Salado Art Fair Posters available for sale now

Full-color posters for the 28th Annual Salado Art Fair are now available for purchase from artist Ronnie Wells.

Salado artist Ronnie Wells painted the scene of Salado Creek and the Main Street Bridge, which is used as the Art Fair poster.

Unframed posters are available for \$10 each while framed posters are \$50 each.

Ronnie and Patricia Wells opened Wells Gallery on South Main St. Salado in April 1993, coming from Georgetown.

Ronnie Wells, a painter and sculptor, has received many honors for his work.

His most recent award was Artist of the Year for the 1994 North Carolina Wildlife and Sportsman's Show.

In 1993, Wells received three Best of Show Awards from Kansas City Ducks Unlimited and was named Sculptor of the Year at the World Wildlife Exposition in Gatlinburg, TN.

Other awards include First Place Sculpture at the North Carolina Wildlife and Sportsman's Show in 1991; Gold Award from the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame for his bronze sculpture The Covey in 1991 and Gulf Coast Conservation Stamp and Print Artist in 1992.

The Texas Legislature chose him as Texas State Sculptor in 1990-91.

In 1988, his bronze sculpture Evening Roost won Best in World from the World Wildlife Sculpture and Bronze Championships in Georgia. In 1987, his bronze sculpture Intrusion also won.

In 1984, Wells was named The Texas Ducks Unlimited Artist of the Year.

Wells received a degree of fine arts from the Louisiana Tech University in 1968. He has been a full-time professional artist for over 20 years.

Wells is among the 183 artists at the 28th Salado Art Fair August 6-7 in Pace Park. He will have the posters available for purchase during the weekend in his booth, as well as his other work, including paintings and sculpture.

Admission to the Art Fair is \$3 for adults, children

under 12 free. The Fair will be open 9 a.m.-6 p.m. Aug. 6 and 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 7.

Salado Field of Dreams has ribbon cutting

Salado's "Field of Dreams" had its official ribbon cutting ceremony on June 15. The Salado Youth Association with the assistance of the Salado Chamber of Commerce and the assistance of one of Salado's T-Ball teams cut the ribbon officially opening the field for use.

This ribbon cutting was a momentous occasion for those personally involved in all phases of the project as well as every Salado resident. It was just one year ago when a small group of residents got together and decided to form an organization to help develop these facilities in the community. The group set their goals for the year. They were to raise enough money to purchase the property on which the complex was to be located. These efforts were accomplished with no backing, no government budget, no grants, just lots of hard work and devotion to get the job done.

They not only obtained their goals for 1993, but managed to get the first field completed and in use. The organization has now set their goals for the future which will include at least one phase of the construction of the complex to be completed each year.

Tickets for the main fund-raiser of the year are now on sale. Each ticket may be purchased for \$100, which is tax deductible. The \$100 donation pays for a fun filled evening with great food, but it also entitles you to a chance to win the \$5,000 first prize of the evening. The \$5,000 win-

ner will be the last ticket in the bin. The second from the last will win \$3,000, while the third from the last wins \$500.

The Fund-raiser Auction will take place 6:30 p.m. July 9 at the Bell County Expo Center. Las Casas will be catering the event. Dinner will be buffet style with

the auction and festivities to begin at 7 p.m.

Geronimo is a terribly boring Western with just three things going for it: Robert Duvall, Gene Hackman, and Wes Studi. You would think they would be enough for any movie. But not **Geronimo**.

Wes Studi (**Dances with Wolves, Last of the Mohicans**) finally has a starring role as the legendary Geronimo, an Apache warrior who escapes from a U.S. Army reservation and evades the trackers and calvary.

Hackman stars as the General responsible for bringing in the rebel Indian leader and tries to bring peace to the situation by meeting and talking with Geronimo.

He is accompanied by a Lieutenant (Jason Patric, from **Rush**) who has befriended the outlaw Geronimo. Patric is particularly weak in his role, which shows why he gets so few good roles.

Duvall reprises his **Lonesome Dove** character, this time as an Indian tracker whose greatest challenge is to bring in Geronimo.

With all the potential **Geronimo** had, it is very disappointing that it is so anti-climactic. But, of course, the filmmakers were presenting an authentic telling of the legend.

But you would think Hollywood could change history just a little to make a better movie. Right?

All this sound familiar? Should - it has Salado written all over its descriptive under and overtones.

Growth, unfortunately, has some not so happy side-effects. A lovely community of folks that is complete with pleasing-to-the-eye surroundings many times attracts people who can best be termed - "hit and run" visitors. These are the creatures who hit town; mess up everything they touch; bother everyone they come in contact with and then take off leaving others to clean up after they are gone.

Salado is slowly but surely feeling the effects of these slovens. Reason is simple. Once the charm of the village is seen with its historical homes and businesses; the dramatic beauty of Mill Creek; the excellent

golf course and probably the most attractive feature of all - Pace Park and Salado Creek; once all this has been discovered, all types of people are attracted. Among them are many fine visitors; a few are the not-so-fine minority who would best be served in a caged atmosphere.

No meeting of Pace Park Trustees or the Chamber of Commerce is complete these days without a discussion of the poor treatment that the creek and park are receiving. Some visitors feel compelled to trash the water and park land by building open fires; throwing refuse to the winds; drinking that is usually followed by boisterous noise; deliberately destroying trees, benches, rest rooms and trash receptacles. They drive over the grass and defy anyone to call a halt to their ne'er-do-well activities. What they do in the water is beyond words and certainly not something to report in a family newspaper.

Where do these unwanted visitors come from?

All over - including other communities in Bell County and as far away as Austin and Waco. They don't shop in our stores but they use the park and creek as if it were their own personal property. Residents living up and down the waterway are worried about the noise and other disruptive activities.

The Chamber of Commerce is looking at the costs of hiring off-duty law enforcement officers for the park during weekend and holiday periods. The cost will be high but the potential danger is felt to outweigh the dollars. Liability looms large when you get down to what can happen in an unprotected park or creek such as ours here in Salado.

It would be a shame if the Chamber of Commerce had to spend up to \$20,000.00 a year, or more, policing the park-creek area. Money that is so hard to come by and could be better spent on youth and other things that benefit the village.

All of this begs the question - must these bad things accompany growth in Salado? If so - is growth what we really want? What is the alternative? In fact - is there an alternative?

One suggestion would be that we fully support - with our ideas, moral backup and perhaps later with money -

Heart of Texas Hospice names new Executive Director

The Board of Directors of the Heart of Texas Hospice, Inc. announces the appointment of Cecilia "Ceci" Bunker, R.N., C., as the new Executive Director. She will be responsible for all the overall operation of the Hospice.

"Ceci Bunker brings a wealth of valuable experience with her," said Vic Kilian, a founding member of the Heart of Texas Hospice, Inc. and a current member of the Board of Directors.

"During her eight years of association with hospices in Ohio and Texas she has held the positions of Case Manager, Patient Care Co-

ordinator, Community Nurse Educator and Home Care Supervisor," he added. She is board certified in gerontology and hospice nursing.

She has also served as Director of Nursing in a long term care facility. She helped develop an experimental Alzheimer's Unit, and an Acute Geriatric Center within a hospital setting. She is a board member of the Texas Hospice Association.

Bunker has announced plans for strengthening the services offered by the Heart of Texas Hospice, Inc., including the revision of criteria for patient ad-

missions, improved liaison with referring physicians, and implementing a quick response system for patient/family special needs.

The Heart of Texas Hospice, Inc., was organized and cared for its first patient in 1989. Since then it has provided care for 842 patients and their families. The Heart of Texas Hospice currently cares for patients and families in a 50 mile radius area from Belton, Texas.

The Hospice also operates a thrift store in Belton managed by a paid manager who oversees the work of 41 volunteers. Hospice trains and uses volunteers in many other activities including patient and family support and business office operations. To date 144 persons have completed the 30 hour training course for Hospice volunteers. For more information about

Next year, the Social Security Administration will automatically issue Earning and Benefit Estimates to every worker over 60, detailing how much he or she has contributed and what retirement benefits he or she can expect. Currently, a worker has to request such an analysis.

The death of Richard Nixon has focused more attention on so-called living wills. Surveys show that 90 percent of Americans support the idea of a living will to specify what medical treatment they desire. But strangely, only 10-20 percent of people have actually written a living will.

Authorities in several states have warned elderly consumers about salesmen selling nursing home insurance and living trusts under company names that may resemble those of respected organizations, like the AARP.

Nursing home insurance sales have grown dramatically since the policies were introduced a decade ago. Sales increased from 815,000 in 1987 to 2,930,00 in 1992. The number of companies selling the insurance grew from 75 to 135.

Sparklers cause 100s of eye injuries

Sparklers, considered safe by many parents, will injure hundreds of preschool-age children this Fourth of July, warns Prevent Blindness Texas, an affiliate of Prevent Blindness America.

Sparklers are fireworks that emit white or colored

sparks when lit. The chemicals in sparklers are pasted on "needle-thin" wire. Unlike other fireworks devices, sparklers don't explode, splatter, or fly up like rockets. These "silent" devices sizzle at temperatures of 1,800° F and injure more than 800 preschoolers each year.

"Many parents give sparklers to children as alternatives to other fireworks, because they think sparklers are safer," explained Carol Green, Executive Director of Prevent Blindness Texas Central Region. "But when you consider how hot these devices get, parents are actually giving their children miniature fireballs."

Sparklers are common causes of corneal burns and burns to the hands and fingers. People also tend to swing burning sparklers, risking penetrating eye injuries to young bystanders. According to Prevent Blindness, more than half of the 12,000 fireworks injuries each year impact children, forty percent are bystanders.

Because sparklers are among the fireworks least likely to be regulated, the devices are part of a multi-million dollar industry, with purchases totalling

\$250 million last year. Approximately two-thirds of this price tag were consumer purchases.

"Until people realize that there is no such thing as safe fireworks, manufacturers will continue selling them, and children will continue to suffer serious injuries," said Green.

During the months of May and June Prevent Blindness and its nationwide network of affiliates have distributed free Fireworks Safety Test to help educate parents and others about the dangers of fireworks. 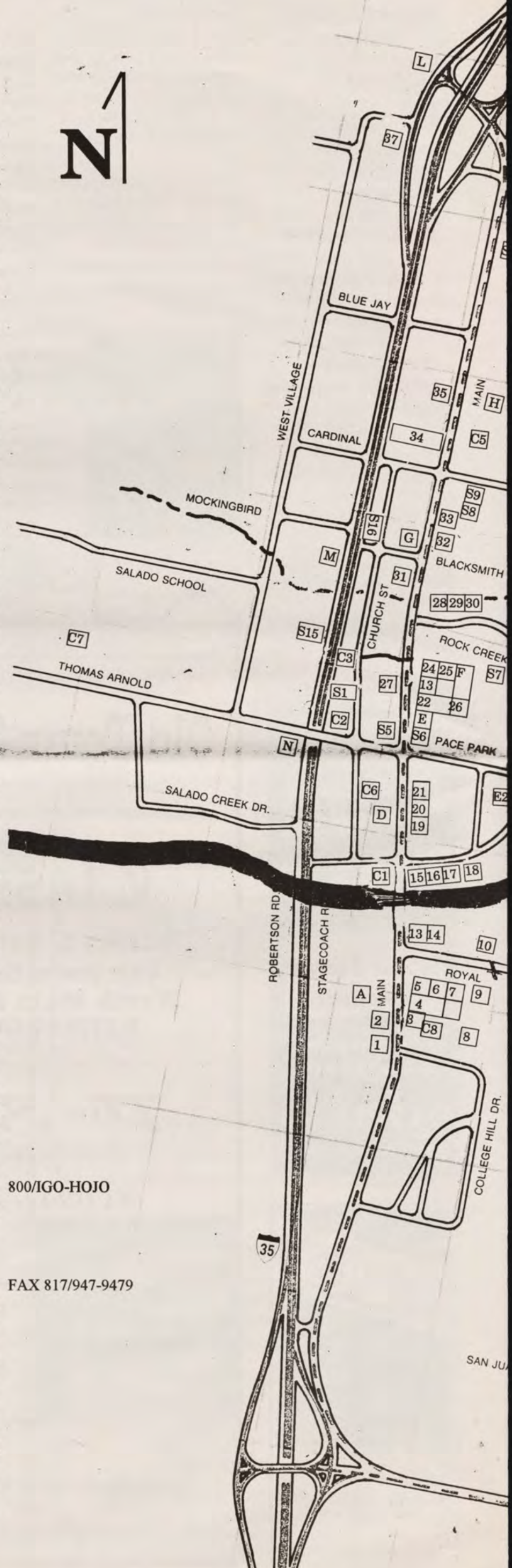

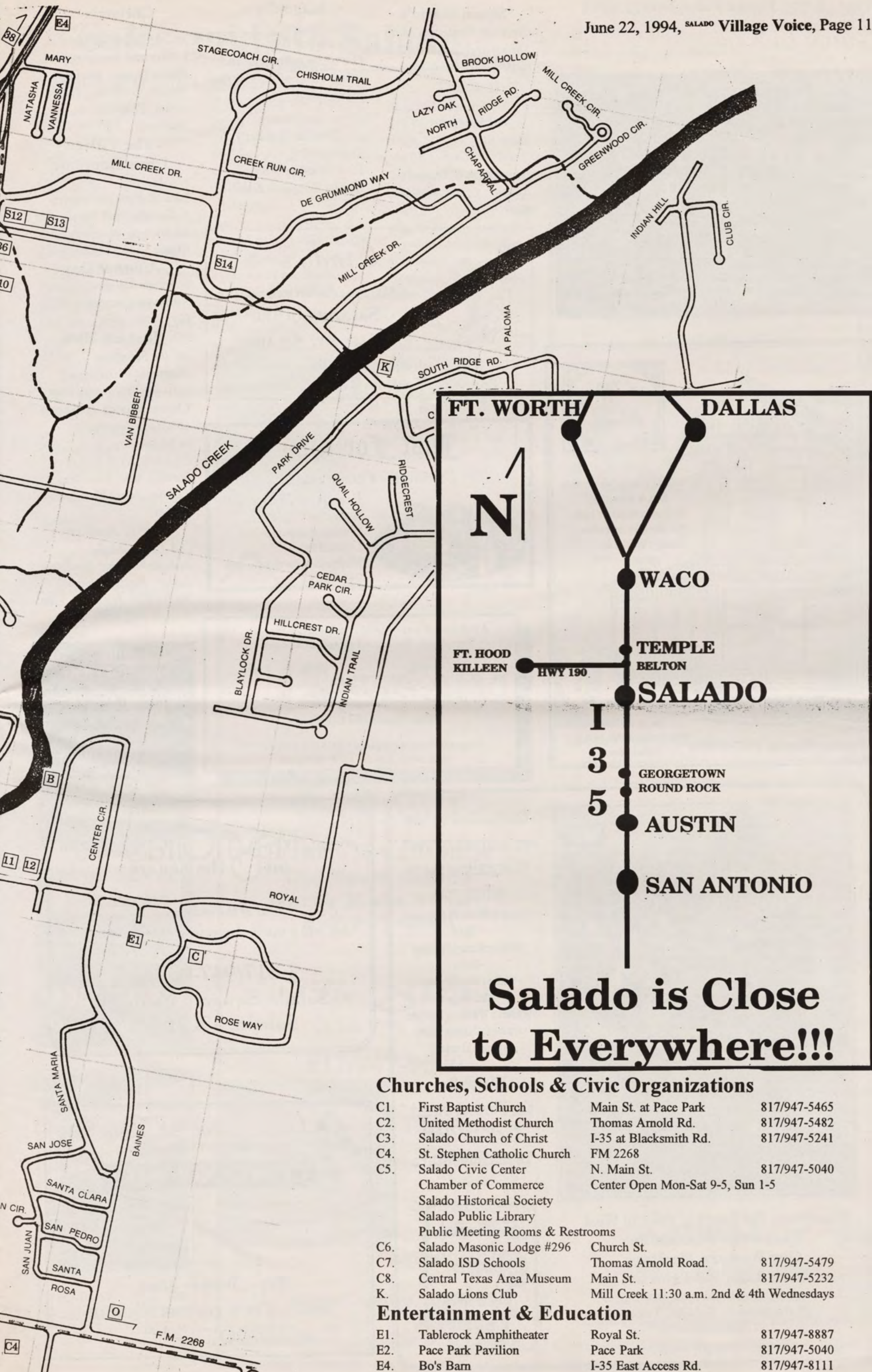



 - 2 tablespoons chopped fresh chives or green onion tops
 - 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved if large
 - Lettuce leaves
1. Bring a large saucepan of salted water to boil. Add Brussels sprouts; cook 2 minutes.

Salado Creek Monitors Receive Award



How to Take A 'Vacation' From Burglary Worries

(NU) - The average American family works until about May just to pay its annual tax bill, then tries to put together a summer vacation. And while the Joneses are away, they hope no one's breaking into their home.

Nearly seven million families return home sometime during the year to find it burglarized. U.S. Justice Department statistics indicate summer is prime time for burglars, whose victims are out playing in the sun, at the pool or on vacation.

The best protection is a good burglar alarm system. Homes without security systems are three times more likely to be broken into than homes with a system according to the National Burglar and Fire Alarm Association (NBFAA).

A good alarm system,

combined with the following security practices, can send burglars looking for easier targets:

- Cancel newspaper, milk and other deliveries. Don't leave notes.
- Lock all doors and windows. Secure the garage door.
- Have a neighbor pick up mail, deliveries and emptied garbage cans.
- Park a car outside.
- Leave a house key with a neighbor who will know where the family can be reached.

• Turn telephone ringers down or off. Constant ringing phones indicate an occupied house.

Conserve water during summer months

The summer activities - swimming, lawn watering, car washing, etc., all require an ample water supply that we often take for granted.

By now, most Texans should know that our ground water supplies are being depleted faster than they can be renewed. That means everybody needs to do their part to conserve water.

Here are some suggestions to reduce the amount of water we casually waste at home and help you save dollars on your monthly water bill.

Keep a thermos of cool water on the kitchen cabinet or a jug of water in the refrigerator. Running the

tap to wait for cooler water sends about five gallons of water per minute down the drain.

Take a quick shower. Every inch of water in a bath tub represents about 4-1/2 gallons of water and a shower without a water-saving device typically uses 5-10 gallons per minute.

Use full loads of laundry to clean those summer clothes. Washing machines can use 40-60 gallons of water per load.

Resist using the toilet for a trash basket. Every flush uses 4-7 gallons of water.

A leaking faucet wastes more water than you might think. A drip a second could waste over 2,000 gallons a year. Luckily a dripping faucet is an easy leak to detect. Sometimes a leak

can be stopped by turning off the faucet tightly. Don't turn too hard, though, or the washer will wear out more quickly. If the dripping continues, the faucet must be repaired. This usually means getting a new washer.

When brushing your teeth, don't let the water run the entire time. Every minute, 4 to 5 gallons of water will run down the drain. Use a cup for rinsing. The same rule applies when washing your hair or hands in the sink - shut off the water while soaping up.
