Dedication ceremony held for Salado Civic Center

The Salado Civic Center was formally opened with great fanfare as 329 people attended ceremonies Oct. 9 at the old red school on Main St. Salado.

Salado Chamber of Commerce President Denver Mills served as master of ceremonies, as he was joined on stage by Stewart Smith, president of the Old Salado School Foundation (OSSF), Salado alumnus Morris Foster, Paul Meyer and John Meadows of the Meadows Foundation.

The Meadows Foundation gave \$117,000 to the renovation project, The Paul Meyer family gave \$39,000 and Morris Foster led the individual donations with \$25,000.

Mills also thanked vol-

unteer efforts by Bob Cottle, Patsy Sanford, Ken Clapp, Cathy Sands and Suzi Epps.

A model of Troy Kelley's proposed bronze sculpture, "Salado Children" was on display in the Civic Center.

Kelley proposes a life size model of four Salado children at the flagpole. "The sculpture is designed to reflect the ideals and attitudes of education during the late 1920s and early 1930s when the red brick school was constructed," said artist Troy Kelley.

"The placement of the sculpture in front of the 'old school' will signify to everyone that Salado was founded with certain community values and that the residents still pay homage to those values through art," Kelley added.

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
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


Sneaking in the income tax

Amendment Four 1 been, and will continue to be, the most emotionally charged proposal coming before voters on November 2. It deals with the hated "I" word - income taxes - at the state level. It needs a lot more study and thinking over by the electorate.

What the proposed amendment claims to do is simple. It would, if passed, prohibit the legislature from passing a state personal and/or corporate income tax unless and until a referendum is held at which time voters could then have the final say as to implementing the tax on income as well as the rate to be levied. A salient point for those promoting the amendment.

Further, all the income tax revenue would go to education. Two thirds to reduce, dollar for dollar, the school property tax and the balance to support statewide educational programs. These are also good selling points to support such a radical change in our Texas tax system. And lastly, if the legislature - in its infinite wisdom - should decide to raise the income tax rate, they would first have to go back to the voters of the state in referendum for such an increase. Another



plus factor for passage of this proposal.

There are some downsides to this adventure into theunknown abyss of taxation, namely the wording of the law that would implement this measure should it pass. It gives the legislature power to repeal and/or amend the income tax mea-

sure by a simple majority at any time after a statewide vote in favor of the income tax. Repeal is fine but the critical word is "amend" and here we don't know what those loonies in Austin might do given their track record in amending things. These guys are capable of messing up a two car funeral. Think what they could do to an income tax once it was put in place!

There is one other puzzlingaspect to the proposed law that goes along with the amendment; it gives the legislature the power to repeal the law as noted, but also gives the lawmakers the right to reenact the income tax the next year without voter approval. The rate is not mentioned in the reenactment process which means that we could just be giving our "spend it all" solons a blank check through this mysterious loophole in the proposed law that would implement the amendment if passed.

A lot more politicking will take place between now and the presentation of this amendment to the public on November 2. Business

interests in the state are drooling with glee over such a proposed change since they now pay some 60 percent of all ad valorem school taxes. They figure they will get a break if given entry into an income tax setting that could in years to comethanks to the "amendment" clause in the law find all sorts of abatements, special exemptions and other reasons for not paying their fair share. Much as they do today with the federal income tax.

This column has long advocated exchanging the property tax for a low rate incometax-provided there were strict limits on the new tax; voter control on all changes in the rates: dollar for dollar reduction of property taxes for income taxes and no special allowances or exemptions given to special interests.

If you believe that our lawmakers can be trusted to implement with honesty and fairness- an income tax that would take the place of the school property tax; that there would be no special treatment for businesses or individuals; changed without further referendum votes by the people; and that all the proceeds from such an income tax would go 100 percent to public education and not drained off in part for special legislative programs then it is recommended that you approve Amendment Four. Otherwise kill it dead!



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Year-end Gifting can be valuable strategy for investors

(Part 2 of 2)

Gifting can be a very effective com-conent of an individual's year-end tax-clanning efforts. And, in light of increases in tax rates, many more indithis year as a way to control their tax bills. Whether gifting to an individual or a charity, you need to document two essential pieces of information about your gift the date the gift was made and the value of the asset on that date.

Many investors, particularly those who want to conserve cash, prefer to gift securities. This strategy can have additional advantages if the gifted securities have increased in value, since selling them would result in a taxable capital gain for the giver

When gifting securities, documenting both the timing and value of the gift is essential. And you must follow certain rules in determining this information. Further, different types of securiwhen determining their value.

When valuing stocks that trade publicly in an established market, the value of that stock equals the average of the high and low selling prices of the date of the gift. For example, if the lowest trading price on a particular date is \$10 per share and the highest trading price is \$10.50 per share, the value of the stock gifted on that date will be \$10.25 for tax purposes. This is true regardless of the closing price of

the liquidation value of the share) on the date of the gift.

In valuing bonds, you would typi-cally use the same method as in valuing stocks (the average of the high and low selling price on the date of the gift). If the only price available for a bond on particular date is its closing price, the IRS encourages investors to use the average between the closing price on the date of the gift and the closing price on the previous trading date.

Bond prices typically fluctuate based on changing economic conditions (e.g., interest rate movements). As a result, it's not uncommon for there to be no variation in the bid price of a bond over a period of several days. If you are trying to value a bond for purposes of gifting, you should ask your investment broker for the bond's high and low bid prices over the twoday period. However, don't be surprised if you find the two prices are the

He or she can assist you in identifying those securities that might be good candidates for gifts, as well as in developing a plan for effectively transferring those assets to your family or the charity of your choice.

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
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Jordan discusses ethics & morals in public life at Institute Oct. 10

"The role of money in the political system is an obscenity," Barbara Jordan told a packed house Oct. 10 during the first of a series of four lectures on Life's Continuum: Ethics and Morals.

"Ethical principals don't change," Jordan said. "They are enduring. They don't fluctuate."

What does change, however, is the attention paid to those principals by the public. When a public official is not tuned into this attention by the public, that official will be "caught in a snare," Jordan said.

Jordan discussed the downfall of former House speaker Jim Wright. The things Wright did which eventually caused his loss of power were legal at the time he did them, "but the public became attentive to the appearance of impropriety. It is not enough to be legal."

Elected officials, accord-

ing to Jordan, cannot draw a line between what is legal and what is ethical. "Those two lines must become one," she said.

Public officials are the owners of a public trust, according to Jordan. "It is a very high responsibility," she said. "We elect a person to express our views in a manner that pleases us. We don't' want that person to confuse his or her interests with ours." others.

"Not the idea rality in say," Jordan't want that person to crowdt place worder.

Public officials are often held to a higher set of standards than many others. "Many times, officials set the tenor of public discourse. His acts have the potential to become a model of behavior for others."

A viable democracy rests on three pillars: an honest public servant with a set of values, an involved and informed citizenry and a rigorous and responsible press.

The set of standards and values of public officials should include these, according to Jordan:

1. Preservation of life.

2. Individual autonomy.

3. Don't lie, "Just tell the truth," Jordan said.

4. Be fair.

5. Care and concern for others.

"Nothing should replace the ideal of ethics and morality in all we do and all we say," Jordan said.

Jordan told the capacity crowdthat "religiosity is the place where values are in order. It is okay to discuss about values in context of religiosity. No one has told me that God is partisan... and I don't think that she is," Jordan said with a laugh.

The family is first in line in teaching ethics and values. "We are afraid of spanking today and something is wrong with that.... My mother had a strap when I was growing up. I knew where it was and when I did something I knew was wrong, I knew it would be used. Sometimes the best thing I could do is try to hide the strap," Jordan said with a smile.
