Bluebonnet Parade & Antique Show Apr. 11-12 will attract many to Salado

The ingredients for the Third Annual Bluebonnet Antique Show and Parade April 11-12 include antiques, antique car displays, a giant parade and much more.

Inside a circus-like tent some of the more outstanding antique dealers in Texas as well as from out of state will be gathered.

Cathy Sands, director of the Antique Show, noted that this year's presentation of top antiques will include forty dealers from as far away as Arizona and Missouri and as near as Belton. They will have some of the finest examples of primitive, old glass, silver, furniture, quilts and wide array of collectibles. The dealers will be under a giant tent located on the grounds of the old red brick school house on Main Street.

A second tent will house the refreshments for visitors as well as serve as a place to rest and visit.

The two day event kicks-off with a parade starting at 10 a.m. April 11. Parade route runs from

the Salado Plaza Shopping Center down Main Street and past the old post office.

Grand marshal of the parade is Thelma Fletcher, owner of Fletcher's Books & Antiques in Salado. Mrs. Fletcher has been an important and integral part of Salado since coming to the village in the 1950s.

An additional feature of the parade is a large number of antique automobiles that will for the first time be a part of this year's Spring event.

Three auto groups will be in town for the parade including the Lincoln and Continental Owners Club from three regions of the state; the Texas Packard Club and the Wildflower Region of the Antique Automobile Clubs of America headquartered in Temple. The Lincolns will hold a meet in Pace Park and the public is invited to attend. There is no charge to view the judging of the 1936-1980 model cars.

The Packards will be on display at the Stagecoach Inn and the more than 20

old cars of various types from Temple will take part in the parade and then be on display around the Antique Show's tent.

Art

The Salado Village Artist will present a display of completed works as well as a demonstration of work actually in progress. This display will be across from the Antique show on Main Street April 11-12.

A silent auction of paintings donated by the Salado Village Artists will be held with proceeds going towards the Tablerock restoration project.

Music

Local musicians will be on hand to entertain visitors at noon, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. on April 11 just across the street from the Antique Show. The groups will feature Greg Barry, singer and instrumentalists; Mansel Bolton, guitarist and singer Alice Wells and Richard Paul Thomas, singer and guitarist.

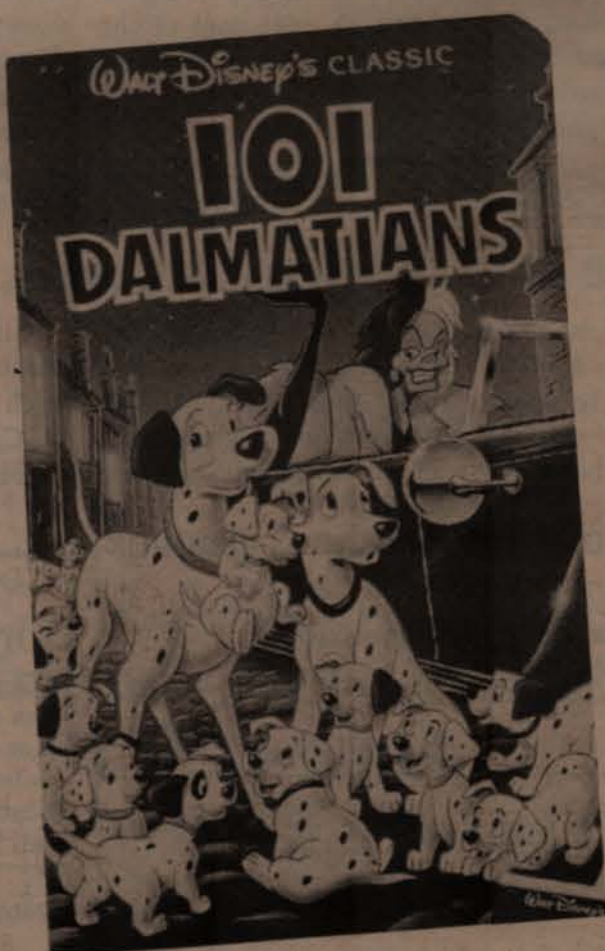

The CB Hodge soccer team got on the winning track April 4, defeating Temple Kiwanis, 3-1.

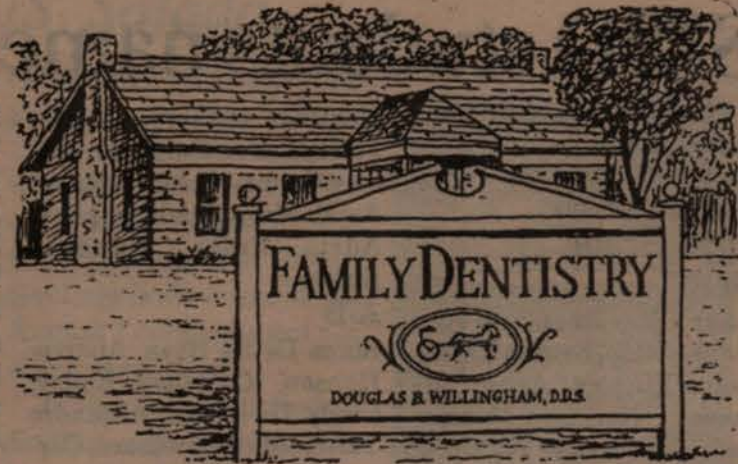
Salado scored early on a shot from Josh Lee. A few minutes later, Lee made a perfect pass to Ryan Hodge, who scored the second and third goals in the first half.

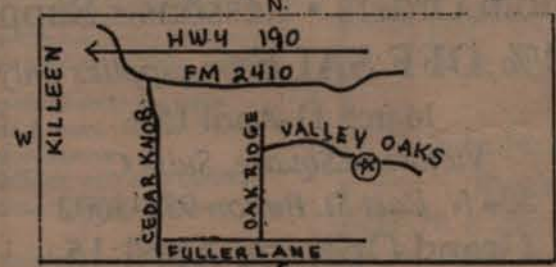

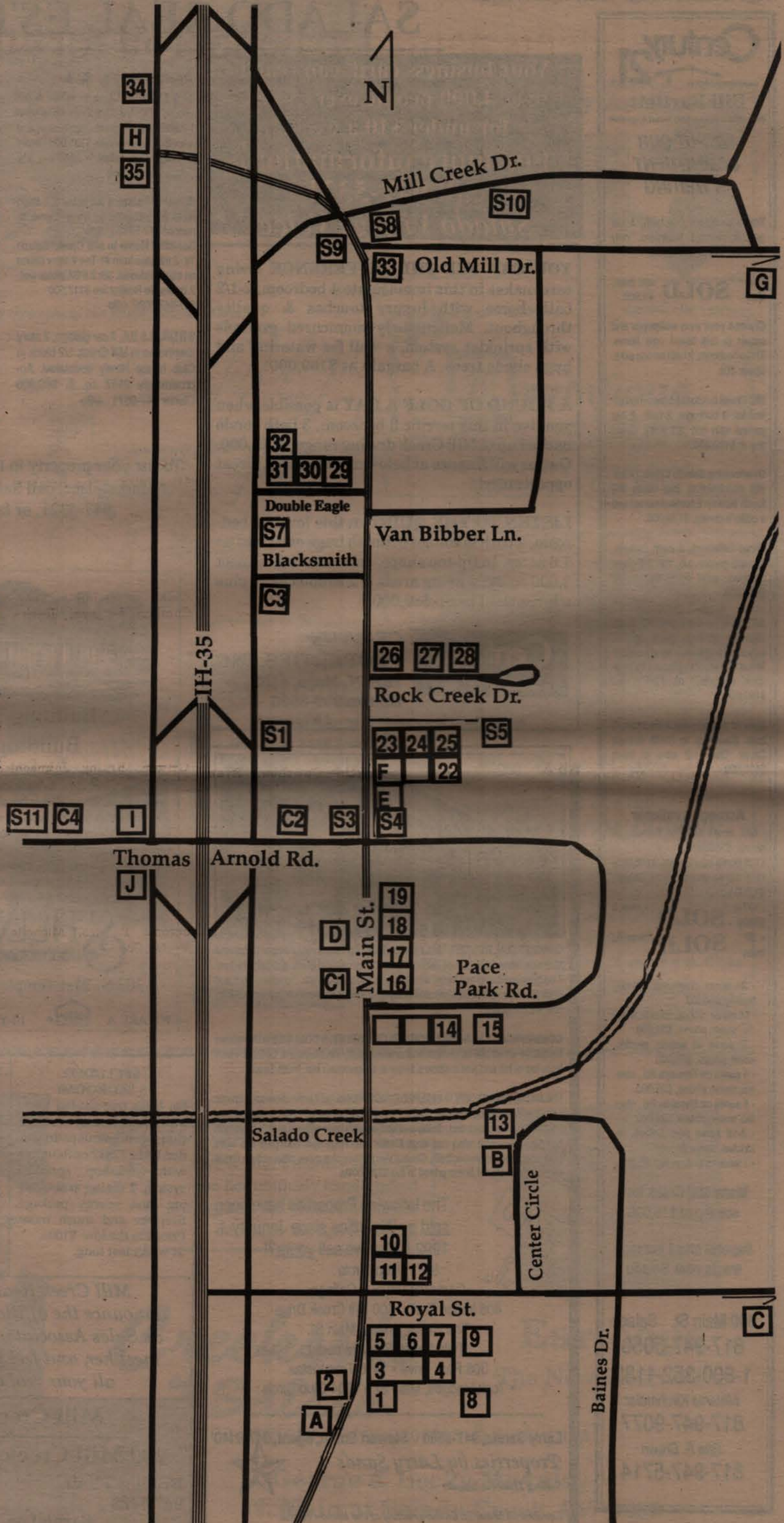

Canada-US relations topic of Dr. Winks' Apr. 12 lecture

The third speaker at the Institute for the Humanities at Salado's spring series on the native people of Canada will be Dr. Robin Winks. Winks, a retired professor of History at Yale University, will speak on April 11-12.

Winks will lead a seminar on "The UnAmerican Structure of the Canadian Experience," at 10 a.m. on April 11, at the Inn on the Creek. His lecture on "The First Decolonization: Can-

The 1867-70 McWhirter-Walker-Kimball House at 400 N. Pearl St., home of the "Sanctificationist Religion" and

family home of two U.S. Army Four-Star Generals Walton Harris Walker and his son Sam Sims Walker, the 1893 Victorian luxury home of Ele B. Baggett at 1019 N. Main St., now a bed and breakfast, and the 1914 Watters-Kelley "mail order catalogue" house at 508 N. Wall St. are returning to the tour.

A new dimension is the 1990 Antebellum Texas Style ranch house reproduced in a pre-Civil War style plan on property in the Messer Estate for a number of years, three miles west on Highway 190, and the Summers Mill Farm. Summers Mill was built in 1866 and the present plantation style home built in 1902 is on the site of the house first built there in 1870. It is currently a horse ranch and ostrich farm.

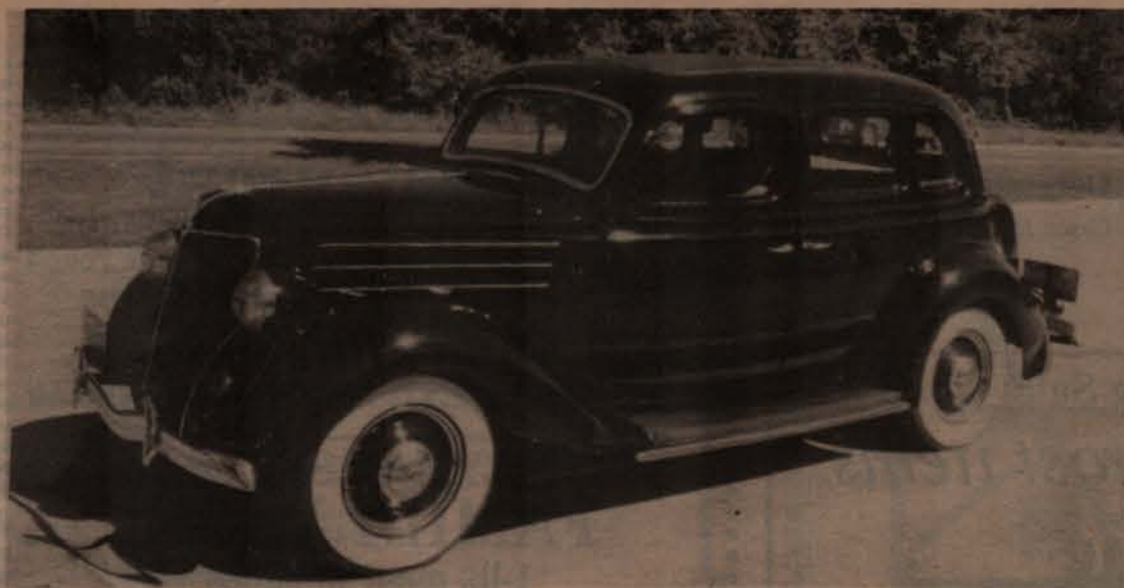

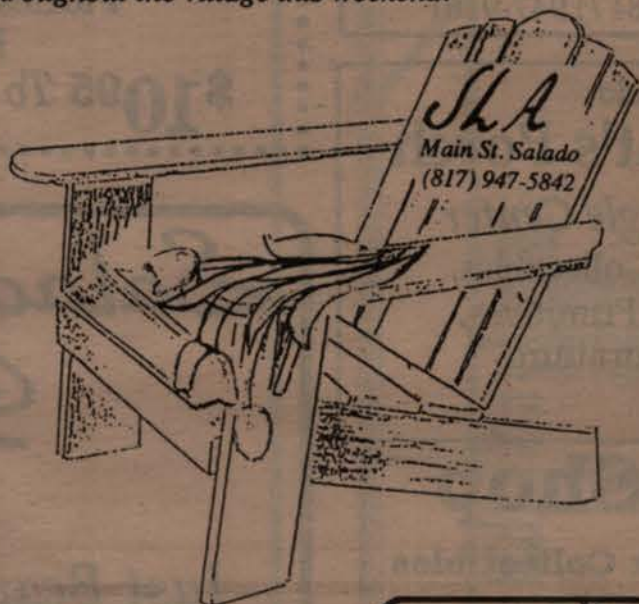
A basic life support course for the general public will be offered at Scott and White in Temple 6-9 p.m. April 21-22.
