## Salado bests 'Dogs for Championship

In the hearts and minds of many Saladoans, the Oct. 29 victory over Thorndale was the best ballgame in memory played at Eagle Field.

Even though the temperature was in the low 30s with a strong wind from the north, high school football fans filled the stands on both sides of the field to watch as the 26AA district championship was decided.

This would not be a night in which a game was decided by kickers or passers.

Rather, it was a game decided by desire and talent. Salado wanted the victory more. The Eagles also had the talent to back up the desire to win, as evidenced in their 18-13 vic-

tory over the seventh-ranked Thorndale Bulldogs in freezing weather.

Prior to the game, Head Coach Dan Wasik said the contest would be decided by the team with control over the line of scrimmage.

Oct. 29, Salado owned the line of scrimmage. Both sides.

The Eagles ate up 320 yards of turf, 308 rushing, the most to-date on the Bulldogs.

Salado held Thorndale to just 168 yards offense, the least yardage the Bulldogs have had this year.

Both Thorndale touchdowns came as a result of great field position in the third quarter.

The Bulldogs took over at the Salado 41 yard line with 8:33 remaining in the third quarter, driving into the endzone on eight plays.

The point-after was good, to bring Thorndale within a touchdown.

After stopping Salado at their 24 yard line, Thorndale took over at the Eagle 31 yard line after a bad punt into the wind.

Bulldog Anthony Dominguez threw 12 yards to Kelly Cowan on fourth down and 10 when Salado coverage broke down.

Defensive coverage worked just fine when the Bulldogs went for two points on the conversion. Michael Sierra blasted past two blockers to throw Dominguez for a loss on the point-after try.

But, Thorndale held a 13-12 lead with 24 seconds left in the third quarter.

The Eagles gave Thorndale another chance to score when a poor kick gave the Bulldogs the ball

at Salado's 36 yard line.

The Eagles shutdown the Bulldogs on fourth down and 6, taking over at the Salado 22 yard line.

Junior running back Jason Hosch broke open the game when he ran off-tackle, following blocks by Brian Hill and Shawn Easley and sprinted 75 yards into the endzone.

Hosch carried the ball 14 times for 134 yards to lead the Eagles runners. Richard Berumen followed with 32 carries for 128 yards. Berumen gained those yards playing with a sore hamstring, which may keep him from playing Nov. 5 against the Hutto Hippos. Both runners have over 800 yards for the year, sharing the tailback duties.

# Old Salado School Foundation elects new directors, officers

The Old Salado School Foundation's Board of Directors met in a lengthy session this past Thursday at the Civic Center. The group, charged with the responsibility of overseeing all phases of the renovation, operation, financing and management of the new building, handled a variety of agenda items that included approving the building's hours of operation; policies concerning use of the center along with a report on the final work being done to complete the renovation and the costs related to this work.

The board also elected two new directors as well as officers for 1994. New directors are Patsy Sanford and Pete Jennings who will replace outgoing directors Lois Shepperd and Egon Friedrich.

Officers selected for 1994 are: Ken Clapp, President; Patsy Sanford, Vice President; Jessie Foster, Treasurer, Laura McQueary, executive secretary to the board, was elected to serve as the recording secretary for the coming year.

Returning members of the board include Stewart Smith and Wilma Williams. The Salado Chamber of Commerce President serves on both boards concurrently. Denver Mills has served in this capacity during 1993 and will be retiring on December 31. His replacement has not been elected by the chamber board since that group's officials are not selected until November 8th. All new officers of the foundation take office on January 14 1994.

Serving as special advisors to the foundation are Bob Cottle, fiscal matters and Helen Zagona, legal.

#### Hours and Fees

The foundation board approved recommendations from building director Ken Clapp, relative to the hours of operation and rates to be charged for renting and leasing the various meeting rooms in the building. The Chamber of Commerce and building management offices will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Closed between noon and 1 p.m. daily for lunch. Rest rooms will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays. It is hoped that volunteers will be available to work in the

chamber's visitor center all day Saturday and on Sunday afternoons to assist newcomers visiting Salado by directing them to points of interest as well as to the various shops in the village.

Clapp noted that the library's hours starting on Monday, November 15, will be from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

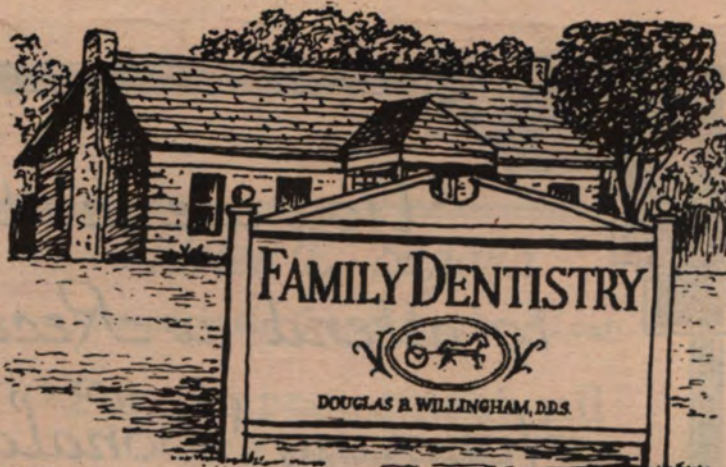
Rental rates for the building's auditorium and other meeting rooms are available to anyone interested by calling the civic center office at 947-5040. Reservations are being

made at this time for the rest of this year and well into 1994 with a large number of confirmed events already on the calendar indicating, according to Clapp, a high degree of interest in using the new building's facilities.

#### Renovation Costs

Final construction bills are being processed at this time according to Suzi Epps, who has been serving as the board's construction representative during the renovation program. She introduced a recent letter from architect Mike Marrs of Temple, indicating an overrun in costs due to necessary changes made

Dr. Michael LaCombe, a Maine country doctor, considers the decline of human contact and communication between doctors and their patients a crisis in medicine. This issue will be the topic of his seminar and lecture on November 6-7, at the Institute for the Humanities at Salado's fall program LIFE'S CONTINUUM: ETHICS AND MORALS.

Michael LaCombe is a doctor who often explores medical issues through writing. Over seventy-five of his short stories and essays have been published in periodicals such as the American Journal of Medicine and the Annals of Internal Medicine. In con-

junction the Mayo Clinic, he has published one video of dramatic readings of his stories.

He is at work on a second video in collaboration with the American Board of Internal. In addition to short stories, he has written a book titled *Medicine Made Clear: House Calls from a Maine Country Doctor*.

A graduate of Harvard Medical School, Dr. LaCombe has practiced general internal medicine for twenty years.

Among other honors, he has been the John S. Lawrence Visiting Professor at UCLA and the Louis B. Matthews Visiting Professor at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center.

Dr. LaCombe will lead a seminar on Saturday, November 6, at the Inn at Salado. His seminar will take place from 10:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and will focus on the topic of "Ethics, Humanism: Stories from Medicine."

Dr. LaCombe will give a lecture titled "The Decline of Humanism: Crisis in Medicine" on Sunday, November 7, at the Mill Creek Dining Room, Salado. His lecture will take place 4 p.m. and will be followed by a discussion session and buffet dinner.

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### Research is Key to Selecting Mutual Funds

Investors trying to select mutual funds have a formidable task ahead of them. Today there are more mutual funds than there are stocks listed on the New York and American Stock Exchanges combined. Finding the right funds for you can be a time-consuming experience. To complicate matters, nearly every investment magazine publishes its picks of the "top-performing" mutual funds each year. Often, there's considerable disagreement among the publications. So, what should an investor look for when selecting a mutual fund?

One of the first things that mutual fund shoppers should realize is that this year's "hot" funds, as defined by one publication or another, is not necessarily the right fund for them. Spectacular performance over the short term does not guarantee a fund will be successful over the long haul. Before you select any fund, you should identify your investment objective, investment style and tolerance for risk. Then, eliminate the types of funds that don't watch up. For example, if your objective is income, you probably don't want to invest in a growth-oriented mutual fund that pays minimal income just because a magazine has ranked it this year's "best performing" fund. Instead, ask your investment broker to provide you with prospectuses on the funds that best meet your needs. A prospectus explains a fund's investment objective, the types of securities it invests in, its historical performance, charges and expenses, and special services offered by the fund.

Although a fund's past performance numbers should not be the only criterion used when selecting a mutual fund (or considered a guarantee of future results). You can study them for their trend value, historical performance over the last five or 10 years can show you whether the fund has achieved steady gains over the years or owes its good numbers to alternating periods of good and not-so-good performance. If the latter is the case, you should examine whether there is a logical explanation for this type of volatility. Ask yourself if you can be comfortable with such fluctuations.

You should also take a look at a fund's expenses. Mutual funds typically have two categories of costs associated with them -- sales charges and other expenses (e.g. operating costs, management fees, and marketing fees). Sales charges apply to the purchase of fund shares: the fees generally represent continuing costs assessed annually.

Sales charges are generally assessed either when you purchase or sell fund shares. Fading are the days when you could simply refer to a mutual fund as a load or no-load fund. Today, many mutual funds offer multiple "classes" of shares, each with its own pricing structure. The different structures are intended to allow investors to choose the

sales charge option most suitable for their needs.

Probably a bigger issue when you're shopping for mutual funds is each fund's expense ratio. This figure represents the percentage of a fund's assets paid for operating expenses, marketing the fund and management, but excludes sales charges. A number of factors, including the type of fund, will cause expense ratios to change between funds. However, there are some general rules of thumb regarding sales charges and expense ratios that may be good to keep in mind.

First, remember that nothing is free. If a fund's sales charge looks too good to be true, it probably is. Second, carefully weigh the long-term effects of sales charges and expenses. For example, suppose you can't decide between a fund with a higher up-front load, but a lower expense ratio, and a similar no-load fund with higher expenses. If you're planning to hold your shares for the long term, keep in mind that the higher load will diminish over time and you will be left with small annual expenses to pay. However, the higher expenses on the no-load fund will continue to affect your returns annually until you redeem your shares.

The proliferation of new mutual funds in recent years has made the task of selecting funds more challenging. Investors who understand the many characteristics of mutual funds as well as their own investment objectives, risk tolerance and overall investment plan will make the best investment decisions.

# Georgetown CPA discusses new tax rates with Lions Club

Georgetown CPA Johnny Lacy discussed the effects of the Clinton tax plan and investment strategies for the coming years at the Oct. 27 meeting of the Salado Lions Club. Some of the changes Lacy

outlined were these:  
 · Business meals and travel can be deducted at only 50 percent, rather than 80 percent.  
 · Only those moving expenses involved directly in moving furniture outside a 50 miles radius can now be deducted. In the past, lodging, meals and other mov-

ing expenses were deductible.  
 · Country Club dues are no longer tax deductible.  
 · The 10 percent luxury tax was repealed, on most luxury items, except cars.  
 · Profits in small company investments are taxed at half the rate of the capital gain tax, when the stock is held over five years. This means the tax rate for these investments is 14 percent.  
 · Public trade securities can be rolled over into small business investments within 60 days of the sale of

the securities with no taxing penalty. This is limited to \$50,000 per year.  
 · Self-employed individuals can deduct 25 percent of their health insurance costs.  
 · Charitable contributions must be recorded with receipts beginning Jan. 1994.

Lacy also told Lions of many tax saving plans:

· Company 401 (k) defers income tax until the money is cashed in.  
 · IRAs are good investments for those who are self-employed. Up to \$2,000 per year can be invested in IRAs each year, tax-free.

· Municipal bonds are tax-free investments.

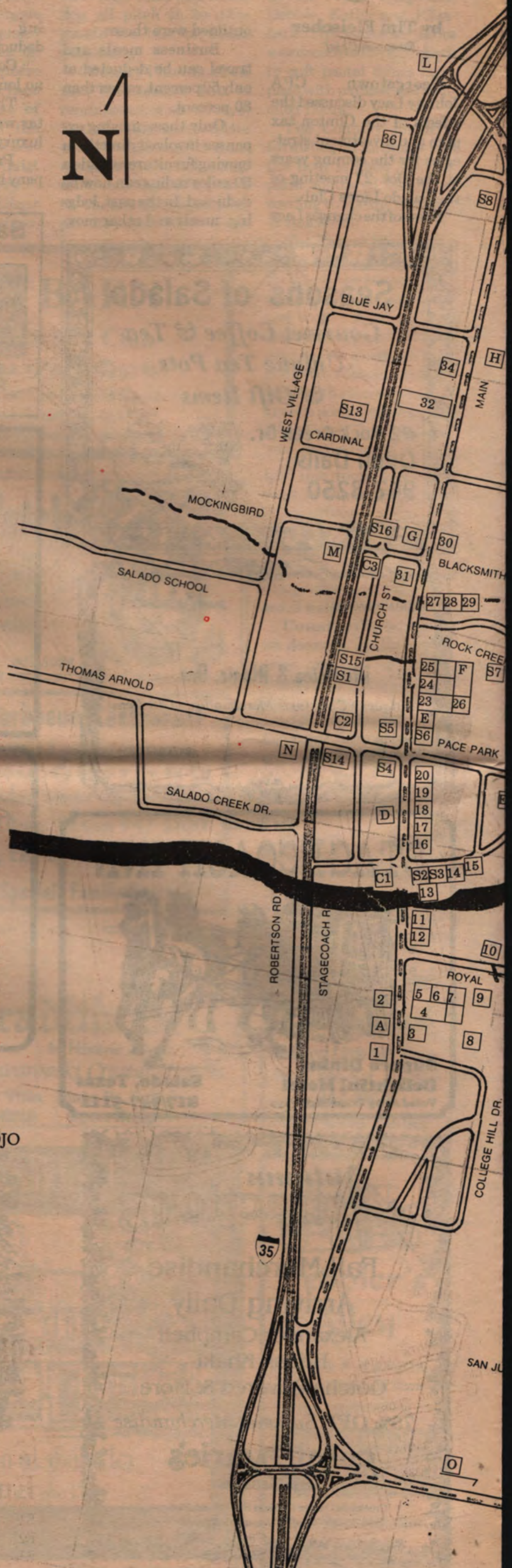

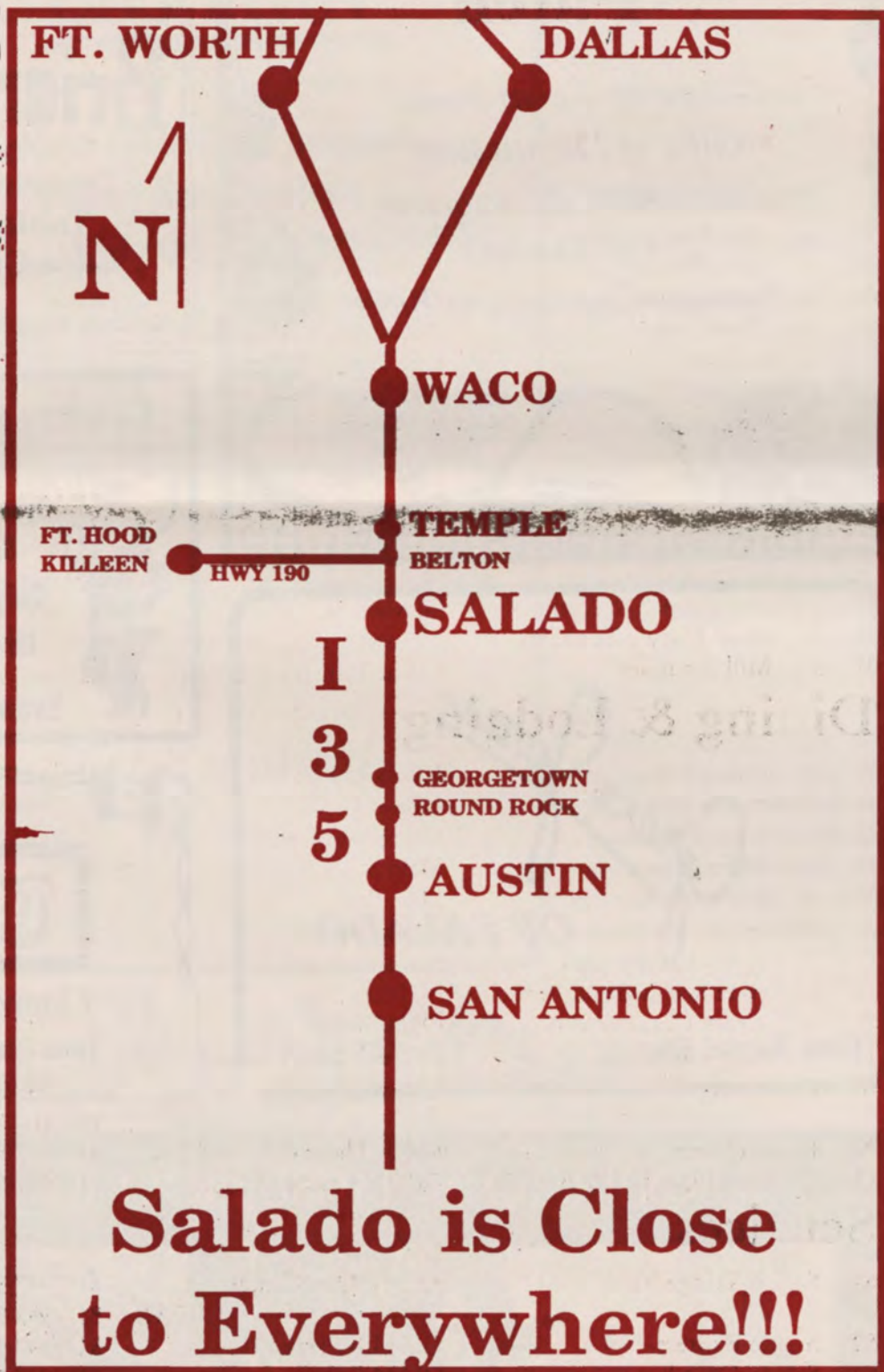

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during the construction phase. This is anticipated to be less than 3 percent of the total costs of renovation. That total was contracted in at \$401,654,000.

### Work Halted

Building director Clapp had ordered all work stopped earlier in the week, when news of the overrun reached his office, and until the costs figures could be positively determined. He noted that completion of the plumbing, ceiling and floor finishing will proceed on schedule since they are well within the contracted numbers but work on the cabinet laminating, upstairs doors, landscaping and some painting will have to be done at a later date when funds become available through rentals. The overrun will be paid out of funds previously set aside for furnishing the building which now will have to be delayed.

Board President Stewart Smith noted that all proceeds from the brick sales, pledged funds that come in this year and for the next two years plus all revenue from fund raising events will go directly towards paying off the bank loan. He stated: "When we have the bank note paid off we can then think about doing other things that will add to the completeness of the civic center."

### Drive Underway

A drive is being formed by Ross Greenwood to raise money specifically for the landscaping and hopefully, according to foundation board members, other groups will come forward to help with projects such as the purchase of furniture and tables for the meeting rooms and the auditorium. The board expressed deep appreciation to Greenwood for his volunteering to raise funds for the landscaping work.

A permanent sign has been designed and when funds become available it will be erected. Until then, Clapp said, "We will put up a temporary sign so everyone will know we are up and running."

The board does not plan to borrow any more money and will depend on donations and rentals and leases to continue its policy of "pay-as-you-go".

### Insurance

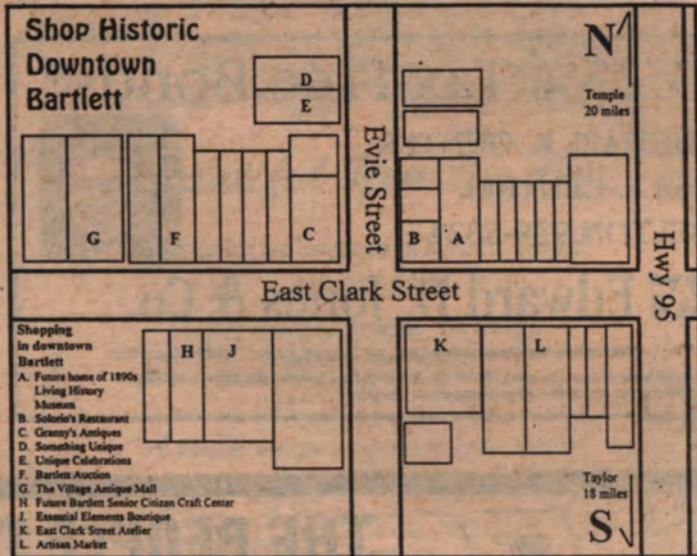
The Foundation voted to approve the overall insurance program designed to protect the building and contents as well as a gen-

eral liability protection policy but voted not to purchase a liquor liability policy. Rather, it was determined that any group, wanting to serve alcoholic beverages, during the time they rent or lease any part of the civic center must provide the building's management with a certificate of insurance indicating the purchase of a \$1 million liquor liability policy with the civic center and Foundation board as addition-

ally insured parties of interest.

Cost of this type insurance can run as high as \$500 per day due to the high risk exposure to insurance carriers. Hence the reasoning behind the Foundation's decision not to purchase this type of protection.

The board also approved the purchase of a fire and security system for the civic center that will be tied into a central office
