SISD Recognized

TEA releases accreditation ratings for Texas schools; Salado High School achieves Recognized status

Salado I.S.D. is one of just 52 districts in Texas to be Recognized by the Texas Education Agency, which released its accreditation ratings last week.

In addition, Salado High School is among the top 8 percent of 6,200 school campuses in Texas to be Recognized by the TEA.

Salado I.S.D. and Salado High School met the Recognized level performances standards for all base indicated and demonstrated required improvement on Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), according to the TEA report released Aug. 1.

nized status, all schools within the district must be and TAAS scores surpassing the standard for recognized districts.

Salado High School had 70.8 percent of its seniors take either the SAT or ACT college entrance tests. The school had 16.7 percent of its seniors in 1993 score above the criterion of 1,000 on the SAT and 24 on the ACT.

The Recognized supplemental acknowledgment standard was not applicable to Thomas Arnold Elementary because the school has no graduates and no students taking college en-rated Acceptable or higher. Thomas Arnold Elementary was rated Acceptable

Recognized campuses automatically qualify for a Texas Successful Schools excellence award and may apply for an additional TSSAS inclusion award.

The TEA will inform school districts of TSSAS awards in September.

The rating standards for recognized school districts are the following: at least 65 percent passing each subject area (all students and each student group) in the Spring 1994 TAAS, a dropout rate of 3.5 percent or less and an attendance rate of 94 percent for grades

The district had an attendance of 96.4 percent, a drop-out rate of 1 percent

The 28th Annual Salado Art Fair will net over \$53,000, according to cochairs Don Owens and Jean Davis.

Owens and Davis reported to the Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Aug. 8.

tend the Art Fair," Owens table toilets, postage, and said, adding that with volunteers, artists, children and others who attended the Fair without paying admission, total attendance was over 10,000. Gross ticket sales were \$25,216.90 for the weekend.

Booth rentals totaled \$33,112.00 from the artists. Advertising on the Art Fair fans grossed \$910.00.

Advertising sold to artists in the Salado Village Voice Jewel in the Crown of Texas totaled \$1,250.00. The Salado Village Voice gives the Chamber 8 pages at no cost for the Art Fair. The Chamber used the pages for a map of the

grounds, a list of the Artists showing and to sell \$25 ads to artists.

Total income for the Art Fair totals \$60,488.90 to date with income from ice sales and concession fees outstanding.

The Chamber has received and paid most of the expenses for the Art Fair, including printing, adver-"We had 8,404 pay to at- tising, trash services, porbuses. Total expenses this year will be approximately

The Chamber will net approximately \$53,000 from the Art Fair, which is more than budgeted and more than last year's Fair.

"I have been involved with a lot of civic projects overthe years," Owens said, "but I have never seen one which goes so smoothly. This has truly been a Village effort and everyone involved should be commended for their good

Roy Hector, chair of the Pace Park committee, rehe has dis-

covered some problems with the facility, namely inadequate electrical service and inadequate toilets.

"Updating the electrical service at Pace Park should be high on the planning list for the future," Hector said.

Hector was given the authority from the Board to seek out a contract with an individual to maintain and manage the Park.

This would include n ing, trash pick-up, setting up tables at the pavilion, minor repairs and other items which the Chamber has had to purchase on a pay-as-you-go basis.

The Chamber voted to pay approximately \$725 as its portion of a memorial plaque to be placed at the entrance of the Salado Civic Center.

The plaque listed the names of the board members of the Chamber and Old Salado School Foundation during the renovation of the old school.

The Chamber reached an understanding with the Pace Park trustees by

Art Fair success for community

The 1994 Salado Art Fair went down in the history books as a resounding success according to co-chairman Don Owens and Jean Davis. The loot from nearly 10,000 visitors was still being computed at press time but profits are expected to equal or exceed last year. The artists went home happy with their sales and all in all it was another great first weekend in August free from the vicissitudes of Texas weather.

Which brings us to the only cloud on the horizon. The funds derived from the annual art show carries the Chamber of Commerce through the year. There is a bit that comes from membership dues and a dab from the antique show but in the main - nearly 70 percent of the \$90,000 current annual budget comes from the successful arts and crafts extravaganza.

What would happen if the weekend was rained out? We can imagine the officers of the chamber hat in hand-beating down the doors of local banks seeking loans to tide the group over until funds were available next year. Grants to the library, scholarships, youth activities, civic center, street lights, fire department, Pace park, merchants committee activities, and

the list goes on and on; all these and more would be halted or curtailed.

That is why - at this point in time, chamber officials are casting about

for fund raising ideas that would back-up the big money raising art fair.

A Spring indoor art fair, expanded antique show activity, auto rally and other events are on the table.

Reserve funds that always gave the chamber a cushion have been donated to two major civic projects over the years with only one coming on line-the Main Street Civic Center.

It is imperative that the chamber keep all their eggs out of one basket, so to speak. Depending almost entirely on one massive fund raising event that relys on good weather is going to bankrupt the chamber one of these days.

Either the chamber is going to have to reduce the wide scope of support of everything they do in town or create a larger supply of money to pass around to soften the ever expanding cry for funds.

If there is a down side to not being incorporated it would have to be that the chamber has had to become the city provider without the tax base necessary for such an effort. By being the only village wide elected entity- the chamber gets most of the complaints and many of the dollar requests. Also because it is a highly visible agency that is super active and has some bucks in the bank.



Dear Editor:

This paper has published or will publish an announcement of a public meeting in Salado on August 16. The Golden Cheeked Warbler Habitat Protection Plan will be discussed.

Some property owners are angry and confused about this, as there has been an amazing amount of wrong information circulated. Anyone who is concerned about this will have an opportunity at this meeting to hear a very reputable National Wildlife Federation executive, Russell Hyer, discuss the issue, and he will answer questions.

Many people are baffled as to why we should protect wild animals and plants,

and perceive this protection as a waste of time, energy and money. Humans are often dependent on other species for well-being. Nature weaves an intricate web of animals (including humans) and plants; connected and interdependent.

However, it is possible that the warbler is not essential to human well-being. The bird may be only an indicator, the tip of the ice berg. In very simple terms, when the warbler's environment is compromised, so may our environment be damaged.

On Aug. 27, at the Belton Expo Center, a political rally will be open to the public. Several candidates will speak, including at least one who has openly criticized the protection plan.

Voters should hear both points of view. Arguments are likely to be extreme so that the astute observer will realize that saving the bird per se is NOT the issue. The issue is the environment for humans. In fact, a set of regulations designed to protect the warbler may be the best way to protect us all from poorly placed rock quarries, refineries, and power plants, as well as from bad water, foul air, dust and noise. We should consider the issue in that context and vote accordingly.



TNRCC tries to reach agreement with Big Chief over clean-up of site

In the last week of July, attorneys for the TNRCC Petroleum Storage Tank Division met with attorneys for the Responsible Party for contaminated water from the former gasoline station site on the west side, of I-35 Big Chief Distributors. The purpose for the meeting was to reach financial agreement as to who would take certain actions to clean up the contaminated water and to define and remove the unleum product.

reached. Now it must be signed. Then it must go to a TNRCC Commissioner. Adesign for cleanup had to be put on hold until an agreement was reached; now after approval by the Commissioner, it can be continued.

Big Chief Distributors is responsible for an assessment of the problem. They have hired a geologist, Dan Ayre as a consultant. Wells will be drilled to locate the plume of contamination. A "receptor survey" will be

done, to determine all the risks (of contaminationi). They will monitor the wells they drill. Actual work may begin in November.

Lean beef can stay a part of low-cholesteral diet

When a cholesterol-lowering diet is prescribed, lean beef can stay on the menu. Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston have determined that eating lean beef in a cholesterol-lowering diet produces reductions in levels of total blood cholesterol and low density lipoprotein, the "bad" cholesterol, similar to those achieved by eating chicken.

"The keys to keeping

beef in a heart-healthy, low-fat diet are the amount of fat in the meat and the portion size," said the study's principal investigator, Lynne Scott. director of the DeBakev Heart Center's Diet Modification Clinic at Baylor and The Methodist Hos-

The study was funded by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Hectic food preparation can increase the chances for food poisoning, especially among young children.

Children are more vulnerable because their intestinal tracts and immune systems are not fully developed, said Dr. Kathleen Motil of the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and they may have less resistance to the bacteria that cause food borne illnesses.

Symptoms of food poisoning include stomach cramps, nausea, diarrhea, vomiting and, in some cases, fever. Symptoms
