Salado ISD students returned to school last week. Enrollment figures for the first day of school 96-97 showed an 8 percent increase over last-day enrollment for 95-96.

The High school showed the most growth with 262 students enrolled for Aug. 16, compared with 216 for May 23.

Thomas Arnold Elementary also showed growth: 434 for the first day, 403 for the last day last year.

The junior high had 134 enrolled Aug. 16 and 125 enrolled May 23.

# GOP convention given an A

The Republican National Convention is history. Nominees Bob Dole and his faithful companion Jack Kemp are now riding off to do battle against an incumbent president with hoisted banners reading: "Down With Teacher Unions", "A 15 Percent Tax Cut", "Hooray For Women", "Choice For Schools", "No-choice For Women" and a variety of other devices designed to attract moderates, pro-Perotistas, disenchanted conservative Democrats and anyone else who will listen - and more importantly - vote in November.

Before giving the convention a grade, we need to understand what the guidelines and goals were in the first place. No floor in-fighting about the platform especially abortion; a desperate reaching out to women to close the gender gap; a lot of whooping and hollering tailored for an exact time to start having fun and more important - when to stop, and best of all a bounce in polling numbers plus real excitement over naming the personable ex-jock, Jack Kemp.

All of this came to pass so **the grade has to be an "A"**, even though it was a little too professionally orchestrated and obvious for

Liddy Dole was a big hit when she went to the floor like a talk show hostess. Turned out far better than a podium speech and she delivered the goods.

All in all, a happy pow-wow. Not "gay" happy you

understand. Those folks with the name "Log Cabin Republicans" were allowed to demonstrate and shout far from the convention hall so delegates were not disturbed.

The media came in for a share of the fussing since the major nets allowed only an hour or so each night on prime time. Poor old Sam Donaldson, armed with the frowning bonded eye brows, could not cause any problems so he went home early along with the Howdy Doody look-alike Ted Koppel. No one seemed to miss either of the two.

Kemp made a good talk even though he disabused many of his earlier stands including immigration and affirmative action. He will be a big help to Dole thanks to his relative youth and

free wheeling delivery.

**BULLETIN: LATE POLL RESULTS**  
A Newsweek Poll, taken immediately after the GOP convention closed, gave more than a "bump" to the Dole-Kemp ticket. Nearly 1000 registered voters showed the 20 percent gap between Clinton and Dole had dwindled to two points!

Bob Dole did himself proud in his acceptance speech. Little long, but worth listening to - since he came across as honest, sincere and hopeful. He has lost his cross-patch demeanor and if he keeps on will gain in the polling. No one doubts he is a good man and would probably make a fine president.

Dole did fail to mention his accomplishments over the past 30 plus years in Congress during his commencement address - in fact left all that Washing-

**When Your Heart Skips A Beat**  
A skipped beat is "the heart's version of gray hair and wrinkles."

It's not uncommon as we grow older, says Douglas P. Zipes, MD, professor of medicine, pharmacology, and toxicology at Indiana State University School of medicine in Indianapolis. Skipped beats are the result of a single premature heart beat. After one of these early beats, there is a pause while on the heart's chambers refills with blood.

The heart, says Zipes, is not like a Swiss-made watch. "It's normal for the heart to have small disturbances," he says. These occurrences can be triggered by caffeine, nicotine, alcohol, decongestants, lack of sleep, and anxiety. Women notice them more during menstruation. For both sexes, they tend to increase with age.

### A New Way Of Counting Calories

Instead of counting calories you eat in the day, why not try counting the ones you don't eat. When you pass up a doughnut in the office, count 250 calorie. When you don't put dressing on your salad, add another 200 to the total. At the end of the day, you can see how many calories you were tempted to eat, but didn't.

### Fizz Won't Hydrate

Soft drinks that fizz-- because of carbonation-- aren't good choices to prevent dehydration. When you exercise strenuously or for a prolonged period of time, you need to replace the fluid as it is lost. The bubbles in carbonated drinks fill you up, so you drink less. If the soft drink contains caffeine, it is even less effective. Caffeine further increases your water loss through urination, thereby contributing to dehydration. Choose instead non-carbonated sports drinks which not only replace wat but mineral as well

**Bell Sheriff initiates canine programs**

The Bell County Sheriff's office is initiating a new program to help fight drug trafficking in Bell County and to provide assistance for locating missing or es-

caped persons.

Sheriff's Office Lieutenant Gary Zimmerman and his dog "Suedo" have recently completed a canine drug training course administered by the Texas K-9 Police Association for Certifications and Standards. "Suedo", a German Shepherd, and Lt. Zimmerman are now certified for search and identification of marijuana, cocaine, heroin and methamphetamine. Zimmerman and "Seudo" were guests at the Lions Club meeting on July 14. "Suedo" displayed the results of his training.

The drug dog will be made available to sheriff's office deputies as well as any other local law enforcement agency.

Currently, the team is working with the Central Texas Narcotics Task Force with interdiction of suspected drug smugglers on various roads and highways within Bell County.

A second dog, also owned and trained to "track" human scent. This dog will be utilized when an escape

occurs from any local officer or facility. The dog can also be used to track missing persons such as small children or an elderly person who may have become lost or disoriented.

Area agencies are being notified of the new programs and resources now available through the Sheriff's Office.

Seized funds and donations will be used to supplement the cost of caring for the animals.

Gary Zimmerman born in Renton, Washington, joining the United States Army in 1971. He served with the military police at Ft. Gordon, Georgia, and at Ft. Hood, Texas. He was Honorably discharged in 1973.

He has worked as a police officer in Harker Heights, Tx. Has worked with Juvenile Probation in Bell County as a Probation Officer. He has also worked with the Bell County Attorney's Office as a Criminal Investigator.

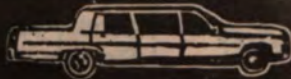

## Telephone-based pesticide sales frauds at work again

Telephone-based pesticides sales frauds are again at work. The victims this time are farmers who are offered a product that purport to be ideal for total vegetation control. A typical sales pitch is to compare their product with a well known brand. 'It's just like Round-up,' they say. The price is usually between \$50 and \$80 per gallon. This scam is at least 20 years old.

Farmers who attempt to get some information about the product, get little. Sales are always C.O.D. What the farmer gets for his money is a legitimate, legally registered herbicide. It is a product called 'TK-10 Liquid Vegetation Killer.' It contains 3.75%

prometon (Pramitol,) formulated in fuel oil.

TK-10 has an EPA Registration number (69204-1) and meets EPA labeling regulations. The boiler room telephone scam artists seldom go to the trouble to register the product with the states they well into. The old saying — if it sounds too good-to be true, it probably is — applies here.

Pay attention to warnings from the Federal Trade Commission. If sellers won't send you literature before purchase, don't buy. If they won't give you price, ingredients, and concentration for comparison, don't buy. Never buy from unknown persons selling over the phone.

Pesticide fraud is an annual event. It happens early every season.

Whether registered or not, these kinds of pesticide sales usually involve herbicide active ingredients at low-concentrations, selling at high prices.

Another problem with the advertising of these products is that they are often sold for uses other than on the label. No matter what product you purchase, or how you obtain it, or what claims are made about it — READ and follow the LABEL directions exactly! If you use a pesticide on a site other than one listed on the label, YOU are in violation of federal law.

Educational programs conduct by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability.

## Village Artists happy to be home

To many people Salado is synonymous with "Art" in its various forms. A cursory walk down Main Street makes it very clear that many artists call this village their home. Salado Village Artists, Inc. met first at the Old Church Place, then at Tablerock. At first the group met only in warm weather due to lack of heat. In 1993 Salado Village Artists, Inc. voted to seek funds to remodel and restore the old school maintenance building (formerly the Union Grove Schoolhouse) relocated - its present location.

With the generous support of Salado Citizens, members of Salado Village Artists, and the Old Salado School Foundation, along with the tireless labor from architect and builder, Dick Goodman, the Village Artists finally had a permanent home in 1994, the Salado Art Center.

Over the past 16 years, Salado Village Artists, Inc. have generously shared their talents, time and energies with their community by donating their art, stitchery, (quilts, etc.), crafts, and poster art to

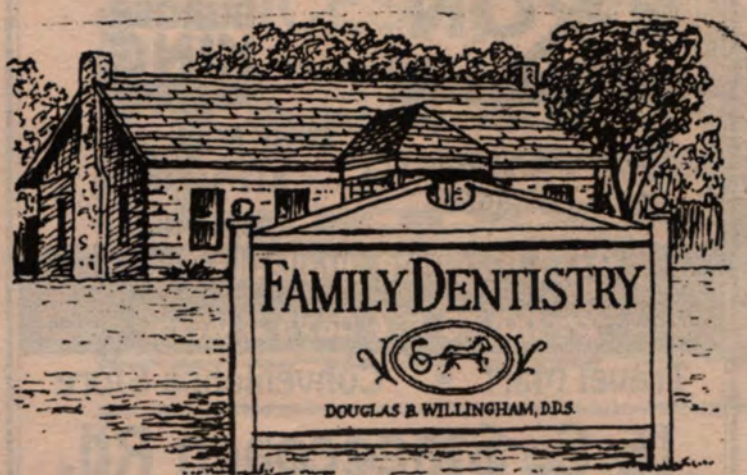

**ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT REFORM SUPPORTERS TRY NEW TACTIC TO GET BILL TO HOUSE FLOOR**

Late last month I signed an important petition to force Endangered Species Act reform legislation to the House floor for a vote.

Signing this petition sends a signal and sets the groundwork for a vote on major reform of the Endangered Species Act.

Many members of the U.S. House of Representatives are ready and willing to vote on common-sense reform of the Endangered Species Act and should be given that opportunity.

This action became necessary when House Speaker Newt Gingrich announced in April that he would prevent House consideration of HR 2275, the Endangered Species Conservation and Management Act.

That bill, which passed the House Resources Committee in October and cleared for House consideration, was viewed as the best chance for reform of the Endangered Species Act.

The bill has bipartisan backing and support from the Texas Farm Bureau, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers, Texas Homebuilders and numerous groups fighting for stronger property rights.

The bill doesn't have the backing of one important House member who wants it killed — Speaker Gingrich.

Bill supporters need 218 petition signers to circumvent the Speaker and send the bill directly to the House for a vote.

I am disappointed that the Speaker single-handedly chose to stop this bill from coming to the House floor for a vote.

The bill provides land owner compensation and establishes voluntary incentives to preserve endangered species. The bill also establishes steps to insure that private property rights are protected and that economic impacts are considered.

While a handful of northeastern Republicans may oppose this bill, the private property owners of America deserve a vote on this reform.

I will do everything I can to ensure that private property owners are heard.

# Children can learn to read earlier by following suggestions given

by Ilene C. Miller

Learning to read is an important part of childhood. For many children, it seems to just come "naturally" while for others it is an ongoing struggle. Parents can help their children acquire reading skills in a number of ways.

- Let your children see you read so they will have a model to follow.
- Provide a comfortable, special reading area and a variety of books, newspapers and magazines.
- Take your children to the library to get library cards, to check out books and to listen to films and stories. Most libraries will allow children to have library cards as soon as they can write their names.
- Read store and road signs, package labels and license plates.
- Reward the child's reading achievement with a trip to the library, the

purchase of a new book or praise about how well the child is doing.

- Write down your child's story as he or she tells it so that it can be seen in print. The child can draw pictures to illustrate the story. Save the story and read and savor it together.
- Give your kids book-cases (a cardboard carton covered with contact paper will work) where they can store books.
- Play readers theater (each individual has a part and they read aloud together), act out stories, present puppet shows of favorite books.
- Give books as birthday and holiday gifts.
- Show pictures and ask what might happen next, being able to predict what will happen next is an important reading skill.
- Read to your children every day. Sometimes let them choose the books. Read your old favorites or those that teachers or li-

brarians recommend. Once your child can read on his own, you need to continue reading at a higher level.

- Talk about the books you read together. Ask questions about the story: Where did, the story take place? Which of the characters are you most like and why? What happened first, second, last? Why did you like the story? How does it make you feel? Think of a question to ask me about the book.
- The single most important activity that parents can do to assist their children in reading is to read to them throughout childhood and especially during preschool years.
- The benefits are greatest if the child is an active participant, engages in discussions about stories, identifies letters and words and discusses the meanings of words.

## Don't be a pain in the boat: follow safety tips

Maintaining your vessel in good working condition is an important safety habit. Marinas can be far apart and a breakdown could leave you stranded. Keep the engine well tuned. On inboard and stem drive motors, check the oil level each time you set out. The owner's manual will indicate how often the oil should be changed. Check the fluid level in the battery and have it recharged if it is necessary. See that the battery terminal connections are tight, clean and free of corrosion. The exterior of the engine should be kept as clean as possible, since grease and oil build-up absorbs moisture which conducts electricity. Generally check for loose hoses, nuts, bolts, screws or anything else which must be tightened, repaired or replaced.

Wrenches, screwdrivers, duct tape, a hammer and vise grips are enough to tackle most problems. Spare parts and spark plugs, fuel pump, fuel filter (for diesel engines), and drive belts are also valuable to keep, on board for emergencies.

**Broken Drive Belt.** If a replacement is not available, tie a piece of line around pulleys and secure with a square knot.

**Broken Pipe or Hose.** Wrap the break with duct tape.

**Basic Checks.** If your engine fails, make these three basic checks before taking it apart or calling for help:

1. Fuel tank is not empty.
2. The boat is not aground.
3. The propeller is not fouled with seaweed, rope or fishing line, and the drive pin hasn't sheared.

**Engine Oil Leak.** Simply catch in a pan and pour it back in the engine.

### EMERGENCY REPAIRS

Proper care and maintenance on your boat reduces the chance of a breakdown. But it can still happen. Many emergency repairs can be made with materials on the boat. A few basic hand tools and spare parts are a must for any boat.

**Living With A Cat**

Few animals invoke as strong, almost instantaneous, emotional feelings as the average domestic cat. It doesn't matter if you love them or hate them, when it comes to cats, you can't avoid them.

At a recent meeting in Chicago, the American Veterinary Medical Association brought together cat experts from the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom to shed some light on this equally loved and maligned pet.

According to Joan Miller, the Director-at-Large of the Cat Fanciers' Association, "There is no one entity that can be defined as a 'domestic cat.' Between the fully domesticated feline and those that live a feral existence—there is a continuum of cat lifestyles. And the needs and problems of cats are all different—which is why there can be no single way to better the lives of cats."

Miller feels that people will have more success in changing a behavior if they try to gradually modify the cat's environment rather than attempting to dominate the cat. She goes on to say that any encouragement towards domestication should be with the acceptance that cats

are motivated by pleasure for themselves rather than by a desire to please their owners.

While their human friends provide cat owners with verbal communication, affection and intellectual stimulation—most owners say their cats provide unconditional love, affection, undivided loyalty, devotion and total acceptance.

According to Veterinarian Dr. Gary Landsberg, just about any behavior problem associated with indoor living can be prevented simply by providing the cats with all the amenities of outdoor living. For instance, Dr. Landsberg tells cat owners whose pets like to chew on plants to provide their pets with their own small indoor herb garden.

As for rambunctious and overly playful cats—Dr. Landsberg suggests regular play sessions with the owners, or even a second cat to keep them active in a positive way. 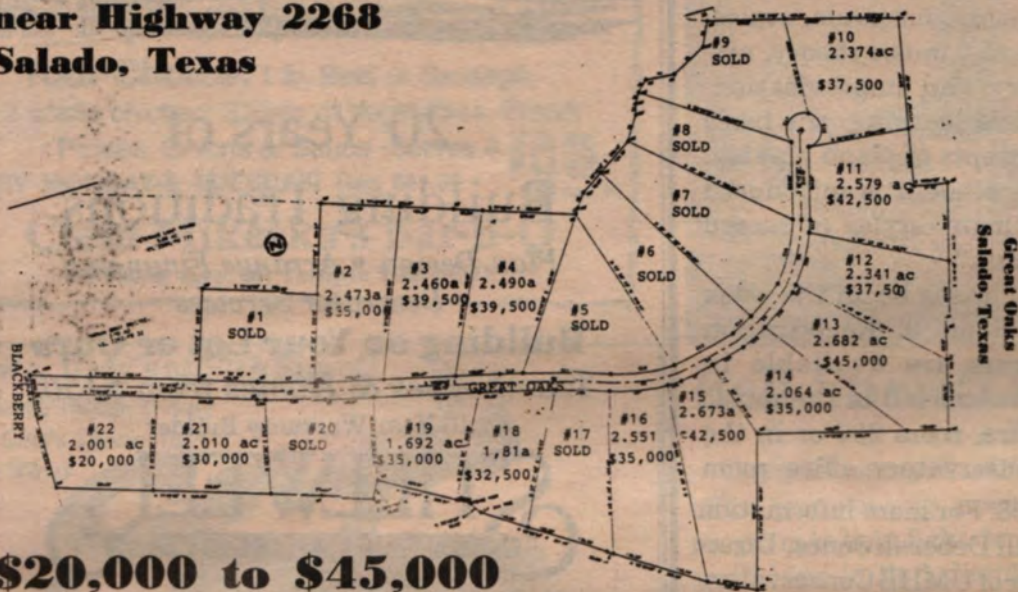

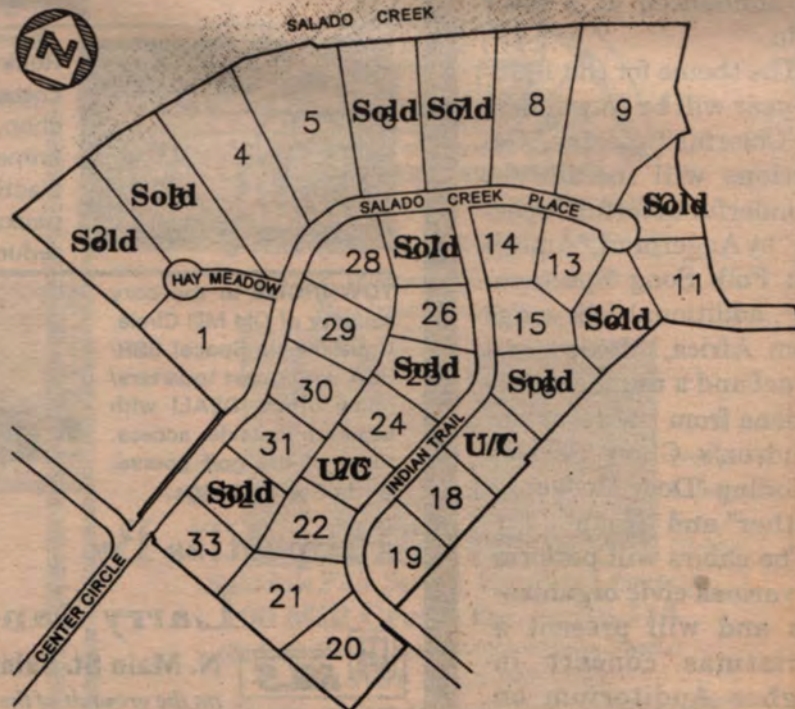

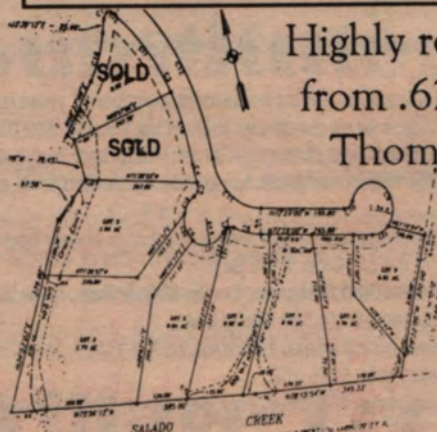

## SISD, Bartlett receive \$25K grant from TEA

Salado ISD and Bartlett ISD have received a \$25,000 grant from the Texas Education Agency to move children from special education into the mainstream classroom.

The Bell County Cooperative for Exceptional Children has stated that the major tenet of its educational philosophy is to create a climate for the success of all students.

One way to achieve this is the inclusion of special education students in the regular education environments.

The secondary campuses of Salado and Bartlett have decided to strive toward this goal with intensive staff development using the methodologies chosen

by the Education service Center in the areas of vertical learning strategies and awareness of how the brain works.

These campuses know that if they are successful, they will be able to work with the Education Service Center and the surrounding universities to help other school districts in the region create success for special education students in every area of the school environs.

At the moment, inclusion is not a goal in the campus plans of the secondary campuses of Salado and Bartlett. The Campus Team hopes that inclusion will be listed as a goal with the additional knowledge and skills acquired with this project.

At the end of the 1997-98 school year, Salado and Bartlett plan to move 25 percent of their secondary special education students into a regular classroom setting. They plan to reduce the percentage of special education students in the district by 15 percent.

With continued training and professional development, the districts plan to reduce their percentage of identified special education students to 12 percent within the next five years.

The Salado and Bartlett ISDs realize the importance of continuous growth and development and will continue to provide funds and support after the grant period to promote the goal of inclusion.

## Fail to support your kid, lose your license

### Legal Matters

Texas families and Texas taxpayers are better off this year, thanks to the hard work of our Child Support Division and a new law allowing for license suspension, an additional \$30 million in child support has been collected since the law took effect last September.

The new law, affecting non-custodial parents who are behind in their child support, gives the Office of the Attorney General the authority to suspend the driver's, professional and recreational licenses of parents who are delinquent in paying their child support.

Best of all, that \$30 million received from non-custodial parents is money that does have to come from the pockets of Texas taxpayers.

### Serious about child support

The license suspension law was designed to show delinquent parents that the

Attorney General is serious about collecting child support. It serves as an important enforcement tool in reaching the most troubling cases involving delinquent parents.

Most of the non-custodial parents whose licenses are suspended have avoided automatic wage withholding for child support by various means, including skipping from job to job, working for cash, or becoming self-employed. They aren't getting away with this anymore.

### The process begins

Just before the law took effect, we launched a statewide campaign in late August 1995 to inform delinquent non-custodial parents that their license privileges were in jeopardy. Nearly 50,000 warning letters were mailed to non-paying parents with the message, "Pay your child support or lose your license."

This initial warning period was very successful. In just four and a half

months, the threat of license suspension prompted 17,000 delinquent parents to pay \$9 million.

Voluntary compliance from all non-custodial parents is what we hoped to receive. We have set up measures to give parents ample opportunity to live up to their child support obligations. After all, our goal is to collect child support, not suspend licenses. However, we are also aware that every day of delay in providing child support is another day some children go without food and clothing.

### License suspension

In January 1996, my office filed more than 1,000 petitions to suspend licenses. So far, more than 100 licenses have been revoked, including those held by a funeral director and a dentist.

Our success is measured not by the number of licenses we suspend, but by the number of people who

begin to pay. However, for those who continue to shirk their responsibility to their

children, we will aggressively pursue the suspension of their licenses.

Delinquent parents have ample opportunity to comply with their child support orders or to work out payment plans with the state before reaching the point of license suspension.

**Pay or lose your license**

Before the law was enacted, we set a goal to collect \$20 million during fiscal year 1996, which ends

on August 31. This \$20 million would be in addition to the projected \$500 million in child support that we anticipate collecting through other enforcement methods during the 1996 fiscal year. In May, we reached our goal, and project that we will surpass it by more than 50 percent at the end of August.

**Common-sense minimum goals**

I look forward to seeing continued success in the license suspension program in the years to come.

Though my office cannot force parents to love, nurture, and guide their children, at least we can do our best to make them feed, clothe and house their children. License suspension is necessary to force some parents to do what they should do willingly - financially support their children.

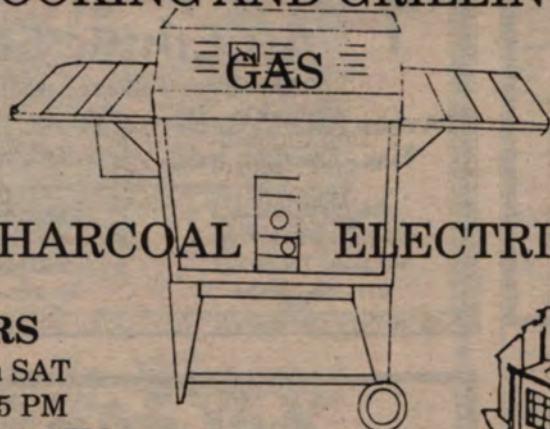

## Brown bag it at next physical

The next time you go for, a complete physical exam, "brown bag" it.

"Sweep all prescription and over-the-counter medications from the bedside table and medicine cabinet into a paper bag and take them to your physician," said Dr. Isaac Klein, associate professors of family medicine at Bay or College of Medicine in Houston.

"This is especially important when you're accompanying elderly family members who are treated by several specialists to be sure their drugs are not incompatible, unnecessary or outdated", he said.

Also, take, along notes on your health history. Make a list of major illnesses, surgeries and immunizations you have had and the years they occurred, and note serious health problems that have run in your family-

"The patient's medical history is the most important part of a health checkup," Kleinman said. "Most diagnoses are based on this information."

During the physical exam, your doctor should:

- note weight, blood pres-

sure, pulse and temperature

- inspect the eyes, ears, nose and throat

- listen to the heart and lungs for unusual sounds

- test for sensation in fingers and feet

- check reflexes and balance

- check the abdomen, lymph nodes and breasts for swelling or lumps

- inspect the skin for lesions, rashes on other abnormalities

- do a rectal exam (including a check for prostate cancer in men)

- order a blood and urine analysis

- check for blood in the stool.

Women should also have a Pap smear pelvic exam and mammogram. Men should have a testicular exam.

Remember that your lifestyle, age and other health problems will affect which lab tests the physician requests and the need for additional procedures, such as a sigmoidoscopy (viewing the lower colon through a tube inserted in the rectum).

Kleinman recommends that healthy adults get a

full physical every five years, starting at age 20. A blood-pressure check, Pap smear and breast exam should be done every year. Starting at age 40, you should have a rectal exam and a test for blood in the stool every year and get your eyeball pressure checked for glaucoma every two years. Starting at age 45, women should have a mammogram annually.

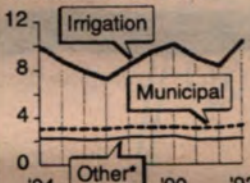

As the population of the state increases—it has doubled since the 1950s—demands on water resources will rise and could exceed supply by 2030 in some regions of Texas without planning for conservation, waste prevention and drought management. Statewide consumption, in millions of acre-feet



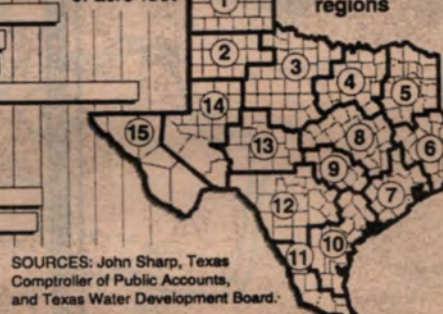

To quote Andrew McIver in Salado Legends: "Whoever the friendly donors be, to the men thereof a genuine handshake, handkisses to the ladies." Like Andrew, the cast and crew of "Legends" are grateful to the businesses of Central Texas for the support and sponsorship of Salado Legends.

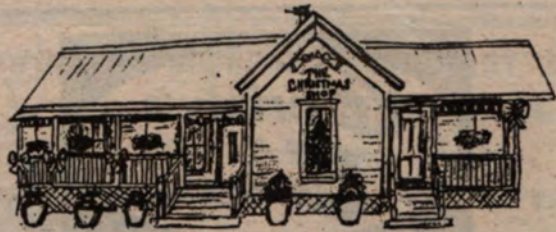

4. Get the contractor to put the work to be done in writing with specific information about the cost involved and method of payment.

5. Never pay in advance for the work to be done. Most legitimate contractors will not request more than 1/3 of the total price in advance.

A return receipt can be purchased with certified mail.

This receipt comes back to you showing the date your article was delivered with the signature of the person receiving it.

You can restrict delivery to only one person with a return receipt and also verify delivery address.

# Problem Doctors Cited By Consumer Publication

(NU) - Despite the notorious we-protect-our-own secrecy among medical doctors, it is now possible for the ordinary person to know if a practicing physician has been disciplined by state medical boards or the federal government for incompetence, substance abuse, patient abuse or the misprescription of dangerous drugs.

Physicians' groups have tried to keep disciplinary actions against doctors closed to the press and public. However, a public interest group called Public Citizen has broken the wall of silence by publishing the names of more than 13,000 doctors and the disciplinary actions against them.

The books, titled "Questionable Doctors," are organized on a state-by-state basis. Individual state reports are available for \$15 each. The data for all 50 states and the District of Columbia are available for \$250.

The book for New York

state lists 1,655 doctors; California, 1,382; Florida, 1,234; Texas, 978; New Jersey, 948; Illinois, 866; and Ohio, 708.

Of the 25,069 disciplinary actions taken against doctors named in the Public Citizen report, only 26.5 percent led to any removal, even temporarily, of a doctor's license. This includes 1,913 doctors involved in criminal offenses; 1,622 involved in substandard care, incompetence or negligence; 1,378 who overprescribed or misprescribed drugs; 1,059 involved in the abuse of alcohol or drugs; and 264 doctors involved in sexual abuse or sexual misconduct with a patient.

How can medical consumers effectively use the information?

They can be forewarned about doctors who have been disciplined for unprofessional sexual behavior with their patients. They can question doctors with records of incompetence. Older people

and their friends can avoid doctors who have neglected or abused elderly patients. And patients can be wary of doctors who have drinking or drug-abuse problems.

"For too long, doctors and their ostensible gatekeepers have failed to realize that consumers need to protect themselves," says Dr. Sidney M. Wolfe who guided the Public Citizen project.

"A license to practice medicine is a hard-won privilege," Dr. Wolfe adds. "It is a privilege to see us naked, to cut us open, to hear our innermost thoughts, to provide us with potentially dangerous drugs. Yet for too long, the state and federal government agencies chartered to protect us from those no longer fit to hold the privilege have fallen down on the job."
