Salado Boys golf team places 2nd at Regional meet to qualify for Austin

The Salado boys golf team advanced to the state tournament by finishing in second place at the region 4 golf tournament in San Marcos. With a disappointing first round of 364 the team shot a second round score of 340 to move from fifth place to second.

Danny Light lead the Eagles with scores of 82, 78 which also earned him first place medalists of the region.

Mark Thompson shot 89,88; Monte Sands suffering from a stomach virus shot 103 but returned healthier Tuesday to post an 83, Cortney Renfro shot 96 Monday and lowered it

to 91, Zach Sands shooting 97 helped keep the Eagles in contention and shot 103 on Tuesday.

The team will compete in Austin on May 13-14 at the State Tournament.

The Salado Girls gold team also competed at the Regional Golf Tournament at San Marcos and finished in fourth place. Kelli Hood finished in ninth place for medalist honors shooting 91 and 104.

Marie Grigsby, Bertha Berumen and Michelle Martinez also did an excellent job. The girls were all freshmen and competed against 15 other teams with five players on each team.

Passing the Torch?

GI Generation may not be ready to call it quits in society

A national news magazine recently illustrated the G.I. Generation's passing of the torch to younger political leaders with a cover photo of a World War II soldier and the superimposed headline, So Long, Joe. The 40 million Americans who are 60 or older (including 2.4 million Texans) could be forgiven for wondering where, exactly, they're supposed to be going.

The vital - and continuing - role these seniors play in society is the theme of Older Americans Month, which will be celebrated throughout May. For even if none of their generation again occupy the Oval Office, older Americans still have years of contributions to offer as volunteers, employees, teachers, scholars, friends, advisors and role models.

Texas Department on Aging Executive Director Mary Sapp, whose agency relies heavily on older vol-

unteers to deliver its services noted, "Our agency would be, if not out of business altogether, severely hamstrung without the contributions of senior volunteers. They deliver meals, drive vans, help operate senior centers, staff hot lines and provide many other essential services our funding couldn't support at anywhere near their current levels."

Sapp also pointed to the assistance seniors give to younger people through the Foster Grandparents, and to society at large through the Retired Senior Volunteer Program.

Texas traditionally celebrates Older Texans Month concurrently with Older Americans Month. Many communities commemorate the two observations with such events as:

- Fairs and cultural festivals;
- Senior "Olympics" and other sports tournaments;

- Weekend-long or one-day volunteer home fix up campaigns for low-income or disabled seniors;

- Open houses and parties at nursing homes, senior centers and retirement centers;

- Special award ceremonies for outstanding seniors;

- Programs by churches and clubs honoring their older members; and

- Special programs at schools encouraging contact between students and older persons.

Most of these events are aimed as much at pointing out seniors' ongoing contributions to society as their needs for service. However, because the risk of illness, poverty and isolation does increase with age, Older Americans and Older Texans Month can also be a time to reaffirm society's obligations to older citizens.

Other candidates include these: Dewayne Jackson, 154 votes; Floyd Lee, 98 votes; and Romaine Schatte, 75 votes.

The new members will be inducted into office later this month.

Bob Roberts is a political **Spinal Tap**: irreverent, biting and sometimes just plain stupid. Tim Robbins, of the Hollywood Left, stars as Bob Roberts, a right-wing folk singer, who bashes the welfare system, war protesters, homeless, gays, non-Whites and, of course, the "Liberal Media," with the same vociferous style of Rush Limbaugh.

Only Roberts plays guitar and is running for a Senate seat in Pennsylvania against a liberal incumbent (Gore Vidal). Shot in the style of a "documentary," Bob Roberts is reminiscent of Spinal Tap and the humorous political series HBO ran in 1988.

But, Bob Roberts views conservatism and the conservative movement as you might expect from Tim Robbins and his gal Susan Sarandon (who seem to always wear ribbons to remind of some cause or other none of us care about). Suffice it to say that conservatism is ridiculed beyond belief.

However, it has some really neat songs, like the Wall Street Rap. But cute lyrics cannot save Bob Roberts from just Blowing in the Wind.

Examining the May election

Reasons abound for the failure on May 1, to pass three constitutional amendments that would have lifted the pending court mandated freeze of school funds to the thousand-plus districts in Texas. Sunday's newspapers were filled with cause and effect items including the favorite-"handing the legislature a blank check". This refers to the fact that lawmakers failed to pass implementing laws at the time they approved the amendments prior to sending them to the voters. Many feared the legislature - based on their past record - would vote in massive tax increases as well as shifting dollars from property rich to poor schools once approval had been gained.

Others were still smarting from Governor Ann Richards' remark that in order to pass the amendments there was a need to "keep it simple" and not worry about implementing legislation. Reference, many thought, to the Guvs feeling that voters were not too bright when it came to understanding the ins-and-outs of government.

There is one other factor that had not been toyed with, during the debate on how to equalize funding for

the school children of the state, that could have played a part in the defeat and that is the dramatic shift during the past 40 years away from the basic idea that public education is a state function and as such the state should pay the lion's share of the cost. In the early 50's the state put in a whopping 80 percent of the cost of what was termed a "minimum foundation program". Local districts ponied up the remaining 20 percent plus 100 percent of the cost of facility construction. As state funds from oil and gas diminished and the cost of education soared, the ratio shifted, until today, where it stands at 50-50 with local property taxpayers putting up, on average, half the dollars to run the schools plus all of the construction costs.

With this heavy emphasis on the property tax as fewer and fewer state and federal dollars became available, it is small wonder that voters would turn down amendments that appeared as sort of a "pig-

in-a-poke" tax hike.

Some now say consolidation may be forced in order to equalize funds so that each child receives the same dollar amount for his or her education. This idea - consolidation - may be good in order to close down the very small and inefficient systems but the savings would be minimal at best. This was, and remains, a scare tactic much like the old chestnut - income tax which has been bandied about as the true answer to more state funding.

This observer even heard some say they think the courts might come up with a better idea anyway, given the track record of the Texas legislature and executive department over the past several years in the field of education.

There is one thing we can probably say for certain about all this - voters are not too keen on taking money from rich districts and passing it around to the poorer segments of society. That dog just won't hunt anymore as our Guv likes to tell us in her inimitable down-home speaking style.

There is still plenty of time for the House and Sen-

First Hand: How to deal with conflict

Whenever and wherever people work together, you can expect conflict. Some conflict is beneficial, such as forms of competition, which leads to a more cohesive group, positive change, or an increase in productivity. Other forms of conflict can be extremely detrimental, resulting in resentment, griping, bitterness, and a general decrease in productivity and enthusiasm at the work site.

Sources of work-related conflict include:

Ineffective communication - the number one source of conflict. Whether at home or at the work site, people never seem to communicate enough.

Interest clash - workers differ in what they value, their objectives, and their perceptions.

Competition for limited resources - competing for limited resources leads to win-lose situations.

Unclear role expectations - workers who do not know or accept their role in the workplace cases discord among their peers.

Aggressive personalities - some workers seem to overreact to everything and tend to be uncooperative, inflexible, and non-supportive.

It is impossible to eliminate all conflict at the work site, but there are strategies for preventing conflict or resolving conflict in a positive manner.

1. Don't let sources of discontent fester and become more substantial. Deal with conflict at the lowest possible level. The key to solving conflict is often communication.

2. Deal with conflict in a rational manner. Look at the situation and facts apart from personalities. When egos and self-esteem enter into a conflict, it is difficult for the parties to seek compromise or a fair settlement.

3. Express concerns with others privately. Be frank and honest and ask the other party how they feel. Try to come to an agreement on how you can resolve the conflict in a mutually satisfying manner.

4. If you cannot come to an agreement, suggest in a non-threatening, sincere manner that a supervisor or third party mediate the differences.

Altrusa Horse Show set May 15 at Expo

The 11th Annual Altrusa Benefit Open Horse Show, hosted by Altrusa International, Inc. of Temple, will be held May 15, in the Bell County Expo Center in Belton. Registration begins at 7 a.m. and show time starts at 8 a.m.

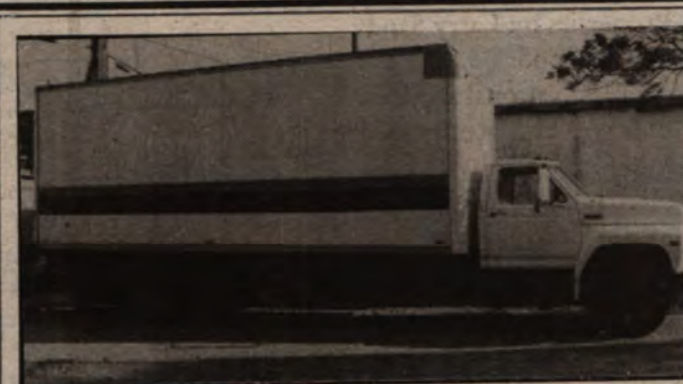

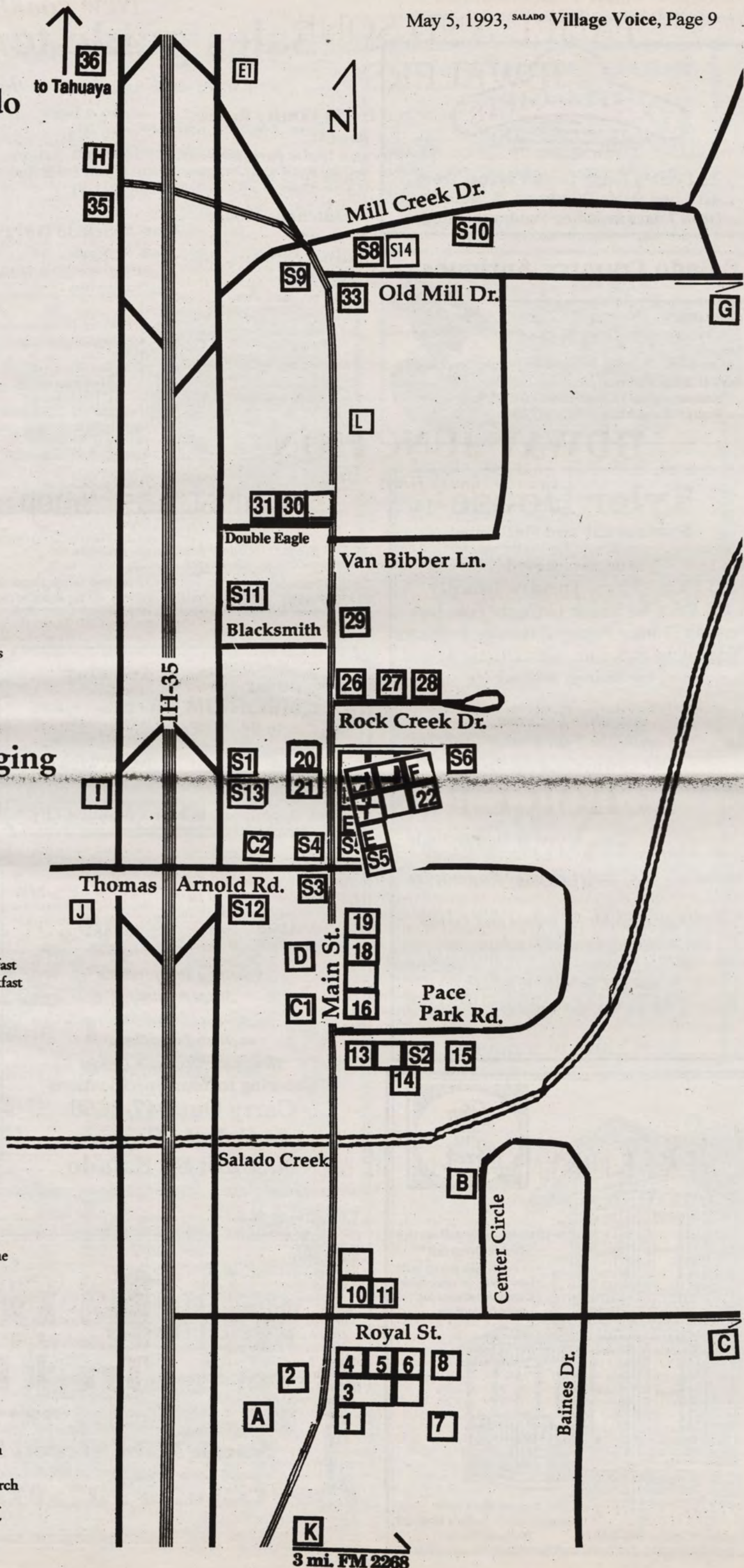

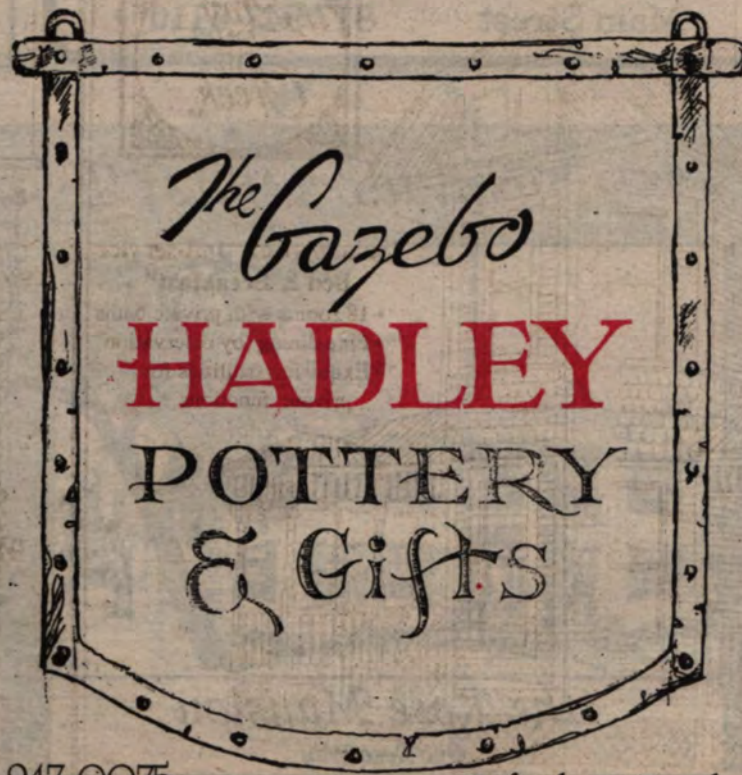

Every year over 500,000 Americans are diagnosed with some form of skin cancer, making it the most prevalent of cancers. There are actually three different types of skin cancer, but most people are familiar with the deadly melanoma.

Melanoma is the most virulent of all skin cancers. It begins in melanocytes, the skin cells that produce the dark protective pigment called melanin. Melanoma cells produce the same type of melanin that usually protects the skin from the sun. These melano-

cytes will cause malignant melanoma to appear black, brown, red, or blue, and it may spread rapidly. A malignant lesion will exhibit one or more of the following characteristics:

- 1 - asymmetry - one side does not match the other, not round.
- 2 - border - irregular or jagged edges.
- 3 - color - pigmentation is not uniform, color is darker in some areas.
- 4 - diameter - size is greater than six millimeters, or about

the size of a pencil eraser.

The best weapon against skin cancer is prevention. By using sunblock when in the sun and staying out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. when it's rays are strongest, one can significantly reduce sun damage. If a lesion does develop, medical attention should be sought as soon as possible. Skin cancer is very treatable in the early stages.

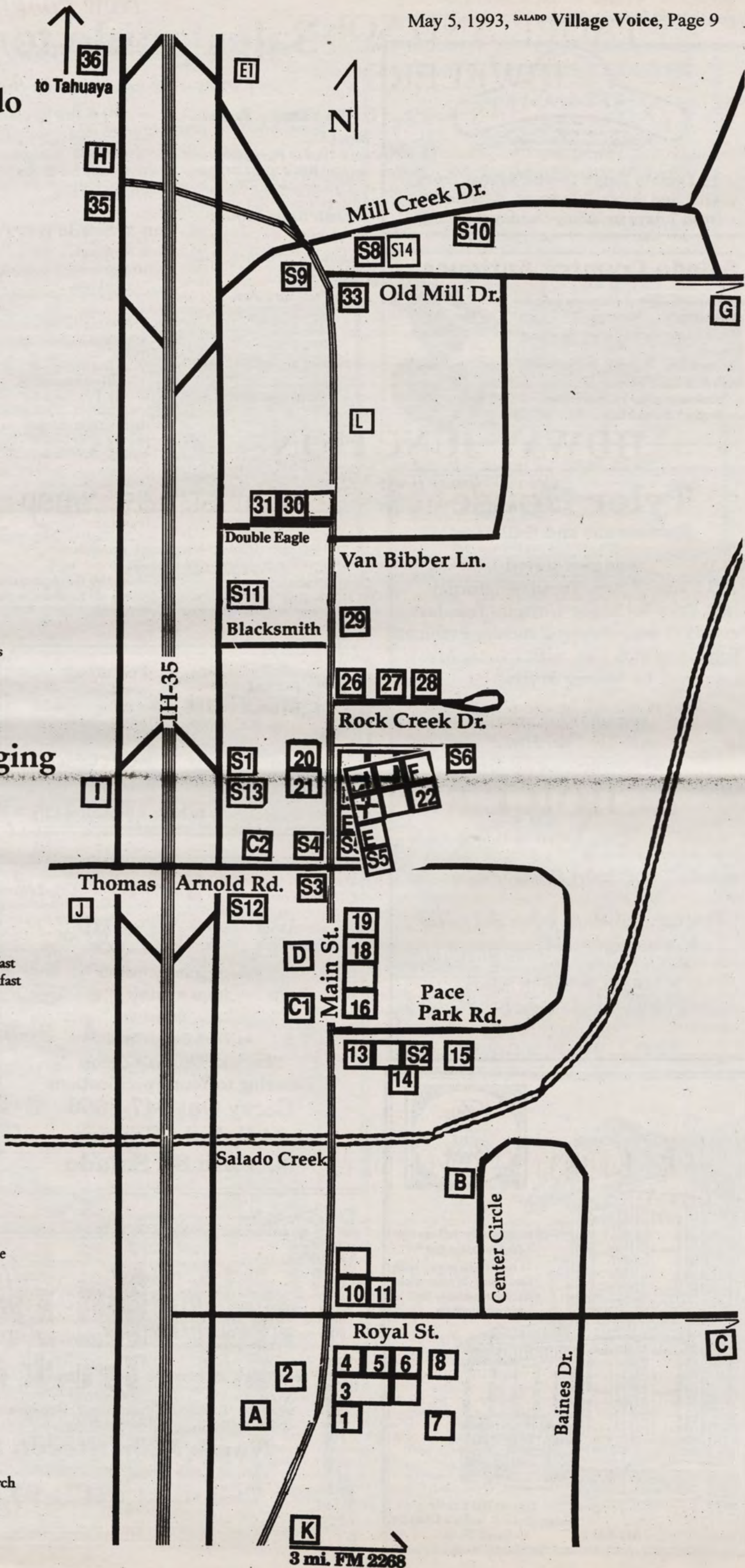

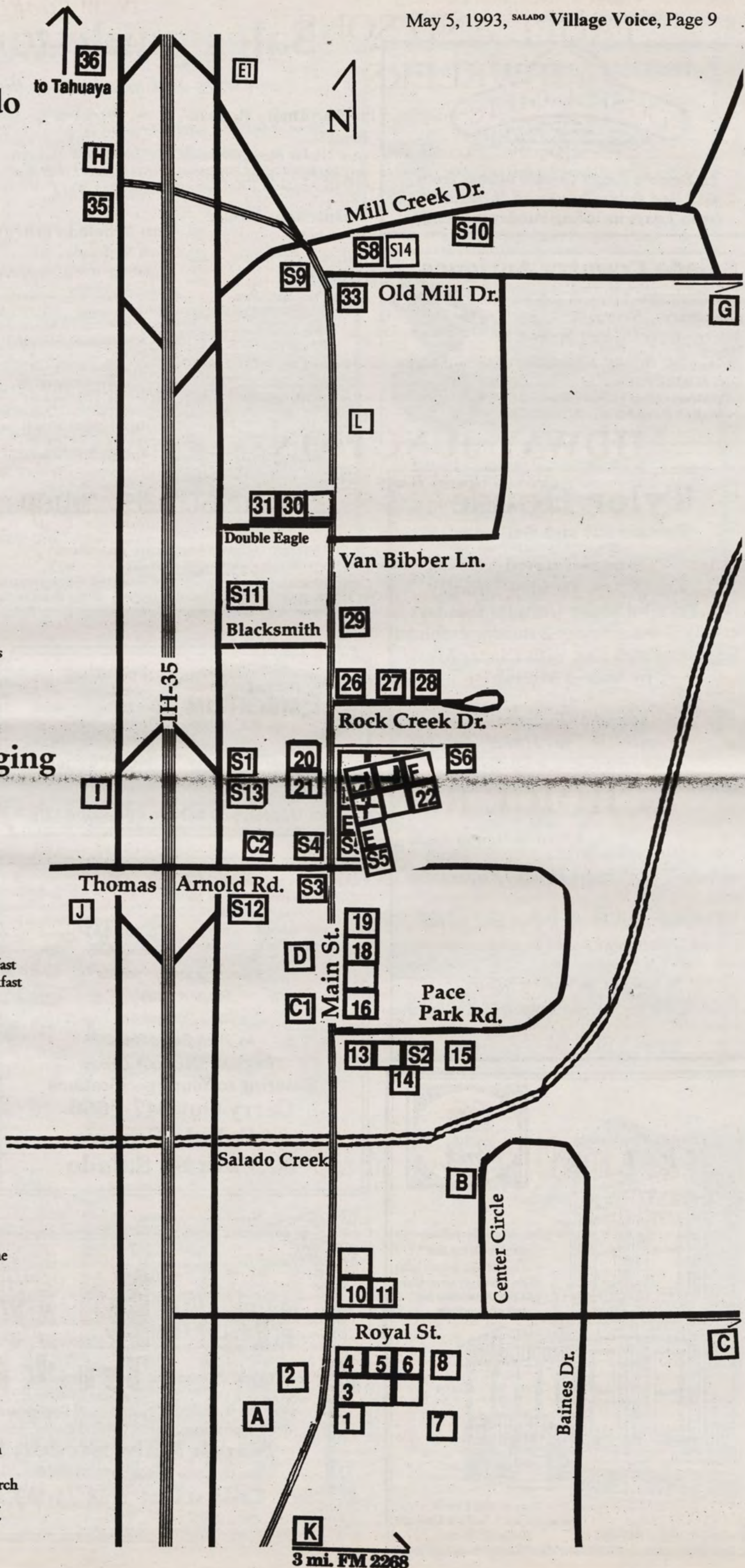

Every year over 500,000 Americans are diagnosed with some form of skin cancer, making it the most prevalent of cancers. There are actually three different types of skin cancer, but most people are familiar with the deadly melanoma.

Melanoma is the most virulent of all skin cancers. It begins in melanocytes, the skin cells that produce the dark protective pigment called melanin. Melanoma cells produce the same type of melanin that usually protects the skin from the sun. These melano-

cytes will cause malignant melanoma to appear black, brown, red, or blue, and it may spread rapidly. A malignant lesion will exhibit one or more of the following characteristics:

1 - asymmetry - one side does not match the other, not round.

2 - border - irregular or jagged edges.

3 - color - pigmentation is not uniform, color is darker in some areas.

4 - diameter - size is greater than six millimeters, or about

the size of a pencil eraser.

The best weapon against skin cancer is prevention. By using sunblock when in the sun and staying out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. when it's rays are strongest, one can significantly reduce sun damage. If a lesion does develop, medical attention should be sought as soon as possible. Skin cancer is very treatable in the early stages.

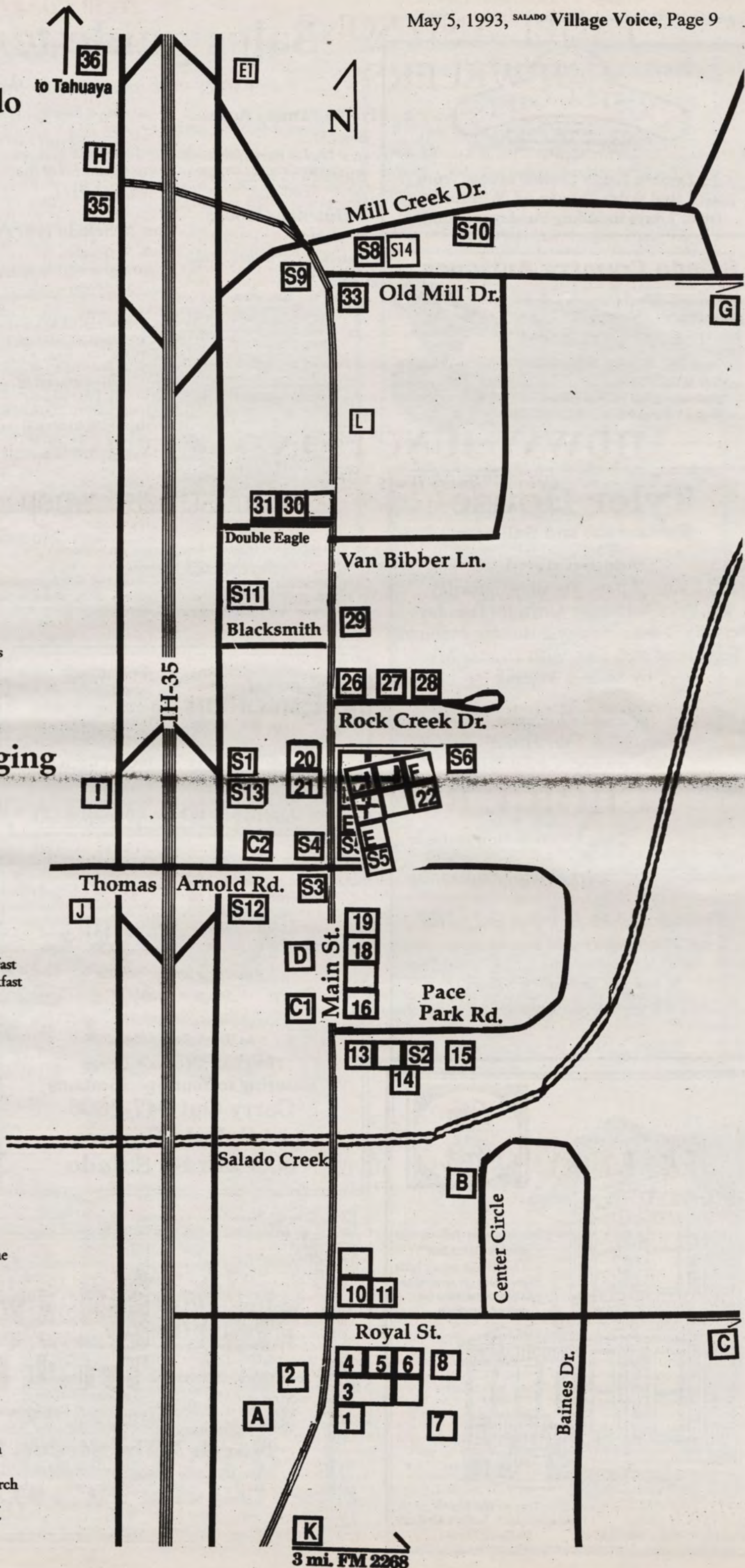

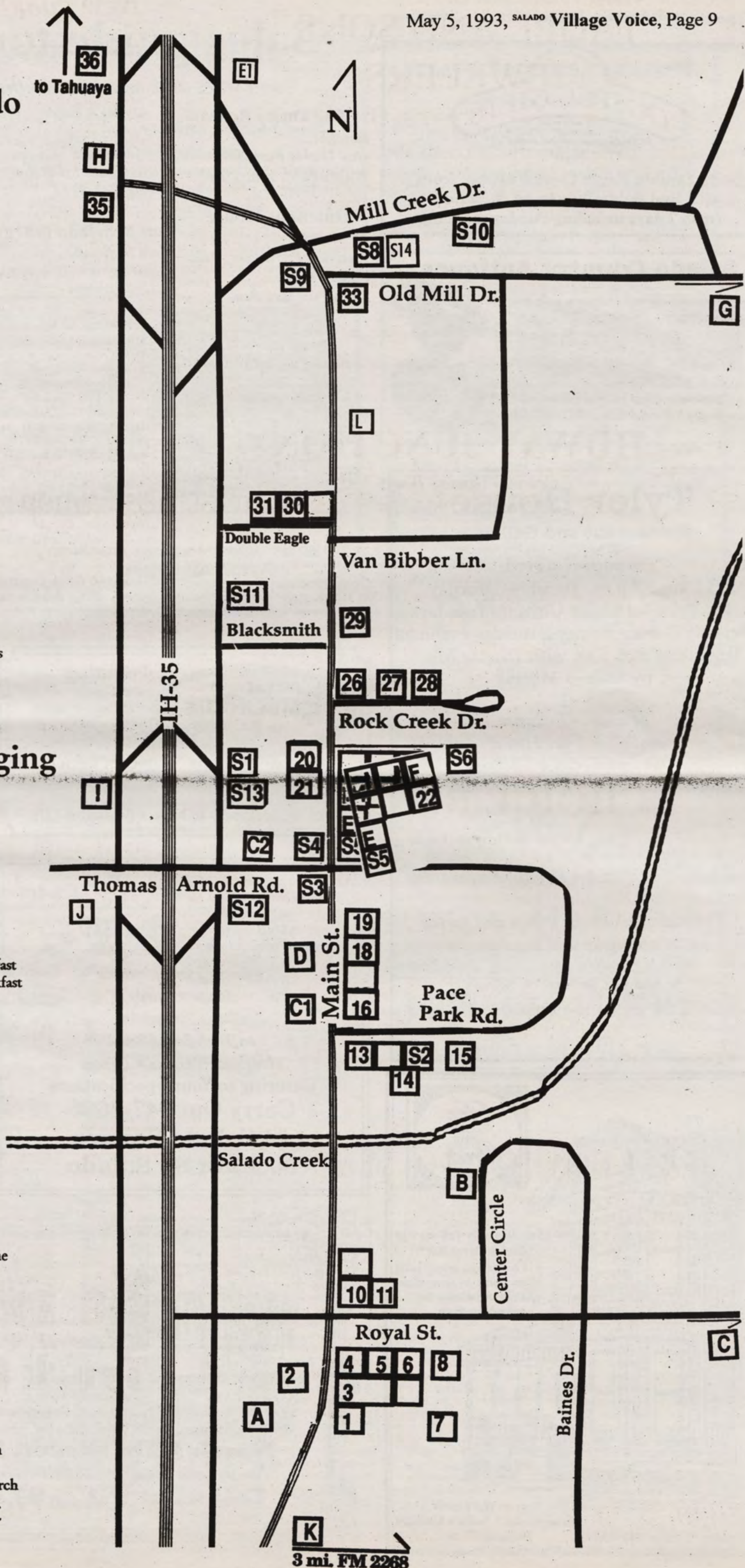

Skin cancer strikes 500,000 each year

Every year over 500,000 Americans are diagnosed with some form of skin cancer, making it the most prevalent of cancers. There are actually three different types of skin cancer, but most people are familiar with the deadly melanoma.

Melanoma is the most virulent of all skin cancers. It begins in melanocytes, the skin cells that produce the dark protective pigment called melanin. Melanoma cells produce the same type of melanin that usually protects the skin from the sun. These melano-

cytes will cause malignant melanoma to appear black, brown, red, or blue, and it may spread rapidly. A malignant lesion will exhibit one or more of the following characteristics:

1 - asymmetry - one side does not match the other, not round.

2 - border - irregular or jagged edges.

3 - color - pigmentation is not uniform, color is darker in some areas.

4 - diameter - size is greater than six millimeters, or about

the size of a pencil eraser.

The best weapon against skin cancer is prevention. By using sunblock when in the sun and staying out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. when it's rays are strongest, one can significantly reduce sun damage. If a lesion does develop, medical attention should be sought as soon as possible. Skin cancer is very treatable in the early stages.

You've already had 4 months withheld at the old rate and if you don't take action soon, you'll find yourself in the same situation next year as this year...You'll owe money on you tax return because of insufficient withholding.

The President's Executive Order on January 28, 1992, decreased the amount of tax being withheld from your paycheck, but it didn't decrease your taxes, so some of you came up with a smaller than usual refund or worse yet, you owed additional tax.

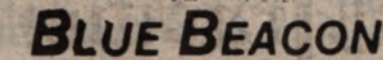
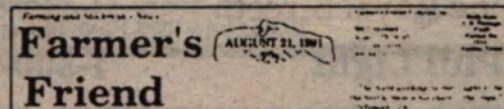

To help reduce your risk, it's a good idea to diversify your stock choices among several different industry groups. This way, a period of weak performance by one stock won't drag down the return on the entire portfolio.

Of course, the timing of interest or dividend payments should never be your primary concern when choosing investments, but creating a portfolio that provides monthly income can be a convenient way to help you meet your monthly living expenses.

Is walking effective?

Yes, walking is a safe and effective type of aerobic exercise. Aerobic means with oxygen.

Exercising aerobically conditions your lungs to use oxygen more efficiently. Regular aerobic exercise will strengthen and condition your heart and major muscle groups.

If you are trying to lose weight, you may have found diets don't work. Choosing to make a lifestyle change eating low fat and walking may work. Brisk walking will burn about 100 calories for each mile and it is less likely to cause any injury of your muscles, bones or joints than jogging.

Did you have a bad day? Get away from it all with a brisk walk. Walking is a great "stress management tool" (and it is cheap). You'll return from your walk feeling like your day wasn't as bad as it was when you first started the walk.

How much does it cost to start a walking program? Well, you probably have clothes you can wear such as sweatsuits or

shorts, you may want to dress in layers, depending on the weather. A bottle of water is useful to replace the water you lose. You definitely need a good pair of walking shoes to protect your feet and legs. Choose shoes with leather or nylon "uppers" to let your feet breathe, padded soles and arch support to provide shock absorption.

Remember these basic guidelines:

1. If you haven't been physically active, check with your health care provider before beginning any exercise program.

2. Learn to take your heart rate to see if your rate is in the target heart rate zone.

3. Stretch before you walk. This warms your muscles and protects them from injury.

4. Start your walk slowly to stretch and warm muscles further, then speed up to your target heart rate for about 20 minutes.

5. Slow you pace for the last 5 minutes of the walk to cool down gradually before the end of the walk. Stretch after the walk to gain flexibility and cool down.

ate and the Governor to come up with an acceptable plan that will pass muster with the courts despite the ticking of the June 1, deadline clock. There is still the special session route that could be taken if all else fails during the current term. Shutting down the flow of money on June 1, is no big deal if the spigot is reopened at the end of a 30 day special session. The pressure to produce in the short term might even cause some positive and creative thinking on the part of our lawmakers - something missing for the past several years on the education front.

Senate Race

Texas Republicans were chortling with glee when the final results of the 24 field race for Lloyd Bentsen's post in the federal senate were announced. GOP Kay Hutchison came in first by 497 votes over incumbent Senator Bob Krueger, a democrat appointed by Governor Richards a scant four months ago. With these two in the June 5, runoff we will see some

heavy buck spending and mighty shots given and taken by both sides. Plenty at stake in this race even above the prestige of both parties and the spectre of having GOPer Phil Gramm joined by yet another right winger thus effectively shutting the Texas door to the White House for the time being. This is, of course, a strong possibility due in the main to the conservative proclivity for voting in runoff elections in larger numbers than their Demo counterparts.

Krueger will have his hands full since he will be fighting his own meager congressional record as well as a lack of charisma that voters tend to equate with good sense. Add to all this the fact that the battle will be joined against a woman and the problems intensify since rough and tumble campaigning is not considered "de rigeur" between men and women seeking office.

Senate races have traditionally been akin to street brawls but in this type battle normally only the lady can be tough and nasty.

Democrats are not as unified these days but fear of having two Republicans in the Senate may bring out the rank and file in sufficient numbers to overcome the hard charging State Treasurer Hutchison. Both

sides will have plenty of money to spend so get ready for more inane TV spots along with all sorts of charges and counter-charges that will make TV shows like Rosanne and

Arsenio appear acceptable and tame by comparison.

More on all this as the days dwindle down to a precious few as the old September Song recalls.

this obligation more fully by retooling its service delivery system to put more emphasis on providing information and resources directly to seniors at the local level. It is using combinations of federal, state and local funding, grants and client contributions to add new services aimed at helping frail or low-income seniors maintain their health and independence. A few of these newer services, programs and initiatives are:

Public/private coalitions, heavily supported by volunteers, which operate independently of governmental control in determining the types of services needed locally and meeting them in the most direct, efficient manner;

Case management programs, which help seniors with temporary disabilities avoid institutionalization by setting up customized packages of services that will allow them to recover in their own homes;

Benefits counseling, which helps seniors understand their legal rights regarding government benefits, and which helps them complete the steps required to obtain those benefits; and

Advocacy, the federally-mandated duty of the agency to determine the needs of older Texans and to present them as forcefully and effectively as possible to elected officials and public policy makers.

"All of us who were raised by people of the De-

pression era know how fond they are of saying, 'I don't want any handouts,'" said Sapp. "Well, that's not what our agency is offering. What we are offering to older Texans are the resources they may need to maintain the quality of life they worked so hard to build for themselves, and for us.
