CoC approves electrical work, announces results of director election at regular meeting Nov. 14

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors voted unanimously Nov. 14 to approve a \$3,090 bid from Bobby Moore Electric for electrical work in Pace Park.

The board also elected a slate of officers for 1995 and announced the results of the director election during its regular monthly meeting Nov. 14 at the Salado Civic Center.

The board unanimously approved electrical improvements at Pace Park and accepted the bid of Bobby Moore Electric for \$3,090 for the work.

The work will include replacing the 100 amp panel in the pavilion with a 200

amp panel to be placed inside the pavilion annex building, so that it cannot be broken into easily.

Also, four 30 amp breakers will replace the present 20 amp breakers.

"Numerous times during the Art Fair, breakers flipped off from the strain on them," said Roy Hector, chairman of the Pace Park Committee. "Also, the main breaker box was very hot from the strain."

In addition to the work on the pavilion, electrical lines will be run underground to four posts. Each post will have four duplex outlets to bring electricity to the lower level of the Pace Park.

Hector said that the lower level outlets will be used mostly during the Art

Fair. At other times, electricity to those outlets will be cut off so that it could not be used without permission.

The bid was approved on a motion by Denver Mills, which received a second from Bill Heath.

In other business, the board elected a slate of officers to serve in 1995. They are the following: President Roy Hector, Vice President Jap Barrett; Secretary Don McDonald and Treasurer Carolyn Dachs.

Jap Barrett announced the results of the election for four three-year terms on the Chamber board: Carolyn Dachs, Michelle Ellis, Tim Fleischer, and Dr. Doug Willingham.

Bea Stewart will serve one year on the board in

her ex officio position as President of the Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary. Cindy Dale will also serve as an ex officio board member as Chairperson of the Merchants Committee.

The board named the budget committee to be chaired by Bill Heath with members Roy Hector, Jap Barrett and Carolyn Dachs. The budget committee will present its proposal to the board at its December meeting.

Ken Clapp reported to the board as President of the Old Salado School Foundation.

Clapp stated that \$4-5,000 will be paid on the note at Peoples National Bank for renovation of the old red school for use as the Salado Civic Center.

The Chamber co-signed the note and was instrumental in raising the initial funds for the renovation of the school.

The payment will reduce the debt to \$42,000.

"We will end our first year in the black," said Clapp of the daily operations of the Salado Civic Center.

Clapp also reported that work began this week on the permanent sign and brick fence posts in front of the Salado Civic Center, a project of the grounds committee chaired by Lloyd Parks.

If you watch movies for a history lesson, **Wyatt Earp** is probably a great film. But, if you watch movies for entertainment, then **Wyatt Earp** falls short.

Kevin Costner's ambitious attempt to chronicle the long and checkered life of lawman Wyatt Earp, one of the Wild West's legendary figures ends up being overly long (three hours) and boring.

Dennis Quaid as Doc Holliday is Wyatt Earp's saving grace. Without his terrific performance as the hard-drinking, tubercular gunman who would be Earp's best friend, Wyatt Earp would have been a complete failure. Quaid lost over 40 pounds to portray Holliday.

For one thing, Tombstone beat Wyatt Earp to the punch by six months. Tombstone is infinitely more entertaining than the historically correct version of Wyatt Earp.

For another, Kurt Russell is a much, much better Wyatt Earp. Russell's Earp is rugged and arrogant, where Costner's is stoic and... dusty.

Both movies are available on videocassette at IGA Village Foods, so that you can rent them both to compare. But, I think you'll agree, **Tombstone** is the winner, hands-down.

The day after the mid-term elections found most Democrats -state and nationwide - trying to locate the license number of the Mack truck that ran over them! Both the U. S. Senate and House fell to a major Republican onslaught not seen in decades. The shock waves became trouble-waves for President Clinton who hopefully will concur that most of what happened is tied to his first two years of mostly inept liberal rule.

Conventional wisdom spouters pointed out correctly that the election was a harsh review of the President as a person as well as his move from a central-moderate position when elected, to a mostly liberal proponent of social issues. This cost him hundreds of thousands of votes and his party the control of the legislative branch of government.

In Texas the story line was more complex as a brand new candidate for public office challenged an old pro: George W. Bush vs. Ann Richards! Just how

Bush trounced Richards will be discussed for years but the battle turned on a few important items that politicians need to remember in the days to come. First, Queen Ann did not take her challenger seriously until it was too late. When she did it was with a shrill personal attack that turned folks off as they watched the neophyte Bush stay with his war plans in a mostly disciplined manner. Second, and perhaps more importantly, the Richards'

front line troops - Blacks, Mexican Americans and women-let her down. They either stayed home or decamped to the enemy. By the same token Bush gathered up the white, middle class, working folks that live in the suburbs -up to 85% in some large precincts - plus his share of the rest of the State and romped home an easy clear-cut winner.

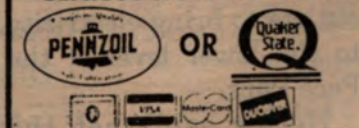

Eagles get revenge 42-7 against Punchers

Revenge is a dish best served cold.

The old cliché certainly proved true for the Salado Eagles in the first round of the high school football play-offs as they routed the Mason Punchers 42-7 in 40 degree weather last week.

It redeemed the Eagles' 21-17 loss to the Punchers in the first round of the play-offs last year.

The Eagles scored early and often, with four touchdowns in the first half.

Shane Johnston carried in on a 3 yard sneak, followed by Jereme Hosch's PAT to put Salado up, 7-0.

Jason Hosch scored the second touchdown for Salado on an 18-yard run. Brother Jereme kicked the PAT, 14-0.

Jason added another touchdown midway through the second quarter on a 20 yard run. Jereme kicked the extra point, 21-0

After forcing a Mason punt with less than two minutes left in the half, the Eagles took over at their own 46 yard line. In just over half a minute, Salado scored on a 17 yard run by Jereme Hosch. It was set-up by a 20-yard catch of Johnston's pass by Jerome Peoples. Jereme kicked the PAT to give Salado a 28-0 lead.

The Eagles forced the Punchers to turnover the ball with 21 seconds left in the half. Salado took over at mid-field with 11 second left. Jerome Peoples bobbled a hand-off and a Mason Puncher picked the ball up and ran for daylight

and a 50-yard touchdown to give Mason its only score of the night.

Salado took the ensuing kick-off and drove 66 yards in eight plays to score with 8:28 left in the third period. Jereme ran in from the 7 yard line. The highlight of the drive was a 20-yard run by Jason Hosch in which he broke three tackles before being brought down. Jereme kicked the extra point to give Salado a 35-7 lead.

The Eagles scored again in the third quarter on a 57 yard drive marked by a 26-yard pass from Johnston to Jessie Finger and a 24-yard run by Jason Hosch.

Jereme Hosch dove in from the 1-yard line with 2:26 left in the third quarter and kicked the extra point for the final score of 42-7 See Eagles, page 8

The Eagle offense tallied 460 yards offense, led by Jason Hosch with 175 yards rushing and Jereme Hosch, 100 yards rushing. Shane Johnston was 5 of 6 for 100 yards passing.

ously; counting on and taking for granted those she had advanced through patronage and appointment plus her close connections with the President, combined to do in the popular lady Governor. All these came to bear at one moment in history causing Ann's battle-wagon to go down with all hands on November 8.

Readers are well aware of who won and lost last Tuesday, so we won't bedevil anyone with pontifical recaps. Probably save some space later on for comments on losers like Foley and Rostenkowski as well as winners like Proposition 187 in California. Maybe even a word or two about Ollie North's loss in a nose-holder by voters who needed a third party in Virginia. One wag in that great State is reported to have said "if there had been a none-of-the-above on the ballot - I would have voted for it"!

When there is time this fall, we will take a long look at the upcoming Texas Legislature with its new members and party breakdowns - all important to the new governor as he tries his hand at pushing programs through what can be a re-

calcitrant body of free thinkers when they set their minds to it.

Salado's Vote

Salado's precinct 203 ranked high in voting numbers on November 8. Out of 1651 registered citizens, a grand total of 1116 voted either early or on time for a percentage of 68! Very high and compares favorably with the county total of 47.2 percent of registered folks who voted.

We promised some weeks ago to compare the results of the high school vote on key races in the area with what the village elders did in the same events. The chart that accompanies this week's column has all this plus the final totals in each race. We think it makes interesting reading.

You will note from the chart that the youth of Salado went strong for the GOP with one exception - Mickey Wade's race for the 169th district judgeship. Both the high schoolers and the Salado adults gave Wade the nod but, it was not enough to win as Trudo slipped by with a little over half a percentage point - the closest race of all. On the other hand, Bill Sims lost at the student and adult

level in his quest for District 24 Senate but went on to wax Hugh Shine in the newly formed senatorial area.

The high school vote took place two weeks before the regular election and mirrored their adult counterparts in all races except for County Judge and JP-2 where the youth went Republican and the older folks crossed over for Demos John Garth and Don Svadlenak.

It is interesting to note that Salado's young people voted along conservative lines for the most part. There is a growing tendency, many say, for our high school and college age citizens to lean to the right and away from their bomb-throwing predecessors whose howling liberalism drove the old folks nuts not too many years back. Reason for the switch that has been some time evolving - may be the rationalization that good jobs are more important than social issues. A theory promulgated successfully by the GOP.

We will all have to agree - no matter our political leaning - that it is with a

A recent study found that families rate these characteristics of a nursing facility as most important: the quality of nursing care, the attention given to residents, and a caring and courteous staff.

People in the Mid-West tend to use nursing services more commonly than people in other parts of the country, while those in the West tend to use nursing facilities less than others, according to a new study.

Studies both in the U.S. and other countries indicate that many of what we think of as unavoidable events of aging are actually just self-fulfilling prophecies: we take up the symptoms of old age because we expect them. Several American studies have shown that the expectation of physical decline can actually be an element in that decline.

Texas researchers have discovered that a low-fat diet, in addition to contributing to a healthier heart and cardiovascular system, also causes people to develop fewer pre-cancerous skin lesions.


What is the Dow Jones Industrial Average?

Lately, we've been hearing a lot about how the stock market is rising and falling. In the news, reporters always tell us how many points the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) has gained or lost. But some may be wondering what the stock market and the DJIA (also known as "The Dow") really have to do with each other, or if perhaps they could be the same thing.

The DJIA is an index used to measure how the stock market is performing. When reporters refer to "the market," they usually mean the stock market as measured by the Dow. The terms "market" and "DJIA," therefore, are often used interchangeably.

The Dow is the oldest of many indexes, originating in 1897, and is perhaps the most popular. One reason for its popularity could be that the Dow Jones Company published the Wall Street Journal and operates the major stock market news service, known as "the broad tape." Dow Jones also compiles the Dow Jones Utility Average and the Dow Jones Transportation Average.

The DJIA is comprised of 30 "blue chip" industrial stocks, such as Coca Cola and IBM, listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

major companies do not reflect the broader market or new industries that are making an increasingly important impact on our economy and markets. For instance, even though the DJIA fell only 6.39 points on Oct. 18, stocks suffered significantly more declines than advances, by nearly a three-to-two ratio. Critics also say the price-weighting system is not scientific and stock splits over time have created a distortion for which the divisor cannot fully compensate.

There are broad market indexes, such as the Standard & Poor's 400 and 500, which include stocks from the American Stock Exchange and over-the-counter markets. Some industry analysts believe these are more representative of the market as a whole because they are "value-weighted," meaning they use market value (price times the number of shares outstanding) rather than price alone.

The important thing to remember when using an index to measure the trend of the market is to use the same one over time. Switching indexes can be confusing. For more information on indexes and stocks, contact your investment broker.

Institute for Humanities hosts final fall lecture

The Institute for the Humanities final lecture in its HOPE: BEYOND SURVIVAL series will be Nov. 20 at Mill Creek dining room. Dr. George Rupp, president of Columbia University, will address the audience with his topic, "Not Only to Survive But to Flourish: The Quest for Community Both Globally and Locally."

Rupp received his Ph.D. in religion from Harvard University where he later became the John Lord O'Brian Professor of Divinity and Dean of the Harvard Divinity School. While at Harvard, Dr. Rupp developed new programs in women's studies and religion, Jewish-Christian relations, and religion and medicine. Later, Rupp went on to become president of Rice University where he launched a reform of the undergraduate curriculum and developed six multi-disciplinary research insti-

tutes.

Continuing in this tradition of reform, Rupp is implementing changes at Columbia University as well. He is streamlining the curriculum to shift the heavy emphasis on graduate studies back to undergraduate education. In addition to being a scholar and seasoned administrator, Rupp is an ordained Presbyterian minister and author of four books, including **Beyond Existentialism** and **Zen: Religion in a Pluralistic World and Commitment and Community**.

The HOPE: BEYOND SURVIVAL lecture series was made possible by the Harris Foundation, Chicago; Potts and Sibley Foundation, Midland; The RGK Foundation, Austin; Rockwell Fund, Inc., Houston; Trull Foundation, Palacios; the Houston Endowment, Houston; and the Texas Committee for the Humanities, a state program of the National Endowment for the Humanities, Austin.

The show barn will open at 10 a.m. All entries must be checked in by 1:30 p.m. Judging will begin at 2 p.m.

Breyer, have been the makers of fine model hoses and other animals for over 40 years. In 1950 the Breyer Molding Company created a model horse to adorn a mantelpiece clock. Two thousand clocks were made. Shortly thereafter, demand for horses alone increased as horse and toy collectors learned of the horses' remarkable authenticity.

Today, Breyer Animal Creations produce and distribute 100 different horses and models to horse enthusiasts and collectors around the world.

Each Breyer horse is a world of art and craftsmanship. The creation process begins on a customizing models and sculptor's table, where

commissioned artist carve famous horses out of clay. The sculptors painstakingly define each detail, from the animal's muscle tone and bone structure, to its proportionate size and overall shape. In many cases the artists travel to farms and ranches to view the living legend.

The final pieces of art are cast in steel. Molds are injected with a cellulose acetate (a highly durable plastic), then handpainted and airbrushed to attain their realistic appearance.

The popularity of Breyer model horses has given rise to a world of collecting and showing.

In support of this, Breyer created the magazine *Just About Horses*. This magazine is published 5 time per year presenting the adventures

of people and their horses, and how-to articles on showing model horses, customizing models and even making tack!

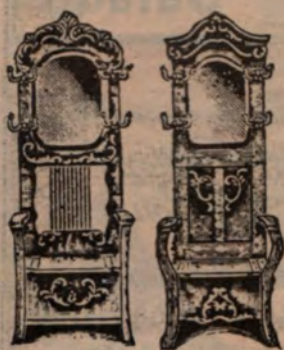
Information seekers may be led to travel to foreign countries just to find out more about their forebears, combining their search with an Elderhostel trip or just with sight-seeing.

ing itinerant vendors. Having been active in the Home furnishings International Association I've learned a great deal about itinerant vendors and I'd like to use this information in this letter and who how it applies to our community.

Many of these itinerant vendors pay no taxes - Income tax or state sales tax - because the government doesn't know they're in business. Some have state Sales tax numbers, but because they deal mainly in cash, they pay only a fraction of what they owe. They have no overhead- they pay no employees, have no utilities, no building payments or rents, they spend no money in the community - They take the money and go.

Salado is strictly run on

volunteerism. Our citizens raised the money to refurbish our Old Red School House and turned it into a much needed Civic Center for our community and visitors. Many of our concerned citizens volunteer their time and work to help preserve our designated Historical district for the enjoyment of our community and our visitors. These same volunteers organize our town events, do all the hard work, advertise these events, our Merchants Association pay for our highway billboards and the itinerant vendor receives all the benefits of our communities hard work and doesn't contribute in any way, shape, or form - They take the money ad go.

As a citizen, board member of the Chamber of Commerce, and Merchant of Salado I hope everyone will consider this information and realize what goes into making Salado the wonderful village that it is and not allow these itinerant vendors to use their property.
