Identity of peoples is topic for anthropologist Edmund Carpenter's Humanities lecture

The native people of Canada and the circumpolar world is the topic of the spring lecture and seminar series sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities at Salado. Anthropologist Dr. Edmund Carpenter will begin the series on March 14-15.

Carpenter, who is from New York, has spent time living with Eskimos (Inuit). On a trip north with a bush pilot, his equipment was lost and he spent seven months living with Eskimos exactly as they lived. This trip formed the basis of his knowledge of Eskimo culture and art. Carpenter has returned since his first trip, but does not enjoy the

experience as much because, "the reality of the new situation destroys what I remember of the old."

Carpenter has taught anthropology at the Universities of Pennsylvania, Toronto, Harvard and California. His area of study has focused primarily on Eskimo culture and the power of the media. His books include Eskimo Realities, Social Symbolism in Ancient and Tribal Art, and They Became What They Beheld.

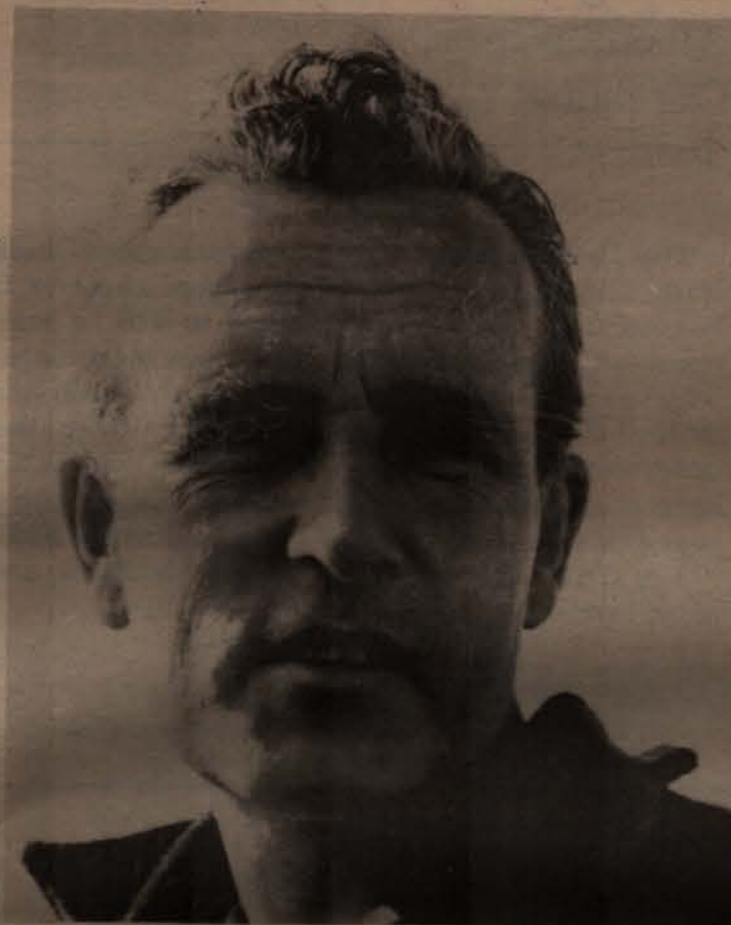
According to Carpenter, the culture of the Eskimo has been dramatically affected by the media: "There are no Indians and Eskimos left. There are

only media Indians and Eskimos. But nobody is aware of this, not even the Indians and Eskimos themselves. In the media world, only the fake is genuine."

Carpenter plans to explore the topic of Eskimo identity in his March 14 seminar "Self in the Electronic Age" at 10 a.m. at the Inn on the Creek.

His lecture "What Identity? Whose Identity?" will be presented 4 p.m., March 15 at the Mill Creek Inn.

Rain delays local farmers planting

Rain continues to delay all farming activities across Central Texas. The time to get "spring planted" is getting very short.

Many people are starting to call the office about weed control and fertilizer on coastal bermuda grass pastures. Many coastal fields on flat land which do not drain well, have water standing in them at this time. In that situation it is not a good idea to put out fertilizer until the soil surface dries. Fertilizer put out on standing water will more than likely evaporate rather than soak into the soil.

Coastal fields that have drained well could be fertilized at this time as they will be greening up very soon. The fertilizer needs to be down and working early to make that good cutting of hay in May. As fertilizer is being put out, a good applicaiton of herbicide would also be recommended in areas where

weeds are a problem. Most broad leaf weeds can be easily taken care of in the Spring with hormone type herbicides or Ally. Any winter annual grasses (Little Barley) would need to be sprayed now with a grass herbicide (Roundup) prior to green up of the coastal. Once the coastal starts to green up a grass herbicide cannot be used because it will also damage the coastal.

At this time, 1992 looks to be a challenging year for all agriculture. Decision making is going to be most difficult due to all the environmental factors we are facing. Anyone needing help with decisions on fertilizer, herbicides or cultural practices are more than welcome to call the County Extension Office. With the help of the various specialists located both on and off campus at Texas A & M University, we should be able to get information that will help producers in their decision-making process.

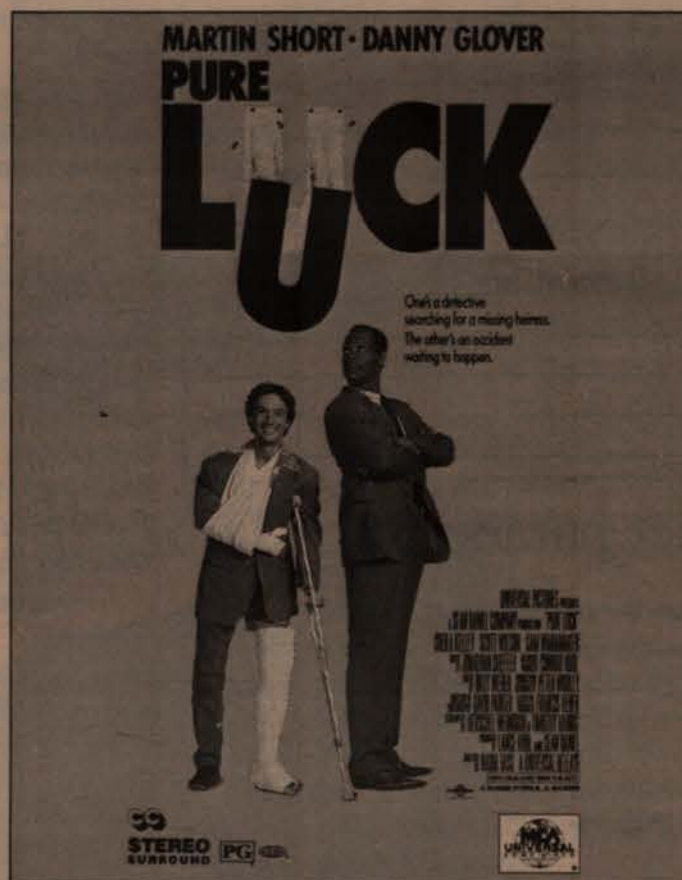

Bartlett Electric Co-op visits school

On Feb. 12, Linda Ferguson asst. office manager and Jim Crum, lineman, employees of the Bartlett Electric Cooperative, Inc., presented a program on safety and cooperative history to the third and fifth grades at Thomas Arnold Elementary School.

Linda first gave the classes a brief history of the Cooperative, the electricity they use in their homes is generated. They were shown a piece of lignite coal which is used to produce electricity in a lignite plant.

Jim demonstrated the safety equipment the cooperative linemen use on their jobs and the purpose of each piece and how it protects their lives. The students were also instructed in safety rules were pointed out.

Salado won the game in the bottom of the seventh. After two outs had been recorded, Jereme Hosch doubled to centerfield. Jason Hosch followed with a walk. Morris then lined a two-strike pitch to right center for the game winning hit.

The win gives the Eagles a 3-1 record. Morris led the Eagles hitters with two hits. Robbie Ray picked up the win on the mound for the Eagles. He pitched the last 5-1/2 innings, striking out 10 while not allowing a hit.

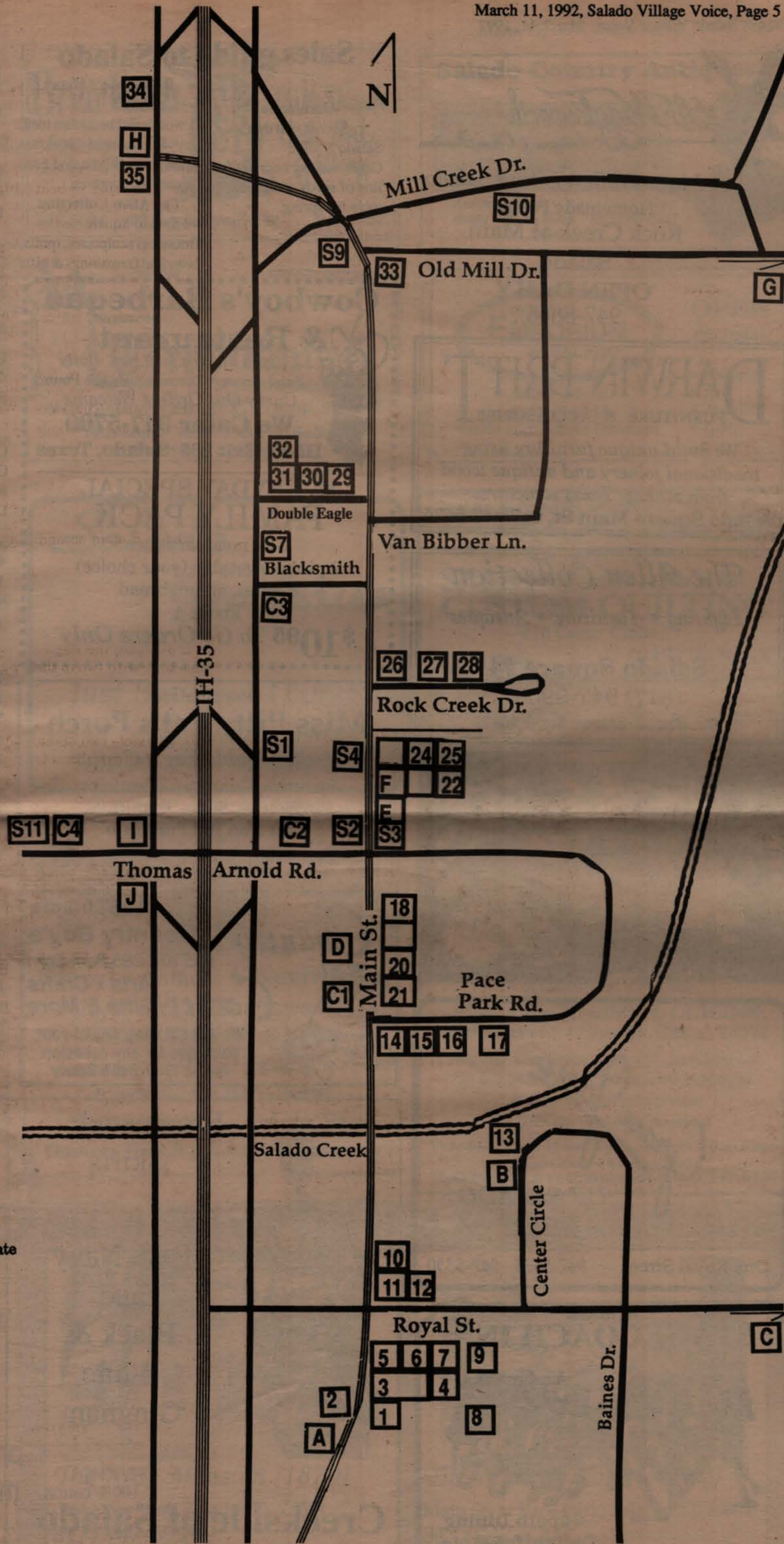

Georgetown, and Doris Ann Spell of Jackson, Mississippi; 13 grandchildren and 14 great-grand children.

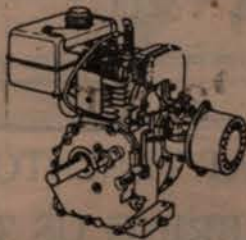
Funeral services were held March 7 in the First Baptist Church with Dr. Ralph Smith and Reverend Mike Bergman officiating.

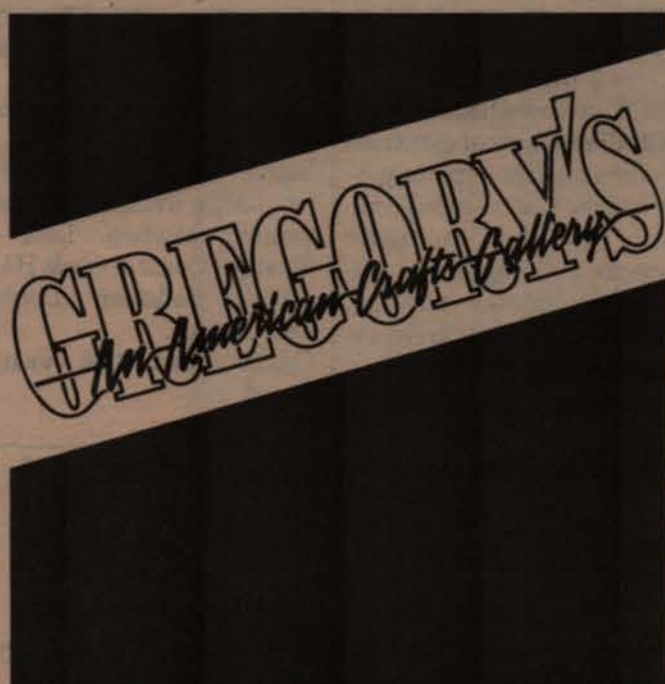
