Chamber discusses Art Fair, signs along Salado Creek, new director

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors heard a "good news, bad news" report on the Salado Art Fair from Co-Chairs Jap Barrett and Jean Davis.

First, the bad news. Attendance at the Art Fair was down from the previous year. Barrett said that approximately 7,700 paid to attend the Art Fair. Last year, 8,400 attended and 8,950 attended in 1993.

The majority of the decline was on Sunday. According to Barrett, this year's Fair was 122 off the Saturday pace of last year and 546 off the pace of Sunday last year.

The good news is that the Art Fair had its largest net of \$57,000. Even with expenses of over \$9,000,

increased booth fees and numbers gave the Art Fair a boost.

Chamber President Roy Hector said that a committee would be formed to investigate the apparent trend in dropping attendance. The committee will examine what steps can be taken to improve attendance at the Art Fair.

The Art Fair is not only the largest fund raiser for the Chamber of Commerce, but several civic and school organizations raise funds through food and refreshment sales.

In other business, Hector reported to the board that signs have gone up along the creek to warn of the water quality of Salado Creek at this time.

"The Highway Department and Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission do not believe

that the high fecal coliform counts are caused by pigeons, as previously suspected," Hector said.

The Creek Preservation Committee tests water quality at several sites along the creek each month. According to tests Aug. 1, fecal coliform counts were too numerous to count in four of the six testing sites (see graph, this issue).

Last month, the fecal coliform counts were these: Summers Mill, 47.5; Chisholm Trail, 37.5; Sirena, 55; Patterson's Crossing, 110; Stagecoach Inn dam, 62.5 and Stagecoach Inn, 165.

In August, before the Art Fair, the fecal coliform counts at Sirena, Patterson's Crossing, Stagecoach Inn dam, and

Students will see new faces this week

Many new faces will greet students this week at Salado schools. Twelve new teachers and teaching professionals have joined the SISD staff, and nine returning teachers have new assignments. Four of the staff members will fill newly created positions in the district.

In the Elementary School, Rebecca Butscher, a new Salado resident, will be teaching first grade. She formerly taught in the Killeen school district. Traci Wilson, a former teacher in Copperas Cove and a Salado resident, will also be a new first grade teacher. Gwen Lorenz, a first year teacher from Killeen, will be a new second grade teacher. She recently graduated from Oklahoma Panhandle State University.

Internal changes at the Elementary include a move for Carey Quick from second to sixth grade, a switch for Marty Wells from first

grade teacher to Elementary PE teacher, and the addition of Judy Wells as a teacher's aide in the technology area.

The High School has the most new staff members, including three newly-created teaching positions, and a new administrator. Joe Palmer, a Gatesville native and Temple resident, has been named the Assistant Principal at the Junior High/High School. He is a former teacher, coach and minister of education. He has a Masters degree from Baylor University. He was Principal at Central Texas Christian School in Temple.

Other new positions include a new full-time computer science teacher, an honors English teacher and an art/choir teacher. Tom Ford, a former teacher from Forney High School, will be teaching the computer literacy and computer science classes this year. He received his Master's in

Computer Science from the University of Oklahoma.

The new honors English classes will be taught by Claudia Cabaniss. She comes to Salado from the Killeen school district, and is a graduate of UMHB. She will also be teaching regular English and Spanish classes.

Donna Brown has moved from second grade to the Junior High/High school to start up the newly created art and choir programs. She will direct junior and senior high choirs as well as teach art and reading.

Other new secondary teachers include Elaine Hanson, the new special education teacher in grades 7-12. She comes to Salado from Knox Junior High in Conroe ISD, where she taught special education for five years. She has a Master's degree in special education.

Yvonne Harmon is the new Spanish teacher at the

high school. She is a former teacher in the Ellison Ninth Grade Center in Killeen. She holds a degree in Spanish and Special Education from UMHB.

Brett Mullins, a local resident and recent graduate of UMHB in Biology and History, is a new addition to both the science department and the coaching staff. He will teach science and history and assist with boys athletics.

Danny Quick, a Salado resident, comes to the SISD staff from Belton, where he taught science and social studies. He holds a degree in Education from Baylor and will teach chemistry and physics at the High School.

Dedra Tomastic is another addition to the science department. She is a new graduate of Texas A&M with a degree in biology. Besides teaching biology, she will assist with the girl's athletic program.

Four other SISD teach-

ers have new teaching assignments within the district this year. Alan Haire has moved from the Elementary PE department to the High School, where he will be teaching government, economics, and continue his coaching duties with boys athletics.

GOP gunning for public TV

For those of you who worry about the future of Public Broadcasting at the hands of the new GOP majority in Congress, we would recommend a quick look at what was discovered a few days ago hidden in the Labor and Human Services appropriations bill: **a 24 percent reduction in funding for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting for 1997-8!**

This news came late last week from the office of Congressman Chet Edwards (D-Waco).

Word is out that when the spending bill **gets to the Senate- the entire appropriation may be deleted**, which means that unless some miracle takes place, PBS could be a thing of the past after the 1996 fiscal year.

Just what PBS has done to anger the Republicans to the point of killing what many believe is the only bright spot in the television wasteland - is a mystery.

Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich did opine recently that he thought the entire public broadcasting system (radio and TV) should be **privatized**.

Actually this is **poli-speak** and when trans-

lated means (according to the gospel of Newt) that we would all be better off putting PBS under the control of commercial TV stations and their advertisers.

You know who they are talking about here don't you? The stations that today bring us such lofty, high-minded and "well produced" programs as Roseanne, The Simpsons, Married With Children, the "sick-soaps", plus the gut-spilling tragedy of the afternoon talk shows including the weekly thoughts of convicted felon G. Gordon Liddy.

PBS on the other hand gives viewers the McNeil-Lehrer Newshour, Masterpiece Theater, Nova, Wall Street Week, Washington Week in Review, Mystery, Nature and factual reports on a variety of subjects including the current 50th anniversary documents relative to the ending of the Second World War.

And don't forget the tremendous series "Civil War" and "Baseball" plus the heralded upcoming story of the development of the

west - all from the brilliant mind of Ken Burns.

Burns incidentally, stated publicly many times that he could never have produced these great images under the aegis of advertiser controlled private tv programming rules and philosophies.

Informed sources in and out of Congress, after seeking anonymity for fear of the normal GOP reprisals (for talking out of school), report that some of the conservative leaders in the House and Senate have cut a deal with the telecommunication giants to kill public television and let these greedy tycoons take over all PBS stations to further fatten their pocketbooks at the expense of killing the finest programs we have on TV today.

In return we have to wonder - will these congressional sellers of votes, patronage and access, receive future contributions to their well heeled personal campaign PACs that are so beloved by elected pooh-bahs as they seek to avoid term limits through lifetime reelections and sinecures?

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Keeping Children at Heart of Child Support

Two dozen federal agencies administer nearly 300 government programs developed to benefit children and adolescents. We have programs for recreation, drug and alcohol rehabilitation, job training, delinquency prevention, juvenile justice services, nutrition guidance, and many more. The cost of these programs has increased tenfold in the last two decades, but the results are unimpressive.

Among the teen population since the 1960s, suicide and drug use has doubled; violent crime, alcohol use and the incidence of gonorrhea has more than doubled, and the rate of homicide has tripled.

August is child support enforcement month, and 1995 is the 20th anniversary of the Federal Child Support Enforcement Program. As the child support professionals from across the country gather later this month in Kansas City for our annual conference, we must ask ourselves the most basic question of all - are our programs really helping America's children, or are we merely helping to perpetuate the fiction that any kind of government program can offset the erosion of the American family.

Lots of people are on the child support enforcement band wagon these days. Mothers want child support, fathers want more access to their children, and politicians want the rest of us to believe that if everyone would pay their rightful child support payments, then welfare programs would be largely unnecessary.

State and federal child

support agencies can certainly justify their programs. From 1980 to 1993, the national caseload has tripled, and the number of court orders establishing child support has quadrupled. And we're proud that we've increased our collections in 20 years from \$700 million to \$10 billion.

But when we gather to explore better ways to collect child support, we're assuring we'll have to build bigger and bigger collection systems backed by more laws and harsher sanctions for those who don't pay. We're assuming that most couples will divorce and that at least three out of 10 will never marry in the first place.

That's where we stand today in America - with a divorce rate of 51 percent and 30 percent of our children born out of wedlock. In fact, what we used to call the "illegitimacy rate" is rising rapidly, and is well over 50 percent in many of our urban areas.

This year's conference theme is **KEEPING CHILDREN AT THE HEART OF CHILD SUPPORT**. We are kicking off a national media campaign designed to increase awareness of the problems we are creating for our children, and of our collective need to change our behavior.

While the dollars that child support enforcement programs bring in are vital to children and their families, nothing replaces putting children first.

Too many of our children are both discouraged and violent. Of all juveniles confined for violent offenses today, less than 30 percent grew up with both parents. We've inadvertently created a well-oiled machine that takes

kids from the playpen to the state pen - and it must be dismantled.

Our efforts to ensure adequate financial child support for every child must be part of a broader effort that begins to percolate through every facet of American society - television, movies, schools and churches.

And our message must be that nothing in life is more important than family. Nothing is more shameful than having children and walking away from them! Every society has operated from this premise.

This year's keynote speaker for the conference will be David Blankenhorn of the National Fatherhood Initiative. Mr. Blankenhorn states: "Ultimately, the solution to the growing problem of deadbeat dads is not jail cells, 'most wanted' posters, job training programs, interstate computer networks or IRS agents. At best, these are Band-Aids on an infected wound. At worst, they are a form of denial, a self-defeating strategy intended to excuse our drift towards fatherlessness. The only solution to the problem of dead-beat dads is fatherhood."

Government can't provide role models nor can government teach children how to become happy, productive adults. This is the role of parents, parents who are entirely committed to the truth that in families of equals, children come first.

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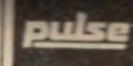
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work just fine but not in the field of public broadcasting that is not forced to toady to paid advertisers when creating programs that are decent, thought provoking and based on documented facts.

One can well imagine how many facts on the dangers of teen-age drinking or smoking would be forthcoming on a program sponsored by the distillers or tobacco industrialists of America.

Better yet - what would a corporate sponsor such as a major oil, gas, lumber, mining or chemical group have to say about presenting specific facts about air and water pollution?

Especially if they were under attack for creating hazardous living conditions near schools, neighborhoods or on public parklands.

This may be the appropriate time for citizens who prefer decent, thought provoking TV and radio programs based on documented facts and not subject to the whims of advertisers, to call a halt to the impending loss of public

broadcasting.

A public outcry is about all these elected officials of ours understand loud and clear.

They are among the best vote-counters to be found and certainly would not want to face a massive term-limitation movement (sometimes called voting) on this issue when they have so many other things to hide from or cover-up.

This terminal stupidity on the part of certain lawmakers needs exposure through the light of an open forum in Congress. We need to find out exactly what, or who, is causing this movement to kill public broadcasting and punish, at the polls, those responsible.

They can be stopped. Fact is, they must be stopped.

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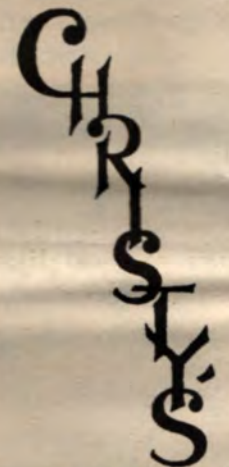
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ABWA gives \$600 scholarships to Yesenia Rocha, Debbie Wasik

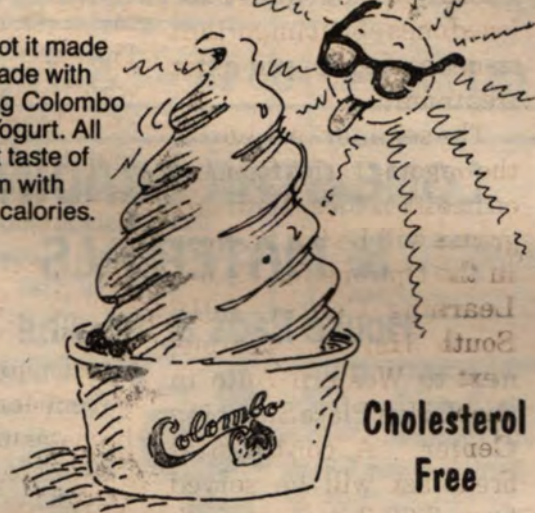
Rocha, who is fluent in both Spanish and French, said that in college, he would like to study international business.

After his year in Europe, he will have a jumpstart.

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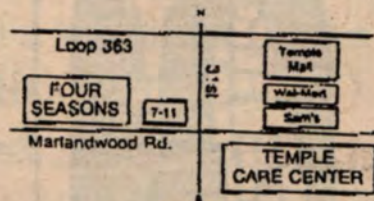

I would like to point out what I believe is an error in the article "Phone Calls to Temple, Holland no Longer Long Distance." which was published on page 18 of the August 9, 1995 edition of the *Salado Village Voice*.

In the article, it is stated

"Once the service is approved by at least a 70 percent of the vote of customers in the petitioning exchange." I believe you will find the Law as passed by S.B. 632 in 1993 and as covered by Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49, only requires "70 percent of the subscribers responding vote affirmative for that exchange", not 70 percent of all subscribers (customers) as indicated. A petition could be passed by far less than 70 percent or even 50percent of the subscribers (customers), so long as 70 percent of those responding voted in the affirmative, and all of the subscribers (customers) would be accessed \$3.50 per month.

Furthermore, I am not sure the statement that local calls to or from Holland will be free of additional charges will be accurate for very long. A petition published in the *Salado Village Voice* for a recent several weeks indicates Centel-Texas is requesting an increase of 67 cents per month per access line representing lost revenue from other "ELCS" Is this for the Holland ELC? The notice of the petition conveniently does not say.

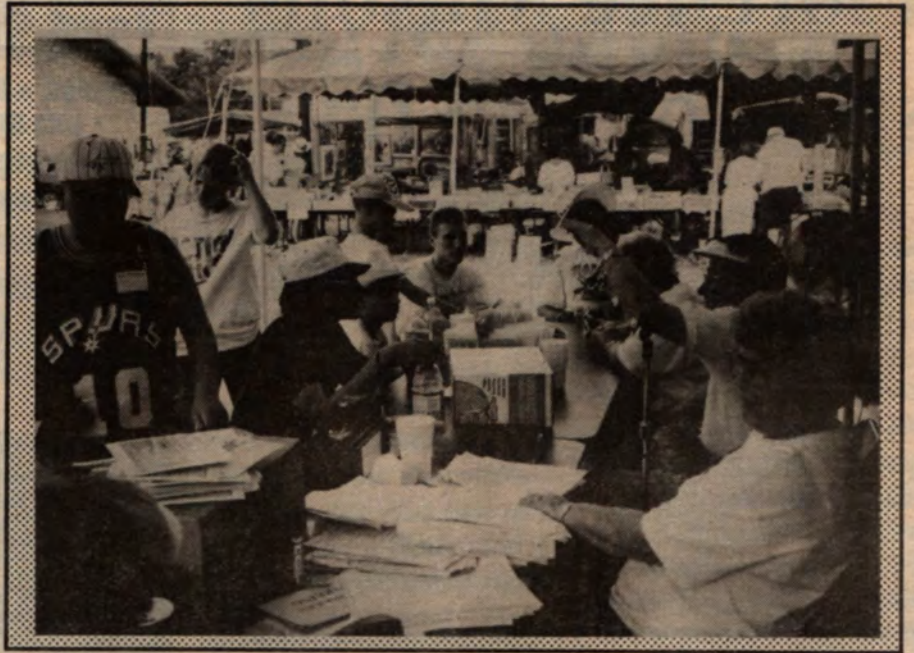
