Dedication set June 4 for Robertson statue

A lifesize bronze statue of Col. E.S.C. Roberson will be dedicated at College Hill 10:30 a.m. June 4. The statue is the result of a gift by the late Alice Robertson Sneed West, grand-daughter of Col. Robertson, and instituted by the Robertson Colony-Salado College Foundation.

The statue, the work of sculptor Clay Dahlberg, of Hunt, is the central presence on the picturesque hillside of live oak trees and the remaining limestone walls of the old College, one of the oldest educational institutions in Texas.

The handsome iron fence and gates at the entrance

to College Hill is the gift of Mary Marshall, a 97-year-old East Texas philanthropist. The gift was made through the Central Texas Area Museum, of which Mrs. Marshall is a trustee.

Descendants of the Colonel, members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas and villagers will be on hand for the opening ceremony 10:30 a.m. June 4. The event is open to the public.

Salado Historical Society worked in cooperation with the Foundation to preserve the Salado College ruins, which had been vacant for decades after the third fire burned the two-story structure in the 1920s.

Masonic Lodge names Denver Mills Community Builder

The Salado Masonic Lodge named Denver Mills as the Salado Community Builder during a luncheon May 24.

The Community Builder Award is presented to non-Masons for their civic involvement in the community in which they live.

Mills is the third to be given the award, following Patsy Sanford in 1992 and Bob Cottle in 1993.

Mills is retired from an active 30-year career in engineering. After receiving an honorable discharge from the U.S. Air Force in 1953 after three years of service, Mill began his training and work in engineering in 1957.

He was named Chief of Policy and Long Range Planning, Southwest Division Corps of Engineers in Dallas in 1968. He was promoted in 1976 to Chief, Planning Branch and Chief Planning Division, Fort Worth District Corps of Engineers.

He became Chief, Engineering and Planning Division, Little Rock Division Corps of Engineers in 1984 until he retired from active engineering work in 1986.

After retiring to Salado, Mills entered the real estate business in the area and later began Rhoads and Mills Construction Company, which capitalized on his past engineering and

construction experience.

In 1990, Mills became interim Chief Engineer for Scott & White Hospital, where he was responsible for managing personnel, equipments, systems and all in-house remodeling for the main hospital clinic, outlying buildings and community clinics.

Mills retired again in 1992 and became actively involved in Salado community affairs.

Some of his involvements includes three years as directors of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, two terms as President of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, President of the Pace Park Board of Trust-

ees, Director of the Tablerock Festival of Salado, Salado Lions Club, and Member of the CLEAR Committee (for Lake Belton and Stillhouse Hollow Lake).

Mills was also Chairman of the Bell County Democratic Party in 1991-92.

During Mills' tenure as President of the Salado Chamber of Commerce, the old red schoolhouse on Main St. was renovated for use as a civic center.

The Chamber was the moving force behind the renovation of the old school building. Groundwork on the project began in 1991 and continued to its completion in 1993.

Fearless is a fantastic movie in a year of epic movies. Jeff Bridges and Rosie Perez deliver powerhouse performances.

Perez' performance as Carla Rodrigo, a devout Catholic struggling with the death of her toddler son in a California plane crash, should have been rewarded with an Academy Award. Her sorrow is so deep and all-encompassing that she cannot leave her room.

When Max Klein (Bridges), an architect who saves many people after the crash, comes to see her at her home, she cries out "All I want to do is die." Klein has become completely fearless of death after the crash, feeling like "a ghost, nothing can happen to me."

The two grow into a relationship which affects everything about their lives, including their marriages.

Strong performances are given by supporting roles, especially that of Brillstein, the lawyer played by Tom Hulce. His sliminess and eagerness to see profit in the sorrow and suffering of others is despicable and Hulce portrays this so realistically. John Turturro is also good as Dr. Bill Perlman, a psychologist dealing with a situation for which he is not prepared.

Fearless is more about life than death. It is one of the best movies this year.

Jereme Hosch absorbed the loss on the mound for Salado. He allowed six runs (four earned) in three innings. Josh Goodnight pitched the final four innings for the Eagles. Salado finished the season with a 19-4 record. The bi-district champs were ranked eighth in the state in the final poll.

McQueary to sign new book at Bell Co. Museum June 11

Carl McQueary of Salado is inviting his friends to the Authors' Day 1 p.m. June 11 to be held at the Bell County Museum on North Main St. in Belton. McQueary will be autographing copies of the book, **Ma's In The Kitchen: You'll Know When it's Done!** which he co-authored with May Nelson Paulissen.

Everyone - even Yankees - has heard of "Ma" Ferguson. Now readers can get better acquainted with Texas' first woman governor, Miriam Ferguson, through her recipes. Fortunately, Governor Ferguson's personal papers, including her recipe collection have been lovingly preserved.

Governor Ferguson grew up as a privileged Southern belle on the Texas Frontier, in the Sparks community, just a few miles from Salado. The selection of food she served, both at home and in the Governor's Mansion in Austin, reflect these influences.

Authors McQueary and Paulissen treat the reader to a delicious look at one of the Lone Star State's most remarkable women. More than 300 of Miriam's kitchen-tested, down-home recipes are included in the book. The authors dish up a good serving of Texas history along with many delightful dishes from Miriam Ferguson's kitchen. Collected over the Governor's lifetime, the recipes span the years 1875-1961 and include such Texas favorites as Will Rogers Chili, M.A.F. Pralines, and the closely guarded biscuit recipe of W. Lee "Pappy" O' Daniel another colorful former Texas governor.

The authors share dozens of rare photographs from the Ferguson family album, never before published, as well as helpful hints and "amazing facts worth knowing" from the writings of "Ma" herself.

History buffs in Salado will recall that Miriam A. Wallace and James E. Ferguson attended Salado

College from 1895-1897, where they met, later fell in love and married.

Miriam Ferguson also attended Baylor Female College in Belton.

Carl McQueary is a graduate of Texas Tech University and the Texas Historical Commission's Winedale Museum seminar. He is the former executive director of the Bell County Museum. While serving that capacity, McQueary was successful in getting the Ferguson Papers donated to the Museum where there is a permanent exhibit.

McQueary is presently Executive Director of the Republic of Texas Museum, Daughters of the Republic of Texas in Austin. He resides in Salado with his wife, Laura and son Kendall.

May Nelson Paulissen, Ph. D. is a professor of English in Houston.

The foreword in the book is written by The Honorable Ann Richards, Governor of Texas.

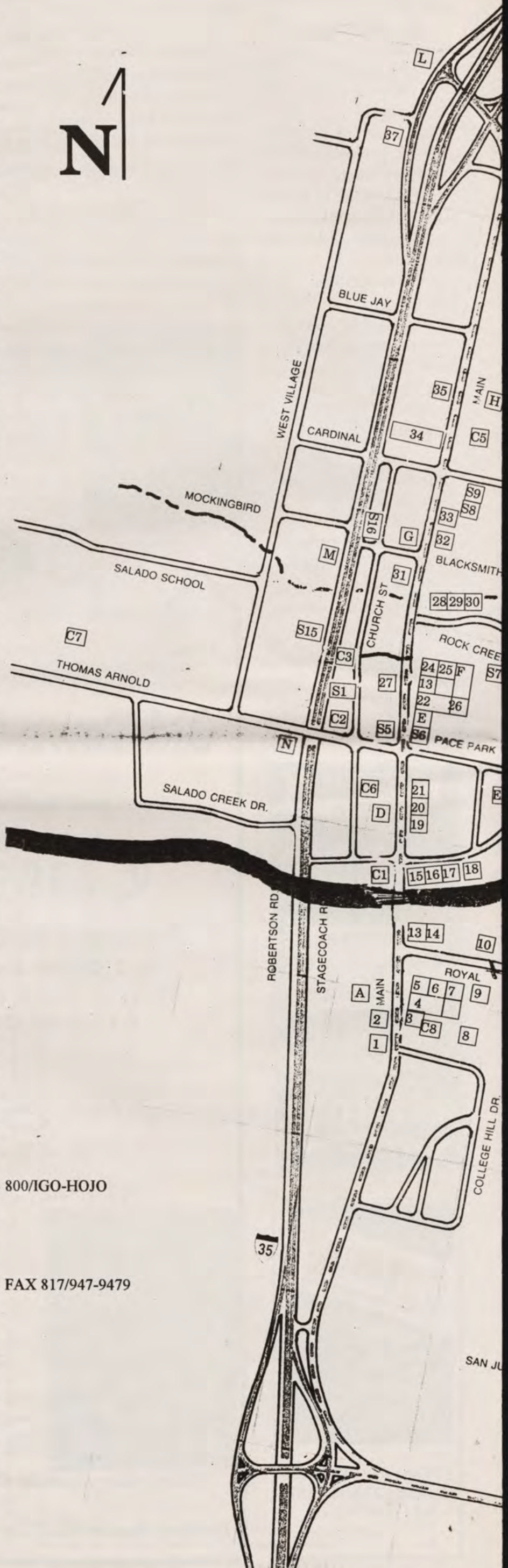

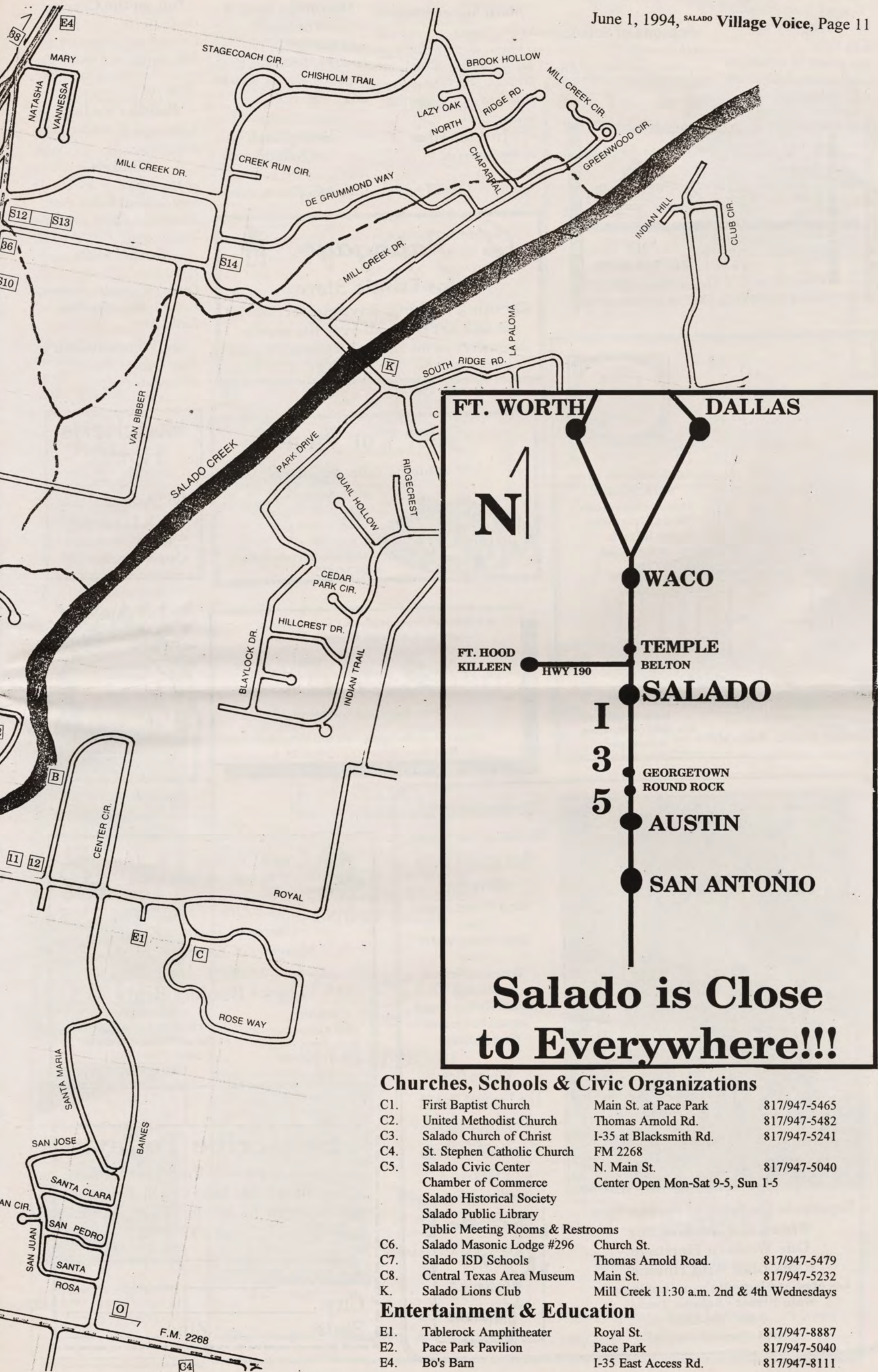



whereas Main Street occupants many times just assign themselves a number they like and hope for the best.

This could cause some real problems in an emergency situation. Don't blame the local post office folks for this failure. It lies within the vast San Antonio PO Department. County officials apparently have done little to push the feds. Someone needs to get cracking on this project before one of us buys the farm for lack of emergency assistance.

Delinquency

Been a rash of delinquency taking place in the village over the past 10 days. Damage to Pace Park and the Civic Center by either adult or teenage miscreants reported. Be nice to think that if they are caught some sort of working restitution would take place. Replace the damaged areas personally while wearing some sort of identification that would let the rest of us know who they

are.

No doubt in this age of "no-faultism," these offenders would tell the judge they were mistreated by their parents or teachers or failed potty training as a child and therefore not responsible. Some adults would oppose public work but these older non-disciplinarians are part of the problem to start with - so don't expect much from that quarter.

Public humiliation is about all that might keep people from crossing the line. Swift and sure and out in the open is the type punishment that would stop the minor acts of delinquency before they become worse. Paying a fine or receiving a slap on the wrist by the judicial system worsens the problem. Physically replacing the damaged property by the person that caused the damage will work. Too bad we don't use it. Really won't hurt a person's psyche and might make a useful citizen out of him or her.
