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THURSDAY, MARCH 12, 2020 254/947-5321 **ZBA** denies variance request for extension of fence have only had their entrances

Salado Zoning Board of Adjustment (aldermen acting as such) turned down a request for variance from Haupstrasse Brewing Co., LLC to allow for the 12-foot extension of a fence from the side yard to the front yard of property located at 109 Royal St.

Applicants were requesting a variance from Zoning Ordinance Section 5.3.B.2 "Placement of a Screening Fence or Wall: In non-residential and multiple-family zoning districts, no fence or wall shall be erected in any front yard or side yard which is adjacent to a public street unless the fence or wall is required to screen the development from an adjacent residential area. If required to screen a residential area, the screening fence or wall shall be extended out to the street right-of-way line by the developer of the non-residential or multiple-family development."

The side yard and front yard are defined in the building code according to the placement of the main building on the property.

K.D. Hill explained to the ZBA that the building in question, which is being renovated to house Rio Salado Cocina and Cantina, sets very far back from the road, farther back than most other buildings in the area.

Hill and other representatives explained the need for the extension of the fence from the side yard to the front yard.

"We have engineered the space to hold 77 parking

on Main," she said. "Recently, they have opened entrances to the back, but what is unusual is that they have not done anything to screen some of the things back there like air conditioning units and other mechanical equipment. It is unsightly and not what I want our customers to see when they come here."

"I want them to experience the beauty of Salado and to maximize the space available," she said.

She told the ZBA that the original request was to allow for an extension of a seven foot fence, but after discussion with Morris Foster, the owner of Shady Villa at the corner of Main and Royal, "we have agreed to lower the height of the fence to less than five feet tall."

ZBA members asked questions about access to the parking lot. "You can't enter from Peddler's Alley," Jay Rich said because it is on other private property.

Frank Coachman said that if Foster came in for the fence permit, it would be able to extend all the way without seeking a variance. "Can you do that?" he asked.

After the presentation on the design and variance request, ZBA conducted a formal public hearing on the matter.

Several people spoke during the public hearing on both sides of the issue.

Shawn Miller, employed by Chupacabra Craft Beer and Lone Star Winery located in Shady Villa, spoke in opposition. "This is cutting off one business from a half dozen others," he said, rather than working in cooperation with them. He raised concerns about traffic, limited visibility in the natural allevway behind Shady Villa, limited access for delivery trucks to those businesses's back doors and the aesthetics of a large fence in the Historic District. "Once they start going up," he said, "they will start going up everywhere"

to the existing owner without the fence. "There is nothing special, unique or new about this," she said.

Strong added that approving the variance would be detrimental to adjacent businesses.

Rich told the ZBA that currently without a fence, parking is unregulated and uncontrolled. "Without a defined inlet and outlet, people could pull through a gap between a set of parked cars directly onto Royal," he said, adding that people are also walking between cars directly into the street.

Chris Lovebridge spoke in favor of the variance because it gains control of the parking area. "In light of everything they have done for this community," he said, "I know that it will be done right."

Following the public hearing, Rodney Bell gave a motion to deny the variance request. "It does not meet the requirement for undue hardship," he said. John Cole gave a second to the motion.

ZBA members discussed if there were other measures that could be taken to accomplish the same result, such as having the owner of Shady Villa make application for the permit.

Bell and Cole were joined by Michael Coggin and Skip Blancett in voting in favor of the motion to deny the variance with Coachman and Amber Preston-Dankert voting against.

Following are the criteria outline in the Zoning Ordinance concerning "undue hardship" on a property owner:

"(1) That literal enforce-

Gene Mikeska told this to the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen during a presentation on the COVID-19 coronavirus on March 5. Mikeska should know. spots," she said, explaining that the fence and other barriers are necessary to control the foot traffic from the parking area in order to make the area safer for pedestrians.

She explained that by having a narrow entrance into the parking and an exit from the parking area to a sidewalk along Royal St., it would make the congestion issues at the corner of Royal and Main safer for walkers and drivers.

The request is also driven by a decision to improve the aesthetics and experience of their customers. "For years, the businesses across the alley have fronted Main St. and

"(2) That the situation causing the hardship or difficulty is neither self-imposed nor generally affecting all or most properties in the same zoning district; and

"(3) That the relief sought will not injure the permitted use of adjacent conforming property; and

"(4) That the granting of a variance will be in harmony with the spirit and purpose of these regulations.

"Most importantly, wash your hands with warm soap and water regularly and use hand-sanitizer with a high alcohol content when soap and water are not available," he said.

• Ensure that sick leave policies are flexible and consistent with public health guidance.

• Do not require a healthcare provider's not for employees who are sick with acute respiratory illness to validate their illness or return to work.

• Maintain flexible policies that permit employees to stay home to care for a sick family member.

• Increase cleaning of frequently touched surfaces in the work place.

• Post signs to remind employees to wash hands and use good cough and sneeze etiquette.

June Ritterbusch announced that the 2020 Texas Wine & Rogue Art Fest on March 28-29 is canceled,

"Our forecast is that many folks in Texas will decide to forgo large public gatherings in the next few weeks," Ritterbusch stated in announcing the show's cancellation.

"We are grateful for your many years of support and have sincerely given this difficult decision considerable thought," she added. "Our goal every year is to produce a quality event for both attendees and vendors. Given the ever-present weather risk coupled with headwinds from progress in improving the village and the known unknowns of contemporary current events, we felt compelled to cancel."

This event has consistently drawn 3,000-5,000 people Village of Salado throughout the weekend in the previous 11 years. "We have poured as many as 29,000 tastings which is equal to about 1200 bottles," Ritterbusch said. "The economic impacts include not only the sales tax on the wine sold, but also the other businesses of Salado

including restaurants, unique shops and hotels." "We hope and pray that this moment passes quickly," she added, "and we promise that when it does we are going to throw one heck of a great party!"

Salado Wine Seller is not alone in canceling what has become a major event for a Texas community. Last week, SXSW organizers announced that they were canceling the annual South by Southwest event in Austin, 13-20.

Not every public event is being canceled due to concerns about gatherings of people and the possible spread of the coronavirus.

Barrow Brewing Co., on the heels of the SXSW cancellation late last week, announced that it was continuing with plans for the Northbound and Down music weekend March 21-22.

The Annual Wildflower Art Festival, slated for March 28-29 on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center is still slated. The event is sponsored by the Salado Chamber of Commerce. A final decision on this event is scheduled for this week.

Local churches announced changes in their services due to the flu and virus season and an abundance of

The Austin Diocese of the Catholic Church announced changes in its procedures for Communion and gatherings recently.

Most Rev. Joe Vásquez, Bishop of Austin, asked parishes including Saint Stephen Catholic Church to temporarily distribute holy Communion in the hand, rather than on the tongue. Bishop Vásquez made it clear to clergy and eucharistic ministers that no one is to be denied the Eucharist over this measure.

Bishop Vásquez also requested a temporary end to the distribution of the Precious Blood at Mass.

Those who cannot receive the Eucharistic bread due to gluten intolerance or allergy, should consult their pastor on making accommodations to

receive the Precious Blood.

While the typical reception of Communion is under both species, that is bread and wine, Catholics are reminded that Christ is fully present in the Eucharistic bread: Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity.

Standing basins of holy water, such as stoups at church doors, should also be removed. Holy water fonts that circulate and filter water can remain operable.

Pastors may ask parishioners to forgo holding hands during the Lord's Prayer and to offer the Sign of Peace without handshaking, if that is best for their parish.

"These temporary changes were made in consultation with clergy and public health officials to safeguard our parishes," Bishop Vásquez said.

> Citing the example

of Pope Francis, Bishop Vásquez also asks those who are ill to not attend Mass or religious education (Sunday school). Pope Francis, who while he had a cold, said he would not attend an annual Lenten retreat.

Saint Joseph Episcopal Church announced the following change required in church operations due to COVID-19:

1. discontinue intinction (dipping the bread or wafer in the cup)

2. refrain from dipping hands in the water font

3. avoid physical contact with others which includes the offering of peace -- bow or give a verbal exchange

4. use hand sanitizing gel

Additionally, worshippers may partake in communion without receiving the wine at all.

Bulls & bears fighting it out over recent market correction

The Markets

Reading the headlines, one could easily be forgiven for thinking that Armageddon was at hand and the stock collapse of 1929 was a mere shadow of what was happening now. The reality was far less exciting. The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose 0.61% for the week ending March 6, closing at 2,972.37. That is not to say the "correction" is over. The SPX is still down about 12.2% from its high point on February 19 but this week with its dramatic ups and downs was far less stressful than last week's 11.5% decline. The bulls and the bears fought fiercely all week with the Index climbing as high as 3,127 twice before retreating to about 2,900 then ending the week somewhere in the middle, but higher than at the end of last week. The question is not whether the coronavirus will become an epidemic in the U.S., as that is currently assumed to be a given, but whether fear of the virus will trigger a major domestic economic downturn.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury note, the benchmark for all U.S. bond rates, closed at a record low yield of 0.767%. For a point of reference, one year ago the 10-year T-note was yielding about 2.7%. As a sort of bright spot, the Federal Reserve's reduction in its overnight interbank rate by 0.50% effectively erased the inverted yield curve we saw last week. Still, the one, two, three, and five-year notes are all well below the interbank rate, indicating the bond market is forecasting a significant slowdown in economic activity over at least the next year. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) agreed with the bond market this week, closing down 5.31% at \$41.57 as world-wide demand for oil shriveled and supply built up in the U.S. WTI is now down over 32%

from the beginning of the year.

The Economy

Looking at the economic data released for the week ending on March 6, an objective observer would conclude that the U.S. economy was in good shape. Admittedly, growth was slowing with manufacturing looking stressed by the tariff wars and the consumer beginning to slow spending growth, but still on solid footing. The Labor Department released its February employment report and estimated we generated a net 273,000 jobs in February. The official unemployment rate dropped back to a half-century low of 3.5% and average wages were up 3% from this time last year. As a footnote to that report though, there were anecdotal reports from survey respondents suggesting that future hiring may be put on hold and layoffs were possible if the virus epidemic spreads to America.

Echoing that concern, the IHS Markit U.S. services index fell to 49.4 from last month's 53.4 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth and below 50 indicate shrinkage. That reading indicates that the business activities of service industries in the United States are already starting to contract. At the same time, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) also reported significant business disruptions were being reported in the service sector. The Federal Reserve executed an emergency interest rate reduction of 0.5% to a range between 1-1.25% for its overnight interbank rate. That emergency rate cut was the first one since 2008 as it became apparent the economy was in trouble during the mortgage-bond crisis. Historically, an emergency half-percent rate cut by the Fed has been reserved for serious economic threats and, to date, has been followed by a recession. The good news is that the Fed is not waiting for the bad news to officially be confirmed a month or more after the fact, but rather is getting ahead of the power curve.

With infections now being reported in 24 states, including, as of Friday 17 confirmed cases in Texas, the COVID-19 coronavirus is here. Festivals like Austin's South-by-Southwest are being cancelled. It is apparent that any service that involves people gathering is going to be hurt. Airlines are already seeing largescale cancellations. It is no longer a question of "if" we have an epidemic here in the United States but more one of how long it will last and how big will be the shortterm economic damage.

As we have written before, it is not going to be pretty, but the nature of this economic crisis is very temporary. Given the history of viral epidemics, six months from now the worst will likely be over and by the end of the year it will be history. Meanwhile, it is good to recognize that any attempt to get out of the market and get back in at the right time is very likely to be a good way to lose money. Our underlying economy is in good shape and the virus has a short time on stage before we return to normal. As it says on the cover of The Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy, in bold letters, "Don't Panic!"

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virus worries

The White House has been walking into a coronavirus trap.

By pooh-poohing worries about the virus and saying everything is under control, it is setting itself up for the charge, if things get even a little bad, that it was self-deluding and overly complacent.

Although President Trump has recently struck a better tone, he's been a chief offender, wanting to downplay the virus for fear it will continue to suppress a stock market that has experienced vertiginous drops.

This is exactly the wrong approach. The moment doesn't call for market-reassuring Trump, but threatsaren't-getting-past-ourborders Trump, not Dow 30,000 Trump, but drawbridge-and-moat Trump. Everything should be geared toward overreacting now, when the threat in the U.S. is still in prospect, instead of later, when circumstances may be beyond anyone's direct control.

That means appointing a point person for the coronavirus response with a medical background, who doesn't already have a fulltime job, like current designee Mike Pence. The right pick could provide genuine expertise in public health and the workings of government, as well as being a reliable source of public information.



It means erring on the side of further travel restrictions, even if it will be impossible to exclude infected people from the United States, given its break out from China to countries all around the world.

It means not quibbling with Congress over coronavirus funding, with even Minority Leader Kevin Mc-Carthy saying the administration's \$2.5 billion request is "a little low" (Trump has signaled a willingness to accept more).

It means making sure that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is working at maximum efficiency to make coronavirus tests widely available, which is the most worrisome shortfall in the federal response so far, and that government agencies are doing everything possible to push the development and deployment of a vaccine.

Finally, it means coordinating with localities, as warranted, on ways to slow the spread of the virus via "social distancing," or the avoidance of large gatherings and public transportation.

The coronavirus is not a

modern-day plague. Many people infected will experience only mild symptoms, and it's not as deadly as SARS or Middle East respiratory syndrome.

Yet, it is not a creation of the fake news, either. It has hobbled one of the most important counties in the world, China, and is shutting down towns in Italy. There are now more new cases outside of China than inside it. The virus has killed nearly 3,000 people. If it gets loose in the United States, there could well be a panic that in itself would be damaging to the social fabric and the economy.

Maybe none of this comes to pass, but it's better to be overly prepared and vigilant than play to catch up.

Besides, the political valence of the coronavirus crisis should be favorable to Trump's worldview. It demonstrates a downside of globalization and shows the importance of borders. It is an object lesson in our overdependence on a China that is dictatorial, dishonest and poorly governed.

The president shouldn't shrug off the threat in the hopes of talking up the stock market. If his team responds effectively, the Dow will take care of itself. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review. (c) 2020 by King Features Synd., Inc.

The event is free and open to the public.







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

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

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This deal occurred in the 1986 world team championship and features Pakistan's Zia Mahmood, whose daring and ingenuity through the years have provided bridge journalists with enough material to fill several volumes.

On this occasion, though, he experienced an unexpected lapse from which mere mortals may take heart. After conducting a typically Zia-esque auction with the West hand to reach a laydown heart slam, he failed to find the best defense against North-South's seven-diamond sacrifice. As

The bidding went as shown, with Zia lying low at his first two turns before showing his true colors. In the interim, the opponents' spade bids told him that his partner had at most one spade. When Zia eventually bid the slam, South, who had seen the Pakistani in action before, believed him and took the diamond save.

The defense seemed obvious: ace of spades, spade ruff, a heart to the king, spade ruff and the ace of diamonds for down five. This would come to 900 points (1,100 in today's scoring) only 80 less than the score for making six hearts.

To everyone's astonishment, Zia led a club, reasoning that on the bidding, his partner's ace was likely to be in clubs. In that case, the defense would go: club ace, club ruff, spade ace, spade ruff, heart king and spade ruff for down six and 1,100 points.

However, South won the first club and led a trump to the jack and ace. East then returned a club, never expecting that his partner would lead a singleton club holding only one trump. When West couldn't ruff, declarer discarded his losing heart on a third round of clubs, drew trump and then led a spade. Zia had to grab the ace or he would have lost it, so South finished down only two for a loss of 300 points.

Perhaps there is hope for the rest of us after all.
