## International peace, ethics topic of Institute lecture

Ethics and international peace are the topics of John J. Gilligan's seminar and lecture on October 23-24, at the Institute for the Humanities at Salado. Gilligan is the second speaker in the Institute's fall program "Life's Continuum: Ethics and Morals."

John Gilligan is the former director of the Institute for International Peace Studies (IIPS) at the University of Notre Dame. While at the IIPS he worked to stimulate teaching and research on the issues of peace, violence, justice, and human rights.

A Notre Dame graduate, Gilligan received his M.A. degree from the University of Cincinnati. He was also a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C., and at the John F. Kennedy Institute of Politics at Harvard.

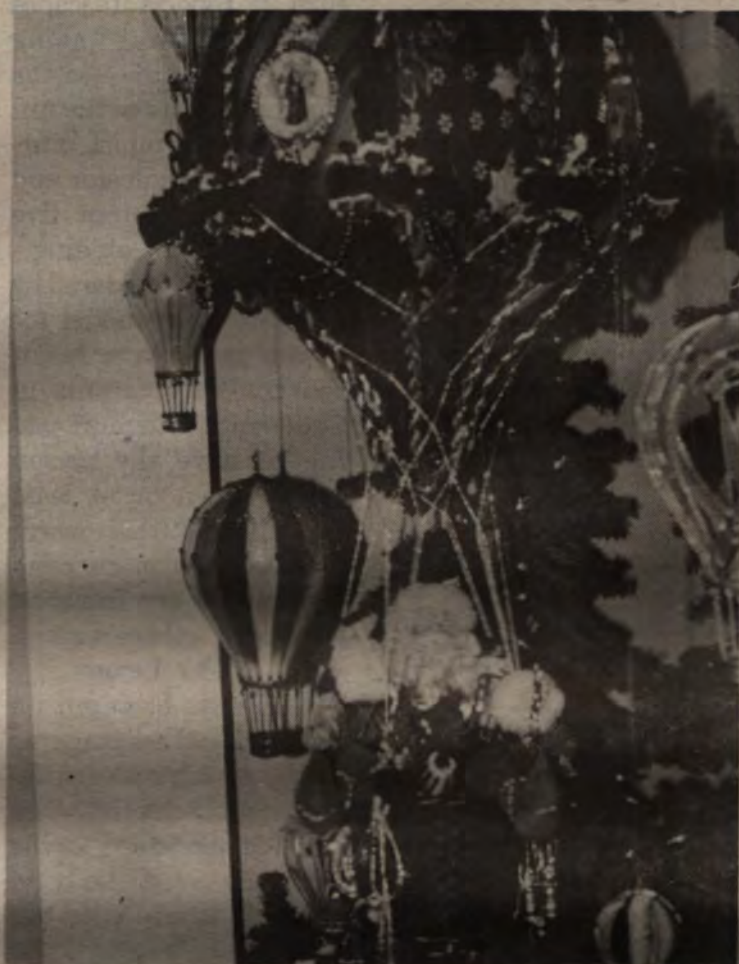
Born in Cincinnati, Gilligan served both as Ohio's representative in

Washington and later as its governor. He is also a former administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development.

Gilligan will give a seminar at the Inn on the Creek 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Oct. 23, on "Morality and the New World Order." Gilligan will give a lecture Oct. 24 4-5 p.m. followed by a discussion session and buffet dinner. His lecture, held at the Mill Creek Dining Room, will be on "Ethics and Morals in the Global Arena."

## Civic Center now open on Main St.

The Salado Civic Center is open for business according to a report from the building's director, Ken Clapp. The Salado Chamber of Commerce hours will be 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Salado Public Library will post its hours within a few days, as will the Salado Historical Society.

The downstairs bathrooms will be open for visitors during the same 9 a.m.-5 p.m. hours Monday through Friday. Bathrooms will also be open all day Saturday and 1-5 p.m. Sunday.

Clapp noted that work is not yet complete on sections of the second floor as well as the placement of some doors on both floors but contracts are expected to be finished within the next week to 10 days.

Landscaping will take place when funds become available as will the civic center sign but according to Chamber and school officials, the main thrust of fund-raising is currently being devoted to the repayment of the \$100,000 bank loan.

Brick sales are brisk. Chairman Cathy Sands asks that villagers and others who wish to have their names placed on the bricks at front entrance to the Civic Center turn in the \$100 donation as soon as possible so that phase of the program can be completed.

## Gathering of Clans set Nov. 12-14 in Salado

Like the mythical Brigadoon, Salado becomes a wee bit of Scotland in November each year. This year the dates for the 32nd Annual Scottish Gathering and Highland Games are Nov. 12-14. Sponsored by the Central Texas Area Museum, the skirl of bagpipes, men in kilts, Scottish Folk Dancing, Sheep Dog Trials and other events fill the week-end.

The first program event is the Genealogy Workshop which begins Nov. 12 1 p.m.; at 6:30 p.m. a "Finger-tip Supper" will be held in the Longhorn Room of the Stagecoach Inn. Nov. 13, begins early and extends all through the day with visitors able to watch the Highland Dancing competitions, Bagpipe Competitions, Sheep Dog Trials, Drummers and one of two Ceilidhs (pronounced Kay-

Lee) a program of entertainment either at 3 p.m. or 7 p.m.

Nov. 14, a Scottish church (kirk) Service, or "Kirkin' of the Tartans" begins the day. More dancing demonstrations, pipe band competitions, athletic competitions and other events fill the day.

The finale is a parade down Main St. Which features all the bands and pipers, the tartan banners and participants.

Admissions are: Admission to the grounds \$5 on Saturday and \$4 on Friday and Sunday. The "Finger-tip Supper" is \$8.50 and the Ceilidh cost \$4 per performance.

# Eagles spank Liberty Hill

Salado, 6-1, shares lead in District 26AA with state-ranked Thorndale

After spanking the Liberty Hill Panthers 42-7 Oct. 15, the Salado Eagles share the lead in the 26AA district race with state-ranked Thorndale Bulldogs.

The Eagles led Liberty Hill throughout the contest and overcame the "Liberty Hill Hex." The victory is the first over Liberty Hill in recent memory.

And what a memory to savor for Salado fans as the Eagles demoralized the Panthers with 330 yards offense and 20 first downs and a stingy defense which held the Panthers to just 141 yards total offense. The Eagles also took away the ball twice from the Panthers.

The first takeaway, a fumble recovered by Chris Duzich in the first quarter, led to Salado's first score, a one yard dive by Duzich with 5:21 remaining in the opening period. The touchdown capped a 38 yard drive. Andrew Voelter missed only his second kick of the season on the extra point.

Salado stopped running threat Billy Simmons on fourth down and three at Salado's 34 yard line, to set off a 66 yard scoring drive.

A key play in the drive was a 32 yard sweep when Shawn Easley followed Brian Hill's block to carry the ball to the Liberty Hill 18 yard line. After a 12 yard run by Richard Berumen, Jereme Hosch carried in from the six yard line. Berumen ran over two Liberty Hill defenders for a two-point con-

version to give Salado a 14-0 lead at the half.

Someone lit a match under Salado, because the Eagles exploded in the third quarter for 28 points.

Salado took the ball 84 yards on its opening drive of the second half in just eight plays. Easley took another sweep around end, this time for 28 yards, followed by two Jason Hosch carries and an 18 yard bulldog run by Duzich over the middle. Jason Hosch pushed the ball in from the six yard line, followed by Voelter's extra point kick.

Salado recovered a Liberty Hill fumble at the Panther 8-yard line after the ensuing kickoff.

Richard Jackson found Billy Wilson alone in the end zone for the scoring pass on the following play. Voelter again booted the point-after, to give Salado a 28-0 lead.

After forcing the Panthers to punt on their next possession, Salado began a 63 yard scoring drive with a 16 yard run by Berumen and a 39 yard pass from Jackson to Justin Brantley to bring the ball to the Panther one yard line. Jerome Peoples pushed the ball in with 3:30 left in the third period. Again Voelter was good on the extra point.

Michael Sierra blocked a Panther punt on fourth down and 19 for Liberty Hill. Sierra recovered his stuffed ball at the Liberty Hill 9 yard line.

Two plays later, Berumen punched the ball into the endzone. Voelter's kick gave Salado a 42-0 lead.

Liberty Hill's lone touchdown came midway

through the final period on a 28 yard run by Oscar Montemayor. The extra point was good.

Berumen led the defense with 15 tackles, 8 for losses. Duzich followed with 14 tackles, 6 for losses. Sierra had 10 tackles, 5 for losses. Jereme Hosch and Brian Hill each had 8 tackles.

Thorndale (7-0, 2-0) and Salado (6-1, 2-0) sit atop the district. Following them are Lexington (2-5, 1-1) and Liberty Hill (1-5-1, 1-1). In the cellar are Florence (3-4, 0-2) and Hutto (3-4, 0-2).

The Eagles will travel to Lexington for their contest at 8 p.m. Oct. 22 before facing Thorndale at Salado Eagle Field 8 p.m. Oct. 29. Hutto will close the schedule for Salado in Hutto 8 p.m. Nov. 5.

Coach Dan Wasik does not discount Lexington. "They have the same two running backs that they had last year. Their full-back Barry Jackson is very

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## How Health Care Reform Will Affect Investors

In a recent speech, President Clinton urged Congress to accept the challenge of reforming the nation's health care system. Both political parties seem ready to accept his challenge, so how will the proposed plans affect the economy and, more importantly, your investments?

First, you should understand the current health care system's impact on the economy. Health care costs in America have grown 10 percent per year since 1980, which is faster than the gross domestic product or inflation. Furthermore, health care expenditures were \$839 billion last year, and analysts expect them to double to \$1.6 trillion by the year 2000.

Runaway spending has set the stage for the recent round of reform proposals, which the White House hopes will decrease waste and reduce spending to lower the deficit while bringing health care coverage to all Americans.

No one knows for sure what the final legislation will entail, but economists believe that the proposed reforms will not dramatically affect the slowly recovering economy. However, since questions remain about how the government will finance reforms, analysts believe that universal health care coverage will increase the deficit and slow opportunities for economic and job growth.

Depending on your stake in the current health care delivery system, the proposed changes may affect your investment decisions. The following is a brief analysis of different industry segments that could be affected by reform measures. For specific invest-

ment advice, consult your investment broker.

### Managed Care & Insurance Companies

As reform legislation unfolds, these companies face the challenges of controlling premium increases, but have more opportunities for growth since more individuals will obtain coverage.

Companies that can increase their market share and have established an ability to control per-member medical costs are well-prepared to compete in the reformed system. In addition, companies that own or manage groups of primary care physicians, the gatekeepers of the new system, will be better positioned as well.

### Pharmaceutical Companies

Clinton's speech did not focus specifically on the drug industry, so the impact of proposed legislation remains unclear. A key issue to watch in the reform debate is possible price controls on new medications, which could lower profitability and decrease the incentive for performing innovative research. The U.S. pharmaceutical industry is a world leader in producing significant new drugs and is a leading contributor to our economy. The speculation is that government will forego drug industry restrictions to maintain its global competitive edge. However, the tougher, cost-conscious environment of reform will

likely result in a wider range of earnings growth within the industry, so investors must be more selective.

### Hospitals

Many hospitals began forming their own alliances and cost-sharing networks at the first signs of reform. They realize that managed care and Medicaid and Medicare cutbacks will sharply decrease their revenues and close many poorly financed, inefficient facilities. However, in the long run, facilities that are well-managed and better located may enjoy some success once the initial controls and cutbacks have been swallowed. In addition, those facilities that can foster unit expansion to override their shrinking gross profit margins may see a growth in earnings over the next five years.

### Long Term and Home Health Care Companies

Analysts believe the current reform proposals will have little effect on these sectors of health care. Individuals and employers may benefit from possible tax exclusions and deductions on payments for long-term care services, but again, final legislation will determine the extent of this benefit. In addition, any continued patient growth for home care companies will likely be offset by margin pressures.

Above all, investors are advised to carefully watch how the Congressional debate on health care reform unfolds and to consult their investment broker about specific investment opportunities and challenge during the transition.

## Construction causes closings along I-35 through Salado

Motorists on Interstate 35 through Salado will encounter lane closures during the next several weeks.

Young Contractors, Inc. of Waco is placing a concrete barrier wall along the inside lanes of both northbound and southbound IH35 from Salado Creek to Aiken Overpass. Traffic will be moved to the right lanes and the shoulders while workers widen the Salado Creek bridge and replace the existing metal beam guard fence with concrete barrier wall.

Once the temporary bar-

rier wall is in place, some occasional lane closures can be expected but one lane of traffic in both directions will remain open at all times.

Motorists traveling in the area are urged to slow down, drive with caution and observe all flaggers and warning signs.

This \$3.7 million project includes drainage work, ramp modifications and resurfacing from Salado Creek to FM 1670. Work could be completed by the end of 1994.

Michigan called Frankenmuth which was reminiscent of a village in the Swiss Alps. "The entire town was a complete Christmas village, even the service stations followed the theme," Larson said.

The Larsons fell in love with the town and in 1976 The Christmas Shop was born, thus becoming one of the first Christmas shops in the state of Texas.

The Christmas Shop carries almost anything one could want or need for the holidays including collectible ornaments, custom designed wreaths, garland, stockings, tree skirts, lights and beautiful ribbons. Larson also features Original

Emperor Candles designed by Peggy Weber. The candles are still made by the same family that originally created them in the 16th century.

Customers have come to depend on the Larsons and The Christmas Shop to keep them updated on new designers as well as the collectibles they've come to know over the years.

"I know many of the designers personally and stay in contact with them on a regular basis. We like to keep abreast of things, so that we may offer our customers the highest level of

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# Oliver joins other air graduates at 50th anniversary celebration

In October 1943, Class 43-13DR graduated 83 bombardier-navigators at San Angelo Army Airfield (Concho Field). Among that graduating class was young Jack Oliver, Jr., aged 19 at the time.

Oliver will join others from the class to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their graduation.

Of the 83 graduates, 18 gave their lives, killed in action as crew members in B-17 and B-24 aircraft in air missions over Europe during World War II. Fifteen more have died of other causes over the years.

Of the 50 remaining members, 38 remain in contact with each other, mainly through a quarterly letter compiled and written by one of the group.

Twenty-two of the surviving bombardiers will return to San Angelo this week for the 50th anniversary. They will come from 15 states, from as far

30 years in the military.

Jack enlisted as a private in the Infantry in

1942, became an aviation cadet during World War II in the Army Air Corps. He completed Advanced Bombardier, Advanced Navigation, and Pilot Training Schools.

He completed 50 missions in B-24 bombers in Italy in 1944, where he earned many decorations and received two Purple Hearts for wounds in action.

He was one of the first 10 men selected to fly jets in advanced pilot training. He continued to fly as a pilot until he completed his 30 years of service.

In addition to his many positions in service and civic clubs in the county, Jack served as County Commissioner for 12 years.

He and wife Miriam live outside of Salado.

The Olivers will return from the reunion later this week.

Dr. Jackson, appointed in 1991 to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles by Gov. Ann Richards, told Lions that Texas houses over 70,000 in its prisons, not to include county jail populations. By the end of the century, Texas can "expect to have capacities for 130,000 beds in our system, which is too many people."

The board on which Dr. Jackson sits, "makes the decisions which prisoners should be released back to the community prior to serving all of their sentence. We cannot always predict what those convicts will do once released. Parolees have left the system to do horrible things."

When a convict has served one-fourth of his sentence he is eligible to go before the parole board.

Committees of three board members vote on paroling those convicted of non-violent crimes.

The board as a whole

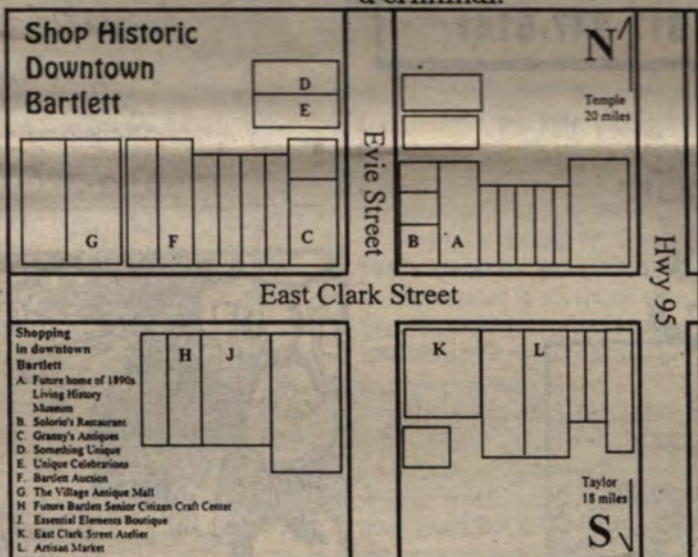
decides on paroling those convicted of violent crimes against society, according to Dr. Jackson.

Today, Texas has over 200,000 parolees in the state. "We do not have enough staff to regulate their conduct," Dr. Jackson said, although urine tests are taken to make sure drug offenders are not abusing again and leg bracelets are used in many counties.

Dr. Jackson tells Lions that they can take many steps to address their worries about criminals being released so early after committing crimes.

"You can push for legislation that during the sentencing process, trial juries can be told how much of a sentence a convict will serve before qualifying for parole," Dr. Jackson said.

"You can also insist that prisons offer vocational and education programs that really work," she said. "Those who can work and those who can think are more likely to obey the law. It is cheaper to rehabilitate a criminal than incarcerate a criminal."
