If Ray Stevens wrote *The Streak* in the 90s instead of the 70s, he could simply change one verse to "Sharon Stone, put your clothes on."

What was shocking and controversial in *Basic Instinct* is boring and predictable in *Sliver*. The question is not will she or won't she? but how often and when will she stop?

Sharon Stone is not sexy in *Sliver*, she's just naked. *Sliver* is not thrilling, chilling or exciting, it is monotonous and predictable.

And pretty dog-gone sick.

Stone stars as Carly, a young woman who finds the perfect apartment in a highly monitored building in the city. What she doesn't know is that the earlier tenant of the apartment took a nose-dive off the balcony.

Sliver is more about voyeurism than about murder and mystery. It is a weakly written story, held together with very unsexy love scenes. Sharon Stone and William Baldwin have no chemistry as a couple and this fact comes across abundantly in the film.

But don't take my word for it. *Sliver* is now available on videocassette at IGA Village Foods Videos.

Less than 20% Saladoans vote Nov. 2 in choosing amendments

Salado sent 273 voters to the polls on November 2, which represented a scant 17.89 percent of the 1526 registered voters in precinct 203. This small but important group defeated four of the constitutional amendments including number one, lending money to minority businesses; number two, tax breaks for companies that install pollution devices; number seven, repealing the "stock watering" laws and number sixteen, agricultural loans for experimental and minority farm projects. The remaining 12 amendments sailed through with votes to spare.

Bell County turned down amendments one and seven while approving the remaining fourteen proposals. Statewide, Texans defeated only amendments one and sixteen - both minority based state loan programs.

It was apparent that Texas voters were willing to spend money on prisons but not questionable business loans and with whopping majorities approved a plan to force the legislature to refer all questions on a state income tax back to the people should the matter come before the law-

makers. Denial of bail to proven criminals to stop them from roaming around free while awaiting trial was heartily approved. Also, thunderous approval of money to technical colleges gave some insight into voter's thinking about what type education is needed in the days ahead.

Other Results

Republican gubernatorial victories this past week in New Jersey and Virginia plus the booting of Democratic Mayor David Dinkins in the Big Apple have political analysts going in circles - some with ecstasy at the thought that all this spells doom for President Clinton as well as hope for Republican inroads during the next round of congressional elections coming up in '94. Other "experts" on the Demo side of the fence were down-playing the victories as they put their spin on what has generally been termed a "throw-the-rascals-out" mood that started in '92 and continues to this day.

Most folks who approach all this in a calmer manner

believe that there is abroad in the land, an impatient electorate, regardless of political persuasion, who have two things on their minds - the almost complete breakdown of the criminal justice system and the absolute failure of either party to take seriously the matter of debt-build-up with absurd tax increases at nearly all levels of government but especially the local property hits taken as lawmakers mandate programs without funding.

GOPers like Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, and his counterpart in the lower house, good-old-boy Newt Gingrich, are stomping around with glee at the thought they might regain control of the White House in '97 and perhaps the Senate as early as '95. These two magnificent "carpers"

need to be reminded that during the 12 benevolent years of Republican control of the administration crime, spending, debt and taxes, "went nuts" and brought about the Clinton change! On the other hand we would remind the Demo spin doctors that their party aided and abetted the Reagan and Bush Pooh-

The Salado Public Library invites all area residents to an Open House in the library's new, expanded location in the Salado Civic Center. The Open House is 2-4 p.m. Nov. 14 at the Civic Center on N. Main St.

To insure a well-stocked inventory in the new expanded space, the Library Board of Trustees has appointed a Collection Committee dedicated to providing a wide range of books, magazines and research materials for all Saladoans.

The Collections has been divided into these categories General Fiction, Medicine, Biography, Mystery, Westerns, Texana, History, Travel, Children's Books, Business and Industry, General Non-Fiction, Large Print Books, Sports, Genealogy, Paperbacks, Geography, Encyclopedias and Reference Materials.

The collection also include books on tape, videotapes of general interest (not Hollywood movies), a variety of magazines and newspapers.

The children's area of the library is excellent with books for pre-school, elementary and junior high school students. Children's programs have been a large, integral part of the total library effort and will continue to be so.

If there is a book or tape you would like to check out that the Salado Library does not have, they can get it for you in just a few days through an Inter-library Loan system with the Austin Public Library.

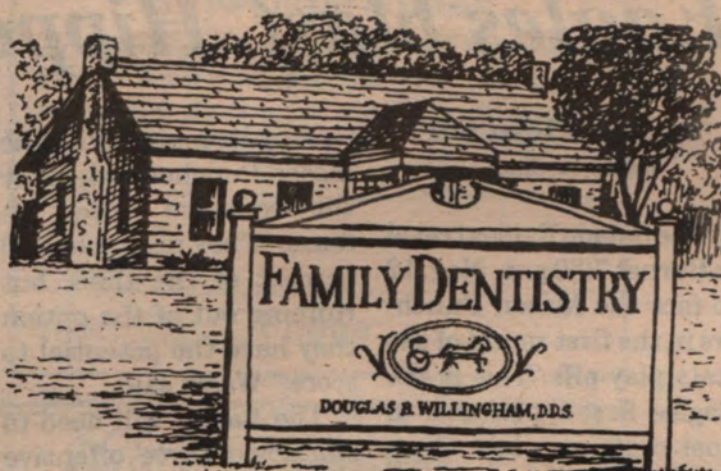

Saladoans named to Messer-Limmer board

Five Saladoans have been named to the Messer-Limmer Foundation Board of Directors.

Charles Abbitt, Robert Cottle, Don Davis, Jean Davis and George Kolb, all of Salado were recently appointed members of the Board of Directors of the Messer-Limmer Foundation.

The foundation, incorporated as a nonprofit organization for historical preservation and educational purposes, conducted its initial meeting of its Board of Directors recently in Bartlett. The foundation's plans include projects assisting the City of Bartlett's "Downtown Renaissance" program designed to enhance the town's Historic District Project.

Bartlett, located in Southeast Bell County, has a marvelous historic district composed of about 60 row buildings all of which have National Register of Historic Places designations. Harry O'Bryant, Project Director for Bartlett's Historic District Project, says that since June many of the historic structures have been sold or leased and that plans call for new businesses to open in the near future in addition to those which have already opened. The revitalization effort is rapidly attracting increasing interest.

The Messer-Limmer Foundation plans to focus its attention initially on a project which will establish a turn-of-the-century farmstead museum to be housed in the historic building facade which was for many years the Cox hardware store.

The museum will feature the 1895-built Messer-Limmer Farmhouse which currently sits on a farm owned by E. A. Limmer, Jr. of Temple and his sister

Ruby Limmer Peck of Crane. These two owners have donated the farmhouse in the hope of preserving this excellent example of a Cumberland style rural home which was, in an earlier time, quite familiar in Bell County. The farmhouse was awarded a Texas Historical Commission Marker in 1989.

E. A. Limmer and Peck descend from two pioneer Bell County families. The Limmers arrived in the county (in the area which

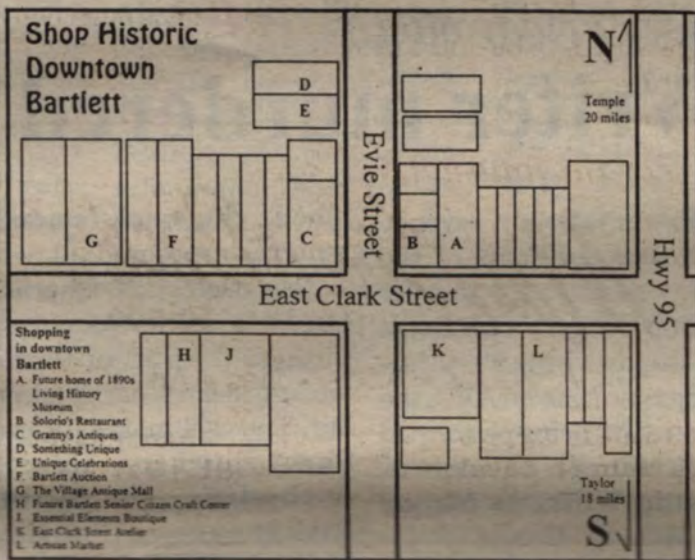
was to become Bartlett) in 1878 while the Messers had arrived a few years earlier, 1873.

Limmer is former chairman of the Bell County Historical Commission and is well-known for his support of historical preservation projects all over the county, and he is an active patron of the arts.

Foundation board members, other than those from Salado, are Limmer; Lloyd E. Davis of Lampasas; Mary Saage and E. B. Ware

both of Bartlett; Alice Sutton-Burbank of Killeen; Pauline McCurdy of San Antonio; Melba Schwertner of Schwertner; and Dr. David Yeilding of Temple. The foundation's founding directors were Harry O'Bryant of Johnson City and Bartlett, and Charles Spiller and Jonnie Williamson of Bartlett.

The directors elected Dr. David Yeilding as Foundation President, Alice Sutton-Burbank as Vice-President, and Mary Saage as Secretary-Treasurer. The Board will meet annually on the second Saturday in October. An Executive Committee will function between annual meetings.

Don't bury yourself using credit cards this Christmas

With the interest rates down on many credit cards, consumers may be tempted to run up bills for Christmas gifts, thinking the cost is lower. However, it's best to shop wisely with credit.

Avoid cash advances on credit cards. They seem convenient, but are costly. Interest starts accruing from the moment you take the advance. There is usually a special transaction fee of up to \$15. There is no grace period for cash advances. If you pay the balance in full by the due date, you still pay a high rate for the cash advance. One cash advance could cost you the money being saved for another gift!

Be on the look out for theft and fraud. Keep track of your cards. Watch each transaction carefully. Make sure the clerk returns your card, receipts and carbons. Tear up the carbons and save the receipts so you can check them carefully against your statements. Be careful who is given your card number. Don't write it on checks or give your number out over the phone if you did not initiate the call to make a purchase.

Watch out for minimum payments. Minimum payments have been lowered by many creditors. A new area for consumer credit use is supermarkets. Buy-

ing \$50 of groceries a week using a credit card charging 18 percent interest, and making only the minimum payments would cost \$223.63 in interest the first year alone. Continuing to pay only the minimum balance would take you 12 years and three months to pay off the balance. You would have paid \$2,539 in interest for groceries that only cost \$2,600 in the first place... and they were eaten 12 years ago! Pay the most you possibly can on any credit card. Start with the lowest balance. Then put the amount you had paid on that card on the next lowest balance and keep going until all cards are paid off.

Avoid skip payment offers. Many credit cards send you the present of being able to miss a payment during this budget stretching time. Interest continues to pile up when you skip the payment. Don't become the holiday turkey — make payments on bills as much as you can and as fast as you can.

Limit credit use to the amount you know you can pay in full the next month when the payment is due.


We may well be on the road to permanent one term presidents but even if that is true don't look for
