that will feature a more culturally diverse group of storytellers. New storytellers are Eldrena Douma from Canyon, Angela Klinger from San Antonio, Dr. Njoki McElroy from Dallas, Dr. Joe Moore from San Marcos, Consuela Samarrippa from Austin, Earley Teal from San Antonio, and Trudy Stanton Terry from Orange.

Other new entertainment participants are the "Balloonmeister" and the "Balloon Man" from Garland who will create balloon sculptures for Festival visitors.

### Festival Menu Additions

The Texas Folklife Festival is known for its authentic ethnic cuisine. Festival visitors are encouraged to come hungry and be prepared to savor an abundance of food items, especially those provided by new participants. The Nigerian People's Association of San Antonio will whet visitors' appetites with suya and coconut candy. Bexar County's Master Gardeners will sell cactus fries, the San Antonio Men's Garden Club will sell ice-cold watermelon, and Hidalgo's BorderFest will sell onion blossoms.

New Demonstrators, Crafts and Reenactment Groups

A Texas Crafts Market will be featured at the Festival. Visitors will have the opportunity to purchase many of the crafts created by Festival participants, including the Bead and Ornament Society of San Antonio, Ferni's African Market and Pioneer Puzzles, Inc.

Also, visitors can purchase neck wear for hot

weather from Cool Dudes, milagro and tamale shuck creations from Lunera Arts and Crafts, hand-crafted furniture from Hugh Vaughn; potpourri and fragrance oils from Scentsational by Chalonne tapestry bags and goods from Jennie Vaughn; and gourd art from Tony McGregor. Visitors will enjoy demonstrations by Dan and Vickie Overpeck from Corpus Christi, who will showcase their corn husk dolls and bentwood boxes; Cliff Tienert, of the Long X Cattle Company, who will demonstrate cowboy lore and cooking, J.B. Taylor from Brownwood, who will display his wood creations; and Frank Knight from Marfa, who will explain the art of spur and bit making. Everyone will enjoy the "Taco Ranch,"

sponsored by the Texas Agrifood Masters of San Antonio.

Reenactment groups performing for the first time at the Festival are the Buffalo Soldiers Association, U.S. 9th Cavalry; Mission City Business and Professional Women's Club, which will demonstrate the life of a pioneer woman; the San Antonio Living History Association, featuring the lifestyles of the 1820s-1850s; the Society of Creative Anachronisms medieval re-enactors; and the Texas Army 1836-1845.
