# Town meeting called April 7 about potential rock quarries

Members of Save Our Resources and Environment (SORE) have called for a town meeting 7 p.m. April 7 in the Salado Civic Center.

The meeting will inform citizens of potential effects of portable rock crushers between Belton and Salado on the residents of those areas, as well as peripheral effects to citizens of Salado proper.

SORE organized as residents in the area who gathered together in late 1993 in opposition to a proposed portable rock crusher near Stillhouse Hollow Lake and Camp Tahuaya.

Since then, SORE has grown to 100 members and petitioned against the rock crusher, having over 3,000 signatures.

SORE has retained the services of environmental law firm Henry, Lowerre, Hess and Frederick.

Legal counsel for SORE will be present at the meeting for questions.

According to President Larry Gumpert, SORE needs support from Salado residents as well as those neighboring the proposed rock quarry who will be most effected.

This is something that will effect a lot of people in a lot of different ways," Gumpert said. "I don't think most people know just how dramatically it may effect their life-styles."

"The quarry near Tahuaya is not the only

quarry planned for the Salado area. There are other potential sites near Salado," Gumpert said.

Gumpert said that the meeting will be informative to all Saladoans concerned about the quality of life in the village.

"We will also discuss some of our next steps in our fight against this quarry," Gumpert said. "Ultimately, we would like to see state regulation of the industry'

The Age of Innocence is a compelling, picturesque adaptation of Edith Wharton's novel by Martin Scorsese, who also directed Goodfellas. The only similarity between the two movies by Scorsese is his attention to detail.

The Age of Innonce is so beautiful to look at, so wonderful to listen to, that the viewer may find himself awestruck. It is easily one of the most wonderfully filmed movies I have seen.

The costuming and scenery capture the elegance of the Victorian period in which the story is set.

Daniel Day-Lewis is strong and quiet as Archer, a young lawyer promised to May (Ryder). But he finds himself inexplicably drawn to May's cousin (Pfeiffer), a married woman who is the subject of much gossip among the upper echelon of New York City society.



# After primaries, it's off to the races for Texas Senate sit, Governors Chair

This time next week, the line ups for the November 1994 general election will be completed, following a few runoff decisions to be made by both major political parties. Democrats naturally have two of the noisiest battles to contend with on April 12, the runoff election date. First is the contentious race between incumbent Supreme Court Judge Raul Gonzales and wannabee Rene Haas. The campaign drew blood the first time Haas' TV ads blossomed forth with accusations that Justice Gonzales took money from companies with suits pending before his tribunal. Since the first primary Haas has mellowed-out her advertising with Gonzales going on the attack. Neither one has much room to do fingerpointing and both lend credence to the proposition that high court judges need to be appointed rather than elected.

The second Democratic brawl includes Jim Mattox, former Congressman and Attorney General of Texas and newcomer Richard Fisher. These two worthies want to take on GOPer Kay Hutchison in November. This Senate campaign started on a low point with Mattox accusing Fisher of being a closet Republican
