No Escape is Road Warrior without the roads and without Mel Gibson, which means it is not that great of a movie.

No Escape tries to recapture the excitement and danger of Mad Max and Road Warrior, movies about society turned inside-out and upside-down.

Instead of begin centered around the gas wars as was Mad Max and Road Warrior, No Escape is centered on a prison island where good and evil conflict between the Outsiders and Insiders.

Both camps want the expertise offered by John Robbins, a Marine who only wants to get off the island.

What No Escape has in explosions and good costumes, it lacks in suspense and a decent lead character. Where Gibson's Mad Max is exactly that, fitting the chaos around him, Liotta's Robbins is way, way too normal for the circumstances in which he is thrown.

Both movies are basically grown men dressed up in scary costumes and chasing each other with scary weapons.... At least the writers of Mad Max and Road Warrior understood this and did not take themselves or their story too seriously unlike No Escape, which is played way to straight.

Last Friday's gubernatorial debate between incumbent Ann Richards and GOP challenger George Bush went down with few surprises. It was the traditional battle between the consummate insider - Richards, who worked her way up the political chairs over the past 26 years and outsider Bush, who brings to the table the normal wannabee pitch demanding change; less government; less spending on all fronts and certainly no new taxes.

Bush touted his education program that would allow local districts after meeting minimal guidelines - to teach what courses they see fit, all according to home-town ideas, mores and needs. Richards held to the theory that becoming chief executive of Texas requires experience and training which she claims to have in spades.

The two kicked around Bush's business record until one member of the panel asking questions said: "enough - let's get on to important matters!"

The major items of difference appeared to parallel the media battle plans of each candidate. Welfare reform, juvenile crime, education and the general high cost of a growing govern-

ment in Texas plus no increase in taxes.

The debate probably did not change the standings of either candidate. The two will no doubt stay close to dead even until election day. A few thousand votes could then turn the tide either way. Both candidates bring

good ideas to state government. Just a matter of experience versus a new face when you get right down to it. Bush has the advantage of being down-ballot from Kay Hutchison who, no doubt, will beat challenger Richard Fisher like a drum.

All in all, the debate was worthwhile for voters who had not seen the two up close and personal at the same time. They did well and we are of course fortunate to have them both on the scene offering their services. Far cry from the battle four years ago when many embarrassed GOPers hid from their standard bearer Clayton Williams who went around with his brain disengaged and his foot in his mouth. Bush is a calm gentleman-like candidate with fresh ideas. Many of them will not work

but if elected he will find that out quickly and have to adjust to the give-and-take of state politics - particularly when the legislature hits town.

GOP Sweeps Local Vote

We congratulate two Salado ISD staff members - Penny Curry, 6th grade teacher and Rod Stockstill, Elementary Principal, for putting together a candidate forum last week that attracted a large number of folks running for office. The students, faculty and several towns-people heard the hopefuls and the next day high schoolers went to the polls.

A tremendous 84 percent of the over 200 secondary students voted - a high mark that the rest of us would do well to emulate.

Republican candidates carried the day with one exception - that being the 264th District Judicial seat. Democrat Mickey Wade squeaked by Janie Trudo (54 to 46 percent). For the rest - it was GOP-all-the-way.

If young people mirror the homefolks, then it could be a near GOP clean sweep in Salado's voting on November 8. Hardly surprising since Salado's voting

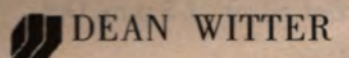

Eagles fall to Rogers, 3-12

The good news is that the Eagles won last week. The bad news, for Salado fans, is that it was the wrong Eagles.

The Rogers Eagles scored twice in the first half on their way to handing Salado a hard-to-swallow 12-3 loss.

What makes the loss hard to swallow is not so much that it killed Salado's chance for back-to-back district championships, but that Salado should have easily won the game.

Except for two things: turnovers and penalties, which have haunted the Eagles in each of their losses, but most especially in this loss to a less-talented team.

Only on their first possession did Rogers look like a better football team as running back David Marek carried 10 times for 58 yards on Rogers' 68-yard scoring drive. The drive took 5:55 off the clock and gave Rogers a 6-0 lead after the



PAT failed.

Rogers recovered the ensuing kick-off at the Salado 38 yard line. Brian Hill fell on a Rogers fumble at the Eagles 21 yard line seven plays later to give Salado the ball.

Salado pushed the ball 60 yards on four plays before turning the ball over on a Jereme Hosch fumble.

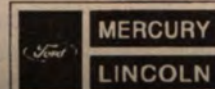

Defer taxes and watch your money grow

The two biggest enemies of long-term investors are inflation and taxes -- if you don't plan for their effects, you may do little more than stay even over time. For example, if your money earns 7 percent and gets taxed at 28 percent, your return (after taxes) is reduced to about 5 percent. If inflation is at 4 percent, you're gaining about 1 percent. That could be disastrous if you're depending on your investments to provide a comfortable, worry-free retirement.

So how do you plan to fight inflation and taxes? One way is with annuities. An annuity is a contract with an insurance company in which you deposit a sum of money for specified period of time. The insurance company promises to pay interest that accumulates tax deferred within the annuity, then at some point in the future, the insurance company returns to you payments of principal and interest.

Advantages of deferred annuities include tax deferral, competitive yields, safety and flexibility. Because they are issued by insurance companies annuities also help you plan for distribution of the accumulated assets after your death. They provide your beneficiaries with a number of settlement options that completely avoid the time delays, cost and publicity of probate.

The most popular type of deferred annuity is a fixed annuity,

where the issuing insurance company guarantees a fixed interest rate for a specified length of time (generally one to seven years). After this, the interest rate is adjusted periodically.

The main advantage of a fixed annuity is that you obtain an attractive rate of return for a specific period without current taxes, and the issuing insurance company guarantees your principal at all times.

A fixed annuity is perhaps the safest type of deferred annuity, but time has proved that fixed investment do not help battle inflation as well as more growth-oriented investments. To increase the growth potential of your assets, you should consider a variable annuity.

With a variable annuity, you participate in the growth potential of selected securities. Most variable annuities offer accounts tied to stocks, bonds or money market securities. You can choose the account that best suits your needs, and as your objectives change, you can switch accounts at no charge and with no tax consequences.

If the value of the underlying securities declines, then the value of your variable annuity would also decline. While your annuity accumulates, however, the issuing insurance company guarantees to re-

turn the entire principal amount to your heirs in the event of your death. And if the variable annuity's value is greater than the principal at the time of your death, the insurance company guarantees to pay the entire value to your heirs.

There are two stages to an annuity -- the accumulation period, when your annuity grows on a tax-deferred basis, and the income period, when you receive payments. Because taxes are deferred during the accumulation period, your money has the opportunity to grow much faster than it would in a comparable investment that gets taxed each year.

After the initial accumulation period, you can renew the annuity at the prevailing interest rate or start receiving regular income payments. You can also cancel the contract if you wish, but you would have to pay taxes on the annuity's earnings and may be subject to a surrender fee. In addition, prior to age 59-1/2, the interest portion may be subject to a 10 percent IRS penalty tax.

If you're trying to invest for a comfortable retirement, you should consider the benefits of annuities. You can minimize the effects of taxes, and receive a competitive return that compounds tax-deferred. A professional investment broker can provide information about specific annuities available.
