## TNRCC tells Shallow Ford it needs water permit

The Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission told Shallow Ford Construction Co. last week that a water permit is necessary for the proposed rock crushing plant north of Salado.

"We have determined that because the contracts call for washed gravel, Shallow Ford Construction will need a waste water permit," said TNRCC spokes-

man Pat Shaughnessy.

Within 180 days of the application for the waste water permit, the applicant must submit a draft of the water use plan to determine the amount of waste water and disposal methods, according to Shaughnessy.

The TNRCC would then publish a notice of the application for a waste water permit in the local newspaper of record.

Notices will also be sent to area residents.

Within 30 days of the notice, citizens can request hearings before the TNRCC on the matter.

If the TNRCC receives no requests for hearings, then the application will be placed on the next agenda of the commission.

However, if the TNRCC receives requests for hearings, then the hearing examiner will conduct hearings to consider objections from citizens.

The hearing examiner will then make a recom-

mendation to the commission for their consideration.

Save Our Resources and Environment (SORE) recently hired Stewart Henry of Henry, Lowery, Hess and Falkner, to represent the group of citizens opposed to the rock crushing plant.

"Since hiring Henry, who is a top-notch environmental attorney, SORE really needs the fiscal support of anyone who is opposed to the idea of a rock quarry within a mile of homes, the Dam and Camp

Tahuaya," said Larry Gumpert, president of SORE.

Christmas arrived early for the "Save Our Resources and Environment" group that is opposing a rock crushing quarry planned for an area just next to the Stillhouse Hollow Dam and smack against the boy scout camp at Tahuaya. SORE received word from the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission last Thursday that a water study would have to be made before the Shallow Ford Construction outfit receives a permit to begin blasting the landscape.

This potential six month delay will give area-residents the time needed to combat the quarry plan. Leaders of SORE have retained the services of a top environmental law firm in Austin and this plus the delay in permitting lifted spirits of the beleaguered residents who have been fighting the quarry plan.

Larry Gumpert, President of SORE, called off the planned public meeting with Bob Spiegel, owner of Shallow Ford, that was scheduled for last Saturday. "Advice of counsel" Gumpert noted as he reported the group's attorneys wanted to be present at all meetings with the rock crushing company.

Gumpert also noted that funding was a problem and hopes that everyone in Salado and the rural area near the proposed plant would send donations to stop this intrusion into a sensitive water and land area.

#### Law Needed

Long range, this group and anyone else interested in keeping quarries away from the area, should contact Layton Black, State Representative for this district and Bill Sims who we hope (or should hope), will be our next Senator in the new Senatorial district Bell County has been assigned to - and tell these worthies to put on the law books a statute that would control all phases of rock crushing and quarrying. Right now there is nothing to stop such a move unless there are water, air or land problems that require study.

Rock quarrying should be controlled just like strip mining. In fact, if you want to see what a quarry looks like and does to an area - stop by the two rock crushing outfits in Nolanville. The only forgiving part of

the two is that they are out of sight. Word is that there is enough crushable rock on the twin sites to last area road builders and concrete makers some 100 plus years. Why do we need another one especially located so near homes, nature study trails and scout camps? Talk about messing with mother nature!

You may have forgotten what such plants do to the landscape. Remember Round Rock and the strange look the area just west of IH 35 took on when just such an operation was in full swing?

#### Strange

The folks fighting the quarry have received help from most of the area's politicians - some strong, some weak. The notable exception is Representative Dianne Delisi (R-Temple) who is reported to have said

"We need to learn to be good neighbors to Spiegel's operation"! Wonder what she would say if the plant was to go in near her home or the trucks were slated to race back and forth in front of her residence - one every few minutes?

If I were a Yellow Dog Democrat, I would have to say that Delisi's comment

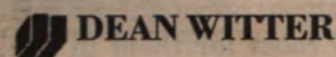

## Funeral services held for Robert Cutler

Robert Ward Cutler, of Salado, passed away Dec. 17, 1993. Funeral services were held Dec. 20 at St. Francis Episcopal Church in Temple with Rev. George Udell officiating. Mr. Cutler was buried in the Salado Cemetery.

Mr. Cutler was a retired New York architect of Salado since 1972. When six months old, his family moved from Ridgeway, Pennsylvania, where he was born June 27, 1905, to upper New York state. His parents were Olga Holmberg Cutler and Robert W. Cutler.

Survivors include his wife, formerly Morene Parten; two children by a former marriage, Denise Cutler Kimball, wife of Dr. Kent Kimball of Oakland, California and Robert Ward Cutler, Jr. of Greenwich, Connecticut; 1 sister, Mrs. James Sheedy of Fayetteville, New York; 4 grandchildren, Dr. Thomas Kimball of Cincinnati, Ohio, Mrs. Whitney (Susan) Skala of San Diego, California, Robert Ward Cutler III and Jonathan Cutler, both of Greenwich, Connecticut; and 5 great-grandchildren, Teresa, Kirsten and Whitney Skala, Jr. and Jennifer and Mark Kimball.

Robert Cutler received a Bachelor of Architecture degree from Syracuse University in 1928. He later received the Arents Pioneer Medal, the highest award bestowed on a former student, and also served as a trustee. He established the Robert Cutler Travelling Scholarship which annually sends students to Italy. He was named a Fellow of Syracuse University.

Mr. Cutler lived in New York City many years and after being associated with several firms, he became a partner of Skidmore, Owing's and Merrill. In 1972 he retired to Salado, Texas, and continued to maintain a second home in Old Chatham, New York. The Cutler's also own a farm in Ellis County near Waxahachie, Texas.

His career in New York includes being a member of the Art Commission, trustee of Community Service Society, consultant to New York Community Civic Center, the first architect named president of the Fifth Avenue Association and president of the New York chapter of the American Institute of Ar-

Mr. Cutler has been listed in Who's Who for many years. He was a member of Sigma Chi, the Metropolitan Club and Century Association of New York, Tau Sigma Delta and Phi Kappa Phi.

## Formula babies may get high cholesterol

Formula-fed infants may need more dietary cholesterol than commercial preparations provide, says a scientist at the USDA's Children's Nutritional Research Center in Houston.

In a recent study of four-month old infants, Dr. Williams Wong, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine, found significant differences in the way formula-fed and breast-fed infants produce cholesterol.

Wong points out that cholesterol is crucial for the growth and development of an infant's brain and for the production of the my-

elin sheath, which protects and insulates the brain stem and other nerve fibers.

"Breast milk has six times more cholesterol than formula, so breast-fed infants naturally have high levels of cholesterol in their blood," Wong said. "Formulas have very little cholesterol, and infants respond to this need by producing their own."

Wong found that formula-fed infants produced cholesterol three times faster than their breast-fed counterparts and yet, had 40 percent less cholesterol in their blood.

Researchers speculate that infants who receive low-cholesterol formulas may end up making so much themselves that they suffer from high cholesterol levels as adults.

"In other words, the cholesterol that breast-fed infants receive in the early postnatal period may serve as a long-term defense and actually protect them from diet-related increases of blood cholesterol later in life," Wong said.

The results also raise the question whether cholesterol should be added to infant formulas. Casein-based or cow's milk-based formulas currently contain less than 25 percent of the cholesterol in breast milk; soy-based formulas less than 7 percent.

Further research comparing former breast-fed and formula-fed infants is needed before any solid recommendation can be made, Wong said.

"We don't know what the optimal level of cholesterol should be for infants. There are still many questions to answer."

Results from the study appear to support increasing evidence that the way a baby is fed may impact growth and development.

Study findings were published in the *Journal of Lipid Research*.

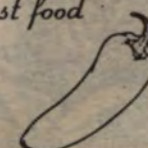

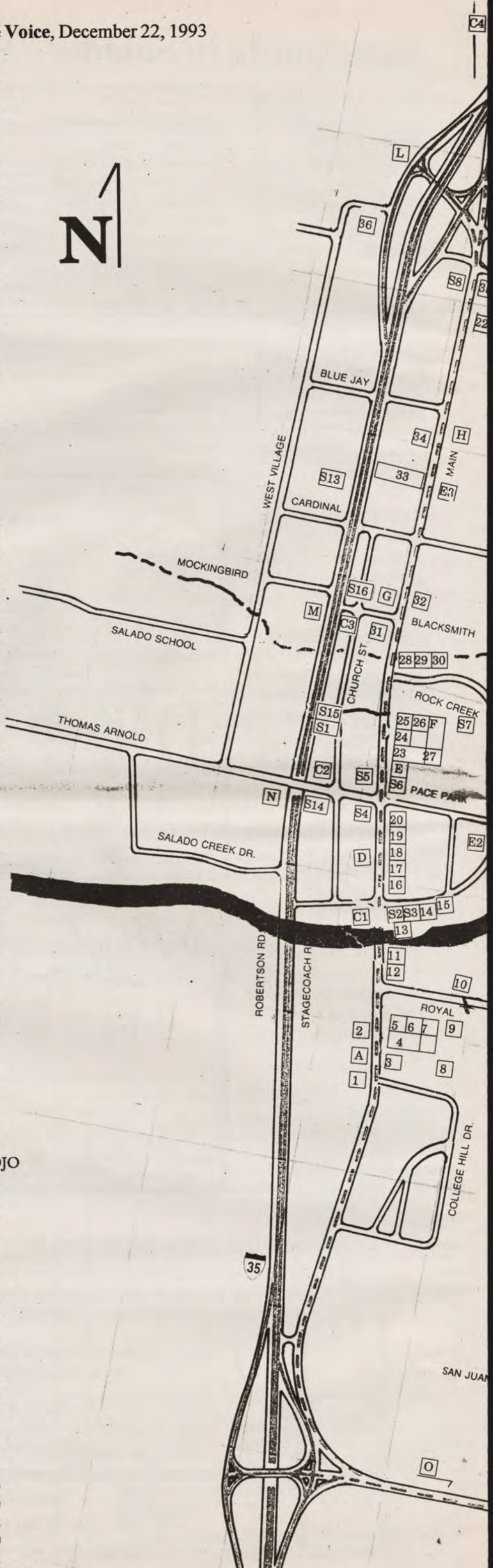

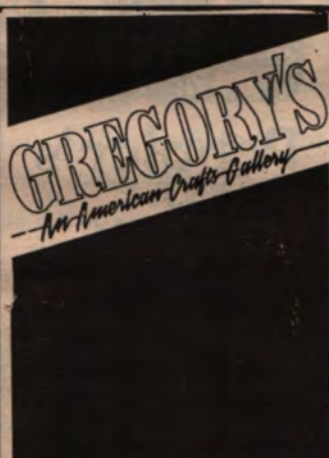

Thinking about making New Year's resolutions? Then, get a notebook.

According to Dr. Francis J. Pirozzolo, a neuro-psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, a notebook can be your best friend when trying to keep 1994 resolutions.

Pirozzolo says that changing things about ourselves--whether it is losing weight, quitting smoking, starting an exercise program --is more easily accomplished with a well-defined, four-part plan.

That is where the notebook fits in.

If it is losing weight, exactly how many pounds and in how much time? If it is quitting smoking, by what date will you have quit or at least cut down on the number of cigarettes?

Be specific. Write it down.

Second, set realistic, attainable goals.

Trying to lose 20 pounds in two weeks or to quit smoking in one day is an unrealistic goal that guarantees failure.

Third, keep a written record of your progress.

"I encourage people to think about what causes them to fall into the behaviors they want to change," Pirozzolo said. "The cause can often be anxiety or a low-mood state."

Every time you eat or light up, record your emotional state at the time, who you were with and the setting.

"You need to know what triggers your eating or what prompts you to reach for a cigarette," he said.

After a few days, look at your notes and search for patterns that seem to trigger the behavior.

Record how you are progressing toward your goals. "Share your resolutions and progress with friends and relatives, so they can encourage you," Pirozzolo said. "Others can play an important role in helping you modify behavior."

And, fourth, maintain a positive attitude that focuses on your successes rather than failures.

If you eat a cookie or two or if you smoke one more cigarette than you had planned, do not berate yourself. Rather, think of it as a reminder that you must strengthen your resolve.

"If you fall off the horse, get right back on," Pirozzolo said. "And keep that notebook handy."

# Prepare food properly at Christmas

**Ilene C. Miller**

Don't let food poisoning spoil the holidays for you and your family this week. Foodborne illnesses can cause diarrhea, vomiting, stomach cramps, and other unpleasant symptoms which can last for several hours or even days. With young children and elderly people, the results can be more severe.

Often people mistake foodborne illness for a simple "bug" or virus. The real cause may be food that was not properly handled, prepared or served. This can be prevented.

Here are some food storage tips to make your holidays a safe and happy time for your family and guests. For more details on storing food in the pantry, refrigerator, or freezer, contact the Extension Office for a copy of our new food storage guide.

\*\*\* If you receive a smoked, cured or cooked turkey as a gift or via the mail, it is usually vacuum-packed and shipped ready to eat. Some firms ship smoked turkey frozen. Others ship them "hard cold" or nearly frozen. It is very important that the turkey arrive frozen or cold to the touch. If it's still frozen you can store it up to six months in the freezer without losing quality, or in the refrigerator for use within one to two days after defrosting.

If the turkey arrives cold but not frozen, it is best to

remove the meat from the bones and use within one to two days, reheating to 160 degrees.

If the turkey arrives warm or has an off odor, do not use it. The best way to thaw any turkey is in the refrigerator. Never thaw it on the counter, where it

could easily reach the "danger zone" or temperature between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F. which are perfect for growth of bacteria.

It's also very important to make sure that the vacuum packaging has not



been torn, because this could allow bacteria to grow. Don't eat any turkey with an off-odor or with a slimy feel, you should not reheat a whole turkey that has already been cooked. Instead, cut it into serving size pieces and reheat them.

\*\*\*Perishable foods such as cream pies, seafood, dishes made with eggs, fish, meat, poultry should be kept COLD (below 40 degrees F.) or HOT (above 140 degrees F). Do not let these foods stand at room temperature more than 2 hours.

\*\*\*Hams labeled "cured" or "cured and smoked" must be cooked before you eat them. Cook to an internal temperature at 160 degrees F. "Fully cooked" hams are cooked thoroughly in processing and are already to eat.

\*\*\* If roasting a fresh turkey, cook turkey thoroughly, to an internal temperature of 180-190 degrees F. Never partially cook turkey and finish cooking later. Bacteria can survive in partially cooked poultry.

\*\*\* Cook turkey stuffing completely. It's safest to cook it separately from the turkey, because stuffing

inside a warm turkey is a breeding place for bacteria. It's also easier to serve a crowd when the stuffing is cooked separately.

\*\*\* Refrigerate turkey leftovers immediately. Remove all stuffing; store separately. Freeze any leftovers you will not be using in 1 or 2 days.

\*\*\* If cold cuts, dips or appetizers are part of the holiday party fare, make sure that they are fresh and kept chilled. Don't allow foods to stand at room temperature too long. Instead, use several containers of food; while one is on the table, keep the rest refrig-

erated. Bring out a fresh tray frequently to replace those partly used. Then meats and other protein foods stay cold and bacteria don't have a chance to grow.

\*\*\*Creamed vegetables are perishable, too. Serve them hot and don't let them stand more than 2 hours at room temperature.
