## Salado Art Fair time!

Salado will transform Pace Park into an art haven to celebrate its 27th Annual Art Fair Aug. 7-8. Admission is \$3 for adults, free to children 12 and under. Pace Park will open for the Art Fair 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 7 and 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 8.

The Salado Chamber of Commerce sponsors this Art Fair, which draws over 10,000 visitors to this quiet village in August each year. For your convenience a free bus will take you from free parking areas at Salado Plaza to the Art Fair grounds. Handicapped parking will be available on the Pace Park fairgrounds and a hospitality tent will be available for

eating and relaxing. Fifteen Salado organization will supply a variety of reasonably priced foods and drinks.

This year's 190 master artists and craftsmen, chosen from over 900 juried applicants, offer their quality paintings, jewelry, wood crafts, handmade clothing, toys and more.

Proceeds from the Art Fair will help fund restoration of the Salado Old Red Brick Shoolhouse on Main St., provide upkeep for Pace Park, pay for street lights and support various community projects and scholarships. Official hosts will be the Salado Village Artists and the Salado Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary.

## Texas Water Commission to speak at town meeting

Results of a Texas Water Commission survey of public drinking water wells in Bell County will be discussed at a public meeting in Salado.

The meeting will be 1-3 p.m. Aug. 6 at the Thomas Arnold Elementary School cafeteria. TWC staff will brief the public and local officials on the findings and recommended strategies for ground water protection. Input from the public is welcome.

The TWC's Edwards Aquifer Ground-Water Protection Program was launched in 1991 and covered water supply wells in 7 counties, including Bell. In Bell County, the Edwards Aquifer supplies drinking water to hundreds of residents through two public water supply companies accounting for seven public water supply wells. The program called for local volunteers and TWC staff to map potential sources of ground-water pollution within one-quarter mile of each well.

Present and former gasoline stations, dumps, abandoned water wells, septic

tanks, railroads and highways are among the potential contaminations sources that were mapped. Most of these sources will not cause water contamination, but remain potential sources in the event of accident or leakage.

The data was compiled and interpreted, and a report containing potential contaminant source data, location maps, a discussion of the local geology, best management practices and contingency plans was produced for each public water supply company. The reports for Bell County are on file at local public water supply companies and at the Salado Public Library, prior to the public meeting.

The Edwards has been designated as a sole-source aquifer. It is the only source of drinking water in Central Texas to over 1 million people. Implementation of a comprehensive regional aquifer protection program by local governments will ensure maintenance of the aquifer's ground-water

## Shot clinic Aug. 11 at school

The Salado Independent School District in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health will sponsor a free shot clinic at Salado Elementary School 1-6 p.m. Aug. 11.

Measles, the most contagious of all childhood diseases, has re-emerged itself at an alarming rate here in Texas. The 3,300 cases diagnosed in 1989, and another 4,000 cases in 1990 were among the highest in the nation. Half the

cases were in children under the age of five. Preliminary data for 1992 indicates Texas had more than half of the measles cases in the nation. Complications from measles can lead to blindness and even death.

With at least one childhood disease on the rise, a new state law will try to ensure that all Texas children, especially pre-school age children receive the immunizations they so desperately need.

A new "no - excuses"

law, effective Sept. 1, will require all hospitals and physicians to immunize individuals under age 18, who are not current on vaccinations, unless there are religious objections.

Texas law requires that all children under eighteen must have a parent or guardian present to be vaccinated at the free shot clinic.

## The Goods on greedy GOpPer Gramm

Leave it to Michael Douglas to take on the role of D-FENS in **Falling Down**, the controversial movie from Warner Brothers available on videocassette August 11. Douglas had guts for taking on the roll of D-FENS, but he would have been better served having some CMN-SENS. When D-FENS asks at the end of the movie, "I'm the bad guy here?" most viewers concur: definitely, you're the bad guy.

If you like Pat Buchanan, you'll love D-FENS, a WASP-ish defense worker laid-off from his job, dejected by society and just plain tired-of-it-all. On his journey through Los Angeles, D-FENS runs into (and over) LA gang members, a Korean clerk who refuses to make change without buying something from his store, obnoxious golfers who hit balls at him and many other urban annoyances.

Be forewarned, that what begins as a somewhat humorous situation we all can relate to quickly becomes an ugly, mean and thoroughly disheartening political statement.

Moviemakers should concentrate more on making good movies, than making political statements. Evidently, when Hollywood tries to do both, it fails miserably, as it did in **Falling Down**.

Christmas trees may be ordered for delivery November 19-20, the weekend before Thanksgiving, Pilgrim said.

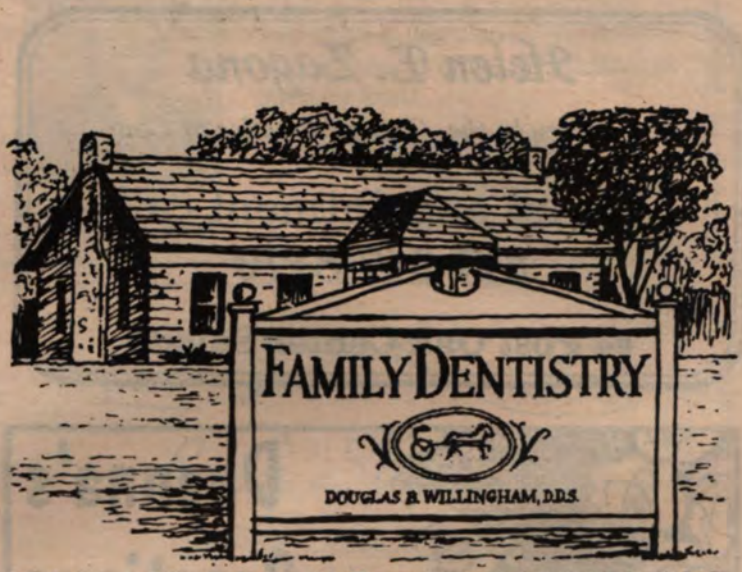
"These trees will be fresh cut northern long needle pines, which are known to be a long-lived tree. They will be treated," Pilgrim said.

Dear Editor:

The renovation of the Old Red School is making satisfactory progress toward a forecasted completion date in October 1993. The architects early estimate of a late August completion date was overly optimistic principally because of the residential building boom presently being experienced in Bell County. All sub-contractors, including those under contract for the project are running later on most of their commitments.

Fortunately for our community and those interested in the Old Red School renovation the planners of the project had the foresight to obtain contracts for all of the major parts of the renovation as to have locked in costs for practically the entire project.

To date costs are well within the planned budget estimate made last year which is a considerable accomplishment when one considers the recent escalations of practically everything in the construction industry.

The project planners have held meetings with the architect and supervisory construction management and have advised them that an earlier completion date is desirable, but, costs and budget restraints are essential as funding does not allow for cost overruns paying overtime to sub contractors.

It is important to remember that the actual starting date of the demolition phase began in late Dec. 1992 so a completion date

of October 1993 or 10 months is a major accomplishment for a project of this magnitude.

Rumors always abound on community projects when there does not appear to be a lot of observable daily activity, but the renovation is being extremely well managed by Suzi Epps, the Chambers appointed volunteer project manager, the Old Salado School Foundation is confident the Village will be well pleased with the finished results.

Mr. Shepperd went to work with the State Highway Department. He was a painter and paper hanger for many years. He joined the Salado Methodist Church at an early age, taught a Sunday School class and led the singing for many years.

Mr. Shepperd married Lois Watson on September 2, 1931 in Salado. They had

five children. Roy and Lois ran a grocery store in Salado for 25 years. He was secretary of the Salado cemetery for many years. In 1970 he won the race as Bell County Treasurer. In 1973, he was named the most outstanding Treasurer of Texas. He also served as president of the Belton Rotary Club, member of Salado and Belton Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Salado Library and Salado Historical Society. He retired after 12 years being treasurer of Bell County.

He was preceded in death by one son, his parents, two brothers and three sisters.

Survivors include his wife Lois Shepperd of Salado, three sons, Lee Roy Shepperd of Lampasas, Harold W. Shepperd of Belton, Clyde Martin (Cotton) Shepperd of Austin, one daughter Nancy Shepperd Brotherton of West Virginia.

## Tyler House to feature Texas Traditions

The Tyler House Galleries now features Texas Traditions culinary items, according to owner Blanche Kevlin.

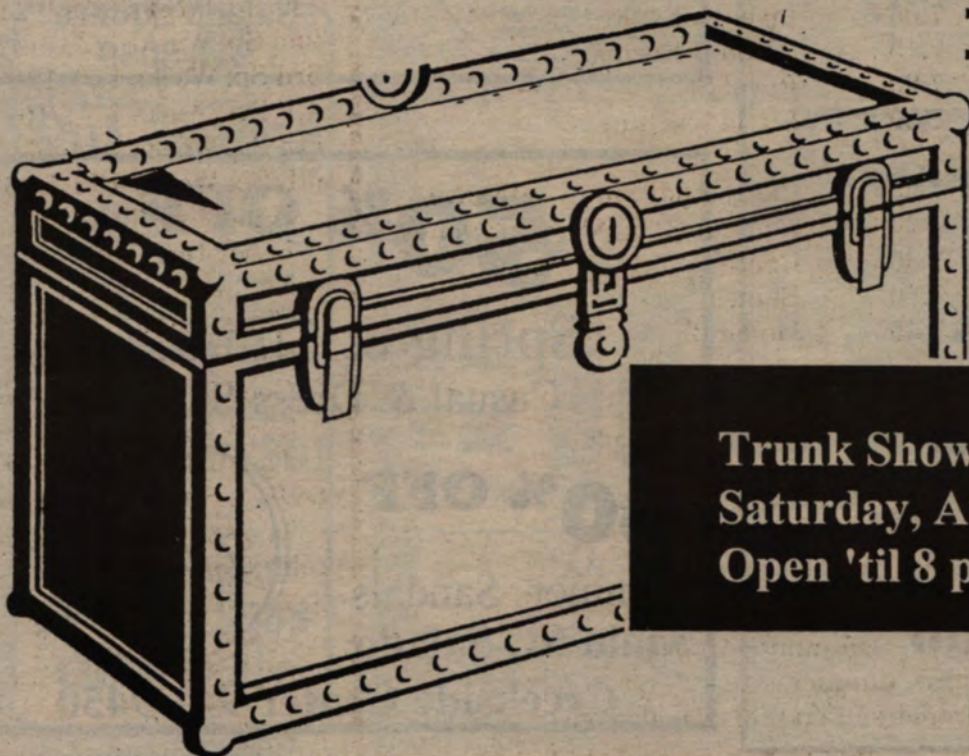

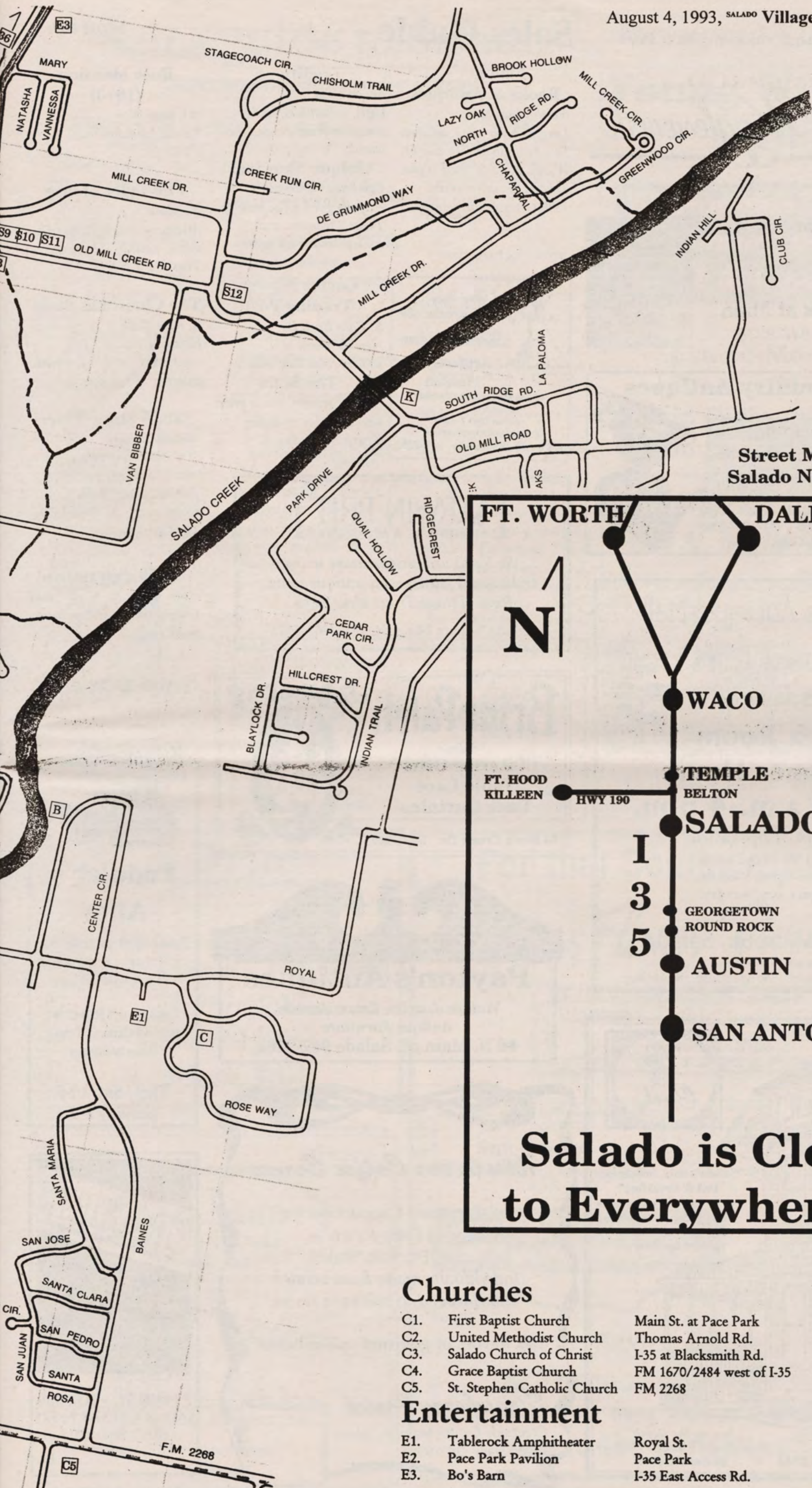

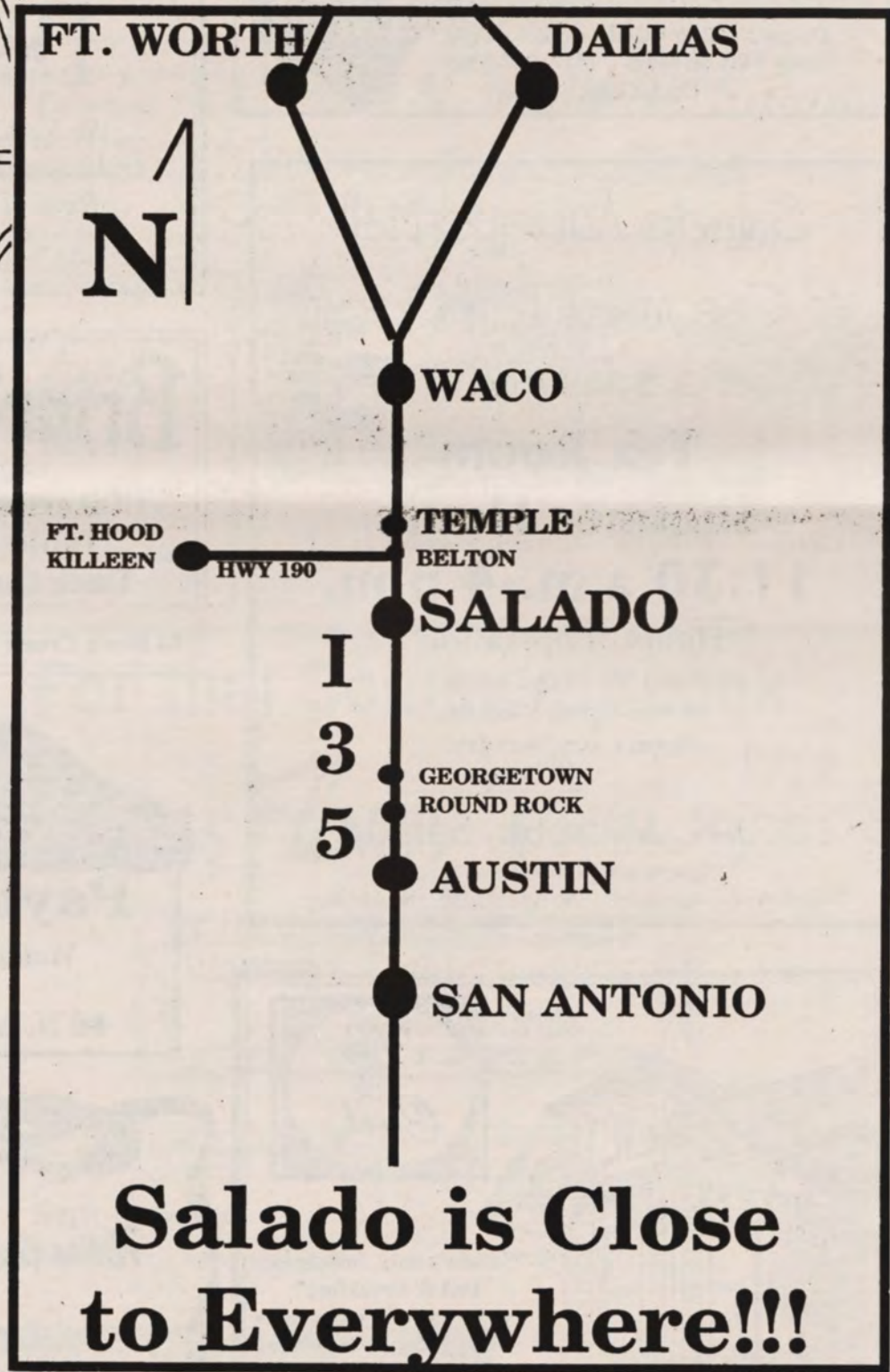

# Liz Carpenter *still Getting Better All the Time*

Liz Carpenter celebrates her 73rd birthday Sept. 1, an age when many of her contemporaries have retired to quieter lives. But Liz Carpenter just keeps rolling along.

It's been nearly 25 years since the end of her most visible job as press secretary to Lady Bird Johnson and two decades since the loss of her husband, but the dynamic Liz Carpenter has creatively and busily waged war against retirement, aging, loneliness and boredom.

This year, she has succeeded in getting both of her books republished. Her 1969 best-seller **Ruffles and Flourishes**, a humorous account of her years in the Johnson White House, came out in a new trade paperback this spring. Now her 1987 **Getting Better All the Time**, which told the world how she uses humor, activism and fun to cope with the Social Security years, is also available in its first quality paperback edition.

A popular speaker with

a crowded calendar of engagements nationwide, Carpenter is once again juggling career and motherhood. She is now raising the three teenage children of her late brother, an experience she will chronicle in a book to be published by Random House. She's thinking of calling it "Unplanned Parenthood."

Between PTA meetings and homework sessions last fall, Liz planned and organized a monumental celebration for Lady Bird Johnson's 80th birthday, which brought coverage from CNN to newspaper across Texas.

This spring, with the new edition of **Ruffles and Flourishes** off the press and a new First Spouse in the White House, Liz took calls from the media and chaired a panel discussion during the bicentennial commemoration of Sam Houston's birth.

She invited Hillary Rodham Clinton to present the annual Liz Sutherland Carpenter Distinguished Visiting Lectureship in the

Humanities and Sciences at the University of Texas, and that event in April drew a record crowd and a panel that included Carpenter friends Ann Richards, Bill Moyers and Sarah Weddington.

In her second book, **Getting Better All the Time**, Liz explained her philosophy for putting the past in its place -- a useful place. She recalls in the opening pages a Kennedy aide who

was never able to recover emotionally after the assassination. His career and life were effectively terminated and truncated, and Liz didn't want that to happen to her. So having lost her beloved White House job and then her husband, Liz finally left Washington and took her memories home to Texas to start a second life.

Liz reports that, "even after **Getting Better All**

**the Time** was out of print, I kept getting calls to speak about it, and people clamored for copies of the book afterward."

**Getting Better All the Time** did indeed warm the hearts of thousands of older readers--and younger ones eager to help friends and relatives get a jump-start back into life.

With her trademark humor touched by pathos, Liz

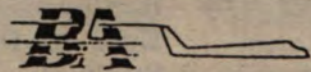

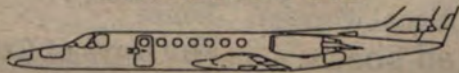

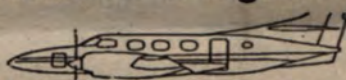

## Alert! Be aware of effects of Oak Wilt Disease

Note: Because trees are important indirectly to the protection of Salado Creek, we are taking this means to bring an important message to Saladoans about oak wilt, a threat to some of the most magnificent trees of our area.

Oak wilt causes a loss of enormous numbers of oak trees in Central Texas. As our village grows, oaks are pruned and trimmed to make room for houses and

the chance of devastation greatly increases.

Avoid pruning if possible February 1- June. November through January is much better.

Learn to handle oak firewood properly. Try to burn all firewood before spring. Never store fresh-cut infected wood near healthy trees.

Early detection is essential for successful control of oak wilt. Signs are defoliation; yellow leaves; brown leaf tips and margins; and the most reliable sign brown leaf veins.

Report oak trees that have signs to the Texas Forest service at 512-556-8575 or 512-263-9756.

Treat wounds caused by pruning immediately. Use a specifically designed wound paint, sold in garden supply and hardware stores. Ordinary paint is not as good. Sanitize saws and other pruning tools before pruning any tree.

- first concerns the damage to our road system as hundreds of thousands of new trucks will be pounding up and down the interstates - mostly IH35 since it links Mexico and Canada. Who will pay for the rebuilding and repair of these roadways and what will be the cost in human lives as the 18-wheelers tear up the road and speed limits. Another problem - how will the inflow of drugs ever be curtailed as suppliers start shipping it via the heavy

freighters going past open and unrestricted borders? And what of the cost of doing business with Mexico? How can anyone deal with a nation that has bribery, corruption, payoffs and theft as an integral part of doing business?

And lastly - what about the millions of jobs that will move south as our greedy industrialists throw away loyal workers as they seek cheap wages and no environmental rules - only

the old bottom line profit? This trade agreement needs to be rethought and while all that thinking is going on - try to add another factor to the equation - illegal immigration and the unbalanced trade deficit we owe to Japan and the other Pacific rim nations. Perhaps we need to shut down our borders to people and goods for six months and see what happens. And see how fast it happens!

quality for the protection of human health, the environment, and drinking water sources.

The information obtained from the survey data will be used to aid local officials in quickly locating and cleaning up any source of contamination, thereby lessening the chance of any adverse health effects. Also the information developed from this program can be used by cities and counties

to adopt future land use regulations which can be used to protect sensitive aquifer recharge zones and wellhead protection areas.

Persons unable to attend the public meeting, but who want to learn more about this project, may attend the TWC's 8th annual Ground-Water Protections seminar to be held at the San Antonio Convention Center 8 a.m.- 5p.m. Sept. 29. The seminar is free. For more
