Shadowlands may turn out to be a great bargaining chip for men across America. Guys, here's how to play it. Agree to sit through this ordeal of a tear-jerking drama with your wife or sweetheart. Afterward, when your sweetie is done drying her tear-filled eyes, mention casually that you would like to see a "real" movie.

Like Tombstone, True Lies, Die Hard (for the 20th time). Or any other testosterone-filled extravaganza. Unless you can trade in Shadowlands on a two-for-one basis, though, your wife will make out better then you.

Anthony Hopkins plays author C.S. Lewis, an inhibited Englishman who finds magic only in his children's stories. This is much the same character as Hopkins portrayed in Howard's End and The Remains of the Day. He comes alive when he meets Joy, a tough talking New York woman and her son.

Of course, Joy dies, as do most of the characters portrayed by doe-eyed Debra Winger. But before she passes, Jack (Hopkins) realizes his love for her (as do all male characters opposite Ms. Winger).

Shadowlands is terribly boring for those viewers who do not immediately connect with Jack and Joy (which I did not because of Hopkins' underacting and Winger's

# The brick stops here...


Salado Civic Center places memorial bricks in patio

Next time you drive by the civic center on Main Street, wheel in and take a peek at the area on the northwest corner that is now home to nearly 250 personalized bricks. The concrete work is excellent and when the project is completed with shrubs and a bench it will be something else to be proud of in the renovated complex.

There are 19 newly engraved bricks waiting to be installed on Sept. 1. These were sold since the initial work was completed last week. If you want your name to be among this group to be installed in perpetuity - get your \$100 donation to the Chamber of Commerce office (conveniently located on the first floor of the community building) no later than Aug. 19. Orders from that point will be taken to Terrell Granite Works for imprinting and finally on the first of September, will be set in concrete.

From that time on- until all spaces are sold - orders will be taken for placement every four to six weeks. There is room for some 200 more bricks at this writing.

Funds from the sale of personalized bricks go directly toward the payment of the building's debt. Scheduled payoff of the one time \$100,000 loan - now





standing at a respectable \$50,000, is no later than Spring of 1995.

#### Salado Creek

Salado Creek and the village of Salado are getting a lot of attention since the County Judge's press conference that pointed out the pollution problem we are

having in a short stretch of the waterway from the I-35 overpass to just east of Main Street. The print and electronic media did their thing with statewide results. Phones jangled for a few days there there were some cancellations at Pace Park money cheerfully refunded. Folks from as far away a Dallas called for info.

We now have three state groups investigating to see if they can discover the source of the impure water. Our special thanks to Pat Merrill and her Creek watchers for alerting us to the potential health danger associated with the polluted water. Pat reported last week that the bacteria count had dropped dramatically for some reason although the Texas Natural

Resources Commission could not, as of now, locate the source of the trouble. The TNRCC and the Brazos River Authority, that does the actual water diagnosing, along with the county health authorities are all working on the case. Some thought of dropping dyes in septic systems to see if they are percolating into the creek. On the other hand - it just may be the pigeons that roost under the bridge.

Once the problem is solved and the water pristine, it is hoped that County Judge John Garth will be as quick to call another press conference to announce the creek being clean - as he was to report the problem in the first place.

Signs alerting the public to the water problem went up late last week. Hope they come down soon even if the water aficionados don't spend much money in our shops as a general rule.







# Burning ban

Bell County Commissioners recently voted to ban outdoor burning in the county during the month of August. The Declaration of a State of Local Disaster" prohibits all outdoor burning except that in containers, or appliances used for food preparation.

From Oct. 1, 1993 through June 30, 1994, County Fire Departments have responded to 116 fires related to outdoor burning. That figure amounts to 20 percent of all county fire calls.

At the Fire Chiefs meeting on July 19, County Fire Marshal Joe Bentley remarked, " Holland, Moffat and Southwest Bell County departments responded to a total of 15 fire calls during that part of the month. Nine of the fires related to outdoor burning."

"Lack of rain is the primary reason for the court's declaration," Judge Garth reported. "Our county's fire departments are tasked with enough hazardous duty as it is. If we can lessen or eliminate part of the risk of life and property by our disaster declaration, we are only doing our duty as elected officials."

The Declaration includes a provision that if "substantial' precipitation falls in one are of the county, the burn ban will be suspended for 24 hours in that area

They buy all the fabric pieces already cut. The

grandmother made an agreement with a fabric company that they would buy so many fabric pieces at one time if they would offer them a better deal. So they buy the overstock sets and the discontined pieces. By saving time on not having to cut the fabric pieces the savings are passed to the customer. This also means if you see a quilt you really like, you better get it ... since their fabric puchases can not be duplicated.

The money they make from the sale of quilts goes into a college fund for their children which motivates the entire family to work even harder.

A supply of water (one gallon per person), replaced every 6 months

Non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener

A change of clothing, rain gear and sturdy shoes for each person

A first aid kit and any required prescription medicine (replace medication as needed)

An extra pair of glasses The Red Cross brochure also pro-

 A battery-powered radio, flashlight, and plenty of extra batteries
 An extra set of car keys

 A list of important family health information: the style and serial number of medical devices, such as pacemakers

# To the folks of Salado,

You've probably noticed all the commotion over at the TYLER HOUSE. Well, I'm the cause of it.

My name is Gene Street. If you've been around here a while, you might remember me as Ernest Gene, the son of Snookie and Billye Street, and the grandson of Ernest and Beaulah Williams. I was born over in Prairie Dell. Not long after, we moved to Brownwood but there was always a lot of visiting back and forth. A lot of my relatives still live in Salado, Austin, Bartlett, Temple and Belton. You might remember some of them: Bunk, Pete and Buck Street, Truett and Guinn Williams, Granger Killingsworth, Robert Hodge, J.D. Hinsley and Alfred Smith. Anyway, I'm 53 now and I've been around a little bit, but in all that time, I've never found any place I liked better than Salado.

I live in Dallas. I moved up here after I graduated from Howard Payne University in Brownwood and got out of the Air Force, where I earned the rank of Captain and served in Southeast Asia, the Pacific and the U.S. I also got a master's degree in liberal arts from SMU. Since then, I've been working on a restaurant called Good Eats. Today we have 14 locations including three licensees in Austin and 11 locations in Dallas and Oklahoma City. I've also opened a restaurant in Acapulco and this September my Texas Embassy Cantina will open in London, England.

I'm known in Dallas for serving a great chicken-fried steak, but I've also operated several Mexican food restaurants including Mother Mesquite's and Tamales. Ever since I bought the Van Bibber place on Salado Creek (where I hope to retire some day), I've been thinking about how nice it would be to open a restaurant in Salado. When I heard the TYLER HOUSE was available, I couldn't pass it up. I'm excited to tell you that soon we'll be opening a restaurant in the TYLER HOUSE called La Mausion de Salado.

When a newcomer shows up, even a local boy, there's concern, so I'd like to say a few things up front:

FIRST, my biggest concern is preserving the historic character of Salado and the charm of the TYLER HOUSE. I wouldn't dare think about changing the architecture of that wonderful old house. I'm biased but I think it's already the most attractive structure in town.

SECOND, I want to be a good neighbor. The folks who live and work in Salado have been struggling for a long time to preserve and enhance this town, and you can count on us to help make this community the best it can be. I expect you'll see a lot of myself, my wife Leisa, and my six children running around Salado.

THIRD, I want to make La Mansion de Salado a place you and your family will love to eat. We'll serve "Southwestern food," which means steak, chicken and fish cooked over red-hot Mesquite wood, and tasty Tex-Mex dishes like fajitas, enchiladas and tacos. Steve Scarborough will be the general manager. Steve is a former Braniff pilot who owned and operated a Bed & Breakfast and touring service in a small town in France. He and his family will be moving to Salado soon. Our goal is to serve high quality food and drinks at reasonable prices, and to make this one of the best restaurants in Central Texas.
